



- Pictures and irreplaceable memorabilia
- Personal computer hard drive and disks

Plastic (credit cards, ATM cards) and cash

3 & 4 **PRE-EVACUATION** PREPARATION STEPS

When an evacuation is anticipated, follow these checklists (if time allows) to give your home the best chance of surviving a wildfire:

OUTSIDE THE HOUSE

- Gather up flammable items from the exterior of 1 the house and bring them inside (patio furniture, children's toys, door mats, trash cans, etc.) or place them in your pool.
- 2 Turn off propane tanks.
- Move propane BBQ appliances away from structures
- Connect garden hoses to outside water valves or spigots for use by firefighters. Fill water buckets and place them around the house

- Don't leave sprinklers on or water running; they can affect critical water pressure
- Leave exterior lights on so your home is visible to firefighters in the smoke or darkness of night.
- 7 Put your Emergency Supply Kit in your vehicle.
- Back your car into the driveway with vehicle loaded and all 8 doors and windows closed. Carry your car keys with you.
 - Have a ladder available and place it at the corner of the house for firefighters to quickly access your roof.
- 10 Seal attic and ground vents with pre-cut plywood or commercial seals.
- 11 Monitor your property and the fire situation. Don't wait for an evacuation order if you feel threatened and need to
- 12 Check on neighbors and make sure they are preparing to leave.

INSIDE THE HOUSE

- 13 Shut all windows and doors, leaving them unlocked.
- 14 Remove flammable window shades and curtains. Close metal shutters
- 15 Move flammable furniture to the center of the room, awa from windows and doors
- 16 Shut off gas at the meter. Turn off pilot lights.
- 17 Leave your lights on so firefighters can see your house under smoky conditions.
- 18 Shut off the air conditioning.
- 19 Locate your pets and keep them nearby.
- 20 Prepare farm animals for transport and think about moving them to a safe location early. Copy courtesy of CAL FIRE.







What Foods You Can and Can't Pack for Your Next Flight

You can take pretty much any kind of food on to a plane, per TSA rules—you'll just hit trouble the closer the foods are to a liquid.

Airport security's requirements comes down to a few simple guidelines. "If you can spill it, spread it, spray it, pump it, or pour it, then it's considered a liquid or gel," That means it falls under the 3-1-1 liquids rule, which mandates that any liquid, gel, cream, aerosol, or paste in a carry-on must be 3.4 ounces or less, and fit in one quart-size resealable bag (only one such bag is allowed per passenger) except hand sanitizer up to 12 ounces, single bottle. This includes alcoholic beverages.

If it's spreadable, like cream cheese, peanut butter, or Nutella, then as a carry-on means packing in line with that 3-1-1 liquids rule explained above (unless it's in a sandwich, in which case you should be fine.) Solid cheese, solid chocolate and, well,

solid peanuts, are treated as dry snacks and allowed in your cabin bag without limit.

Meats, and eggs whether cooked, raw, whole, or sliced, are fine to bring onboard your flight.

Jiggly and pourable foods must be in checked luggage. These include gravy, containers of frosting, jams, jellies, soft butter, honey, syrups, salsa, dips, chutney, spreads, soup, pudding, salad dressina, etc.

Still not finding your answer? Check online at https://www.tsa. gov/travel/security-screening/whatcanibring/all

Checked bags aren't party to the liquid rules of carry-on luggage, so liquids and foods like honey, salsa, jam, and creamy cheese—the ones that fall into that questionable gray area between a liquid and solid and won't be let through at TSA security checkpoints—are always best checked.

Please note, these are TSA security rules, not airline rules.

It's that time of year again and the City of Cloverdale wants you to be prepared for emergencies that have the potential to impact our community. As part of the city's outreach strategy, City Staff will be publishing a three-part series focusing on the essential components of emergency readiness: Awareness, Preparedness, and Activation. The goal is to ensure that every resident, regardless of their race, age, health, mobility, socio economic condition and primary language has a strong understanding of the steps they can take before, and during, an emergency to protect the health and well-being of their household, staff, clients, and immediate neighbors.

I. PUBLIC SAFETY POWER SHUTOFFS (PSPS)

Given the continued and growing threat of extreme weather and wildfires, and as an additional precautionary measure following the 2017 and 2018 wildfires, PG&E began the process of expanding and enhancing their Community Wildfire Safety Program to further reduce wildfire risks and help keep their customers and the communities safe. These measures include expanding their Public Safety Power Shutoff program to include all electric lines that pass through high fire-threat areas - both distribution and transmission. The City of Cloverdale has already experienced PSPS events which are likely to continue for many years and residents are encouraged to prepare themselves for anticipated future events.

Vandalism at City Parks

Parks Superintendent Héctor Galván reported that there has been an increase in vandalism and graffiti at local parks. Parks staff recently responded to significant graffiti at Clark Park and vandalism of park facilities at Furber Park.

At Furber Park, Vandals damaged a secured water irrigation valve that resulted in the loss of several hundred gallons of water as well as locked facilities maintained by Cloverdale Youth Soccer. At Clark Park, graffiti marred park signage and the play structure. The repair work cost City Staff significant time repairing the damage. Repairing the damage takes staff time away from other critical park maintenance efforts by City Staff and the unnecessary expenditure of city funds to repair the damage.

Residents are encouraged to keep an eye out and report

Residents should be aware that:

- These shutoffs could last anywhere from 2-5 days after the event.
- While no single factor decides when a shutoff will occur, conditions PG&E will consider include red flag warnings, low humidity levels generally below 20%, sustained winds above 25 mph and gusts more than 45 mph. Additionally, conditions of dry fuel and observations by PG&E crews on the ground can be determining factors for shutoffs.
- Residents are encouraged to be prepared now and ٠ have a safety plan in place to take care of their own needs during a PSPS shutoff and not wait until they are called.
- Things you should consider in preparation for a PSPS shutoff include; a supply of emergency drinking water, cash, full fuel tanks in your vehicles, non-perishable food sources and plans for charging medical equipment and cellular devices.



Facts from the Past ~ Kay Wells

The next few months columns will be filled with the early farming experiences just south of Cloverdale off Dutcher Creek Road, as described by Ann Amaroli Gillis in her memoir. Selfdescribed as Cloverdale's Hugging Grandma, Ann recently passed away at the age of 101, leaving behind a treasure trove of written stories about her family's experiences on the farm and in Cloverdale. She bequeathed these stories to our Historical Society Library to be shared and enjoyed by us all, with the family's permission.

Dutcher Creek Road

Surely, you've driven on scenic Dutcher Creek Road towards Dry Creek Road, perhaps on your way to wineries or Warm Springs Dam and Lake Sonoma. It was not always so pleasant a drive. Back in the 1920s, the Amarolis bought property just off this five-mile wilderness road with innumerable chuckholes and dangerous curves causing several fatal accidents. The only regular traffic was the Geyserville school bus and the mailman. During the rainy season, Ann's father was hired to fill the holes with gravel from nearby gravel pits, using Babe, their horse and a wagon, and to keep the ditches clear of slide debris. One of Ann's chores was to herd their cows alongside the road to greener pasture. They often tried to run ahead, so Ann used a stick to keep them in line. It was an all-day chore.

In 1972, the county realigned the road and took out the dangerous curves, because the Warm Springs Dam was being constructed and a decent road was needed to bring tourists to Cloverdale.





Whisker Talk Brigid Wasson, First Street Pets

We live in a wasteful world. From clothing to electronics to food and drink containers, most things we buy are not made to last or to re-use and are soon discarded and replaced. Watch any documentary



on the garbage crisis to see the impact this has on our environment and economy. What can pet owners do to reduce this impact while meeting their animals' needs?

1) Buy quality. That nylon leash or collar at the dollar store may be cheap, but it won't last and might even be unsafe. A better quality product from a pet supply shop like Clover Dog will likely last for years, so you reduce waste and get your money's worth.

2) Buy in bulk. Plastic bags containing pet foods are not biodegradable. Buying many small bags increases waste and costs more. Compare any item like bread, cereal, etc. in the grocery store and you will see that many products are cheaper in larger quantities.

3) Waste management. Recology recently put out a directive to reduce landfill waste and divert more trash to the green bin. Most cat litters like clump or clay must be wrapped in plastic and placed in the garbage. Used wood pellet litter can be composted as long as you scoop out the poop. Neither dog nor cat poop can be composted, but there are home septic systems you can try.

4) Toys. Pet toys can be quite expensive and last only minutes, especially with an active chewer! You can make many toys yourself from rope, toilet paper tubes, boxes, balls, paper sacks, and anything else you have around the house. When you buy toys, choose things that will last like Kongs or toys made from canvas or leather.



Cloverdale Senior Multipurpose Center Melanie Hall

I recently presented to the Cloverdale Kiwanis Club and the Cloverdale Rotary Club about what the Senior Center was doing pre-Covid, during Covid, and now. The mission of CSMC is to provide Cloverdale Residents with activities, support, resources, and services that encourage participation in community life, promote well-being and independence, and enhance dignity.

Before Covid, we had physical activities and skill-building classes such as Yoga, Chair Yoga, Strength Training, Qi Gong Practice, Autobiographical Writing, Cooking, Bingo, Bunco, and much more; this continues now. We had special events and workshops, Craft Fairs, Holiday Teas, Card Parties, and Art Classes. Community-based information workshops; COPE Readiness, end-of-life planning, emergency preparedness, senior resources, HICAP (Medicare insurance), Sonoma County Legal Aid, Sonoma County Job Link Services, etc.

We have a Senior Technology Loan Program and Medical Equipment Loan Program. The tech program, developed during Covid, was intended to help senior isolation; a grant provided the funding. We collaborate for services with SOS Counseling, which provides mental health services to Cloverdale at our site. Dr. Kunda continues to offer Podiatry appointments monthly, and we work with Redwood Empire Food Bank to distribute food to our community weekly, sometimes multiple times a week.

During Covid, we remained open as a resource but closed to the public; we were here Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. We started a Connect Program where volunteers regularly called everyone in our membership to help with the feeling of isolation during the shelter-in-place orders. This communication also served to help find out what our senior's needs were in regards to transportation. We facilitated fifty community volunteers assisting others in running errands, picking up/delivering groceries and medication, and providing rides to medical/dental appointments.

We pursued fresh meals through Sonoma Family Meals and distributed thousands of meals, with many of the meals being home delivered by volunteers. We also worked with Farm to Pantry, Farmers to Families, Council on Aging (Meals on Wheels), and Redwood Empire Food Bank to provide more food security in our community. In addition, we pursued getting the Providence Mobile Clinic up to Cloverdale once a week, which continues and is now at Living Water church on Tuesdays.

Today, we are proud to continue with our classes, events, and programs for our community. Join at our biggest upcoming event July 9 to celebrate our 35th Anniversary.





What's Growing in Your Gutters? Anne Miserlian Baker

Have you looked in your gutters lately? Probably not. Gutters are not exactly in the line of sight.

Lucky for me, I was standing on the deck of a rental property we were pulling into service. Because the house was on built on a hillside, it stood one story above the garage. From the front porch, I was easily able to examine one gutter. Even though this home had a tile roof, rather than a gritty composition roof, there was about a quarter inch of hard packed dirt.

You might wonder, so what? Well, if allowed to remain in the gutter year after year, this dirt, along with more dirt to come, could end up costing this investor a LOT of money.

When road dirt, shingle grit, fallen leaves, bugs, algae, moss, and other growing things clog the gutters year after year, unremedied, expensive costs incur. Gutters rust and crack at the seams from the water that sits in that dirt. They then leak, often causing damage to the siding of the house. Worse, if there is a lot of debris, more debris will pile and trap water, often causing damage to the roof and eaves.

Whether it's your primary residence or an investment property, yearly maintenance is an essential part of home ownership. Even with gutter guards, gutter maintenance is imperative.

Composting Is Now The Law In Cloverdale

California state law, SB1383 requires all Cloverdale residents and businesses to compost. The Cloverdale City Council adopted an Ordinance to comply with California Senate Bill (SB1383) "Short-lived Climate Pollutants" on 3/23/22. The law requires all residents and businesses to separate organics from their garbage.

This law will reduce methane emissions from landfills and will increase the use of carbon-sinking compost, which greatly helps to combat the climate crisis.



All food-soiled paper (like paper towels or napkins) can be placed in your compost bin. Make sure the paper product does not have a lining that usually appears as a "shiny" surface. Meat and cheese can be placed in your compost cart. The compost facilities process this material at high temperatures, killing any dangerous bacteria. It's easy to keep your compost container clean and odorfree. Pro tips include lining your food scraps container with a paper bag or newspaper (like an old issue of Cloverdale Connect), using a container with a carbon filter, emptying your food scraps container regularly into your green cart, and layering carbon-rich materials such as dried leaves in your green cart.

Anna Maria Amaroli Gillis September 8, 1920 – February 18, 2022



Anna passed away peacefully at home with her family at her side. Born in Porretta Terme Italy, she was eleven months old when she arrived in Boston on a ship with her mother Teresa. The daughter of Attilio Amaroli and Teresa Guidotti Amaroli, she lived most of her life on a small farm on Dutcher Creek Road, where

they raised turkeys, chickens, eggs, cattle, vegetables and fruit. The farm is still with the family today.

Anna attended school in a one room schoolhouse on Dutcher Creek Road, then transferred to Geyserville schools beginning in the 2nd grade. Anna was accepted to UC Berkeley and graduated in 1942 with a B.A. with a major in Languages and a minor in Home Economics. She also took a college graduate business course at Armstrong Business College.

At a dance, she met Alexander S. Gillis from Texas, who was not a good dancer, but who wanted to learn. They enjoyed dancing and continued their love of it until Al passed. Anna and Al became engaged in 1943 and married December 30, 1945.

Al and Anna moved to Dutcher Creek and he worked in the lumber mills and she did secretarial work. Having no experience, except what she learned when she worked for developer Henry Trione, Anna, Al and Anna's brothers Ralph and George built their house by hand. Then Al decided to go into the insurance business and became a Farmers Agent and needed Anna's capable assistance to run the office. She helped him for 27 years until they retired from that business. Then Anna went to work in the medical field and worked until 1997 until she was diagnosed with stomach cancer, and retired.

Anna's love of cooking was enjoyed by family and friends. Her specialty was gnocchi and she loved teaching people how to make them. She did many fundraisers for the Cloverdale Senior Center by cooking elaborate dinners along with help from friends. Those fundraisers helped build the Senior Center. The Senior Center gave Anna a 101st Birthday Party last September where she was thrilled to see all her friends.

Anna also was a strong supporter of the Cloverdale Historical Society and was a speaker for some of their events about the history of Cloverdale. Her life story is on file at the History Center.

Anna's passion was painting, which she called her therapy. She served on various art groups and was Cloverdale's representative to the Sonoma County Arts Council for ten years. Anna was still painting daily until her fall.

Anna is survived by her loving daughter Shirley and her "favorite" son-in-law Gary and her beloved granddaughter Cara and partner Adam plus nieces Jackie Kennedy (Jeff), Aileen Reeves (David), and Lisa Amaroli; nephews Thomas Amaroli (Gisella) and Paul Amaroli; great nieces and nephews and a large extended family in Italy. She was preceded in passing by husband of almost 70 years, Alexander Gillis; her brothers Ralph Amaroli (Theadora) and George Amaroli (Marilan).

Remembering Stephen Lenn Weigt on this Memorial Day Al Delsid



Memorial Day is the time for us to remember the service and sacrifice of all veterans who are now gone and we especially remember and honor the service and sacrifice of SP4 Stephen Lenn Weigt who gave up his life for his fellow soldiers and his beloved country.

Stephen Lenn Weigt was born on October 14, 1947 to Louis and Maude Weigt in Hillsboro, Oregon. In 1954, the Weigt family moved to Cloverdale where Steve began attending school in Cloverdale from second grade up through his freshman year in high school, dropping out before his sophomore year began. Steve would also be the typical big brother who would keep an eye on his younger brother Jim and his friends. They called themselves the "River Rats" and would usually hang out and have fun along the river and especially at the First Falls area on Sulphur Creek.

Steve enlisted in the U.S. Army on January 20, 1967 and immediately went through his basic training and was sent to Vietnam. Steve's tour of duty began on January 25, 1968 where he was assigned to the 18th Engineer Brigade as a heavy vehicle driver.

Steve served honorably and eventually completed his first tour in Vietnam but decided to serve an additional 6-months.

Before starting his second tour of duty, Steve was given an opportunity to come home for a short time in December 1968. Steve returned to Vietnam to serve his 6 months and hopefully get out of the military a few months earlier. In the early hours of March 21, 1969, his sector was viciously attacked by enemy forces. SP4 Stephen L. Weigt responded with heavy volumes of machine gun fire. He continued this fierce fire fight for one hour while enemy mortars, rockets, hand grenades, automatic weapon rounds were coming in. Stephen L. Weigt was hit, suffering multiple fragmentation wounds and was killed in action in the Kontum Province, South Vietnam. Steve served a total of 15 months in Vietnam. He was posthumously awarded the Bronze Star medal with a "V" device for Valor, the Purple Heart, the Army Commendation Medal for heroism, National Defense Medal, the Vietnam Service Medal and the



Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal.

Stephen L. Weigt was buried with military honors next to his parents at the Oak Mound Cemetery in Healdsburg.

This time of year, plants and trees need little to no water depending on species and soils condition.

Irrigation Tips for Saving Water


- Perform a complete inventory of your garden and remove dead plants that did not endure winter conditions or last years drought
- Turn off irrigation to plants mentioned in first bullet point

- Turn down irrigation times to trees and large drought tolerant shrubbery
- Reduce all irrigation systems to shorter watering cycles to avoid run off
- Make sure the irrigation controller is set to the local mandatory stage 4-35% water reduction ordinance



California Library Parks Pass

California State Parks is distributing the California State Library Parks Pass to public libraries across the state for checkout by library patrons. The new pass will allow free vehicle day use entry at more than 200 participating state park units.

As part of a three-year pilot program, each library jurisdiction will receive at least three California State Library Parks Pass hangtags per branch for checkout by library patrons, including mobile libraries. Park Passes will enter circulation on a rolling basis for checkout by library patrons; library users can contact their local library for more information. Library-card holders will be able to check out the pass for the allotted number of days allowed by the local library, then return the pass to the library for others to use. The pass is valid for entry of one passenger vehicle with capacity of nine people or less or one highway licensed motorcycle at participating state park units.



Cooking With David Maciel Sponsored by Ray's Food Place

With the warmer weather I turn my attention to the BBQ & grill. This rolled flank steak is a great idea for a two with plenty of leftovers or parties.

Rolled Flank Steak with Prosciutto and Basil

- 1 cup coarse dry bread crumbs
- ¹/₂ cup chopped flat-leaf parsley
- ¹/₂ cup shredded Italian Fontina cheese (3 ounces)
- ¹/₄ cup green olives, pitted and chopped (1¹/₂ ounces)
- ¹/₄ cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese (³/₄ ounce)
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 tablespoon plus 2 teaspoons finely chopped thyme
- One 2-pound flank steak
- 5 ounces thinly sliced prosciutto
- 1 cup basil leaves
- 2 teaspoons kosher salt
- 2 teaspoons minced garlic
- 1 teaspoon freshly ground pepper

Light BBQ grill or preheat oven 350°. In large bowl, combine bread crumbs with parsley, Fontina, olives, Parmesan, 2 TBS of olive oil and 1 TBS of thyme.

Lay steak on work surface with a short edge facing you. Using a long, sharp knife, make a horizontal cut in a long side of the steak to within $\frac{1}{2}$ inch of the opposite edge. Open the flank steak like a book.

Cover cut side of the steak with prosciutto slices, then top with layer of basil leaves. Spread the bread crumb mixture on top. Tightly roll up the steak around the filling. Using kitchen string, tie roll in 4 or 5 places.

In a small bowl, combine remaining 1 tablespoon of olive oil and 2 teaspoons of thyme with salt, garlic and pepper. Rub mixture over rolled steak.

Bank coals to one side of grill or turn off one side of grill. Grill steak over high heat until browned all over, turning steak 4 times as it cooks. Move meat away from direct heat and grill for 15 to 20 minutes, or until instant thermometer registers 120° to 125° for medium rare. Or, heat a large ovenproof skillet. Add rolled steak and cook over high heat until browned all over, 8 to 10 minutes. Transfer skillet to oven, roast steak for 20 to 30 minutes, or until instant thermometer registers 120° to 125° for medium rare. Transfer steak to carving board, cover loosely with foil, let rest for 10 minutes. Discard strings, slice the steak crosswise ¹/₂ inch thick. Serve.
