



#### FACTS FROM THE PAST by Kay Wells

Ever wonder why we call our fair grounds the Cloverdale CITRUS Fair, when you don't see that many citrus trees about town or on surrounding farmlands? Well, in the 1880s, there were 1170 acres in fruit including 500 orange trees and 2000 fig trees. The new fairgrounds, established in 1892, was named in honor of those citrus groves. In all, 95,000 lbs. of fruit were shipped from our depot on the San Francisco and No. Pacific Railroad to markets far and wide. This included 3885 acres of grapes producing 337,250 gallons of wine.

There is a 100+ year old orange tree on the grounds of what is now the Cloverdale History Museum. It was planted by Isaac Shaw in the garden of the Gould Shaw House, built in 1862. And the oranges are delicious!

#### **Tips for Buying Firewood**

Whether you're looking for wood to burn in a fireplace, wood stove or backyard fire pit, here's what to keep in mind before you buy. It's best to store firewood with plenty of space between the logs to allow drying and prevent rotting. And don't position the firewood right next to your house or garage due to mice, insects and fire danger.

Firewood is sold by the cord - 8 ft. long x 4 ft. deep x 4 ft. high. A face cord is one-third of a full cord, so it's a single stack that measures 4 ft. high by 8 ft. long x 20" +/-.

For an indoor fireplace or stove, buy firewood that is dense like oak and maple. Maple and fruitwoods are great for cooking fires because they infuse the food with a pleasant flavor. Stay away from resinous wood such as pine and spruce for indoor fires. They create creosote that can coat a chimney and cause a chimney fire. Other woods to avoid: pressure-treated, painted, stained and manufactured wood, such as plywood and particleboard. These woods can release toxic gases.

Recently harvested (green) wood is very heavy due to its high moisture content. If you are buying firewood that is green, plan to let it season (dry out) for approximately nine months. Seasoned wood is dry to the touch, has cracks in the ends and loose bark.

Ask the approximate size of the logs so you can make sure they'll fit your fireplace or stove. Most firewood is about 16 in. long, but it's worth asking to make sure the logs will work for you without additional chopping.

Is delivery available? If so, is there an extra charge?

Will they stack the wood where you want to store it or will they leave it in a pile on your driveway?

If you're picking it up, will they help you load up the wood? (A typical 8 ft. truck bed will hold about one-third of a cord if the wood is piled loosely or two-thirds of a cord if it's tightly stacked.)

#### **Reach For Home**


Reach for Home understands that the greatest reduction in homeless populations occurs when there are established relationships between healthcare, housing services and treatment. Conversely, in areas of the county with limited services, including North County, homeless numbers increase. Due to the acuteness of their mental and physical condition, this population often resists housing opportunities, thereby creating more homelessness.

Reach For Home offers the only Street Medicine team in Sonoma County and are one of the few agencies that provide direct support to approximately 250 of the most vulnerable people who call the North County their home. In Cloverdale, their team goes directly to the encampments to provide critical care and to build relationships with people who are distrustful of institutionalized settings. They track their progress through the county's information software as well as Vertical Change software (client management, data collection, impact reporting) and are required to report achievement of goals on a quarterly basis. Jackie, Rick and Jim provide transportation to those individuals that work with the agency so they can meet with primary care physicians or connect with social services.

In the early stages of COVID-19, when the SIP order was first issued, Reach For Home distributed food to the encampments. As this crisis continues, they perform wellness checks and distribute masks for the safety of their clients. By the end of 2020, they hope to purchase a medical van to provide confidentiality and a safe place for medication management and medically assisted treatments.

Reach for Home believes if they provide this type of care, more people will seek housing but without it, more people suffer mentally and physically due to unhealthy living conditions. #### **Resilient Cloverdale**

The City of Cloverdale and a host of other local organizations have been making preparations to protect the health and well-being of our residents, businesses and guests throughout Cloverdale in the event of a wildlfire or other natural disaster, while building on the lessons of the Kincade fire in 2019, and adopting the practices that prevent the spread of COVID 19.

#### **Background:**

In October of 2019, the Kincade fire broke out a few miles south of Cloverdale. In response Pacific Gas and Electric turned off essential lifelines, electricity and natural gas, to the city in an effort to mitigate the impact of the wildfire. Within hours, many vulnerable residents in the community, sheltering in their homes, began to experience difficulties protecting their health and well-being due to the reduction in services. At the same time, a large number of residents from the surrounding region began to present themselves at the Citrus Fairgrounds looking for care and shelter support. Fortunately, the city's civic networks activated and organized feeding, volunteer and donation strategies to support all those impacted by the Kincade fire.

In December of 2019, the city convened a group of key stakeholders to launch a strategic planning process that would increase the capacity to prepare for, and respond to, times of stress in an inclusive and equitable manner. The program was branded Resilient Cloverdale and was supported by the City Manager's office, the Mayor and key local civic and service leaders.

In February, 2020, Resilient Cloverdale hosted a convening of all social and spiritual service organizations to inventory lessons learned from the response to the Kincade fire as well as begin to craft an integrated readiness/response strategy for future events to address the gaps that were brought forward during the meeting. Soon after, the COVID 19 pandemic occurred and the strategic planning process was put on hold.

A few months later, using Zoom and other virtual mediums, the Resilient Cloverdale leadership team re-started the planning process, so that any future response to local disasters can occur regardless of operating concerns.

#### The three primary goals are:

Advance overall readiness of the city by investing in systems, relationships and resources to ensure any future response to disasters is done in an equitable and inclusive manner regardless of operating conditions (like a global pandemic).

Increase the level of readiness of the Cloverdale Citrus Fairgrounds to respond to the surges in demand for care and shelter.

Establish a local COAD (Community Agencies Active in Disaster) to support Cloverdale's readiness and response goals encompassing all populations in the community.

Cannabis comes in a assortment of strains and varieties. At Red Door Remedies, budtenders describe the effects in ways that customers can understand. Each strain has its own unique flavor and experience. The varieties have different effects. Indicais usually fornight time, an intense relaxing effect, Sativa for daytime, a more stimulating effect, a Hybrid tends to lean more towards one or the other and CBD does not have the high but helps with stress and lack of sleep. Discussing your desired effect will help your Budtender know a bit more about you and what you're hoping for. Know going in that all products must pass state testing for potency and contaminants before hitting the shelves. What's on the label is what's in that package.

When visiting a Dispensary you will have to provide current valid state or government issued ID. Like a driver's license or passport. If you're a Medical Patient, please bring your Medical Marijuana Card with you. Most facilities accept cash, debit cards and online payment apps or have an ATM available. If you're unsure, try calling ahead. There may also be Covid restrictions - take your mask with you, most places will require you wear one.

# Alexander Valley Healthcare's Next Chapter

Alexander Valley Healthcare was incorporated in 1994 as Coppertower Family Medical Center, offering medical and dental services from a modest, three-story facility on the corner of North Cloverdale Blvd. and First Street. A decade later, the last private practice physician in Cloverdale departed, leaving Alexander Valley Healthcare as the sole primary care provider between Ukiah and Healdsburg.

In 2013, Alexander Valley Healthcare was designated a federally qualified health center, which allows it to receive federal health care grants and enhanced Medicare and Medicaid reimbursement. With the new designation, Alexander Valley Healthcare was able to expand its services and staff adding general dentistry, behavioral health and substance abuse services, chronic care case management, and other patient services for the community. In addition to serving uninsured and low-income patients, Alexander Valley Healthcare also cares for a large number of privately insured patients and Medicare beneficiaries. In total Alexander Valley Healthcare providers annually receive and care for 5,000 patients covering more than 25,000 patient visits.

The next chapter is the construction of a state-of-the-art medical facility in Cloverdale. Alexander Valley Healthcare hopes to break ground in 2020 on a Community Health & Wellness Center, which will continue providing comprehensive primary care, general dentistry, behavioral health and substance abuse services. The new facility allows for additional health services such as: Specialized Care and Treatment, including alternative healing, community educational series, laboratory and pharmacy services, as well as, application assistance with health coverage, prescription assistance and food assistance – all in one location.

With Thanksgiving right around the corner and Covid numbers sadly on the rise, preparing for Thanksgiving this year will be a new kind of stressful for many as they decide how to safely celebrate. When stress threatens to dampen the joy of a holiday, utilizing a bit of humor is just what the doctor ordered.

Embrace the joy of Thanksgiving in all of its pumpkin glory and take some Covid humor from when TP was flying off the shelves and marry the 2 in celebration?

#### **COVID-19 General Testing Information**

There are two kinds of tests for COVID-19: viral tests and antibody tests.

A viral test tells you if you have a current infection. An antibody test tells you if you had a previous infection.

Close to 40% of people who test positive experience no symptoms (asymptomatic), but are still spreading the disease. Those persons who are symptomatic OR who are identified as a close contact (anyone who was within 6 feet of an infected person for at least 15 minutes starting from 48 hours before the person began to feel sick until the infected person was isolated) will be advised they must quarantine pending test results to prevent the spread of the virus.

If you are experiencing COVID-19 symptoms or suspect that you were exposed to someone with COVID-19, contact your healthcare provider **right away** for guidance on the quickest way to get a test.

Provide a working cell phone number or email address to the testing site authorizing receipt of test results via text or email.

Those with a positive test result will receive a follow-up phone call from a Public Health nurse who will:

Provide guidance on isolation to prevent the spread in one's household and community; and

Inquire about any needs and offer resource support to help the infected person and their family during their illness.

The Department of Health Services (DHS) has expanded its system for monitoring cases and contacts which helps break the chain of infection by monitoring people who have been exposed or infected as early as possible, getting them to care, and helping them to isolate from others.

DHS will Determine Contacts (anyone who was within 6 feet of an infected person for at least 15 minutes starting from 48 hours before the person began to feel sick until the infected person was isolated)

DHS will attempt to make contact with individuals with direct exposure

DHS will then assess contacts

Close contacts are asked to voluntarily comply with a daily assessment of their symptoms via phone call from a public health nurse for the 14 days of their quarantine.

Asymptomatic contacts are instructed to get tested approximately 7 days after the exposure.


All contacts with symptoms are tested as soon as possible

If you test positive for COVID-19 by a viral test, know what protective steps to take if you are sick or caring for someone.

If you test negative for COVID-19 by a viral test, you probably were not infected at the time your sample was collected. However, that does not mean you will not get sick. The test result only means that you did not have COVID-19 at the time of testing.

#### **Betty Mankin**

When the Citrus Fair was on the corner of 1st and the Blvd.the fair building would become Cloverdale Furniture for many years. When it caught fire, one of the biggest in Cloverdale, it was the last working fire the 29 American LaFrance worked. It is still owned by the fire dept. I'm sure of that as it was my husband who ran it for 8 hours. None of the buildings down 1st St to the theatre were there at that time. Remember when the Hell's Angels would come to town. They partied in town because at the time someone owned property up by "Squaw Rock" where they camped. Buck had his own way of handling them. He would go to the head officer and tell him of a problem and he was told to take care of it. Had 3 of the Hell's Angels in the ambulance at one time after an accident by Commisky Station.

#### **Gary Murray**

I'm a newcomer working on my 71st year in our little town. Now my mother-in-law is heading for here, 102 year in Cloverdale. We used to have Water Balloon Fights every Halloween. Both sides on the downtown street were lined up. Cops got rid of it back in the 70's. In Nov.1966 we beat the St.Helena Saints 12-7 to win our very 1st NCL Football Championship. We had the world's largest Plywood Mill NORTH OF TOWN. Burnt to the ground one year.

#### Geri Giovannetti

We used to swim in the river. The Lion's Club used to dam it up & place docks out. It was our official swimming hole before the pool was built. My grandparents owned the property (still in the family) that is at the end of the levee. Deed goes out to middle of the river. They always allowed people to swim there & the Lion's Club to dam up. The big gate is now there stopping people from going onto the ranch property because they started dumping their garbage into the orchard & then vineyard. They used the sprinkler heads for target practice. Used to shoot them off!

#### Carol Gibbs Rankin

Another interesting thing, Beck firetrucks were made in Cloverdale for many years at the end of Sandholm. They were delivered all over the country.

#### **Dominic Fontana**

There was at one time big Indian camps at McCray road, Asti, Sulphur Creek, etc. Bud Lyda used to bring the town's Christmas tree every year. There used to be large mills at both ends of town. Used to have sheep dog trials at the city park. There were many trucking companies in town. The crossing at Sulphur Creek used to be made every summer before the bridge that is there now. Hwy 101 used to roll through town, and at Preston Bridge north was a very dangerous section near NACO west. Used to be able to take Kelly Road to Annapolis. Across from the new fire station used to be a vineyard, used to be able to drive on the riverbed at First Street bridge was the way down to the river with cars. Police Chief Buck would walk the boulevard with only his baton. He would visit all the bars in town and socialize with the patrons. He made sure nobody was too rowdy or if someone needed to get home he would take them. He was a great police chief, gentleman.

#### Susan Ramazzotti

We had multiple clothing stores, dress shops, liquor stores and many bars. A furniture store, an appliance/paint store and later a Sears catalog store. We had Picks Drive In, A&W (later H&L Drive In) Foster Freeze, The Wheel, the Owl and The Redwood Smorgette Cafe. A Dry Cleaner and we even had a court house at the end of town. The old feed store, multiple smaller scale grocery stores, sporting goods stores (penny candy at the B&B (Gambetta's). We had a bowling alley, and a riding club and two operational horse arenas.

I forgot about Bouchers - two swimming pools and a kids' pool, miniature golf and a nine hole golf course. A small lake where you could rent pedal boats and see the small version of the Statue of Liberty and a great picnic area with food and a club house for the golfers and a camp ground up above, which is still there.





#### Barbara DuVall

Cloverdale, passed away October 15, 2020, just shy of her 90th Birthday. 
