
Editor's Note

Whisker Talk

Brigid Wasson, Good Dogs Pet Sitting ~ "Helping pet lovers live their best life"

Folks may wonder why their dog barks suspiciously at someone who appears perfectly normal, or why their horse snorts and runs from a plastic bag or rock.

As predators, dogs have binocular vision, like humans. This means their eyes are in front of their head and they can tocus on objects with both eyes. Dogs can see some color, but not in as broad a spectrum as people. With a different ratio of rods and cones, they have much greater perception of movement and shapes. Color is important to humans but impairs clarity of vision. With their greater perception of movement and shapes, dogs will react to things out of the ordinary like a person in a big hat, a Halloween costume, or someone who walks with a cane or in a wheelchair. I had a dog years ago who barked at hang gliders. She could not figure out how people could fly!

vision. This means that their eyes are on opposite sides of their head, each with its own field of vision. With the largest eyes of any land mammal, they have an amazing long-range panoramic view almost



Horses are prey animals and as such, they have monocular

all the way around. This enables them to detect and avoid danger, but it has some limitations. They

have little depth perception as you'll see when you're riding and your horse thinks a two inch deep puddle is a death trap. They will turn their head to the side or move their head higher or lower to get the thing they want to see in clear view. They have blind spots directly in front of and behind their bodies which is why they may kick out when taken by surprise from behind. Knowing how our animals see can help us understand why they do the things they do.

Cloverdale Ambulance Seeks Funds For Cardiac Monitors Mary Jo Winter

The Cloverdale Healthcare District is seeking funds to complete the purchase of two of the latest generation cardiac monitors costing \$66,000 for the Cloverdale Ambulance. These monitors can provide telemedicine and real-time remote monitoring and access by cardiac receiving centers and cardiologists. The units will be the first of their kind in Sonoma County and the District will be helping push this technology forward to allied agencies within the County. A \$25,000 grant has been received from the County of Mendocino and they are hoping to raise a similar amount or more through other grant sources and community donations. While the District has some capital funds available to apply towards this purchase, additional financial assistance is still needed.

As a rural provider, the Cloverdale Ambulance has significant travel time from northern Sonoma County to the two cardiac receiving facilities in the County and to local emergency departments. According to Manager Tom Hinrichs, "Our paramedics already provide excellent care and diagnostic skills to these patients, but with this new ability to interact with the cardiologist, the catheterization teams can expedite treatment, improving both our care and the cardiac centers' care."Tax-deductible donations can be made directly to the Cloverdale Healthcare District Foundation, P.O. 


Paul Allen Lane November 6, 1939 - June 15, 2022

Cloverdale Water Shortage Reminder

This is a reminder that Cloverdale is in a "Stage 4 Water Shortage Emergency", which was declared August 11, 2021. Water usage per person per day is limited to no more than 65 gallons.

- All customers are required to reduce water use by 35% from 2020 levels.
- Irrigation may only occur once per week.
- Residential meters serving single-family detached homes: any water use in excess of 65 gallons per person per day is not permitted.
- A permit is required for all hydrant use, except for water used for fighting fires or for other emergency use deemed essential by the Fire Chief.
- Drinking water in any restaurant, café, cafeteria or other

Water waste prohibitions are currently in effect. No water furnished by the City shall be wasted. Waste of water include but is not limited to the following:

- Washing of sidewalks, walkways, driveways, parking lots and other hard-surfaced areas by direct hosing.
- Customer water leaks: customer has 72 hours after discovery to repair a leak. (Call 707-894-2150)
- Irrigating more than one day per week.
- Excessive run-off or unreasonable over-spray of the areas being irrigated.
- Washing cars, bots, trailers or other vehicles or machinery.
- Water for non-recyclina decorative water fountains.
- Water for non-recycling evaporative cooling systems for air conditioning installed after April 28, 2021, unless required for health or safety reasons.

Tips to help keep an airline from losing your luggage:

Never check anything that you can't live without. This includes car keys, glasses or medicine. Also, leave your most precious items at home to avoid possible heartbreak.

Remove all existing labels and tags from your previous trips. Destination bag tags as well as those little bar code stickers that get put on your suitcase.

Put your name and contact information pretty much everywhere. Add a baggage tag on the outside with your name and phone number, plus one inside in case that one falls off or gets lost.

Photograph both the outside of the checked suitcase and the inside with its contents for future identification purposes.

Get to the airport early to check your bag, but not 4 to 6 hrs. pre-departure, as your luggage may go to a holding area and not get sorted for your flight.

When it comes time to check your bag, keep an eye on the tags that are printing.

Does it have the right airport and code? Your correct name and frequent flyer number? Is the barcode clear or smudged? (If it doesn't look crisp, have them print it again.) If you qualify for elite and priority tags, make sure they're added to your baas as well.

Stay and watch to make sure your luggage is put on the conveyor belt or added to the checked bags cart (this is important for curb checking where available, too).

Add an electronic tag (Apple Air Tags, LugLoc or Trakdot) and follow on the app to keep an eye on the progress of your bags.

Download your carrier's app since most of the large airlines now offer digital luggage receipts and bag tracking within their apps.

Keep those baggage receipts the agent hands you. If something goes awry, you'll need them as proof. 5

Facts from the Past – Prohibition **Kay Wells**

This is Part 3 of Ann Gillis' memoir of farm life on Dutcher Creek, in which she describes how Prohibition affected their lives in Sonoma County.

In 1919 Congress enforced the 18th amendment to the constitution making it illegal to produce or sell alcoholic beverages except for home consumption (up to 250 gal. a year.) Home brewing and winemaking took off. Ann's dad made wine for the family from the many varieties of grapes found on their property when they bought it. The orchards were not irrigated, just dry land farming, but "the grapes were delicious and sweet." The first year her dad pressed the grapes with his bare feet, but later bought rubber boots, a new pair every year. After pressing, he would let her drink the fresh juice which she loved.

Some grape growers switched to prunes. Some winemakers produced sacramental wine or turned to bootlegging. Ann recounts how the town mortician, Edna Gordon, was approached by bootleggers to transport their liquor inside her hearse where authorities would not think to look. She of course refused.

It is said that some shipments of sugar used in fermentation they knew came through Cloverdale, but probably by a longgone secret route through private properties to HWY 1.

Her family planted 50 Bartlett pear trees and other fruits which they sold to vacationing families for canning. The income helped sustain their family through the Prohibition years.



The ELECTION is coming!



November 8, 2022

In the words of United States Founding Father Thomas Jefferson, "We in America do not have government by the majority. We have government by the majority who participate," and the City of Cloverdale encourages every eligible resident to take part in the upcoming election on November 8, 2022!

The Cloverdale City Council is comprised of five members, each elected at-large by the voters of Cloverdale for a four-year term. On November 8, 2022, the City of Cloverdale will hold a General Municipal Election in the City of Cloverdale for the following offices:

- City Council 3 to be elected to 4 year terms
- City Treasurer 1 to be elected to 4 year term
- Qualifications for all registered voter in the City

The four-year terms for existing Councilmembers: Vice Mayor Wolter, Councilmember Cruz, and Councilmember Palla come to an end. In addition, the four year term for the position of City Treasurer Mike Nixon comes to an end.

In addition to these elected officials, voters will consider a measure to prohibit fireworks, including Safe and Sane Fireworks, in the City of Coverdale. The following measure will be voted on at the general municipal election to be held in the City of Cloverdale on Tuesday, the 8th day of November, 2022:

A "YES" or "NO" vote for Measure:

City of Cloverdale Fireworks Prohibition. Shall an ordinance be adopted that prohibits the sale and use of all fireworks, including "Safe and Sane Fireworks", within the City with an exception for permitted public fireworks displays?

If you're interested in potential candidacy for a seat on the City Council, the nomination period began Monday, July 18th, 2022, and will close on Friday, August 12th, 2022 *. Official nomination petitions for eligible candidates desiring to file for the above offices may be obtained from the Office of the City Clerk, at 124 N. Cloverdale Blvd **by appointment only**. Contact City Clerk Mike Maloney at mmaloney@ci.cloverdale.ca.us to schedule an appointment. For additional information to become a qualified candidate for the 2022 election, including candidate eligibility, nomination process details, required nomination and candidate forms for filing, and important contact information, toolkits, and manuals, visit our website's election section online at: www.cloverdale.net/elections!

*If nomination papers for an incumbent elective officer of the city are not filed by close of business on Friday, August 12, 2022, the voters shall have until close of business on Wednesday, August 17th by 5 p.m. to nominate candidates other than the incumbent.

Democracy is not a spectator sport, and with three of the five council seats up for election, as well as the position of City Treasurer and a ballot measure, we strongly urge every eligible voter in Cloverdale to make their vote count and participate in the fast-approaching November 8th election! Voter resources including voter registration information, voting locations, ballot and candidate material, as well as an election calendar, and eventual election results, will be available and updated regularly online at www.cloverdale.net/elections!

In addition to voting, your involvement and contributions in conversations and the decision-making process at public meetings is not only welcomed and valued, but also encouraged! You're also invited to attend the various Council Subcommittees that have been established to help set management objectives for city government, adopt a city budget for fulfilling those management objectives, and to ensure accountability to the citizens of Cloverdale. including Safe and Sane Fireworks, within the City of Cloverdale. The City Council heard an agenda report prepared by the City Attorney and received public input on the proposed ballot measure. The Council review of a proposed ballot measure was preceded by a review of options at their January 26 meeting regarding the sale, possession, and use of fireworks and public fireworks displays in the City of Cloverdale. At that meeting, the City Council provided direction to staff to prepare a ballot measure that would prohibit the sale and use of Safe and Sane Fireworks for the City Council to consider placing on the November 8, 2022 ballot. After debate and discussion, the Council adopted a Resolution that took the following actions:

- 1. Calling and Giving Notice of the Holding of an Election on Nov. 8, 2022, to Consider the City of Cloverdale Measure to Prohibit Fireworks, including Safe and Sane Fireworks;
- 2. Ordering the Submittal of the Measure to the Voters at the Election, and
- 3. Requesting that the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors Consent to the Consolidation of this Election with the Statewide General Election and the Previously Called Municipal Election to be Held on the Same Date and Direct the Registrar of Voters to Conduct the Election.

In order to pass, the Measure must receive a simple majority (50%+1) of votes by registered voters in the City during the election. If approved by the voters, the Measure will adopt an ordinance amending the City's Municipal Code to prohibit the sale and use of all fireworks, including Safe and Sane Fireworks, in Cloverdale. Specifically, the Ordinance would delete Municipal Code section 15.14.695 in its entirety, which would eliminate the regulations legalizing Safe and Sane Fireworks. In addition, the Ordinance would add Chapter 9.44 to the Municipal Code, which would explicitly prohibit the sale and use of all fireworks, including Safe and Sane Fireworks. In addition, the Ordinance would add Chapter 9.44 to the Municipal Code, which would explicitly prohibit the sale and use of all fireworks, including Safe and Sane Fireworks, within Cloverdale. The Ordinance includes an exception for permitted public displays of fireworks that are conducted by a licensed professional.

If adopted by the voters, the City Council will retain the authority to amend the Ordinance in the future in order to further regulate public fireworks displays, increase penalties for violation, and make other related topics. However, any action to remove the prohibition on Safe and Sane Fireworks would require approval from the voters.

The ballot measure will include an impartial analysis prepared by the City Attorney. The Impartial Analysis will read as follows:

CITY ATTORNEY'S IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS

The California State Fire Marshall is responsible for regulating the use and sale of all fireworks in the state. Under California law, it is illegal for any person, except for a pyrotechnic professional licensed by the State Fire Marshall, to use most fireworks. "Safe and Sane Fireworks" are a specific type of fireworks that the State Fire Marshall has determined may safely be used by ordinary individuals who are not pyrotechnic professionals.

Safe and Sane Fireworks are legal under state law. However, a city has the authority to ban the sale and use of Safe and Sane Fireworks within the city's boundaries. The sale of and use of Safe and Sane Fireworks is currently allowed in Cloverdale, subject to certain regulations. Specifically, Safe and Sane Fireworks may currently be sold in Cloverdale from July 1-4. Only nonprofit organizations located in Cloverdale that provide direct and regular community services and benefits to the residents of the City may apply for a permit to sell Safe and Sane Fireworks. The City may issue permits to a maximum of three organizations. Cloverdale Municipal Code section 15.14.695 contains other regulations governing where and how Safe and Sane Fireworks can be sold.

Ballot Measure on Fireworks

On May 25th, the City Council considered whether to place a Measure on November 8, 2022 Ballot to enable the voters to consider whether to Ban the **Sale and Use of All Fireworks**,

Under current law, Safe and Sane Fireworks may only be used between 11:00 a.m. and midnight on July 4th. The use of Safe and Sane Fireworks is generally limited to private property and is prohibited in City parks. The use of all fireworks, other than Safe and Sane Fireworks, is currently prohibited in Cloverdale, except for supervised public firework shows conducted by licensed pyrotechnic professionals.

The Fireworks Ballot Measure will officially be designated a Measure Number on the ballot by the Registrar of Voters. At this time, the Measure number has not been assigned.

In the spirit of collaboration and the democratic process, don't be a spectator: Vote in the election, participate in the public meetings, and let your voice be heard!




Pandemic Phoenix LIFT ~ Kristin Bongiovanni

Water Smart Irrigation Russian River Watershed Association

Did you know that most residential landscapes are regularly over-watered by as much as 30-40%? When using water for irrigation, it is not only economical to use only what your garden needs, but it conserves water for other uses during our long, dry summers. If left unchecked, wasteful irrigation can be a major consumer of precious potable water sources like local groundwater stores and the Russian River. Here are some helpful steps you can take to reduce your reliance on potable water for irrigation:

Grow Native Plants

The reason native plants are 'native' is because they have adapted to their local surroundings and have found their niche in terms of navigating seasonal changes in climate. Many of these native plants require no irrigation at all and have adapted to long stretches without any additional watering whatsoever! Incorporating these plants in your landscape and garden can drastically reduce water consumption. As a bonus, these native plants act as a haven for beneficial insects, native plants, and animals, which benefits and sustains our local ecosystems.

Minimize Turf Areas

Historically, lawns have been areas of recreation and socialization between friends and family, however, turf areas require a significant amount of water to stay healthy through long dry seasons. Furthermore, many lawns are often treated with toxic herbicides and contribute towards greenhouse gas emissions when maintained with a gas-powered lawn mower. Replacing some (or all) of your existing lawn with mulch and native plants will increase water use efficiency, promote onsite water infiltration, and reduce your overall water consumption.

Utilize Alternative Sources for Water

Given a little ingenuity, potable water from your hose or faucet doesn't have to be the only source of irrigation for your garden or landscape. Rainwater and graywater are both excellent sources of irrigation that can be applied to replace potable water consumption. Water that normally falls on your roof is routed away from your property and towards your local stormwater collection system, however, this water can be rerouted to on-site storage tanks which can be later drawn from as a source of irrigation. Graywater from sinks, showers, and washing machines, albeit non-potable, also serves as an excellent source of irrigation so long as your graywater system meets local regulations.

Audit your Irrigation Methods

The last piece of advice is to audit your own irrigation methods. This means critically analyzing how and when you water your landscape to determine the most significant areas that can be improved upon in terms of water efficiency. Do you water your landscape manually with a hose? Consider using a hose nozzle with a built-in shut-off trigger to prevent wasting water when moving between plants. Do you water your landscape with a drip system? Periodically check for leaks, especially near places of erosion or overgrowth. Taking a closer look at your average watering methods will undoubtably reveal some areas where water efficiency can be improved! According to the American Water Works Association, 85% of all landscape problems are caused by overwatering. Next time your home garden isn't giving you the results you were expecting, it might be advantageous to take some time out of your day to analyze how you normally water. You might find that when you irrigate to meet your landscapes needs, not only will your plants remain healthy and thrive throughout the year, but you will save on utility costs and reduce your carbon footprint all at the same time!



Keeping Food Safe in the Heat Gina Berry, MS, RD, ServSafe Certified Instructor



While flies can be annoying at your picnic, there are many tiny bugs that can cause bigger problems! The CDC estimates that 48 million people get sick, 128,000 are hospitalized, and 3,000 die from food borne illness each year in the U.S. Here are some tips to prevent harmful bacteria and viruses from causing food borne illnesses at your next summer gathering. Some of the most common causes of food poisoning are potato salad (or anything with mayonnaise), cooked rice, eggs, deli meats, cut fruit, and undercooked poultry. When food is in the temperature danger zone (41-135°F), bacteria can double in number every minute and bacteria multiply even faster between 75-125°F which happens to be similar to our summer temperatures here in Cloverdale. Unfortunately, you cannot see, smell, or taste if a food has harmful bacteria growing in it.

A few of the best ways to keep food safe are:

- Wash your hands with soap and water before, during, and after food preparation and handling.
- Keep your food colder than 41°F or hotter than 135°F ensure your cooler has plenty of ice and do not leave foods out of the cooler or off the grill for more than **1 hour** on a hot day.
- Avoid cross contamination make sure raw meats and poultry are kept separate or securely wrapped, use different utensils for raw and cooked foods, and keep ready-to-eat foods separate.

Grandma's Portuguese Beans

There was always of pot of beans on the stove that I can remember as a kid at my grandma's house. I enjoy the aroma that it brings to the house, and if I close my eyes, I can still see my grandmother cooking them over the stove.

Ingredients

- 2 lbs. dry pinto beans, rinsed and drained
- 2 links of Silva Brand linquica cut into quarter size pieces
- 1 medium sized yellow onion coarsely chopped
- 4 to 5 garlic cloves chopped
- 3 cups of smoked ham hock broth, or as needed
- 1 24oz cans of whole tomatoes with juice
- 1-12 oz cans of tomatoes sauce
- 2 TBS of tomato paste
- 1 cup of red wine (zinfandel or similar)
- 1/2 cup of brown sugar
- 2 tsp of cumin

Soak the beans in a large pot over night, at least 12 hours. Rinse the beans, put back in the pot, add these ingredients: Tomatoes, tomato paste, tomato sauce, smoked ham hock broth*, wine, to bring the level in the pot just above the beans by a few inches or less.

Sauté the linguica on low in a non-reactive pan (Teflon) to get the oil out, remove the linguica and set aside. Add the onions to the oil, sauté on medium heat until clear in color, then add the garlic for an additional 3 minutes. Add the mixture to the beans and stir.

When beans are at a full boil, reduce heat to LOW so they are only simmering. Cover pot leaving the lid off enough to let the steam out. Check the beans to make sure that they are not burning on the bottom by stirring every half hour. Cook beans for 3 to 4 hours, trying them after 3 hours for tenderness. Add more ham hock broth or water to keep liquid level above the beans as needed. Add linguica, pulled ham hock meat, brown sugar, and cumin to taste.

*Smoked Ham Hock Broth

2 or 3 Smoked Ham Hocks 3 Bay leaves

Place ham hocks & bay leaves in a large pot of water bring to a boil, reduce heat, simmer for about an hour lightly covered or until the meat is ready to fall off the bone. Strain broth into a large container, reserving the ham hocks into a separate bowl to cool. Discard the bay leaves and let the juice cool, skim off the oil from the surface.
