Sicilian Cookie Memories

My grandmother, Vincenza, immigrated from Sicily to Upstate New York in the early part of the last century. Along with that journey came colorful stories, century-old traditions and old-world recipes. Vincenza's Sicilian cookies were a visual delight with their bright green and white frosting and sticky fig filling which oozed out of their flakey crusts.

These delectable morsels were also instrumental in bridging a communication gap and showing kindness to those around her. On Easter, Nana piled dozens of crisply-baked colorful Sicilian cookies into a tattered farm basket lined with burlap. Delighted neighbors happily selected a few cookies from her cornucopia as she made her deliveries, door to door.

Vincenza's Sesame Cookies

½ cup sesame seeds 1/4 tsp. salt 1/4 cup water ½ cup shortening

2½ cups sifted flour 2 eggs slightly beaten

1/4 cup milk ½ sugar

2 ½ tsp. baking powder 1 tsp. vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Grease two baking sheets. Moisten sesame seeds with ½ cup water. Sift flour, sugar, baking powder and salt together. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse cornmeal. Stir in eggs, milk and vanilla. Mix until dough is smooth. Form dough into a ball and cut ball into four pieces.

On a lightly floured board, roll pieces with palms of hands, forming long ropes 1/2" thick. Cut ropes into 2" Spread moistened sesame seeds on a flat surface; roll cookies over them, coating well. cookies, 1" apart, on greased baking sheets. Bake until cookies are browned 10-12 minutes. Make 3 dozen.

Quick & Easy Chicken Cacciatore Is a peasant comfort food recipe that won't break the budget and is sure to please even the pickiest eaters. Use either bone-in or boneless chicken - note boneless meats cook faster so adjust cooking times.

Ingredients

6 each chicken skin-on, bone-in thighs or whole legs

1 can 14.5 ounce can chopped tomatoes

½ cup chopped red green or yellow bell pepper

½ cup onion

1 cup sliced mushrooms

2 Tbs each of tomato paste and chopped garlic

½ cup water or chicken stock, more if needed

½ package of Italian seasoning

½ cup of Marsala wine or red or white wine (water can be substituted)

2 TBS of unsalted butter & brown sugar (optional)

Use large high rimmed frying pan or Dutch oven. Salt & pepper chicken, dredge lightly in flour and brown in olive oil on medium heat. Remove and set aside.

Pour off most of oil. Reduce heat, add the chopped veggies and sauté 6 to 8 minutes. Add the tomato paste, garlic and ½ seasoning package and mix well for another minute or two. Increase heat, add Marsala wine, scrape pan bottom to loosen bits & pieces. Reduce the liquid to half, add chopped tomatoes and water, and simmer. Return the chicken to pan, cover lightly with lid, simmer for 30 to 40 minutes. Remove chicken add the butter & sugar mix, simmer briefly. Salt & pepper to taste. Pour sauce over chicken.

If you're flying and concerned about COVID and germs, here are 8 ways to avoid them.

- 1. Wear a mask
- 2. Research airline policies around social distancing before booking
- 3. Wash your hands
- 4. Pack an alcohol-based hand sanitizer
- 5. Wipe down your area
- 6. Consider going snack-free on short flights
- 7. Get the flu shot

More airline news, according to Elliott Advocacy: last year the airlines deliberately slowed down the pace of refunds of over 9 million air travelers— for obvious reasons. Keeping your money meant it had enough cash to continue operating. By the time the federal government caught on to this trick, the industry had already weathered the worst of the storm, thanks to these interest-free microloans from millions of customers.

You don't have to become one of 9 million aggrieved air travelers this year. The trick? Know your rights to a refund — and don't be afraid to let your airline know.

You have the right to a refund if your flight is canceled. According to DOT (Dept. of Transportation) regulations, your airline must refund your money within 7 business days if it cancels your flight. It may offer you a replacement flight, but you are under no obligation to accept it.

You have the right to a refund if your flight is rescheduled. If your airline makes a "significant" change to your flight and you decide not to fly, you get a refund. The DOT — not your airline — gets to define "significant."

If you get downgraded. If you have a confirmed seat in business class and the airline tries to send you to the bleacher seats, guess what? You get a refund if you decide to cancel your trip. But what if you decided to cancel your flight because it isn't safe to travel? If you initiate the cancellation, you have to accept a nontransferable, expiring ticket credit, and you may have to pay a ticket change fee.

Alexander Valley Healthcare Works to Ensure Cloverdale Community is Vaccinated



It's been a very busy year so far for the staff of Alexander Valley Healthcare. Besides the ongoing care for patients, AVH eagerly accepted the responsibility to provide Covid-19 vaccinations to residents of Cloverdale, Geyserville and surrounding communities.

As of March 18, AVH has completed 6,731 vaccines in arms! The county recently released data on vaccination rates by zip code – based on those receiving at least one dose: Geyserville is at the top at 91% and Cloverdale residents are at 47%. In comparison, about 14% of the U.S. has received one dose of the Covid-19 vaccination.

"Vaccinating our area was my dream two months ago and we are doing it," said Dr. Shellie Burdick, Chief Medical Officer at AVH. "It has literally saved lives and made our whole community safer for everyone."

Although vaccinations are completely dependent on vaccine supply, AVH has been averaging about three events per week. The state has been expanding eligibility requirements which now include anyone over 16 years of age who works in agricultural/food industry, education/childcare, and transportation or has a disability or serious health condition. 

Although swarming can look chaotic, please don't harm any swarms you see. This is a natural process and the bees tend to be very passive. Just give him a call at 707-529-8004 and he will happily relocate them.





Become A Master Gardener

Sonoma County Master Gardeners provide environmentally sustainable, science-based horticultural information to all of Sonoma County's population and strive for diversity and inclusion in all aspects of our organization. Become a Master Gardener to gain invaluable horticultural information and education, and to contribute to the Sonoma County community -- every year Master Gardeners donate thousands of hours of volunteer service.

Master Gardeners are given an intensive three-month, 100+ hour training program in horticulture. Classes commence after the New Year and end before Summer. The sessions provide a practical course in plant science and horticulture, soil and water management, pest identification and management, plant selection and care, fruit and landscape trees, xeriscape and environmentally-sound garden practices. Classes meet once a week, with field trips and external training activities in addition to class time. A final examination reviews course materials and prepares the trainee to begin the internship year.

Instructors are experts in their fields, including University of California faculty and staff, landscape and nursery professionals, and knowledgeable local horticulture educators, as well as experienced Master Gardeners. Applicants to the program are selected based on their interest and their ability to fulfill the commitment of service and education. In the year following the training course, interns are required to complete a minimum of 50 hours of volunteer service.

Master Gardeners staff an information desk in the UC Cooperative Extension office, where they answer questions, diagnose plant problems, and give assistance to home gardeners. They also work on special community horticultural and gardening projects, such as school gardens, the Demonstration Garden, the biennial garden show, Farmer's Markets, and the county fair. Information and advice are also dispersed by Master Gardeners through workshops, library lectures and plant clinics.

CERTIFICATION Completion of the training and the internship year earns certification as a Master Gardener. Each year thereafter, 25 hours of volunteer work and 12 hours of continuing education are required to remain a certified Master Gardener. Classes commence after the New Year and end before Summer of even years only. The application form is available online Master Gardener Application - UC Master Gardener Program of Sonoma County (ucanr.edu) between mid-June and the end of September of the preceding (odd) year. Homage to Joe Hawley will be the Trail's contribution to the world-wide celebration of sculpture during the 7th annual International Sculpture Day on April 24th. Beginning April 24th at the Cloverdale Sculpture Trail website, the Homage to Joe Hawley will be illustrated through interviews, news articles, personal experiences and images.

Seven Sonoma County sculptors will gather to celebrate International Sculpture Day at the T Barny Gallery & Sculpture Gardens in beautiful Alexander Valley on April 24 & 25 from 11-4. T Barny has exhibited the past two years in the Cloverdale Sculpture Trail and is currently displaying a sculpture in the 2020-2022 Trail. This is the 7th Annual International Sculpture Day event hosted by sculptor T Barny. "Post vaccination we can not only touch our families, but we can also touch sculpture again." said T Barny. Gary Forsman, a Cal Poly graduate, brings over fifty years of dedicated horticulture experience to the Cloverdale Nursery. Questions about California native plants, especially the planting and pruning of fruit trees can be answered knowledgeably by Gary.

Ashley and her partners are passionate about encouraging people to grow their own gardens. Throughout the continuing Pandemic, they are seeing a surge in sales of plant edibles and drought resistant plants. Since the Pandemic struck at the beginning of the planting season, the Nursery tried to ensure that everybody who needed to, could grow their own food. Edibles like patio tomatoes and lettuce can be grown in even the smallest container gardens. Ashley commented, "We want to know you, and if we don't already, we'll get to know you so that we can better understand what you need."

Cloverdale Nursery has been able to donate to Your Tiny Farm (a non-profit aiding the homeless), The Cloverdale Community Garden, the local FFA (Future Farmers of America) program at Cloverdale High School, and the African Artist Relief Fund. "I measure success on how much you can help others," Ashley emphasized.

Clover Springs Preserve

Clover Springs Preserve is a 250 acre property owned by the city of Cloverdale with an amazing wealth of wildflowers. There are several serpentine outcroppings, so there are a number of wildflowers you might not see in other spots. The Preserve has a nice mix of hillside meadow, chaparral, and oak woodland, along with a small creek.

I've found multiple names for this preserve, which can cause some confusion. In some places you will find references to Porterfield Creek Preserve (full name Porterfield Creek Trails Open Space Preserve). In other places it is called Clover Springs Preserve. I suspect that the Porterfield name is the original name for the full preserve (which includes Porterfield Creek) while Clover Springs may refer to a 25 acre extension near the entrance, but it is not clear. The names seem to be interchangeable.

There are a number of loops that you can take through the Preserve. We spent most of our time on the inner loops, in the Lower Traverse Trail, Meadow Trail, and Three Bridges Trail. Copies of the Porterfield Creek Preserve Map are available at the trailhead, and those copies have a QR code that you can scan to download to your phone.

The entrance to Clover Springs Preserve is at the end of Skyview Drive in Cloverdale, California (Sonoma County). There are parking spaces at the end of the road, so you don't have to park in front of someone's house. There are no restroom facilities at the site.

We started off going left on Tanks Road, which is paved. This becomes Craig Clark Trail as it starts to get steeper. After about a half mile we turned right onto the NW Link trail – there wasn't a sign, but you'll see a narrow dirt trail that heads off into the bush. Portions of this are nicely shaded. Eventually you come

Cloverdale Museum of History Re-Opening

The Gould-Shaw house, is on the National Register of Historic Places and may be the oldest house in Cloverdale. It was designed and built in the Gothic Revival Style in 1863 by Thomas Gould and furnished with period pieces from the Cloverdale area. out into an open grassy area that is called the "meadow". Lots of interesting wildflowers here! At this junction we wandered along the Meadow Trail for a short distance (serpentine outcroppings here), but then we decided to continue further uphill on the Lower Traverse Trail. Keep an eye out for poison oak, which is abundant in some sections of the trails (but easy to avoid).

This trail eventually starts downhill towards Porterville Creek, where the trail is a bit steep and is very shady. The creek had very little water so it was easy to cross. From here we turned on to the Three Bridges Trail and on to the Tanks a Lot Trail, which takes you back to the trail head. Note that when this last part brings you back to the creek, look in the creek bed for Leopard Lilies (if your timing is right). On the outer trails we met multiple folks out for a hike or walking their dogs. On the inner trails (Lower Traverse, etc.) we were pretty much on our own.

This visit was in early June 2020. The weather was a bit windy, but temperatures were mild (low 70's). There is a lot of shade here so it can be nice even on a warm day. I was pleasantly surprised to find this many native wildflowers this time of year.

Dena's Love Cookies

(makes about 3 dozen)

1 cup room temperature butter

1 cup sugar

4 eggs

1-2/3 cups cake flour

1 tsp. salt

1 tsp. vanilla

Walnuts (optional)

Pre-heat oven to 350 degrees,

Beat butter thoroughly in mixing bowl.

Gradually add 1 cup sifted sugar and beat until well creamed. Add 4 eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Gradually beat in 1-2/3 cups flour, which has been sifted with 1 tsp. salt.

When well beaten, add 1 tsp. vanilla.

Swirl batter into 2-inch circles on well-seasoned cookie sheet. Place walnut pieces at center of each cookie (optional). Bake until edges are brown.

Remove cookies from pan immediately to prevent sticking.

A plaque on the Hwy 101 bridge over E. First St. pays homage to the late Albert and Dena Gambetta, long time Cloverdale residents, owners of the B&B Sport Shop and community volunteers. Affectionately known as the "grandfather of city government," Al was a member of the Planning Commission at the time of his death and had been a Council Member for 18 years prior to that. He served as a Captain of the Cloverdale Volunteer Fire Department and was a union representative during his tenure at Italian Swiss Colony.

Dena always seemed to be everywhere at once. Not only was she a Noon Duty Aide for 14 years in the local schools, she staffed the cashier's booth at every high school home game. She also led the American Legion Auxiliary's Color Guard at Little League and Ponytail opening ceremonies, middle school and high school graduations, and the annual Citrus Fair and Citrus Fair Parade.

She edited a weekly column in the Reveille highlighting work done by the auxiliary and helped out at surplus food distributions and community Thanksgiving dinners. Every Thursday for more than 20 years she visited the nursing home where she recited the rosary and conducted sing-a-longs.

Born Dena Mary Santich in Yugoslavia on September 13, 1912, her family immigrated in 1913. Immensely proud of her American citizenship, she regularly promoted respect for the flag in local elementary schools.

Dena's "Love Cookies" were legendary. She baked them every morning to distribute randomly around town on her morning walks. Each cellophane-wrapped paper plate held 33 cookies because, as she said, "that's how many years Jesus spent on this earth."

She once told a reporter "You know, when I die, God's not going to ask me how often I dusted my house or where I went on vacation or what kind of car I drove. He's going to ask me what I did for people." Dena's been gone almost 30 years, but chances are she and God are still discussing all of this while sharing a plate of "Love Cookies."

Get a Little Sunshine in Your Diet

Did you know that 50% of the population has vitamin D insufficiency? Vitamin D is known as the sunshine vitamin because we synthesize it in our skin from UVB light. Why are many people deficient? For thousands of years, our ancestors were hunter gatherers, outside in the sun for most of the day. Unfortunately, evolution has not caught up with our indoor lifestyles. This vitamin has several major roles in the body and recently has been in the news for it's important role in immune function. It's essential for bone health and new research is showing a relationship between inadequate vitamin D and anxiety and depression. The Linus Pauling Institute recommends a daily intake around 2,000 IU. There are few good food sources of vitamin D – salmon, mackerel, and milk fortified with vitamin D. When choosing a plant-based milk, find one that has vitamin D added (not all of them do). Ask your doctor to check the vitamin D level in your blood. If it is suboptimal, you'll need supplements to bring it to an ideal level. So, head outside and bask in the sunshine to take in some vitamin D.



The Eco-Friendly Garden Tour is a public outreach and education program that promotes sustainable landscaping practices.



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
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
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
