Bring the family and "Experience Cloverdale."

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

Unsocial Cat - The unsocial cat is fearful and avoids interaction with people and may have been born

feral and has no bond with people. He may see humans as something to fear and to be avoided. The unsocial cat will likely hide most of the time, away from human interaction. They do not like change so it's very stressful for them to move, go to the vet, or accept a new animal or human roommate. Because they hide, you may not notice if they are not eating or acting ill. Keep a close eye on this kind of kitty to make sure they are in good health.

Shy Cat - The shy cat will also hide but, unlike the unsocial cat, does warm up to people he knows and can be very sweet. This kind of cat will avoid people he doesn't know, and will usually disappear under the bed if a stranger comes to visit. The shy cat will seek out attention from family members. They may hide from pet sitters until they get to know them so it is important to figure out where they are and check on them. They do not like change, but can adjust in time.

Outgoing cat -The outgoing cat is curious and not fearful, and will investigate new things. They generally like being around people and other pets. They won't run and hide unless there is a frightening stimulus like sudden movement or a loud noise. If your outgoing cat lives indoors, you will need to be careful when entering and exiting. Since they are so curious, they are likely to wait by the door and dart out if something gets their attention. If this kind of cat is avoiding people or hiding, this is a good clue that they are ill.

Knowing your cats' personalities will help you understand them and keep them safe and healthy.



Welcome back to early mornings, packing lunches, and afterschool snacks for hungry, growing kids! When planning a lunch, whether it is at home or in a lunchbox, try to include all 5 food groups: Protein, Fruit, Vegetables, Grains, and Dairy/Calcium-rich foods. For snacks, aim to get 3 food groups. This will help you stay organized and ensure a healthy and balanced meal. Many options fall into the protein category like deli meats, hard boiled eggs, nuts, seeds, and beans. Some schools restrict nuts due to the common problem of nut allergies, so that daily PB&J many of us used to eat may not be an option. You can make the same delicious sandwich with sunflower seed butter! When thinking about grains, look for whole grain options such as whole wheat bread, brown rice cakes, whole grain crackers, or even popcorn. Next, aim for half of the lunch to be fruits and Sometimes kids don't love their veggies, but repeated exposure is helpful in the long run. You can also include a tasty dip such as ranch, hummus, guacamole, or tzatziki sauce to make the vegetables more appetizing. For added protein, try blending some edamame (soy beans) into your guacamole for what I like to call "Guacamame"! Don't forget to include an ice pack to keep cold foods safe! Hopefully these tips will help you win the "What to Pack for Lunch" game!

Improvements to Veteran's Memorial Building

The Day Cloverdale "went dial" Mary Jo Winter

Coverdale's first telephone exchange, located where Bolt Fabric is now, was built in 1902. As phone usage grew, a new exchange was built at 112 W. First St. where Dr. Hoyer's office is located. On Sept. 3, 1953, however, the exchange was closed forever when Cloverdale "went dial."

In August of 1952, it was announced that the fast, modern dial system scheduled to be installed the following year would cost \$140,000 and new dial telephone numbers would include the prefix "Twinbrook 4."

It was also noted that "beginning with the change to dial service, operators from as far away as the East Coast will be able to dial direct and ring telephones here almost as quickly as local calls."

To herald the advent of this extraordinary development, the Veterans of Foreign Wars fashioned a huge dial phone out of fruit for their 1953 Citrus Fair exhibit.


An all-upper-case headline in the Sept. 3, edition of the Reveille proclaimed, "CITY PHONES GO 'DIAL' TONIGHT."

The article went on to explain that the "hum" residents would hear on their dial telephone after 10 p.m. that night was the phone's way of saying "number please," and be the signal to start using the new system.

For any calls in progress when the bewitching hour arrived, operators came on the line and said, "This is the operator. We are about to convert Cloverdale to dial operation. Will you please hang up and place your call after 10 p.m. using your new dial telephone."

It was noted that an abnormally high number of "curiosity" calls was expected the first couple of days, and telephone users were asked to refrain from placing calls "just to see how it works."

A dial phone today might be considered old fashioned, but in 1953, it was considered quite trendy.





Geoff and the (Almost) Eternal Olive Tree Michele Armanino

If you ask Geoff Peters what he knew about farming before he launched his Showa Farm olive oil business in 2016, he'll laugh and say, "Nothing. I've always lived in cities" However, a series of serendipitous events led Peters to a fortuitous interest in that tiny fruit, the olive.

In 2006, after teaching a three-week class on fundraising at the University of Bologna, Geoff, an attorney, and his wife, Cecile, extended their trip to the rural, mountainous area of Alta Luca where they were surrounded by orchards of Tuscan olive trees. When the couple's son and daughter-in-law announced a baby was on the way, the Peters relocated from Washington D.C. to Cloverdale, fondly reminiscent of Tuscany, to be closer to their family.

After building a road, constructing a house and drilling a well on their thirty-acre, biodynamic, solar paneled farm, Peters, who educated himself on farming by reading and attending classes at UC Davis Olive Center (where he later became a board member), began the low-density planting of arbequina olive trees. "We don't use any chemicals." Geoff says. "Everything is organic. We have feral cats and owl houses that help keep down the rodent population, and two hundred oak trees provide shade for the animals."

An early October harvest, Peters explains, produces smaller, greener olives which are rich in polyphenols (antioxidants proven to promote better health and taste). Peters focuses his farm's fruit production on quality, not quantity. The first yield, Nuovo Olio, a raw, organic, unfiltered extra virgin olive oil with a strong flavor is produced in limited quantities and has a shelf life of three months. A larger volume of filtered extra virgin olive oil follows which produces a less pungent taste. Showa Farm's olive oil has been a three-time winner in the New York International Olive Oil Competition.

"Any thoughts on the vagaries of farming," I ask? "Farming is fifty percent hard work, twenty five percent knowledge and twenty five percent luck!" Geoff replies knowledgeably. He comments that olive trees live to be about eight hundred years old. Peters laughs heartily, "I'm in this for the long run."



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

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
Cloverdale FFA Angelica Fernandes

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AAUW Tech Trek: Girls Go For Science and Tech

Eight local 8th-grade girls joined dozens of others from



2022 AAUW Healdsburg Tech Trekkers at SSU: Brisa C., Bryanna C., Samantha G., Valentina H., Elizabeth S.

across California to stay on Sonoma State University campus for the week of June 19-25 and participate in the American Assoc. of University Women's (AAUW) week-long Tech Trek camp. AAUW's Healdsburg branch members donors provided scholarships for the girls in order to support their interest and education in learning and applying core STEM (science, Malia M., Valeira R., Avani S., and technology, engineering and mechanics) concepts.

Female STEM professionals engaged the girls by sharing about their careers and leading engrossing activities such as: building robots, making a flashlight by soldering a wires on a circuit board; separating water into hydrogen and oxygen; touring Sonoma Water Russian River water supply system; using block coding to solve a maze or roll a digital die; even launching rockets.





Ah yes, the ridiculously narrow and basically useless closet space that shows up in many homes built back in the 90's. Tall ceilings? Check! Open concept? Check! Tiniest weird hall closet designed to be basically useless and end up as a dump zone for random stuff? Oh yes, check. I was originally excited to have a linen closet until I figured out it was a pain to try to make our linens fit in the small spaces allotted.

Because of the recession in 2008, Jeanne lost her business, her jobs, her assets and ultimately, her husband. She lost medical insurance and due to a critical medical problem, Jeanne also lost her sight. She is now legally blind

and functions only due to adaptations and training at the Earle Baum Center for the Blind. She has a seeing eye guide dog, Geo.

This summer, on August 6, 2022, Jeanne received a letter from Social Security that they would no longer provide funds for her retirement. The reason was that she worked at a minimal job for the last few years. Now Jeanne has no income either.

Here's how our community can help:

A home-based job – Jeanne has great customer service experience, and utilizes a computer devised for her by the Earle Baum Center for the Blind.

She needs stable housing. Currently she is renting a bedroom in a friend's home.

She needs money to pay for diabetic medication, other medications, and help with non-food essentials of daily living.

A little history: Plans for a major transformation and face-lift in the business district were completed in 2002 with construction scheduled for spring of 2003. As project publicist for the project, Joyce's job was to propose projects & activities to the downtown area during construction.


Her first idea was a project to combine the k-rails to divide the part of the boulevard under construction from the traffic lanes with orange safety fencing. Ron Siegemund, artist, and Albert Walker, construction designer, were enlisted to figure out how to combine these construction materials into a work of art. They tried out their ideas with safety fencing and two abandoned k-rails near Ray's. The idea was to have artistic undulating waves of orange safety fencing on top of the k-rails.

When the downtown transformation project was completed, another idea emerged for a second artistic project: a juried sculpture exhibit that changed the Plaza into a sculpture garden. This second project was very successful and the exhibit turned into the Cloverdale Annual Sculpture Exhibit, later expanding into the downtown business community and becoming the Cloverdale Sculpture Trail. Next year marks the 20th anniversary of the trail. Over the years, it has experienced changes and hurdles, but continues on with the help from a handful of volunteers, sponsors and artists who are dedicated to keeping public art alive in downtown Cloverdale.

Cloverdale City Parks Update

Several park projects have recently been accomplished during this work week. The majority of the park staff's time was allocated to maintenance along the downtown corridor from St. Peters Church to the Cloverdale Library. There are several landscape areas throughout our city that are maintained



by The Cloverdale Green Thumb Garden Club, but due to their decline in members, Parks staff will assist with maintenance from time to time. Parks Staff performed much needed weed abatement in a large island in front of the St. Peters Church. This effort

continued to the Thymes Square Property where several hours were spent hedging the large shrubs, and then weed abatement, in the form of string weed eating. The project continued throughout our downtown, targeting raised stone planters and large planted areas near local business.

One of the benefits of late summer pruning is removing dead foliage and any deseeded growth that can potentially cause stress to the shrubs. It also encourages hearty vigorous, growth. Pest control can also be addressed during this time of the year by removing small branches that have mites or aphids.

Several yards of wood chips (bark) were broadcasted near Citrus Fair Drive by the Welcome to Cloverdale Sign as well as hedging of all shrubs on the east side of our town entrance.

The Northern Sonoma County Fire Fuels crew are making tremendous progress on the vegetation fire suppression project along the Cloverdale River Park Trail. The crew has completed 1.5 miles vegetation management so far and are scheduled to mobilize their efforts south of the First Street Crocker Bridge next week. Special Thanks to Mayor Lands who speared headed this effort.



Vietnamese Clay Pot Chicken

I love clay pot cooking. The meats come out tender & flavorful. If you don't have a clay pot any casserole or cast iron pot will do.

Ingredients

- 2 pounds chicken thighs or legs, skin-on
- 1/4 cup soy sauce
- 1 ½ cups water
- 2 TBS white vinegar
- 1 TBS fish sauce
- 1 tsp lemon juice
- 2 TBS peanut or vegetable oil
- ½ cup dark brown sugar
- 1 medium onion, diced
- 2 bird's eye chilis or other small red peppers, minced
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 TBS fresh ginger, peeled and minced
- Cilantro springs for garnish (optional)
- 1. Blot the chicken with paper towels to remove excess moisture.
- 2. Combine the soy sauce, water, white vinegar, fish sauce, and lemon juice in a bowl and set aside.
- 3. Heat the oil in a wok or large skillet over medium-high heat. Working in batches, carefully place the chicken thighs in the wok skin-side down and sear for about 5 minutes, until the skin is golden brown. Transfer to a plate and set aside.
- 4. In a clay pot, Dutch oven, or deep skillet over medium heat, melt the brown sugar while stirring frequently to avoid scorching. When the sugar fully liquifies, immediately pour in the soy sauce mixture. Add the chicken, onions, chilis, garlic, and ginger. Bring the liquid to a boil, then reduce to a simmer and cook uncovered for 30 to 35 minutes, until the chicken is very tender and the sauce has reduced by at least half.
- 5. Use tongs to transfer the chicken to a serving dish. Pour the sauce over the chicken, garnish with cilantro springs, and serve hot with rice on the side.

- Copies of important documents (birth certificates, passports, etc.)

2 READY • SET • GO! REMEMBER THE SIX P's

3 & 4 PRE-EVACUATION

PRE-EVACUATION PREPARATION STEPS

When an evacuation is anticipated, follow these checklists (if time allows) to give your home the best chance of surviving a wildfire:

OUTSIDE THE HOUSE

- 1 Gather up flammable items from the exterior of the house and bring them inside (patio furniture, children's toys, door mats, trash cans, etc.) or place them in your pool.
- Turn off propane tanks.
- Move propose BBQ appliances away from structures.
- 4 Connect garden hoses to outside water valves or spigots for use by firefighters. Fill water buckets and place them around the house.

- Don't leave sprinklers on or water running; they can affect critical water pressure.
- 6 Leave exterior lights on so your home is visible to
- firefighters in the smoke or darkness of night.

 7 Put your Emergency Supply Kit in your vehicle.
- 8 Back your car into the driveway with vehicle loaded and all doors and windows closed. Carry your car keys with you.
- Have a ladder available and place it at the corner of the house for firefighters to quickly access your roof.
- 10 Seal attic and ground vents with pre-cut plywood or commercial seals.
- 11 Monitor your property and the fire situation. Don't wait for an evacuation order if you feel threatened and need to
- 12 Check on neighbors and make sure they are preparing to leave.

INSIDE THE HOUSE

- 13 Shut all windows and doors, leaving them unlocked.
- 14 Remove flammable window shades and curtains. Close
- 15 Move flammable furniture to the center of the room, away from windows and doors.
- 16 Shut off gas at the meter. Turn off pilot lights.
- 17 Leave your lights on so firefighters can see your house under smoky conditions.
- 18 Shut off the air conditioning.
- 19 Locate your pets and keep them nearby.
- 20 Prepare farm animals for transport and think about moving them to a safe location early. Copy courtesy of CAL FIRE.



How Does The Use of Pesticides Affect Our Water Quality?

Runoff from the street is collected in storm drains, flowing through storm drain pipes, directly to our creeks and rivers, and to the Pacific Ocean. Commonly used pesticides have been detected in creeks and rivers throughout California, threatening birds, fish, and all aquatic wildlife. The contaminated water from these waterbodies can make its way to our drinking water. Exposure to pesticides can have both short-term and long-term health impacts.

Water flowing in the gutters and streets will flow directly into local creeks and rivers without being treated. Unlike our sanitary sewer system that collects water from indoor pipes and treats it at wastewater treatment plants before being released to our local waterways, storm drain runoff from streets and parking lots is collected by the storm drain system and remains untreated. Rather than getting to the root cause of your pest problem, applying pesticides in and around your home will kill and deter all bugs, including those beneficial to your garden, like the ladybugs that feed on harmful insects or the bees that pollinate your plants. Getting rid of these beneficial insects will eliminate the natural solution to the pest problem and lead to a further need for pesticides. One way to keep pests out of your home is by using physical barriers – by making sure windows and doors are properly sealed.

If the use of pesticides can't be avoided, try to use ones that are non-toxic or less-toxic to the environment, and use them sparingly. To reduce the likelihood of runoff into the storm drain system, do not apply pesticides when rain is forecasted.
