





Happy 150th Birthday Cloverdale Mary Jo Winter

Cloverdale received official incorporation on February 28, 1872, the same year the San Francisco and North Pacific Railroad entered the area. In 1972, the city marked its first 100 years with several special events leading up to their Centennial Dinner Dance Celebration. Festivities started on New Year's Eve at the Fireman's Ball where Vice Mayor Marie Vandagriff read the official Centennial Proclamation.

The Citrus Fair theme was "Centennial in Citrus." Season tickets were \$2.50 for adults, \$1.50 for students. Fairgoers rode a miniature train on streets surrounding the fairgrounds. A huge train engine created by the Druids took top citrus exhibit honors and 16-year-old Naomi Shiflett was crowned Citrus Fair Queen. Saturday morning's parade featured more than 250 floats, vehicles, bands, mounted units and novelty groups. It was touted as the most entries ever in the annual parade.



Visitors from Cloverdale's sister city, Cloverdale, B.C. came to town. Their Deputy Mayor Rita Johnson even rode in the parade with Mayor Al Gambetta. More than 200 copies of local historian Bill Wilson's "History of Cloverdale" were sold.

On February 28, despite the inclement weather, folks gathered on Broad Street as the newly built fire station was dedicated, with the bronze plaque unveiled by Vice Mayor Vandagriff. A congratulatory telegram from then-President Richard Nixon was sealed in a time capsule to be opened in 2072, along with city records, a 1972 Citrus Fair program, and copies of the Reveille. At that night's dinner dance, Mayor Gambetta read some of the city's original ordinances which included restrictions on "houses of ill repute" and "exhibiting stallions and jack asses in a public place." There were turn-of-the-century fashions, excerpts from days gone by, barbershop harmony and private stock wine to toast the past 100 years and lay the foundation for another 100 years of history.

2022 Cloverdale Citrus Fair Moves To April



Recently, the Cloverdale Citrus Fair Board of Directors voted unanimously to postpone the Citrus Fair. The new date is April 21-24, 2022. The move is in response to the current health order which prohibits public indoor gatherings to 50 people and outdoor gatherings to 100. The order is set to expire on February 11th, a week before the opening day of the fair, but the preparation for northern Sonoma County's signature event requires several

volunteers, staff, and business partners working together to prepare exhibits, buildings, and the grounds.

"The health and safety of our community is our primary concern" said Allison Keaney, CEO of the Citrus Fair. "Moving the date of Citrus Fair allows us to support the health of all who prepare the fair by shifting that work until after the current health order is lifted, and providing a date that is safer and more comfortable for all patrons." As soon as the current health order was announced, Fair staff began working with business partners and service providers to find alternatives. The new date was selected based on the availability of these partners who provide the carnival, concessions, ticketing, security, and more.

The popular and long-awaited Cabaret will also shift with the new fair dates, playing on Thursday through Sunday. Updates on scheduling, exhibits deadlines, and other information will be shared via the fair's website and social media outlets: Cloverdalecitrusfair.org

Returning to the US with a Covid negative test

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has expanded the testing program for international travel to the United States, allowing airlines to accept at-home instant tests that include remote supervision.

One company gained instant popularity for travelers looking for a more straightforward to get COVID-19 tests to fly back to the United States. Abbott's BinaxNow COVID-19 Home Test is supervised and administered remotely online, and is approved for travel to the U.S. Results are available within 15 minutes. https://www.abbott.com/BinaxNOW-Tests-NAVICA-App.html

I recently used this test while in Belize and it was easy to administer, took only 15 minutes and was accepted by the airlines, no questions asked.

5 Common Mistakes Travelers Make Returning to the U.S.

1. Not Having the Right Type of COVID-19 Test

The only negative tests acceptable are either an antigen test or a nucleic acid amplification test (NAAT).

If you are packing a self-test to take while traveling, the test must be a SARS-CoV-2 viral test (nucleic acid amplification test [NAAT] or antigen test) with Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA).

The testing procedure must include real-time supervision remotely through an audio and video connection and must confirm your identity, observe the sample collection and testing. Results can be shown either on paper or electronically.

2. Forgetting to Declare Food.

Packaged cookies or candy is ok but food such as an apple served on the plane needs to be declared.

3. Not Having Proof of Vaccination

Acceptable proof of vaccination at the U.S. border includes: Vaccination certificates or digital passes with QR codes. A printed vaccination record or CDC vaccination card or a digital photo or electronic copy of your vaccination record/COVID card

4. Not Having Global Entry Membership

Now that international travelers are finally allowed back into the U.S., the country is experiencing a surge of visitors, causing longer entry lines at land borders and international airports. Spend the \$100 fee for a five-year Global Entry membership, which will allow you to speed through reentry to the U.S. Use it once and you'll agree that it's completely worth the cost.

5. Arriving to the Airport Too Late

Arrive at the airport three or more hours before your flight home because airlines now have a number of things to check before they let travelers board a flight to the U.S., including vaccine cards and COVID tests, which can add hours to check-in lines. Be sure to leave extra time in case of long lines.

Law Enforcement Services

Recently there have been some discussions posted on the Community of Cloverdale Facebook page involving interest in contracting law enforcement services with the Sonoma County Sheriff's Office. Much of these discussions involve inaccurate and misleading information about how the sheriff's office can provide more police presence and that the services would essentially be provided at no cost to the city. These inaccurate and misleading statements have generated some interest among community members. However, these statements are simply not true nor are they supported by facts. The cost to contract law enforcement services is an expensive endeavor as evidenced by the two contract cities within Sonoma County.

The City of Sonoma has contracted with the Sonoma County Sheriff's Office since 2004. The department nearly mirrors the size of Cloverdale and is staffed by 16 employees, which consists of a Police Chief, 2 Sergeants, 10 Deputy Sheriffs, 2 Community Service Officers, and 1 Administrative Clerk. Dispatch services, investigations, records management, and property/evidence are handled by experts at the Sheriff's Main Office and are included in the contract. The cost for law enforcement services in the fiscal year 2021-2022 is projected at \$4,988,226.00 with additional expenses estimated at approximately \$771,044.

The Town of Windsor has contracted with the Sonoma County Sheriff's Office since 2008. Although larger, the Town of Windsor is staffed by 24 employees, which consists of a Police Chief, 3 Sergeants, 17 Deputy Sheriffs, and 3 Office Staff. Services include patrol, investigation, traffic enforcement, K-9, school resource officer, juvenile diversion counseling, and management of the animal control services. The indirect cost associated with dispatch, records management, and administrative services is also reflected in their budget. The cost for law enforcement services in the fiscal year 2021-2022 is projected at \$8,728,160.

The City of Cloverdale is staffed by 21 employees, which consists of a Police Chief, a Police Lieutenant, 2 Sergeants, 9 Patrol Officers, 6 Dispatchers, 1 Records Manager, and 1 Community Services Officer. Services include patrol, investigation, traffic enforcement, parking enforcement, and management of the animal control services. The cost for law enforcement services in the fiscal year 2021-2022 is projected at \$4,753,301. The Cloverdale Police Department also provides numerous ancillary duties not mentioned above and our response time, on average for emergency calls, is approximately 6 minutes.

Based on the information provided, there is clear evidence to support the fact that contracting law enforcement services with the Sonoma County Sheriff's Office would potentially cost more than what it costs for the city to provide its services.

Additional factors to be considered when contracting with the County:

The first thing that would happen is the Chief of Police and the Lieutenant would not be included in a proposed contract. At best, the Lieutenant may remain, and that position would most likely be reduced to a Sergeant. The current Police Dispatching functions would more than likely be absorbed by the County and, the Records Division would more than likely be transferred to the main records section of the Sheriff's Office in Santa Rosa.

In a contract situation, while the City may be able to influence which sheriff's office manager is assigned to the contract, the City Manager does not have the final decision regarding selection or performance reviews.

The community must also keep in mind that once a contract is signed the City would have very little control over the enforcement level and response time for assistance. This is due, in large part, to the responsibilities of the sheriff's office for all unincorporated area residents.

City Updating Code Enforcement Program City transitioning from complaint driven to proactive enforcement program



The City Council recently approved a budget amendment of \$50,000 and a professional services agreement for a proactive code enforcement program. Robert Smith, a code enforcement specialist, was hired by the City Council to enhance the City's current complaint driven Code Enforcement program. Mr. Smith has extensive experience as the former City Attorney for the City of Sonoma and is currently providing code enforcement services for the City of Cotati and the Town of Windsor. As an attorney, Mr. Smith is skilled at understanding the City's code, and will be leading development of an Ordinance updating the City Municipal Code to provide the City will additional tools to assist in the code enforcement process.

Robert Smith will be responsible for investigating and responding to complaints, monitoring compliance, levying fines and penalties as necessary. Mr. Smith will directly report to the Assistant City Manger / Community Development Director Kevin Thompson. He will coordinate with other City departments including the Police Department and City Attorney on an as needed basis


Code enforcement is intended to address nuisances which can include buildings that are abandoned, boarded up, partially destroyed, substantially deteriorated, overgrown/ dead vegetation/landscaping, dangerous conditions and unmaintained property, as well as zoning violations and housing/building violations. Typical nuisance abatement cases may involve the accumulation of junk or garbage, unmaintained vegetation, inoperable vehicles, and building code violations. The City's initial focus will be centered on existing cases throughout the city. The updated program will monitor enforcement of current city codes and address code violations proactively as they arise. The Current enforcement regulations are is found in Chapter 8.02 of the Cloverdale Municipal code. 




Cloverdale City Council Presents Proclamation to Bob Cox








Water Supply Update The Drought is Not Over

Current Water Supply Levels





Despite recent rains, our reservoirs are still at historic lows for this time of year. More storms (like the October 24, 2021 atmospheric river event) are needed to increase storage levels from the third driest water year on record over the last 127 years and to bring an end to this severe drought. Winter is a critical time for water conservation in order to conserve our water supply. We urge our community to keep up the great water-saving efforts – water saved now is water we can use later.

We are all hopeful that the positive beginning of the current water year continues, but after two years of record-low rainfall, we have a long way to go before the drought is over. Sonoma Water thanks our water customers for continuing to conserve water every day and we celebrate those doing their part in this community-wide effort.

The updated Sonoma Water weekly water supply graphic (above) now provides a comparison of storage levels during 2020, 2021 with current 2022 water storage for our two main reservoirs, Lake Sonoma, and Lake Mendocino. Kiwanis Is Back With A Jumbo Prawn-Pasta Feed Fundraiser



The 2021 Housing Numbers Are In! Anne Miserlian Baker

Demand for housing was up, with 195 homes sold in 2021. Compare that to 141 homes sold in 2020 and 137 homes that sold in 2019.

Even with the increase in the number of homes sold in 2021, inventory was low in Cloverdale. At most, we had only 3.4 months of inventory on the market. By the end of 2021 we only had 1.3 months of inventory left.

As you probably know, prices were up in Cloverdale. The most expensive home sold for \$5.5 million. That 28 acre property only came with a fixer upper! The least expensive home was a condo for \$230,000.


The average sale price for a single family home in Cloverdale in 2021 was \$781,691. However, because numbers are skewed by sales as high as 5.5 million, I prefer to see a different data set. Instead, consider the median price, which came in at \$650,000.

In case you are interested, I also took some time to break out some sectors of our housing market. The median sale price of the 24 homes that sold in Clover Springs was \$590,000. But get this, the highest priced sale in our 55+ community was \$875,000!

The other notable sector is our condominium market. These 14 sales included Cloverdale Meadows, Garden's at Thyme Square, Cloverleaf Estates (the colorful condos on Treadway), and Solar Park. The median sales price was \$336,500. Yet, the highest priced condo sold for \$525,000. That's \$90,000 more than the year before.






No "Tea" Totalers, Here! Michele Armanino


Holly Hunt's Russian River Tea Company may well be one of the most fragrant smelling stores in all of Healdsburg. Browsing through this tiny tea establishment (where ninety percent of the store's products are from small, women-owned businesses) ladened with chocolates, candles and more, you can't help but inhale wafting scents of chamomile, rooibos and crushed rose petals. Tea fans, however, are not the only ones enjoying the endless selection of these aromatic, blended leaves. Artisans at local bars are tapping into this ancient drink and infusing it into their luxury craft cocktails.

Holly, a Cloverdale resident, proprietor of the Russian River Tea Company or "Chief Leaf" as she refers to herself, and Healdsburg's tea aficionado, began one of her many successful careers in the '90s by painting and sculpting porcelain dolls for twelve years - until the doll collecting fad began waning. "It came to a screeching halt!" Hunt commented. Quickly switching gears into retail, she began noticing, as she moved around the United States, that tea stores were ubiquitous and well frequented. Holly became a regular tea customer herself, appreciating all the accoutrements associated with tea: tea pots, infusers, sugar, spices and honey. Inspired by the growing tea trend with its unlimited choices and soothing qualities, Holly launched her first successful tea store in Phoenix, Arizona in 2010, and by 2013, Russian River Tea Company was a welcome addition to Healdsburg.

Local Sonoma County bars are featuring unique, tasty little cocktails infused with blended teas supplied by Russian River Tea Company. The Fern Bar, run by Sam Levy in Sebastopol, crafts a drink dubbed the Creamsicle. Rooibos, a type of red, African bush used to make herbal tea, is cold infused into vodka along with Passion Fruit, lime, and mandarin oranges resulting in a refreshing experience. "Holly's teas add depth and complexity to our cocktails." remarked Sam. "She welcomes you into the world of tea and always makes time to guide you through the sensory experience that is Russian River Tea Company."

Holly puts it simply: "Life is better with tea because it brings people together."

Love is in the air this month. I've made this dish for my wife every Valentine's Day for the last 30 years.

Salmon With Hollandaise Sauce

2 each - 6 to 8 ounce Salmon filets, skinless & pin bones removed You can substitute chicken or any white flesh fish. I serve this with white rice or a nutty rice pilaf. For the Salmon lightly salt & pepper both sides. In a non-reactive pan, on medium high heat, place two tablespoons of olive oil & cook each side for two minutes. Finish in the oven for another ten minutes at

Hollandaise Sauce

- 10 tablespoons unsalted butter (if using salted butter, skip the added salt)
- 3 large egg yolks

350 degrees

- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt, divided
- 1/8 teaspoon cayenne, optional

Melt the butter slowly in a small pot. Try not to let it boil—you want the moisture in the butter to remain there and not steam away. Add the egg yolks, lemon juice, 1/4 teaspoon of the salt, and cayenne (if using) into your blender. Blend the egg yolk mixture for 30 seconds at a medium high speed, until it lightens in color.

Turn the blender speed to low (if you only have one speed on your blender, it will still work). With the blender running, slowly drizzle in the melted butter, continue to blend.

Turn off the blender and taste the sauce. It should be buttery, lemony and just lightly salty. If it is not salty or lemony enough, you can add a little more lemon juice or the remaining salt to taste. If you want a thinner consistency, add a little warm water. Pulse briefly to incorporate the ingredients one more time. Drizzle the sauce over the salmon and it's a wonderful meal for two.
