



Make plans to satisfy your fair food cravings on February 12, 13 & 14. Local vendors will be serving sweet and savory treats like corndogs, garlic fries, funnel cakes, and hand-spun cotton candy. Vehicles will enter the fairgrounds off Washington Street and drive through the fairgrounds to order and pick-up food. All guests must remain in their vehicles and wear masks.

Community parade floats will be displayed along with citrus sculptures and still exhibits like art, photography, and class projects. Plus, local talent will be performing on-grounds (weather dependent), and 4-H youths will showcase their fuzzy farm animals for drive-by viewing.

"Little ones" can be signed up for the Timed Trial Baby Derby, happening Saturday, February 13th. Folks of all ages are encouraged to show off their skills in the virtual Community Talent Showcase, while exhibitors can enter their arts, crafts, and photography. Finally, the livestock exhibit contest is open to 4-H, FFA, and Open exhibitors and the Cloverdale Cabaret Players will be putting together a video showcasing top performances over the years.

The Villas Winning Cookie Recipe

The Cookie WINNER was Laurie Currier with her Gluten/ Dairy Free Peanut Butter Balls. The Villas residents had so much fun making and eating the cookies from all the recipes that were submitted.

This is a gluten free and dairy free cookie ball recipe. If there is sensitivity to chocolate, then substitute with dried fruit (raisins, cranberries).

Note: Brewer's yeast not needed.

Peanut Butter Balls

Ingredients:

1 cup old fashioned oatmeal

½ cup peanut butter

½ cup ground flaxseed

1 cup organic shredded coconut

1/3 cup organic honey

½ TBS Brewer's yeast

1 tsp vanilla

½ cup chocolate chips

Directions:

Combine dry ingredients first: oatmeal, coconut, chocolate chips, Brewers yeast & ground flaxseed. Add peanut butter, honey & vanilla. Turn mixer on low and mix together. Refrigerate mixture for at least one hour. Remove from refrigerator & roll mixture into small balls. These are NO Bake cookies!







Cooking With Dave by David Maciel

My goal in sharing these recipes is to help stretch your dollars and provide wholesome belly warming meals. All the ingredients are readily available at any local grocery store. My background is in the food industry where I spent several years working with chefs developing recipes and ideas for menus.

Country Pork Spare Ribs in a Pot

Country pork spare ribs in a pot is a recipe I use frequently. You can also use baby back or spare ribs but cut the cooking time to 60 minutes. These ribs come out fork tender and I hope will become a family favorite.

4 lbs Country Pork Ribs bone-in or out

1 cup Onions chopped

1 cup Ketchup

1/4 cup Worcestershire

1/4 cup White Vinegar

½ cup Brown Sugar

½ teaspoon Dry Mustard

Splash of Tabasco or Hot Sauce

Juice of two lemons

Salt to taste


Pre heat the oven to 350 degrees. Sauté the onions until limp or clear in color, turn off heat and add the remaining ingredients and mix well, re-heat over low to a simmer for 30 minutes.


In a large oven proof covered pot, pour in a small amount of sauce layer in ribs, pour in more sauce and repeat with the pork ribs. Place in oven and cook WITHOUT removing the top for 90 minutes.

Remove the meat when done. Add a dozen ice cubes to collect the fat, then replace the meat or serve right away. Serve over real hot steamed rice or mashed potatoes.

Notes:

Add more onions if you like a strong taste and don't saute them; taste will be a bit strong. Add more hot sauce if you like hotter style sauces.

Whisker Talk:

News, advice, and observations on life with pets by Brigid Wasson

Is your pet microchipped? If so, do you understand how it works? Many pet owners do not, making the chip ineffective as prevention against getting lost.

getting lost. Here are 5 important microchip tips.

- 1) The chip must be registered. Do not assume that the vet or shelter did it for you. Go to www.microchiplookup.org and enter the chip number to see if it is registered and with which registry.
- 2) The chip is not GPS. It does not track your pet's movement and cannot be used to locate a lost pet. There are GPS collars and tags you can find on Amazon that do perform this function.
- 3) Indoor pets should be microchipped. Every day owners are looking for their lost pets who lived indoors but got out due to some mishap. Accidents happen, and the chip is cheap insurance for the safety of your pet.
- 4) Microchips do not cause cancer. Any pet can get cancer, and none have been linked to the implantation of a microchip.
- 5) You do not have to pay yearly fees. Many chip registries offer premium services for an extra yearly fee but you can opt out. Once the chip is registered it is for life. A good website with free online registration is www.foundanimals.org.

If your pet is not microchipped, call Animal Hospital of Cloverdale or Good Dogs Pet Sitting to make an appointment.





Almost half of yearly marriage proposals will happen on Valentine's Day.







Let's Travel by Craig Clark

Having just returned from a trip to Belize allow me to share my travel experience during this COVID pandemic. A face mask was required from the airport until I arrived at my hotel room.

Belize required a negative PCR test for Covid-19 within 72 hrs. of travel, the download of their health app and itinerary details with an approved hotel or resort. A QR code is issued and must be displayed upon entry. I was required to show it prior to boarding in SFO.

Checking in with United was self-service as far as printing boarding passes and luggage tags. An agent did check my passport and place my bag on the conveyor. Upon boarding each flight, I was given sealed disinfectant wipes. The United safety video showed the plane being sanitized with a fogging machine prior to boarding so I felt safe.

Upon arrival into Belize passengers were checked for temperature, proof of negative COVID test, and the health app QR code. Belize is very strict about wearing face masks with significant fines for offenders.

From Belize City I flew Tropic Air to San Pedro and stayed at the Phoenix Hotel. We relied on Amigos del Mar dive shop and posted a few dive videos on Cloverdale Travel's Facebook page.

While Belize had a 10pm to 5am curfew, restaurants and shops were open and people were out and about but I didn't see anyone not wearing a mask.

For my US re-entry through Houston, immigration and customs did not require paperwork, only a look at my passport and a quick photo and I was on my way to recheck my bag and pass security. US Customs did have the dogs out in force; the Houston airport shops and restaurants were all open and busy. Arrival into SFO was just the opposite of Houston. Almost all shops and food outlets were closed and few people in the terminal.

Just to be safe, the first day back I took 3 COVID tests, private lab, county, and Kaiser. All showed negative for COVID.





Love is in the air at the Cloverdale Citrus Fair By Mary Jo Winter

Like this year, many of Cloverdale's past Citrus Fairs have been held on weekends that included Valentine's Day, a day synonymous with love and romance. Over the years, at least three couples have exchanged wedding vows during the Fair, albeit none of them on Feb. 14.

The first was on Feb. 22, 1925, between 19-year-old Eunice Studebaker of Philo and 25-year-old Fred McGinsey of Boonville. The Sunday afternoon ceremony on the pavilion stage was performed by Rev. Leland Rathbone of the Cloverdale Congregational Church.

In addition to the license, ring and minister's fee, the Citrus Fair provided the bride's gown and local merchants gave them gifts of household articles and other necessities. Following a brief honeymoon at McCray's Resort, the couple made their home in Boonville.



The public wedding was such a great draw, the Fair Board tried to do it again in 1931. Despite extensive publicity by both the Citrus Fair and the Chamber of Commerce, including promises of many wonderful gifts, no follow up articles were found indicating a wedding actually took place that year.

The 1940 Citrus Fair, however, culminated on Feb. 25 with the "Leap Year" wedding of 22-yearold Santa Rosa residents Lexie Walker and Clarence Marlatt. The Chamber provided the

bride's trousseau and the young couple received more than \$200 worth of merchandise from sponsoring merchants.

It would be thirty-four years before the next public wedding was held. On Feb. 16, the final day of the 1974 Citrus Fair, Sacramento residents Dick Cross and Jo Ann Arnold tied the knot under the Happy Time Circus big top.

Cross, the circus' musician and a good friend of Happy the Clown, was able to fulfill his long-standing desire to be married in Happy's tent. The bride-to-be had always wanted to be a Valentine's Day bride but was willing to settle for two days later.

The wedding took place at 5:30 p.m., right after the Wrist Wrestling Matches in the auditorium. Everyone was invited to "come as you are - clown suits not required."






