Editor's Note


Hasn't this been a great summer? People smiling, hugging, gathering at events like Friday Night Live again, the Comedy Show,

Passing by 122 E. First Street, predawn, you might see a little light glimmering inside the window of Bakery Panaderia El Palomo. Inside, Roberto Perdomo, the owner, and his son, Roberto, are making many varieties of Pan Dulce (sweet Mexican bread) and donuts, anticipating the early morning arrival of their daily customers.

Roberto and his wife, Adriana, both who originated from Mexico, have operated the bakery since January of 2005. Roberto is an electrician by trade, but, back then, he used his weekends to bake and sell his goods door to door. One day, Roberto's customer told him she had a bakery in Cloverdale for sale and offered to sell it to him. After encouragement from their family, the Perdomos decided to move from Santa Rosa to Cloverdale and open a Mexican style bakery.

Adriana happily led me through the bakery counters filled with goodies for everyone. A rectangular shaped donut sprinkled with freshly fried, chopped bacon and drizzled with maple syrup was enticing! But then, sitting next to it, lay a plump empanada oozing with pineapple and cream! If that doesn't make your decision difficult, there were many varieties of sweet Pan Dulce that filled large metal trays inside the shiny glass counter.

The tantalizing tour continued on to the breakfast burrito counter, where for seven dollars, one can choose from bacon, chorizo, and potato burritos. Adriana informed me that the burritos quickly sell out by 8 a.m. The Perdomos' daily-made sweet tamales are a family recipe from Michoacan. Choose from: chicken tamales with green salsa; pork tamales with red salsa; jalapeno tamales with chili and cheese or sweet corn tamales – all made from the freshest ingredients.

Adriana and Roberto wish to expand the bakery next door so customers can linger and sip freshly squeezed fruit and vegetable juices. Adriana smiled, "I love my job...Every morning, I love to ask: 'Can I help you?' "

Let's Travel Craig Clark

Travelers can now purchase Abbott's BinaxNow COVID-19 Home Test at select Walgreens stores in California for \$35 each. You'll need to confirm availability then print and complete a pick-up form to bring to the store.

The Ellume COVID-19 Home Test is eligible for travel to the United States as well. Tests are available on www.azova.com/testing/ellume/ and priced at \$50 (plus \$15 shipping) each.

As of this writing, Abbott's BinaxNow COVID-19 Home Test appears to be the only instant at-home (or at-hotel) option that's accepted for travel back to the U.S., since the test is supervised and administered remotely via Zoom. Results are available within 15 minutes.

To ensure that your family sits together on the plane book early. Don't select an exit row seat. If no seats are available when booking, you can check-in online 24 hours before departure. Book everyone on the same reservation. Arrive at the airport early and request help from the airline's agent.

The first flight of the day is generally the cleanest. Planes remaining overnight are thoroughly cleaned, including the galley and lavatory, the floors vacuumed, the seat backs cleaned out, and the tray tables wiped down with disinfectant.

The chimes you hear during a flight are actually a secret code. Many flight attendants are trained with first-aid knowledge and their training often includes learning how to deliver a baby. Emergency oxygen masks only last about 15 minutes, however it normally takes a pilot far less time to drop the plane to a safe altitude than it does for those masks to run dry of oxygen. Airplane lavatories can unlock from the outside. Generally, dimming the lights is meant to prepare your eyes for a potential evacuation.

Flight attendants don't get paid until the plane doors close. Some flight attendant programs are harder to get into than Ivy League schools. In 2016, only 1% of the 150,000 applicants to Delta's program were accepted. In comparison, Harvard University's 2016 acceptance rate was 5.2%.

Local Woman Seeking Kidney Donor

Donna Cambra, a member of our Cloverdale community, is in desperate need of a kidney and is seeking a live donor. Donna is a long-time member of the Cloverdale Community and is a mother (1 son) and a grandmother (2 grandkids). Donna plays flute and piccolo in the Healdsburg Community Band, is a member of American Legion, a member of Moonlight Quilters of Sonoma County and volunteers at the local high school. She served as a Nurse for the United States Army and was medically retired due to a diagnosis of Lupus in 1983. She was able to manage her kidneys for 30 years until 2013, when she was put on dialysis and is now on the UCSF donor list.



The major causes of kidney disease are untreated high blood pressure, diabetes and Lupus. Donna goes to dialysis every Monday, Wednesday and Friday which limits traveling and visiting friends and family. Dialysis takes a lot out of you and puts you at risk for loss of muscle strength and abilities to care for your home and sometimes your needs like laundry or personal needs. It is vital to have a strong support team of friends and family. You often have doctor appointments and sometimes procedures that require a helper and driver.





Strange Noises Under The Hood?

Noises coming from the engine area can be related to drive belts. Serpentine belts, which drive a number of peripheral devices (including the alternator, power steering pump, and AC compressor), are particularly prone to creating squealing and screeching sounds under the hood. Fortunately, a careful inspection of belts for missing chunks or sections in the belt's ribs and across the back of the belt, high spots that may be catching, or separated pieces of belts provides the needed evidence. It is also important to take a good look at the pulleys, which should be properly aligned and free of debris. If these problems are not properly addressed, they may leave you stranded and possibly cost more in repairs. Noise from a pulley bearing is often only present when the particular accessory to which it is running.

Don't Do This While Buying a Home Anne Miserlian Baker

If you are in the process or thinking of buying a home with a loan, try not to use your credit or change your income without talking with your lender first. Within the past month, two of our listed homes fell out of contract because of buyer side financial snafus.

The first sale fell out of escrow because one of the buyers changed employment. The move up position was an excellent opportunity because the buyer would be earning more money. However, the lender requires time on the job which was impacted by the buyer's move. That buyer no longer qualified for a loan.

The second transaction was cancelled because the buyer financed a truck. The vehicle loan impacted the buyer's purchasing power and credit. Consequently, the buyer was no longer able to purchase the home.

In both cases, the buyers were devastated by the loss of their dream. They will likely need to wait 1 to 2 years to purchase a home with conventional financing.

If anyone had told me I would one day own a staffing agency and that it would still be in business 30 years later, I probably would have laughed at them.

I've held some pretty interesting jobs in the past – assistant to the CEO of a Hollywood dance conventions company, manager of a downtown Los Angeles office building, circus performer and editor of the Cloverdale Reveille. Never once had the idea of opening a staffing agency crossed my mind.

When I began telling people of my plans in early 1991, the general reaction was "You're opening what? Where? In the middle of a recession? Are you crazy?"

In retrospect, I probably should have had second thoughts since the 1990-91 recession was in full bloom with unemployment nationwide at 7.8% - but I didn't.

After several months spent choosing a name, securing a phone number, ordering letterhead and business cards, preparing ads and flyers, finding office furniture and securing an office in The Courtyard, the doors of Management Connections opened on August 5, 1991.

Not yet having a morning routine, I remember walking in that first morning, checking the answering machine that wasn't blinking, sitting down at my desk and thinking to myself, "Ok. Now what?"

My first local client was Dr. Ed Biery from the Animal Hospital of Cloverdale. He was recruiting for a front office person and, in order to help me get started, gave me copies of all the resumes he had received and had me interview the ones I thought would be a good fit.

My second job order – believe it or not – was for a Mechanical Engineer in Willits. To this day I can hardly believe it, but I found one who lived in San Jose who was willing to relocate.

Failure was never an option. People believed in me, and I couldn't let them – or myself – down. I would often come home and find a bag of groceries at my front door. That first Christmas, with no money to spare, I even found a Christmas tree there.

During the 2008 economic downturn, when many staffing agencies were closing their doors, Management Connections was able to, once again, weather the storm, even though it meant letting my staff go, getting rid of office furniture and downsizing to "just me," for a while.

I credit each and every one of my amazing office staff over the years for making this company what it is. My former business partner, Pamela Kimball, came along shortly after I opened the doors and proved to be a true blessing.


large impact is often pinterest or magazine driven.

Local Rotary Tours Cemetery

Recently, members of the Cloverdale Rotary Club received a tour of the local cemetery from Al Delsid. Many tombstones, caps and markers been vandalized over the years. Al Delsid has worked tirelessly to repair and remount many of the stones. Bob Cox spent three months pressure washing all of the grave stones down in Mount Olive recently. Volunteers have had to repair and install retaining walls to maintain the hillside. Besides the vandals and the hill, the biggest threat to the cemetery are squirrels and rain. Rotary Club of Cloverdale, with Sons of the American Legion, recently planted a tree on the grounds.

The lower section is called Mount Olive. There are also sections earmarked for families and an area that was never used which was intended for individuals without means for burial. There are 68 veterans buried there and over 2130 graves in total.

Here are some stories heard during the tour:

A civil war veteran named Charles Smith is buried in the lower section.

William Russel Ledford was buried in 1922 and the community commemorated the 100 year anniversary of his death in 2018. His 100 years old veteran flag was discovered recently. He passed during World War 1 (of the Spanish Flu) and our American Legion Post 293 was chartered in his honor.

One of the Thompson men in the lower section served with General Custer (but was not at Little Bighorn).

The oldest person buried there, before 1862, does not have a marked grave.

The oldest grave marker is from Francis Hilbi, dated 1/2/1862.

There is a section called infant row up at the top for younger children who were lost too soon.

Francis Gordan was California's first licensed embalmer. She used to practice in the Edward Jones Office where she made caskets, embalmed people and apparently taught violin.

Albert Kilger is the only police officer in Cloverdale's history who was killed in the line of duty. He was shot in a gunfight.

Alan Furber told us about his relatives that were buried here. Many of the streets are named for his grandparents - Elbridge, Maguerite, William and Wallace.

Lifetime of Accomplishments Began in Cloverdale Mary Jo Winter

Over his lifetime James Francis Smith served with Teddy Roosevelt in the Rough Riders, was an Associate Justice to the Supreme Court of the Philippines, served as Governor-General of the Philippines and was Associate Judge of the U.S. Court of Customs and Patent Appeals in Washington D.C.

Born January 28, 1859, in San Francisco to Irish emigrants Patrick and Ann Smith,

he grew up in Cloverdale on the Smith Ranch south of town. Their home was located on the corner of what is now S. Cloverdale Blvd. and Cherry Creek Rd., where the 7 Palms Trailer Park is located.


After graduating from Cloverdale High School, Smith, the oldest of ten children, continued his studies at the University of Santa Clara, where he was considered one of their most brilliant students. He earned his law degree from Hastings Law School and was admitted to the bar in 1881.

At the outbreak of the Spanish-American War, Smith gave up his law practice, joined the 1st California Regiment of Volunteers and was commissioned as a Colonel in 1898. He was part of the first expeditionary force to the Philippines, serving with his friend Theodore Roosevelt in the Rough Riders. Cited for gallantry in action, he was promoted to Brigadier General in 1899.

Smith later served as an Associate Justice on the Supreme Court of the Philippines and subsequently on the Taft Commission, which was responsible for developing a legal code for the Philippines. William Howard Taft appointed him as Governor-General from 1906 to 1909, and during this period, the Philippine Assembly convened for the first time.

Returning to the United States, Smith was appointed an Associate Justice of the United States Court of Customs and Patent Appeals in Washington D.C. a position he held until his death on June 29, 1928.

Smith enjoyed visiting his hometown, and despite his many titles, including "Colonel Jim" to his fellow soldiers, he always remained just plain Jim Smith to his friends and family in Cloverdale.

New Russian River Access Park

A future 19-acre north county river park located along an trails, restrooms, trash and recycling bins, navigational and approximately 1.75-mile stretch of Geysers Road is currently under development by Sonoma County Regional Parks.

The proposed Russian River Parkway is comprised of three distinct sites beginning just south of the Mendocino County line and will provide a minimum of two river access points. Although only recently under the management of Regional Parks, the area has long been known as an informal swimming spot during the summer months. However, due to the lack of oversight and public amenities, such as trails, signs, restrooms or trash facilities, this use has impacted the environment and community. With cars parked along narrow shoulders and pullouts, traffic hazards are high and car breakins are common.

The project aims to provide safe, welcoming and environmentally friendly access for fishing, picnicking, paddling, and other water activities, while addressing the environmental and public health concerns exacerbated by years of unregulated use. All three river access points include safety and parking improvements, miles of new educational signs, and amenities like picnic tables, benches and scenic viewing areas.

Funding for the planning, development and construction of the \$1.2-million parkway comes from a grant made possible through State Proposition 68, county park mitigation fees, and revenue from the Measure M parks sales tax approved by Sonoma County voters in 2018. In July 2020, Regional Parks secured the necessary fee title to the property underlying a 2-mile section of Geysers Road, thereby allowing the project to move forward.

A final draft master plan, guiding the park's development and management, will be presented to the Board of Supervisors in fall 2021. Regional Parks is seeking public input now. Construction will begin in spring 2022, with the park's opening in fall 2022.

Nature Transcends Style Kenyon Lewis – Glass & Tile Artist

"As a child I can remember standing in shallow water in the American River near our home watching the salmon on both sides of me running upstream to spawn" said Cloverdale artist Kenyon Lewis (kenyonlewis.com). He has always lived near water and continues to be interested in the way water and wind shape the landscape. This was intensified upon moving to the often harsh environment of the Oregon coast at their beach house on Johnson Creek, where he finished high school in Bandon. Rivers tend to change seasonally and the Bandon beach is an environment in a constant state of change that leaves new patterns and textures with every high tide and intense episodes of wind.

Kenyon attended the University of Oregon where he received a Bachelors of Fine Arts degree and was awarded his first public art commission in 1985 for the UCCS Engineering building in Colorado Springs. "Western Exposure" is an 8' x 25' surface transformation of a dune moving down the beach, consisting of 90 sixteen-inch ceramic tiles.

Being hired to set up a ceramic tile manufacturing facility in Santa Rosa brought Kenyon to Sonoma County. He spent a decade at Healdsburg's McIntyre Tile where he worked in the glaze lab, fired the kilns and designed his own line of beach tiles.

Lewis' work can be seen in private homes, restaurants and businesses throughout Sonoma County – locally the sculpture "90% Oscar" in Kleiser Park and regionally with two sites in the Yolo County Davis Branch Library. He has made public art for other artists including San Francisco's "Union Square tiles" designed by Vicki Sauls. Kenyon can also be found supporting the "Steelhead Festival" creating art at the event

and donating the money to the "Friends of Lake Sonoma".



Cooking With David

Lasagna Rollups

Lasagna rollups are a perfect dish hot or cold. The ingredients can vary but what I have laid out is the foundation. I'm using a bottle pasta sauce but if you have a favorite recipe for home made, that's even better. Cooked (fresh or frozen) Spinach can be used as a substitute to meat or in addition with the meat. This recipe serves six, or three if you are extra hungry Ingredients

6 dry lasagna noodles

1 32 ounce jar pasta sauce or equivalent of homemade sauce

10 ounces ricotta cheese

16 ounces shredded mozzarella cheese

16 ounces grated parmesan cheese

1 egg

1 pound ground beef

1 pkg of Italian seasoning

Preheat oven to 375. Boil the lasagna noodle according to the directions on the box and cool in cold water. Mix all the cheese together, reserving 6 ounces of the mozzarella & parmesan, and fold in the egg salt & pepper and mix well. Cook the ground beef, pouring off all the grease, and mix the Italian seasoning in, and let cool.

On a flat working surface layout one noodle. Use a spoon to make a liberal layer of cheese mixture and top with meat pressing it into the cheese. Start at one end and roll forward, and set in an oven proof pan seam side down that has a ½ cup of sauce spread in the bottom. Allow room around each rollup. Repeat until you are done. Pour the pasta sauce evenly over the rolls making sure they are covered well. Sprinkle the remaining two cheeses and more if you like cheesy pasta. Cover and bake for 30 minutes. Uncover and continue cooking for 10 minutes. The sauce should be bubbling at this point. Let stand for 15 minutes and serve.
