



Cloverdale Toastmasters Celebrates 30 Year Anniversary


"Good morning fellow Toastmasters!" has probably been said 1,500 times to kick off meetings in Cloverdale over the last 30 years. June 1st marks the 30th anniversary of Cloverdale Toastmasters.

If you live in Cloverdale, you likely know a current member or a Cloverdale Toastmasters Alumnus. Some of these folks own local businesses. Many are active on commissions, boards, and other community associations.

Each meeting follows an agenda. There are always 1 or 2 speeches. Each member takes a turn as the scheduled speaker. The meeting isn't just about speaking, but also leadership. Most speeches run between 5-7 minutes long which is about 1 typed page. The speaker can talk about any subject they desire. The middle of a meeting focuses on impromptu speaking. Speakers are given a prompt by the Topicsmaster. The goal is to speak for 1 to 2 minutes. The prompt can be as easy as "What is your favorite food?" or as challenging as "Tell us about (insert current headline here)". The timer will display a green card, or light, when 1 minute is reached and the speaker can stop speaking, the color yellow is shown at 1.5 minutes and if a speaker reaches 2 minutes, they see red. Timing provides a good guideline for the speaker to learn how to meet audience expectations. There is a Grammarian whose job during the meeting is to listen for filler words like "ah" and "um" and also to provide a word of the day. The challenge is to use the word of the day into a prepared or impromptu speech.

Giving and receiving feedback are regularly practiced and comprise a good part of the meetings. Evaluators evaluate the speech delivery such as gestures, vocal variety, and organization rather than content or conclusions.

Cloverdale Toastmasters meets on Zoom most Fridays, but the 2nd Friday of each month they meet in person at Zini's Diner. Toastmasters also can provide emcees and support for other organizations' speaker needs. Please contact our President: garrett254@yahoo.com

Hardening Your Home And Property

In part two of the city's emergency readiness outreach strategy, we will focus on creating a defensible space around BayREN's Water Upgrade Save program officially launched wildfire strikes.

three ways your home can be exposed to wildfire:

- 1. Direct flames from a wildfire or burning neighboring home
- 2. Radiant heat from nearby burning plants or structures
- 3. Flying embers from a wildfire can destroy homes up to a mile away and are responsible for the destruction of most homes during a wildfire.

There are some critical areas of your home that you can evaluate now to prepare your home. Outlined below are some of the key measures that can be considered for home hardening:

- The roof is the most vulnerable part of your home. Homes with wood or shingle roofs are at high risk of being destroyed during a wildfire. Build your roof or re-roof with materials such as composition, metal, clay or tile. Block any spaces between roof decking and covering to prevent embers from catching. Remove accumulated a qualified program contractor will come to install your vegetative debris from the roof.
- Vents on homes create openings for flying embers. Cover all vent openings with 1/16-inch to 1/8-inch metal mesh. Do not use fiberglass or plastic mesh because vents (WUI vents).
- Surfaces within 10 feet of the building should be built with ignition-resistant, noncombustible, or other approved materials. Create an ember-resistant zone around and under all decks and make sure that all combustible items are removed from underneath your deck. If a deck overhangs a slope, create and maintain defensible space downslope from the deck to reduce the chances of flames reaching the underside of the deck.
- Keep rain gutters clear or enclose rain gutters to prevent accumulation of plant debris. Install a corrosion-resistant and noncombustible metal drip edge for additional protection of the combustible components on your roof's edge. Use a noncombustible gutter cover to prevent buildup of debris and vegetation in the gutter
- Cover your chimney and stovepipe outlets with a nonflammable screen. Use metal screen material with openings no smaller than 3/8-inch and no larger than 1/2-inch to prevent embers from escaping and igniting a fire. Close the fireplace flue during fire season when the chimney is not being used.
- Fences: Best practice is to separate your fence from your house or upgrade the last 5-feet of the fence to a noncombustible material to reduce the chance of the fence from bringing fire to your home.
- Garages: Have a fire extinguisher and tools such as a shovel, rake, bucket, and hose available for fire emergencies. Add a battery back-up to the garage door motor so that the garage can easily be operated if power is out. Install weather stripping around and under the garage door to prevent embers from blowing in. Store all combustible and flammable liquids away from ignition sources. Treat windows and vents in the garage the same way as if it was a part of the house.
- Consider having multiple garden hoses that are long enough to reach all areas of your home and other structures on your property. If you have a pool or well, consider getting a pump.



Whisker Talk

Brigid Wasson, First Street Pets

"Helping pet lovers live their best life"

As temperatures rise and we take our dogs hiking and swimming, we soon find them dirty and smelly and in need of bathing! What are the best ways to go about this?



We have some great groomers here in Cloverdale who can get your dog shiny and new with minimal stress. These include Country Clippers on 1st street and Clover Dog in the Ray's shopping center. Key to a good grooming experience is communication and realistic expectations. If you haven't brushed your dog all year, don't expect the groomer to get them looking like they are ready for a dog show. More likely they will shave them down so they will be comfortable. Good groomers book up fast so be sure to make an appointment as soon as you can. Respect your groomer's time and don't expect them to drop everything because you waited till the last minute.

Clover Dog also has do-it-yourself dog wash, which is quick and cheap, and they will do all the clean-up for you! This is a good solution if your dog just needs a washup. The raised bath tubs are easier on your back, and everything including shampoo, brushes, and towels are provided.

You can bathe your dog at home provided you have a good space to do so. Little dogs are easier and can be washed in the sink. Bigger dogs will require more space in a bathtub or shower. I am fortunate to have a double shower which makes this task easier for my big dogs. What kind of shampoo should you use? There are a number of shampoos sold especially for dogs. I recommend choosing one of the better ones available at a pet store rather than a cheap one from a dollar store. If your dog is really oily or dirty, you can do the first wash with Dawn dish soap. My groomer from years ago shared this trick with me. Dawn is gentle and safe and cuts grease. Follow with a good dog shampoo and conditioner for a soft finished look and feel.

TRANSMISSION TROUBLE?

One early sign of transmission trouble is the smell of burning transmission fluid, which indicates that the transmission is overheating. Transmission fluid not only lubricates, it also removes the heat of friction to an oil cooler (mini-radiator). Most automatic transmission fluids are designed to operate at about 175 degrees F. At higher temperatures, the fluid oxidizes, turns brown, and begins to exhibit a burning odor. As the fluid's lubricating qualities and friction characteristics become compromised, varnish begins to form on internal parts such as the valve body. In addition, rubber seals harden, leaks form and the transmission begins to slip. In time, the clutches burn out, and the transmission fails. We know that a regularly scheduled maintenance is less money, time, and headache. communities in Northern California. Fire preparedness is most successful as a layered approach between individual residents and the larger community. Through scientific and practical study, yard preparation has come to be called Defensible Space.

Cal Fire recommendations:

Zone 0 – "Ember resistant zone" located 0 to 5-feet away from the structure and wooden decks. Use hardscape like gravel, pavers, concrete and other noncombustible mulch materials. Remove all dead and dying plants, from yard and roofs and decks. Remove all branches within 10 feet of any chimney or stovepipe outlet. Limit plants in this area. Limit combustible items. Relocate firewood and lumber to Zone 2

Zone 1 – "Lean, Clean, and Green" located 0 to 30-feet away from the structure. Remove all dead plants, grass, and weeds. Remove dead or dry leaves and pine needles from your yard,

Living with and preparing for wildfires is essential for roof, and rain gutters. Trim trees to keep branches a minimum of 10 feet from other trees and structures. Relocate wood piles to Zone 2. Create a separation between trees, shrubs and items that could catch fire, such as patio furniture, wood piles, swing sets, etc.

> **Zone 2** – "Reduce Fuel" located 30 – 100 feet away from the structure to the property line, whichever is closer. Cut or mow grass down to a maximum height of 4 inches. Create horizontal space between shrubs and trees. Create vertical space between grass, shrubs, and trees. Remove fallen leaves, needles, twigs, and branches to a depth of 3 inches. All exposed wood piles must have a minimum of 10 feet of clearance, down to bare mineral soil, in all directions.

Renovation of Swimming Pool Complete

The Sonoma County Department of General Services announces the completion of the \$660,000 joint community project to renovate the aging swimming pool at the Veterans Memorial Building in Cloverdale. The project includes the installation of a solar thermal heating system that allows the public to comfortably use the outdoor swimming pool in the spring and fall, the installation of a new drain system and pump equipment, plus eight new metal tables and benches.

The county led the project in partnership with the City of Cloverdale and the Cloverdale Unified School District. The county owns the pool, operated and managed by the City of Cloverdale through an annual agreement with the Sonoma County Family YMCA. The county provided \$616,000 in funding for the renovation project, with the remainder supplied by the City of Cloverdale and the Cloverdale Unified School District.

Day use fees are \$5 for adults, \$4 for youth and seniors 55 and older, and \$10 for families with up to two adults and their minor children, all living in the same household.



Spotlight on Sculptor Pierre Riche

Pierre Riche, a Freedom CA sculptor, is exhibiting "Salvaged Horse" in the 2022-2024 Sculpture Trail. "Salvaged Horse" is a welded metal sculpture of a horse rearing up with its hair flying in the wind. The many steel parts that comprise this dynamic equine representation are wrenches, old tools, nuts and bolts, railroad spikes, diamond plate and even a tire iron or two. There are two welded circles of chain links from a diesel locomotive that frame the wine barrel base.

This sculpture (see page 20), 77" H x 27" W x 48" D, is located on east Citrus Fair Drive at the intersection of Cloverdale Boulevard. The sponsor of this unique sculpture is Shelli Byers.

Artist Statement

"From scrap metal to salvation, that is the process I use to elevate the crude to the sublime in my sculptures. It is also a metaphor for the spiritual transformation that guides and gets expressed through my work. Salvaging discarded and abandoned metals and up-cycling them into figurative and animal sculptures revels an invaluable message; with the right tools and creative persuasion, no scrap metal will perish."

Pierre continues: "I strive to strike a balance between crude industrial forms merging into flowing graceful visual poetry. Each sculpted artwork possesses its own rhythm and tells a story.

Historic Funding Secured For Water Resiliency Projects

In response to the continued drought, three key projects have secured vital state funding – \$17 million from the State of California's Department of Water Resources – to supplement local funding. Several agencies partnered on applying for State funds through its 2021 Urban and Multibenefit Drought Relief Program. The Alexander Valley Flood-Managed Aquifer Recharge (Flood-MAR) received \$7 million toward a \$9.6 million recharge project; the City of Healdsburg \$7 million toward a \$13.9 million pipeline; and the City of Cloverdale \$3 million for systemwide improvements.

supply and distribution system projects, including replacing volunteer opportunities for seniors are some of Myer's future and upgrading approximately 1,700 existing water meters plans for the Senior Center. for Advanced Metering Infrastructure radio read capability; expanding the current supervisory control and data acquisition system at the City's treatment facility to integrate portable water distribution infrastructure at seven remote sites; and replacing two city-owned supply wells.

"During our times of drought, we need to be as efficient as possible in our conservation effort," said Todd Lands, mayor of Cloverdale. "Due to this grant funding, we will be able to upgrade many areas of our water system to accurately measure usage and to detect any issues. We are thankful for all who helped Cloverdale with this grant."

The Flood-MAR Initiative will create sustainable water resources with benefits to local fisheries, agriculture and communities. The initiative's primary goal is to replenish the local groundwater system by annually diverting 5,000 acre feet of high winter flows from the Russian River through a network of underflow wells and applying those waters to agricultural land when the commercial crops are dormant.



New Crosses at Veteran Grave Sites Al Delsid



The Sons of the American Legion recently replaced the original crosses that had marked veteran grave sites at the Cloverdale Cemetery. They used a few of the original crosses and new crosses were built. There is a rectangular section on the round steel plate to accommodate a name plate with the veteran's name and branch of service. It is not known who initially placed the original red, white and blue crosses on the veteran grave sites


at the Cloverdale Cemetery, but it was Don Green the Commander VFW Post 9268 in Cloverdale, who kept them up and maintained. Several were broken and became faded over time, but Don would take them home, re-weld the broken pieces and repaint them in the red, white and blue colors. We were not exactly sure how many veteran grave sites there were because many of the veteran graves were left unmarked or the grave stones had no indication the person was a veteran. With the help of Kathleen Clemence of the Find a Grave website, we have finally found and confirmed all veteran grave sites at the Cloverdale Cemetery. Now every veteran in our cemetery has a marked grave site. A new grave marker was placed at the William Russell Ledford grave site. He died on January 18, 1918 during WWI. Ledford is the namesake of the American Legion Post 293.

We can now decorate the graves of our local veterans and leave none forgotten every Memorial Day, every Veterans Day and every other holiday,

Currently there are 1,946 grave sites at the Cloverdale Cemetery and 69 are confirmed veterans. The oldest known veteran named Thomas Clinton Murray served in the War of 1812 and one of the most recent burials is of the only Vietnam War veteran in the cemetery, Evan Gibbins Thompson Jr.

Facts From The Past Kay Wells

This is Part 2 of Ann Gillis' Memoir

"Farm Life on Dutcher Creek Road in the late 1920s and 1930s"

When the Depression hit in 1929, farm folk were fortunate in that they could live on the fruits of their labors, plus raising chickens, turkeys and cattle which on this farm were fed by Ann. After her dad pruned the grape vines and fruit trees, it was Ann's job to gather up the branches for firewood. When she was big enough, Ann learned to pluck chickens after they were doused with boiling water to loosen their feathers. Her mother also taught her how to take out the innards and prepare them for the pot.

If it was fall and the pig was processed, she recalls stirring the fat cubes in the big kettle on the stove to render the lard. There were beans to be shelled, fruit to be peeled, jelly and jam to be made and canned and butter to be churned. She also skinned the jack rabbits hunted by her brothers by hanging them from a tree by their hind legs. Ann was grateful that she never had the job of milking the cows. Her parents and brothers did that.

Ann's mom would send the kids up into the apple trees to place the apples in buckets to later string and dry for winter use. Dirty clothes needed to be scrubbed on the scrub board. The job Ann hated most was ironing with the irons which were heated on the wood stove and had to be cleaned after each heating to prevent scorching the starch. (Visit the Gould Shaw House at our Museum and try lifting those old irons!)

Ed. Note: As a suburban child, the only regular chores I remember included: making my bed, tidying my room, setting the table, washing the dinner dishes, taking out the trash, helping with the vacuuming, and picking the strawberries and veggies we planted during WWII. How about you?

Cooking With David Maciel

Balsamic Glazed Chicken Thighs

I make this dish often. It's very simple but tasty one pan meal.

1/2 C. balsamic vinegar

- 2 Tbsp. honey
- 1 1/2 Tbsp. whole-grain mustard
- 3 cloves garlic, minced

Kosher salt

Freshly ground black pepper

- 4 bone-in, skin-on chicken thighs
- 2 C. baby red potatoes, halved (quartered if large)
- 2 Tbsp. sprigs fresh rosemary, plus 1 Tbsp. chopped
- 2 Tbsp. extra-virgin olive oil, divided
- 1. Preheat oven to 425°. In a large bowl, combine balsamic vinegar, honey, mustard, and garlic and season with salt and pepper. Whisk until combined. Add chicken thighs and toss until fully coated. Transfer to the fridge to marinate, at least 20 minutes and up to 1 hour.
- 2. Meanwhile, prep potatoes: In a medium bowl, add potatoes and chopped rosemary and season with salt and pepper. Add 1 tablespoon oil and toss until combined. Set aside.
- 3. In a large ovenproof skillet over medium-high heat, heat remaining tablespoon oil. Add chicken and sear, skin side down, 2 minutes, then flip and sear 2 minutes more. Add potatoes, nestling them between chicken, and top with rosemary sprigs.
- 4. Transfer to the oven and bake until potatoes are tender and chicken is cooked through, 20 minutes. (If potatoes need longer to cook, transfer chicken to a cutting board to rest and continue cooking potatoes until tender.)
- 5. Serve chicken and potatoes with pan drippings.
