The Gut-Brain Axis Gina Berry, MS, RD, CLT

Have you ever had something gut wrenching happen and gotten a sick feeling in your stomach? Or, something anxietyprovoking, like giving a presentation, cause butterflies in your stomach? That's because the brain and the GI system are intimately connected—so intimately that they should be viewed as one system, according to some researchers. Did you know that 90% of serotonin is produced in the GI tract, much of it by the gut microbes? Serotonin is a neurotransmitter (chemical messenger in the brain) that helps stabilize our mood, feelings of well-being, and happiness. 50% of dopamine, a neurotransmitter responsible for pleasure and motivation, is produced in your intestines as well. The Gut-Brain Axis is a system of 2-way communication that monitors and integrates gut functions with links to the cognitive and emotional centers of the brain. This is an emerging branch of science with new research coming to light! It reminds us that our bodies cannot be broken up into separate systems and shipped off to one specialist or another. We are integrated and all parts work together in ways we are just discovering! How can you support your mental health and the Gut-Brain Axis? Add some fermented foods to provide prebiotics (food for your probiotics) and probiotics (beneficial bacteria in your GI tract). Try yogurt, kefir, kimchi, miso, and sauerkraut. Eat a rainbow of fruits and veggies. Incorporate whole grains and reduce consumption of highly processed and refined foods. Get your omega 3 fats a couple times per week - salmon, sardines, or other seafood.

Sewing Soothes The Soul

A dress form, fashioned with a lively, patterned apron, stands at the front door at 219 North Cloverdale Boulevard. This circa 1875 building, the second oldest business building in Cloverdale, has housed the city's well-loved fabric store, Bolt Fabric and Home, since August, 2014. Kate Barrett, the owner of Bolt, has had a passion for sewing since her great aunt taught her the skill at age eight. Kate grew up in Morgan Hill on her grandmother's fruit farm. When the trees were dormant in the winter, her great aunt would sew custom clothes for the local clientele. Kate remembers her great aunt's story of paying for the \$180.00, 1938, electric Singer sewing machine, in installments. Today, that very same sewing machine is in the front window of Bolt, surrounded by quilts created and sewn by Kate.



Before she opened her business, Kate researched the kinds of fabric that might be used within the store's demographics: Sonoma, Mendocino, Lake County and the Bay Area. She found that modern, high quality cotton fabrics sold well. Designers, like Kaffe Fassett, with his large floral prints, Tula Pink and Tim Holtz are some of her best sellers. With her fine attention to detail, Kate feels that she has given Bolt its own personal style and unique qualities. Last spring, Bolt was closed for two and a half months due to the on-going Pandemic. Kate quickly took that time to update her website to feature all the fabrics in her store. Curbside pick-up and free shipping were some of the services offered to her customers. The majority of her customers purchase fabric to make something for someone else in need, i.e., masks, quilts, etc. "These are gestures of love." "What a cool business to be in!" Kate exclaimed.

Sewing classes will hopefully resume again this summer with simple instruction for beginners to advanced quilt making. Bolt is filled with colorful shelves of endless possibilities, and like a candy store, you won't know where to begin first!

Cooking With Dave

Many cultures around the world combine rice and meat into a one pan stove top or oven meal. This is my simplified version of a Mexican recipe for Arroz con Pollo (rice with chicken) that will serve three to four people.

You'll need:

- Large stove top oven proof pan
- 6 chicken thighs or legs (you can remove the skin if you like) 1 cup of white rice
- 1 cup chicken broth or stock, water may be substituted ¹/₂ cup of water
- 1/2 cup each of chopped onion & bell pepper
- 1 cup of tomato salsa (mild or hot, your preference)
- 2 tablespoons of Taco seasoning
- 1/2 cup frozen peas and carrots or mixed veggies Cilantro for garnish (optional)
- **Directions**:

Season the chicken with salt & pepper, brown in a few tablespoons of oil on medium high heat. Remove chicken and set aside, pour off all but a tablespoon of oil. Add the chopped veggies and sauté for a few minutes add the taco seasoning & rice, continue to stir the rice until it starts to become bright white and a bit brown then add the salsa. Scrap the bottom of the pan to loosen up any chicken bits. Mix well for about one minute. Add in the chicken stock or broth - it should cover the rice if not add water and bring to a full boil. Return the chicken by placing on top of the liquid and rice. Cover and reduce the heat to low or place in a preheated oven at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Remove cover and sprinkle the frozen veggies on top and cover and continue cooking for ten minutes. Check the chicken for doneness - it may need a few more minutes.

Remove from heat and let set for ten minutes, the liquid will continue to absorb into the rice and serve with warm tortillas.

Protect Yourself Against Costly **Rental Car Mistakes** Craig Clark

CAREFULLY REVIEW YOUR RENTAL CAR CONTRACT

Even with a long line of fellow travelers impatiently waiting behind you at the car rental counter, do not rush through your time there. Before you walk away with the keys, make sure you've reviewed all parts of your contract. If you don't understand any part of the document, ask questions. Don't agree to or decline any insurances unless you are clear about the product. One of the most frequent complaints from consumers, is they signed the rental contract without reading it and incurred unnecessary charges as a result. Read the contract before you sign it!

CONFIRM HOURS OF OPERATION

Many rental car locations, especially ones located off-airport, have specific hours of operation. These outlets will have precise instructions for off-hour returns. Be clear about those return protocols and follow them to the letter. If you discover at the check-in counter that you'll be returning during off hours, ask for specific instructions and note the agent's name. Make certain you are clear as to the exact return location. You could incur hefty fees if you return the car to the wrong place.

TAKE PHOTOS AND VIDEOS

Get your phone out and take photos to document the state of the car at pickup and return. This is critical if you're returning the vehicle without an attendant present. Carefully video and photograph all parts of the car AND the gas gauge to prove you've returned it with a full tank if required.

Park in a well-lit area near a security camera and lock the car. To protect yourself against surprise car rental charges and mistakes, note if there are security cameras on the lot when you return the vehicle. Park as close as possible to those cameras, and preferably under a spotlight.

REVIEW YOUR ACCOUNT

Within 24 hours of your car rental return, you should see an update in your account that the company has scanned your vehicle. If not, call the branch directly and inquire about your car rental return to ensure that it is confirmed as returned.

The 1918-19 "Spanish" Flu Pandemic in Sonoma County



A look back at that pandemic as experienced here in Sonoma County (does any of the following sound familiar?): Schools began closing in Oct. 1918. By 1919 the pandemic was at its peak, all schools were closed, as were all places of amusement and entertainment and public gatherings of any nature. The Red Cross instructed citizens how to make masks. Merchants were instructed to wear masks when serving the public. Out of work teachers prepared meals torsick patients at an emergency hospital. Doctors and nurses were diverted to serve WW1 casualties. Makeshift hospitals were set up to treat the victims.

Harold Minkin Now Eylea Spokesperson

Cloverdale resident Harold Minkin is getting his more than 15 minutes of fame as a spokesperson for Regeneron's eye medication, Eylea, which is prescribed for Age Related Macular Degeneration. For the past seven years, Harold has been receiving treatment and upon receiving an email from him about his vast improvement, he was asked to be a spokesperson for the company. They even flew him to Washington DC where he spoke to high school students in a STEM (science, technology, engineering, math) competition. Harold's notoriety is a great reminder to see your eye care doctor whenever your eyesight is causing you concern. Harold became his own health advocate, seeking an ophthalmologist to test his eyesight and treat his issue. Harold says: "When I golf now, I don't have problems looking at the flag where the hole is located! In addition, my stress level has gone down as I am not experiencing anxiety feeling that my vision is getting worse."

Gus, The Compost Worm Guy

In 2019, Gus Delarosa bought a place just outside of Cloverdale. The owners left behind a large ice chest with a broken lid and he learned that he could use a cooler to make a worm farm and create compost from organic waste. He prepared the ice chest with cardboard, shredded office paper, leaves, coconut coir, and food scraps, added some worms and that was the start to a very satisfying hobby.

This first worm bin thrived to nearly double the population in about four months. He added more broken and discarded coolers and turned them into worm bins. Soon after, Gus's refrigerator broke so he tipped it over onto its back, drilled some holes, and turned it into a worm bin as well. Gus has now started to collect old discarded bathtubs.

The purpose of raising worms is to use their castings or "poop" which serves as a rich natural fertilizer for the garden and can be used as a top dressing or prepared into a liquid "worm tea". Gus's philosophy is to recycle, reuse, and to re-purpose with the thought of keeping junk and garbage out of the landfills to produce something good for the environment.

Preserve Smokey's Past, Promote His Present, and Protect His Future



Did you know there is an actual Smokey Bear Association? Association members are Smokey Bear collectors but they collect not for just value but to preserve as many items produced by the US Forest Service as well as commercial items for future generations to view.

The Smokey Bear Association, formerly the Hot Foot Teddy Collectors Association (HFTCA) was founded in 1995 by retired fire captain specialist, Jim Van Meter of California. As the new organization grew, it attracted some of the largest collectors of Smokey Bear memorabilia in the US.

The club ultimately evolved into a nationwide organization with hundreds of members who regularly buy, sell, and trade with each other which would never have been possible without the formation of the SBA. Debuting on July 1, 1995, the first issue of the Hot Foot Teddy Collectors Association newsletter was an attempt at providing "a formal method of reaching lovers of Smokey Bear across the country." The club was first referred to as the SBCA: Smokey Bear Collectors Association. It was changed to the Hot Foot Teddy Collectors Association in the March 1997 News.

On August 16, 2012 by a majority vote of the membership, the name of the Association was changed to the Smokey Bear Association. Whisker Talk:

News, advice, and observations on life with pets Brigid Wasson

What if your dog pulls and is difficult to walk? Choosing the proper collar can make walking easier. Here is a brief review of four types of collars.

1) The choke chain is as old school

as it gets. It can help with pulling, but must be sized, fitted, and used a certain way to be effective. If not, it can actually choke the dog as the name suggests.

2) The pinch collar is a controversial tool. This isn't my tool of choice but it can help starting walks with a very large and unruly dog who otherwise wouldn't be taken out.

3) The martingale is my go-to. It tightens when pulled, so the dog can't back out of it, but not indefinitely like the choke collars. I prefer the kind without buckles so it cannot break, even while walking a dog prone to panicking or bolting.

4) The buckle or snap collar is NOT a good tool for walking. If you attach the leash to this collar and your dog slips out of it, you now have a lost dog with no ID.

Daily exercise is the best training. If you're unable to walk your dog, ask for help from a friend or a pet sitter.

Alexander Valley Healthcare Provides COVID-19 Vaccines and So Much More

Despite the trying times, we are fortunate to be living in Cloverdale. There are many reasons why our community is special – one example is the area's health center, Alexander Valley Healthcare.

Since 1994, Alexander Valley Healthcare (AVH) has been providing compassionate, high quality and affordable care for residents of northern Sonoma and southern Mendocino Counties. From three facilities in Cloverdale, AVH offers comprehensive medical care for all ages, behavioral health and substance abuse services, and dedicated dental care.

Despite this full range of healthcare services, many of us don't realize the benefit of having AVH in our community.

Did you know: AVH served 4,515 patients (41% of Cloverdale residents) in 2019, 4,561 patients in 2020? Overall, there are more than 28,000 patient visits per year at AVH.

Did you know: AVH serves patients from all walks of life in all matters of care, such as behavioral health counseling, general dentistry, vaccinations, etc.? Some locals believe AVH is a health clinic for low-income patients. AVH does serve the less fortunate, but anyone can seek services at the health center. The following is a breakdown of patient's health coverage:

- Medicare: 19% of patients
- Private Insurance: 29% commercial insurance plans
- Medi-Cal: 45% of patients
- Uninsured: 13% of patients have no insurance coverage

Did you know: AVH has plans for construction of a new health center facility in downtown Cloverdale at the open space known as Thyme Square? After two years of negotiating with the city, AVH hopes there's a resolution soon so they can break ground on the new facility.

Did you know: As of mid-February, AVH has given almost 3,000 shots to health care workers and seniors living in Cloverdale, Geyserville and Hopland? 
