Wow! In your hands right now (or on your digital contraption) is our biggest issue ever! Thank you to our readers, advertisers,


non-profits and service clubs who have made *Cloverdale Connect* such a success. This is our community paper and it's a great collaboration.







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Lockhorns Are Unique Part Of Cloverdale's History - Mary Jo Winter

Mary Jane Whitsman Horn was just 14 in 1847 when she and her parents crossed the plains from Missouri to Oregon with a band of pioneers. They traveled by way of ox train, arriving in Portland as the ground was being cleared for the city.

In 1853, she married James M. Horn and they raised a family of ten children, one of whom was Riley McClusky Horn of Cloverdale. His daughter, Beatrice "Bee" Horn Maio, was a beloved community member and an original member of the Cloverdale Historical Society.

Sometime before 1916, Riley found two mule deer bucks on Juniper Mountain in Eastern Oregon. They had been dead for about two days, forever locked together by two short spikes on their horns.

During their struggle to break apart, the deer tore up an acre of soil and bunch grass. Ironically, with a play of about two and a half inches, the horns were not tight. Because they were pulling away from each other, though, the spikes locked and

sealed their fate.

The mounted bucks were first displayed in George Cavalli's grocery store during the 1920s before being moved in the 1930s to a bar called The Lockhorn, owned by Tony Reger and named in their honor.

In the 1940s, The Lockhorn Bar moved again to where La Hacienda is now. When Victor Calderon sold the restaurant, the lockhorns did not fit into the new owners' remodeling plans. The Horn Family descendants really wanted the deer to remain in Cloverdale and offered them to the Historical Society. Unfortunately, the History Center building does not have sufficient wall space available to display them.

Having spent several weeks in a Menlo Park storage unit, the lockhorns are now headed back to Cloverdale and moving into their new permanent home at the Citrus Fairgrounds.

Rattlesnake Season Is Approaching Roy Blodgett



As the days continue to lengthen and warm, I'm observing increasing reptile activity around our home, so I figure it is time to post about my rattlesnake conflict mitigation services.

My approach is education oriented, and prioritizes working with landowners to become more snake-aware, seeking to mitigate unwanted encounters with rattlesnakes as much as possible. In more cases than not, this involves making simple changes around the property with how water, debris, and other potential snake attractants are managed. I also offer translocation services for snakes that are too close to home, should the need arise.

Manure Options April Lance

Animal manure has long been used as a fertilizer in gardens and on farm fields, creating nutrient-rich, moisture-retaining soil for your plants. Manure loosens up the soil we have here in Sonoma County, allowing easier planting and the ability of your new plants roots to expand.

Here are some values commonly assigned to different animal manures:

Fresh cow manure, sometimes called moo doo, is about 17% organic matter, offers .3% nitrogen, .2% phosphorus, .4% potassium, and is 83% moisture. To add .2 pounds of nitrogen to a 100 square foot garden patch you would need to add 75 pounds of cow manure without bedding, or about three 5-gallon buckets full. Composted manure has even less nitrogen so you would need to add 200 pounds of it to have the same effect! Dried cow manure has much higher nutrient levels - 2% nitrogen, 2% phosphorus, and 2.4% potassium—so you could use much less, roughly 10 pounds per 100 square feet.

Fresh sheep manure is about 32% organic matter, has .7% nitrogen, .3% phosphorus, and .9% potassium and is 66% moisture. To add .2 pounds of nitrogen to our 100 square foot garden we would need to add 40 pounds of manure with no bedding or 50 pounds with bedding included. Dried sheep manure is 4% nitrogen, 1.4% phosphorus, and 3.5% potassium so you'd need only 10 pounds per 100 square feet.

Fresh chicken manure, sometimes called hen dressing, is 25-45% organic matter, has 1.1% nitrogen, .8% phosphorus, and .5% potassium, and is 55-75% moisture. Add 30 pounds of it, including bedding, to a 100 square foot bed to get .2 pounds of nitrogen. Composted it would have less nitrogen, so you'd need 70 pounds.

Fresh horse manure, sometimes called road apples, is 24% organic matter, has .7% nitrogen, .3% phosphorus, and .6% potassium, and is about 75% moisture. To add .2 pounds of nitrogen to the 100 square foot bed we'd need to incorporate 65 pounds of it with bedding included.

Fresh rabbit droppings, AKA bunny honey, are 33% organic matter, offer 2.4% nitrogen, 1.4%phosphorus, .6% potassium, and only 43% moisture. As little as 10 pounds would add .2 pounds of nitrogen to the garden.


The Bee Guy Travis Ryan

The Russian River Watershed encompasses an area of nearly 1,500 square miles of forests, agricultural lands and urban lands in Mendocino and Sonoma Counties. The mainstem of the Russian River flows 110 miles from its headwaters near Redwood Valley and Potter Valley along the eastern edge of Cloverdale before heading out to the Pacific Ocean near Jenner. The watershed is home to approximately 360,000 people, 238 streams and creeks, and 63 species of fish.

The Russian River Watershed Association (RRWA) is a coalition of ten cities including the City of Cloverdale, Sonoma and Mendocino counties and a host of special districts in the Russian River watershed that have come together to coordinate regional programs for clean water, habitat restoration, and watershed enhancement. RRWA was formed in 2003 to create opportunities for our member agencies to expand their stewardship role in the watershed. The City of Cloverdale appoints a Councilmember to sit on the Board of Directors of RRWA. This year and last, Councilmember Cruz represented the City on the RRWA Board.

Annually, the RRWA Board of Directors approves a workplan that includes both public outreach and collaborative outreach, the intent of which is to draw attention to programs that support the health of the water shed and provide public information to address impacts to water quality.

Public Outreach & Response:

- The RRWA is partnering with Sonoma Water's Water Education Program for the annual high school video contest for Water Awareness Month, in which participating students have the chance to win cash prizes. In recent years a local Cloverdale high school student won a prize for their video. This year's theme is, "Water, there's never enough to waste!" First, second, and third place videos are selected by a panel of professionals in the water and media fields. Cash prizes are split between the student(s) who create the winning videos and the high school they attend. The winning videos are used as educational outreach materials throughout the watershed. The first prize is \$1,500 and the in-person awards ceremony & student showcase is scheduled for May 26 at 6:00 pm at the Advanced Energy Center.
- RRWA continues to see success with a new program in collaboration with the Cloverdale Chamber of Commerce involving the placement of restaurant placements at participating Cloverdale restaurants. Restaurant Placemats is a way to reach out to children about the watershed, river wildlife species, and limiting storm drain pollution. Council-member Cruz was instrumental in getting us connected with Cloverdale's Chamber of Commerce and several new restaurants in Cloverdale. Placemats are in MoE's Eagles Nest Deli, Papa's Pizza, Tian Yuen, 101 ThaiWay, Flavia's, Zini's Diner, and the Cloverdale Public Library. We're excited to announce that we've received a new bilingual version that we'll start distributing soon.
- RRWA facilitated the watershed wide sign program "Ours to Protect" featuring the egret that we see along bridges throughout the watershed. Cloverdale has these signs at Porterfield Creek and Cloverdale Creek. It's important for people to know that storm drains are directly connected to our local waterways. All pollutants on roadways, sidewalks, parking lots, and other surfaces that drain to storm drains end up in our local creeks where they can harm aquatic species and negatively impact water quality.

Environmental Articles:

• RRWA publishes an environmental article each month as authored by staff from our member agencies which can be found on our blog https://www.rrwatershed.org/blog/.

Recent articles include "A thirsty burglar or a dripping faucet? Either way you may be losing precious resources," "Dog Doo Dilemma," and, "Make a Move to Native and Drought Tolerant Plantings." We send these articles to a host of local publications and sometimes they get published in one of the local papers.

The April article will be, "Carbon Gardening: A Dirt Simple Solution to Climate Change." The Carbon Gardening initiative is about educating and promoting gardening on an urban residential scale to help sequester carbon. This article will include 8 easy steps on how to grow a carbon garden, including minimizing soil disturbance, covering soil with living plants and mulch, planting a diverse assortment of regionally appropriate and native plants, watering properly, and avoiding synthetic chemicals/fertilizers. The article will be available on the RRWA blog in a few weeks.

Collaborative Outreach:

- The RRWA manages a regional contract for Our Water Our World (OWOW) to coordinate and implement pesticide-related education and outreach at nurseries. The OWOW is a joint effort by water pollution prevention agencies, participating retail stores, and pesticide distributors and manufacturers working together to reduce the risks associated with pesticide use. Our Water Our World will host a webinar on Wednesday April 13 from 5 to 6 pm. The Topic will be "Drought Proof Gardening: Create a water-efficient garden that will look beautiful through the dryer months." Learn techniques and strategies for water-wise gardening that will help keep your garden healthy and pest-free. The webinar/workshop is ideal for any level of gardener and is free. Information on the upcoming webinar will be added to the RRWA website.
- Safe Medicine Disposal The Cloverdale Police Dept. hosts the Safe Medicine Disposal bin at the Police Station lobby. It's important to water quality that all medications, whether prescription or over-the-counter, including pet medications, be properly disposed of so they stay out of our landfills and sewer systems. The DEA is having their 22nd National Prescription Drug Take Back Day on April 30. Your outdated medicines can be safely disposed of at Cloverdale's PD. The last DEA Take Back event on October 23, 2021 generated 41,970 lbs. of unwanted medications from California alone, and Cloverdale PD was a participant.
- The RRWA hosts a series of webinars and training focused on watershed health. This year the Russian River Friendly Landscaping is heavily focused on the Carbon Gardening initiative. The work includes 8 short videos which we hope will be available for viewing and sharing in the coming months as well as upcoming environmentally friendly events and workshops around the watershed during the year.
- The RRWA publishes the Russian River-Friendly Landscape Guidelines, a publication and a program of landscaping practices, which provide landscape professionals the tools to protect our watershed lands and waterways through an integrated approach to environmentally friendly landscaping. The City of Cloverdale is committed to protecting the health of the Russian River watershed. Our partnership with RRWA enables the city to bring critical programs and activities that help improve water quality, for clean water, and watershed enhancement. Please keep an eye out for more information about various programs offered by RRWA throughout the year and help keep our precious watershed healthy!





Be aware, however, that if it is not fully paid you will be charged all the interest after the grace period. This is a good option for an emergency if you can come up with the money over the next year and avoid the interest.

Pet insurance will cover some emergency situations without the obligation to pay back. Policy costs and coverage vary widely so do your research. With the right policy, an affordable monthly fee will provide you with adequate coverage when you need it. Like all insurance, though, you may pay for years and not need it.

If this is the case, you may consider setting up an emergency fund, saving a designated amount each month instead of paying it to an insurance company. This way you keep the money in your own bank account, and when the need arises you will have \$1,000 or whatever amount you need to pay the vet bills right away.







Benefits of a Carbon Garden **Connor DeVane**

A carbon garden is a landscape that draws down and stores more carbon from the air than it releases into the air. Building healthy soil has immense benefits beyond slowing down climate change. Healthy, carbon-rich soil can store more water, helping to minimize drought impacts and protect the Russian River Watershed!


How do you grow a carbon garden?

- 1. Minimize soil disturbances there are trillions of soil organisms living in healthy soil. When we disturb them, CO2 is released. Let them thrive in peace by minimizing tilling and digging
- 2. Cover your soil leaving exposed soil allows it to dry out and be eroded by wind and water. Instead, cover it with living plants AND
- 3. Apply compost and mulch Mulch and compost protect soil, and they add more organic matter and nutrients to it as they decompose!
- 4. Plant biodiversity plants thrive in diverse communities, just like people! You want a diversity of regionally appropriate species, but also of plant types -- trees, shrubs, grasses and so on.
- 5. Plant CA natives native species have a deep relationship with local soils. Bonus points for native trees, shrubs and woody perennials
- 6. Water properly just like us, plants and soil are at their best when properly hydrated. Be sure to use plants that thrive in our climate and group them by water needs to make watering easier and to avoid overwatering.
- 7. Avoid synthetic chemicals and fertilizers these inputs will deteriorate your soil's health and make soils more dependent on their use in the future. Garden pests can be controlled through less toxic integrated pest management.
- 8. Avoid external inputs ideally, a carbon garden is what we call a closed-loop system. Make your own compost! Use all those fallen leaves and plant trimmings as mulch!

Over the next few years, as Mary Jane and Joe raised their family, she involved herself in various civic, school, religious, and social activities and organizations.

Mary Jane formed deep friendships with many of the Cloverdalians in these groups, friendships that have endured to this day. 



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

- You have owned the home for at least two years.
- You have lived in the home for at least two of the last five years.

Lighten your load. For every 100 lbs. added you will increase fuel consumption by 1-2%! Don't ignore faulty sensors. Some common sensors include; Tire pressure, Oxygen level, Engine emissions, Evaporative emissions. A damaged oxygen sensor alone could decrease fuel efficiency by 20% or more! Got questions? 
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Cloverdale Sculpture Trail

A Thirsty Burglar or a Dripping Faucet?

According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency more than 1 trillion gallons of water are wasted annually through leaks. That's enough water to fill Lake Sonoma more than eight times.

While drought-conscious Californians shudder at the thought of such a precious resource literally going down the drain, leaks create other issues. Water leaking from a faucet inside the home usually goes down a drain into sewer or septic systems, but a leaking pipe or connection fitting can cause interior damage. Water leaking outside the home can weaken foundations and hardscaping over time. Larger leaks can lead to higher water and sewer bills.

Locally, the Sonoma Marin Water Saving Partnership, and cities and water districts throughout the region provide helpful information on how to detect leaks by using your water meter and – for some cities – water-smart apps that allow you to see water use hour-by-hour. Hint: If you are using 10 gallons of water at 2 a.m. when no one is home, you either have a thirsty burglar or a large leak.

While your utility bill and water meter are great starting points, everyone (including rural residents who rely on wells) can check for leaks by listening for dripping faucets and for toilets that refill without being flushed, and by doing a simple toilet dye test (dye tabs are available for free at most city water departments and can be inexpensively purchased at hardware stores). Don't forget to check garage and laundry room sinks and washing machine fittings. Outdoor leaks can sometimes be more difficult to detect but have the potential to save large amounts of water (and money) when fixed. Take advantage of the spring weather to check and repair irrigation systems.

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Scalloped Potatoes

Easter is approaching and I enjoy scalloped potatoes with the family dinner. This version uses three cheeses so it's very rich and hard to put the fork down. I use Yukon potatoes, they are much more flavorful.

Ingredients

- Salt and pepper
- 4 pounds baking potatoes, scrubbed
- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 1½ cups shredded Gruyère or crumbled Blue cheese (about 5 1/2 oz.)
- 1½ cups shredded Cheddar
- ¾ cup grated Parmesan
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh thyme
- 2 cups heavy cream
- 3 bay leaves

Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. Add potatoes and cook, 25 to 30 minutes. Drain, set aside until potatoes are cool

In a small skillet, melt 1 Tbsp. butter over medium heat. Add onion and cook, stirring until tender, about 6 minutes. Add garlic and cook, about 2 minutes longer. Transfer to a medium bowl.

Preheat oven to 350°F and line a large baking sheet with foil. Generously butter a 9-by-13-inch baking dish and place it on lined baking sheet. Add Gruyère, Cheddar, Parmesan, thyme, 2 tsp. salt and 1 tsp. pepper to onion mixture and stir until well combined.

Peel and slice potatoes 1/4-inch thick. Arrange 1/3 of potatoes in baking dish, and sprinkle with 1/3 of cheese mixture. Repeat layering twice, finishing with cheese. Pour cream over potatoes, press bay leaves on top. Bake until cream is mostly absorbed and top is golden brown and bubbling, about 1 hour 15 minutes. Remove bay leaves. Let cool 10 minutes and serve.
