



If you're wondering where you might have had the pleasure of meeting local Cloverdalian Laurie Kneeland before, the answer is - just about everywhere! She is a regular and welcome sight at the many volunteer gatherings here in town. Ms. Kneeland is a conduit - continually facilitating movement and positive change in our community.

Laurie relocated to San Francisco years ago from windy Seattle, Washington where she says her bouffant hairdo would be a windblown mess by the time she got to work. "Little did I know, she laughs, that the fog in chilly San Francisco would be just as unkind to my hair!" Eventually moving to Cloverdale, she opened Mail Center, Etc., on Cloverdale Blvd in 2006. You could always count on chatting with Laurie about local news or just plain life when mailing your letter or package. Two years into retirement, however, has not stopped her from being the dynamo that she is.

Kneeland is an integral member and past President of the Kiwanis Club, where through the Christmas Wish Program, over two hundred deserving children are provided with Christmas gifts each year. "You should see the joy on the faces of those parents when they come to pick up the gifts a few days before Christmas." Laurie says. "They are so grateful and happy." Friday Nite Live, Cloverdale's summer music, food and craft event, exists in part because of the collaboration of the Farmers' Market, where Laurie was a former board member, and the Cloverdale Arts Alliance. She's been a Citrus Fair board member for eight years, currently in charge of wine tasting events, and treasurer for two years. "The board works tirelessly year-round," Kneeland adds. She chuckles when she recalls some of the less glamorous volunteer jobs she's had, like picking stale popcorn out of theater chairs donated to the CPAC.

Kneeland received the Spirit of Sonoma Award in 2019 in recognition of personal contributions and leadership qualities that inspire others. She's grateful to the people of Cloverdale who stand behind the non-profit organizations that make our City's programs a success. "If the community didn't support these non-profits" she says, "there wouldn't be anything for the children in our town."

Robert Bauer, Theater Manager



How to Visit State and National Parks for Free

Library card holders can check out a California State Library Parks Pass for a certain number of days, allowing free vehicle day-use entry – https://www.parks.ca.gov

The National Park System also offers a number of free entrance days. Free entry days each year include Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday as a day of service, as well as the first day of National Park Week in April, the Great American Outdoors Act anniversary in August, and National Public Lands Day in September, and Veterans Day.

A cost-free military pass is available for current U.S. military members and their dependents. Gold Star Families and U.S. military veterans are also eligible for a lifetime pass.

Another free-entry program allows all fourth graders and their families fee-free access for a year through the Every Kid Outdoors program. Students will need to first complete an adventure diary, and then will be rewarded with a pass, which must be printed and shown at entry points (digital copies aren't allowed at this time). With the aim of exposing elementary school students to the nation's lands and history, the pass is available to fourth graders' families starting in September of the school year and running through August of the summer after. Each pass allows the student, plus up to three adults in the same private (non-commercial) vehicle. The pass is also available to home-schooled and free-choice learners who are 10 years old.

American citizens and permanent residents with permanent disabilities can also apply for a free lifetime pass called an Access Pass, which can be obtained online or via mail for a \$10 processing fee. Additionally, those who volunteer at least 250 hours with Interagency Pass Program-participating federal agencies, can get a free annual Volunteer Pass through their volunteer coordinator.

He Stole Her Jewelry And Headed For Greener Pastures Mary Jo Winter

An 1882 article in the Cloverdale Reveille could have been ripped from the pages of The Globe or the National Enquirer.

It seems an Italian by the name of Peter Stracca came to Cloverdale from San Francisco to take charge of the distillery at the Cloverdale Winery. The story began with the reporter describing him as a handsome man who spent money lavishly and was well known to almost everybody in town.

Before coming to Cloverdale, he met an American woman named Estella Launois in San Francisco, gained her love and affection, and soon married her in Cloverdale.

The following month, he gave up his position at the winery and went into partnership with another man, rented the Grand Hotel near the depot, and started in the hotel and saloon business. He got about \$1,200 of his wife's money and, within a week, showed her a telegram from a prominent businessman in the city offering him \$130 per month to run his business.

He left on the next train, telling her to join him as soon as she could. When she arrived, he met her at the ferry and took her to a hotel where they spent the night. He got up at 4 a.m. the following morning, told his wife to give him the check for his baggage and he would have it sent right away.

Instead, he secured her baggage, rifled through it, and took everything of value, including jewelry and clothing, before skipping town. His wife found out later that the telegram he showed her in Cloverdale was a forgery.

The reporter ended by noting, "Stracca is about 26 years old, about 5 ft. 10 in. high, dark complexion, wears a moustache, is quite handsome, and is evidently an unmitigated scoundrel and fraud."

Free Pipe-Organ Concert By Cloverdale Resident



St. Paul's Episcopal Church of Healdsburg continues its series of free "Second Sunday" pipeorgan concerts on Nov. 13, when guest organist Michael Simpson plays organ favorites including César Franck's monumental "Choral in A minor." Selections for the Nov. 13 concert include works by

Dietrich Bextehude, J.S. Bach, Felix Mendelssohn and Georg Böhm as well as Franck. The performance begins at 5 p.m. A native of Richmond, Va., Simpson spends part of every year in Cloverdale. He graduated summa cum laude from the University of Richmond with a bachelor's degree in organ performance. He was assistant director and accompanist for the Richmond Symphony Chorus, organist for the symphony, and director of the Richmond Renaissance Singers. His career in music has spanned 50 years. The church is located at 209 Matheson St. and admission is free. Donations to the church's outreach ministries will be accepted. In 2019, the City of Cloverdale established the Homelessness Community Advisory Group (CAG) to develop a plan to address homelessness within the City of Cloverdale. The Homelessness CAG held a series of monthly meetings wherein advisory group members shared ideas and views based on their experience working with and interacting with the homeless to help form the core content of a Homelessness Strategic Plan for addressing homelessness in Cloverdale. After a number of meetings and robust discussion, the City Council adopted a Homelessness Strategic Plan on August 2022. The Strategic Plan provides a Vision for Success, Guiding Principles, and seven primary Goals that the Plan intends to achieve. Each goal is connected to a series of over thirty-six Supporting Actions, with detailed recommendations for successful implementation.

As part of the Strategic planning process, a community survey was conducted to identify the top 10 priorities of the Community related to homelessness. As part of the goal making process, fire prevention and mitigating impacts on private property were identified as the Community's top goals

The City of Cloverdale has been working with Sonoma County and local stakeholders to address local homeless populations. The focus has been on encampments along Cloverdale River Park and surrounding area near the Russian River corridor. The encampments along the River have heightened concerns about fire threats and have required extensive public safety response by the Cloverdale Police Department, Cloverdale Fire District as well as the Sherriff's Office. A significant challenge in addressing homeless encampments near the River is the legal protections afforded to individuals who are unsheltered because the city does not have the public or private housing or shelter space to restrict camping on public property and the public right of way. In a 2018 decision by the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit in response to a 2009 lawsuit by six homeless plaintiffs against the city of Boise, Idaho regarding the city's anti-camping ordinance. The case referred to as the Martin v. Boise ruling held that cities cannot enforce anti-camping ordinances if they do not have enough homeless shelter beds available for their homeless population. It did not necessarily mean a city cannot enforce any restrictions on camping on public property.

In response to the Martin V. Boise Case, Sonoma County and the City of Cloverdale have begun the process of updating our respective "Camping Ordinances" that addresses the restrictions imposed by the Ninth Circuit while providing adequate protections for our public spaces.

On October 12th, an updated camping ordinance was introduced to the Cloverdale City Council. The Ordinance as currently proposed will add Chapter 9.35 "Protection of Critical Infrastructure and Wildfire Risk Areas" to the City's Municipal Code to provide for the protection of critical infrastructure and wildfire risk areas by prohibiting camping in certain sensitive areas, including:

- At or near "Critical Infrastructure";
- In a wildfire risk area (as specifically defined in the Ordinance);
- Within 150 feet of the high water of the Russian River;
- Within five hundred (500) feet of a well site; and
- Within 10 feet of a building entrance/exit, or a driveway or loading dock.

The camping ordinance includes details of community and environmental impacts caused by the homeless encampments, such as unsanitary, unhealthy, disorderly, detrimental, and dangerous conditions, homeless-related structure and vegetation fires, and threats to the city's water treatment facility and other critical infrastructure. The proposed ordinance would also prohibit individuals from obstructing a clear path of travel on any sidewalk, street or other right-of-way, or occupying an area greater than 10 feet by 10 feet. In addition, the ordinance prohibits the dumping of graywater.

The purpose of Chapter 9.35 is to mitigate the threat of fire or other potential causes of destruction and damage to and interference with critical infrastructure, in order to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the public, by authorizing the removal of persons and their personal property in, on or near critical infrastructure and wildfire risk areas, and as necessary to keep public rights of way clean and available for public use in a manner that preserves the dignity and safety of all residents. Violations of Chapter 9.35 can be punished criminally or with administrative fines, and the City is authorized to abate violations. The added provisions listed above are expected to provide relief for those areas in the City where homeless populations and homeless encampments have negatively impacted livability through criminal behavior, public health issues, and safety concerns due to wildland fires.


Under the newly revised ordinance, the city may abate unlawful encampments with 48 hours' notice under the proposed amendments, thereby minimizing risks to public health and safety and adverse impacts to protected habitats and other open spaces. These changes will allow the City to regulate its property more effectively and within the confines of the law, as announced in the Boise v Martin decision consistent with the top goals of the adopted Homelessness Strategic Plan. On a plus note - at least I have remembered before writing, which will hopefully make this project for any who choose to give it a go; a higher success rate. Disclaimer stated, onto the project!

My love of plants and color is boundless and I am always on the hunt for fun ways to play and explore. Pounding flowers sounds too aggressive, but alas it describes the cathartic joy that comes from taking greens and flowers and literally hammering them into fabric or watercolor paper for a glorious effect. If using watercolor paper then there is no prep needed. If you are going to go for the 100% cotton tea towel as I have, then some prep is needed to make colorfast and safe to launder with a mordant (Mine I shall just remember to use decoratively).


For this project using a salt mordant will entail taking your clean cotton fabric and submerging in a salt to water ratio




of 1:16 and simmer for about an hour, allowing the fabric to open up to accept the pigment for longevity. If you plan on laundering, doing a google search to really understand would be beneficial. But with limited space I am simply giving you the basics!

Needed: fabric or watercolor paper, a hammer & cutting of leaves

and flowers. Some parchment paper laid over the leaves before hammering keeps the pigment more contained. It is that simple, and boys can have fun too! Who doesn't love hammering something to destress? Lay out, cover, hammer, peel off leaves & dry! The possibilities are literally endless and it is so much fun!






Obsidian Son To Play In Cloverdale November 17

Spotlight on Vitamin B2: Riboflavin Gina Berry, MS, RD

Have you ever wanted to impress your friends with glowing lemonade? Riboflavin, one of the B vitamins, is essential for many different processes in the body such as antioxidant functions and as a cofactor in metabolism and energy production. And it also glows under black light! Most people in the US consume adequate amounts of Riboflavin, but it is one of the most common deficiencies in low- and middleincome countries. Riboflavin is heat-stable, meaning it is not damaged by cooking, but it is easily destroyed by exposure to light. For example, half of the Riboflavin in milk in a clear bottle may be destroyed after 2 hours when exposed to sunlight! The good news is that we absorb riboflavin very easily from foods such as enriched bread and cereal products, milk, cheese, eggs, almonds, salmon, halibut, and chicken. People who are lactose intolerant or those who avoid dairy products may not consume enough Riboflavin. Look for dairy alternatives like plant-based milk that have Riboflavin added. Riboflavin is water-soluble which means it is not stored in your body and any excess will be excreted in your urine. You only need to add a tiny bit (scant 1/8 teaspoon) of Riboflavin powder to a pitcher of lemonade to make it glow!

The Great Redwood Trail Agency (GRTA)




The GRTA was established in 2021. The GRTA's service area is the former North Coast Railroad Authority (NCRA) rail corridor in Mendocino, Trinity, Humboldt Counties. The rail corridor in Sonoma and Marin Counties was transferred to Sonoma – Marin Area Rail Transit (SMART). The Great Redwood Trail is a 320mile, world-class, multi-use rail-to-trailproject connecting California's San Francisco and Humboldt Bays. The legacy trail will travel through some of the wildest and most scenic landscapes in the

United States, traversing old growth redwood forests, running alongside oak woodlands and vineyards, and winding through the magnificent Eel River Canyon.





Turkey Veggie Pot Pie

Thanksgiving for me is all about family & friends and enjoying a meal. One of my favorite parts is the leftover turkey & veggies. I grew up having turkey veggie pot pies. Simple to make & a great way to use up the leftovers.

Ingredients

1 egg beaten

¹/₃ cup butter

1 onion diced

¹/₃ cup flour

½ teaspoon poultry seasoning

1/4 teaspoon thyme

1 cup chicken broth

²/₃ cup milk or cream

1 potato diced and cooked

1 ½ cups frozen vegetables, thawed

2 cups leftover turkey

1 double pie crust

Instructions

- Preheat oven to 400°F. Whisk egg with 1 tablespoon water. Set aside.
- Cook onion in butter over medium low heat until tender, about 5 minutes. Add flour, poultry seasoning, thyme, salt & pepper. Cook 2 minutes more.
- Whisk in chicken broth and milk a little bit at a time stirring after each addition. It will seem thick at first but will smooth out. Bring to a boil over medium heat, simmer 1 minute and remove from heat. Stir in turkey and vegetables.
- Line a 9" pie plate with one of the crusts. Fill with turkey filling. Brush edges of crust with egg wash and top with second crust. Pinch edges to seal and cut a few slits to vent pie. Brush with egg wash.
- Bake 35-40 minutes or until lightly browned and filling is bubbly.
- Cool for 10-15 minutes before cutting.



Wi-Fi for Wanderers Will Carter
