Libraries Open Sundays Erika Thibault

All 12 regional libraries in Sonoma County are open seven days a week, effective November 6, 2022. The Sonoma County Library system has been expanding service steadily since voters approved Measure Y in 2016, a modest sales tax that boosted library funding.

Expanded hours, a growing collection of resources for all ages, and the modernization of aging library buildings have all been made possible by the sales tax.

Being open seven days a week at the regional libraries makes it easier for busy families to use their free public library. Opening Sundays is also a direct outgrowth of the library's Reimagining Plan, an ambitious effort we undertook during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic. We surveyed thousands of county residents, and held almost 100 one-on-one interviews with community leaders.

The results of the Reimagining Plan highlight the challenges our county faces, and we distilled the data to three key pillars: county residents want opportunities to learn, contribute, interact, and participate; you want to support racial equity, social justice, and inclusion; and you want to foster community resiliency.

We are building our capacity to serve you, internally and externally. Library branches are being modernized and made more accessible, which includes Sunday hours. We are also getting out of our buildings more often; staff are visiting schools, parks, and community centers. Our mobile library van, the BiblioBus visits community events every week.

We are also working with the Sonoma County Public Library Foundation and other community partners to launch a capital campaign to augment our tax funds to support a 21st century library system. Online access is also available 24/7 at sonomalibrary.org.


Facts From The Past Kay Wells

The Russian River Watershed

Are you aware of these Russian River statistics?

- Provides water to more than 600,000 residents.
 Communities in the Russian River Watershed (RRW) depend on a combination of Russian River water and groundwater to meet their water-supply demands.
- Supports recreation to almost 1 million visitors a year and provides habitat for wildlife. The river is critical to the region's agricultural sector.
- Drains a 1,485 square mile watershed in Mendocino and Sonoma counties, California. The two major dams in the watershed, create Lake Mendocino and Lake Sonoma. Major tributaries to the Russian River include Forsythe Creek, Big Sulphur Creek, Dry Creek, Austin Creek, and Laguna de Santa Rosa. The Laguna de Santa Rosa is the largest subwatershed draining to the Russian River and the largest urban center in the North Coast Region.
- There are approximately 238 streams and creeks in the watershed.



• There are over 63 different species of fish in the watershed.

"A watershed is a marvelous thing to consider: This process of rain falling, streams flowing and oceans evaporating causes every molecule of water on Earth to make the complete trip once every two million years. The surface is carved into watersheds – kind of a familial branching, a chart of relationship, and a definition of place. The watershed gives us a home and a place to go upstream, downstream and across in." Gary Snyder, 1993

Native American Heritage Month Proclamation



On November 9, 2022 Cloverdale City Mayor Todd Lands invited Trina Vega, descendant of The Hopland Band of Pomo Indians and long-term Cloverdale resident, to accept the Native American Heritage Month proclamation. Cloverdale Rancheria Tribal Member Patty Santana Bird and Dry Creek Rancheria Tribal Member Max Cordova, descendants of The Hopland Band of Pomo Indians Christy Carrillo and Jazmine Garcia as well as Nathaniel Yellowbird Hernandez of Lytton Rancheria were also invited to be a part of the proclamation.

These fellow Native Americans celebrated this honorable recognition on behalf of Cloverdale Rancheria, Dry Creek Rancheria, Hopland Band of Pomo Indians and Lytton Rancheria.

The Mayor spoke highly of Dry Creek Rancheria and said he "loves having the tribe be a part of our community and looks forward to seeing the tribal elder housing get started". The Mayor also stated he looks forward to building relationships within the tribe.

Max Cordova thanked the Mayor and City Council on behalf of Dry Creek Rancheria for the recognition and felt honored to be a part of Cloverdale's amazing community.

Trina Vega spoke of her family ties to Cloverdale and expressed her gratitude for being nominated to accept this proclamation along with her daughter Christy, Granddaughter Jazmine and Great Grandson Nathaniel.

Patty Santana Bird of Cloverdale Rancheria said she was honored to be there to represent the Native American community and is happy that the City has recognized Native American Heritage month.

2023 Cloverdale Citrus Fair What a Wonderful World

The Cloverdale Citrus Fair's Board of Directors has announced the theme for the 2023 Fair: "What a Wonderful World." This theme is an important reminder that life is a wonderful gift and there are more wonders in our world than any of us will get to see.

Returning this year in its second year is the Ambassador Program, open to all sexes, successor to the retired Citrus Queen competition. The Ambassador Program is shifting its focus to high school juniors. A new feature will be the inclusion of a workshop on budgeting for a professional wardrobe that will be held at the start of the program. After, the candidates will receive a \$250 wardrobe budget to create their professional look.

The Citrus Fair exhibit book has been overhauled and will show the return of some categories from the past to see if there is interest in including them in the fair in the future. One of the largest changes is allowing online entries for both livestock and exhibits. The Fair has invested in the latest technology allowing the entry system to speak to fairs around the country if any of our exhibitors show elsewhere.

The biggest change to this year's fair is brought about not by a new CEO Tom Keaney, or even a global pandemic, but instead by the good, old-fashioned Stork. Some joyous new arrivals to key members of the Cabaret's cast means that it will not be possible to produce a quality show for February. The 2023 Cabaret will now take place November 2023.

Abounding Resilience ~ Part 1 Michele Armanino

Ukrainians, Maria and Oleksandr Bezhenar tell a two-part, compelling story of their departure from war-struck Odessa to the pastoral hills of Cloverdale.

Q: Describe your life in Odessa before Putin's invasion?

A: We had a life rhythm going. In our five-year plan, the kids would go to high school and the older girls would study abroad. We had a plan to teach the Bible around the world as we are both close to having a degree in Practical Ministry.

Q: What were your plans once you suspected a Russian invasion? A: We decided as a family that in the case of an invasion, we would not stay. We must buy food so we can live for one month and prepare our basement. On February 24, Putin started bombing buildings in Odessa. At 5:15 a.m., I woke my kids up and told them: "Consider this a journey, not an escape." The house was shaking from bombings close to us and we fled.

Q: Recount how you crossed over into the Romanian border? A: We waited ten hours to learn if we could cross over and

A: We waited ten hours to learn if we could cross over and were permitted because we had three children.

Q: Did the Romanians help you?

A: The Romanians were quick to help us. There was a Romanian man who was working in Ireland but had a house in Romania. He told us we could stay there for three months, which we did.


Q: Did you ever lose hope?

A: We needed to save our kids and our family. We told our kids not to be afraid, that when you have strong beliefs, it helps you to get through your problems.

Q: What has happened to your neighborhood in Odessa today?

A: Half of the neighborhood, mostly young families with children, have fled to Poland, Germany and the USA. The rest of the city is now full of refugees. Our house there is no longer habitable.

Looking forward to January, we start a new eight-week Grief Support Group led by long-time hospice volunteer Betty Durso.


We will also be starting a Meditation Group facilitated by William Cordingley, who has been practicing meditation for decades.

Here's when you can get a refund for your nonrefundable ticket:

- If an airline cancels your flight, you are entitled to a refund for the unused transportation.
- If there's a significant schedule change by the airline, you may be entitled to a full refund
- The contract of carriage sometimes called the conditions of carriage — is the legal agreement between you and the airline so be sure to read yours carefully. It may contain a clause that gives you a full refund.
- If you feel the airline hasn't offered you the product it promised, you might be able to dispute the charge on your credit card
- Your rights to dispute a credit card charge are spelled out in the Fair Credit Billing Act.
- In the case of a death, there is a long-standing industry courtesy. There's no rule or regulation that says an airline must refund a dead passenger's fare. If, however, the promise is contained in the contract of carriage, then the airline must honor it.
- If your travel companion dies, some airlines will refund tickets as a goodwill gesture when your travel companion dies or if the person you were traveling to visit dies. If you need to request this type of refund, you will also need to provide written evidence of your companion's death.
- If your military orders change or you have jury duty
- If you have extenuating personal circumstances
- Airlines review these refund requests on a case-by-case basis. Share your dilemma with them succinctly and with a minimum of drama.

WaterSmart Meter Project - Advanced Metering Infrastructure to support our Drought Response

Cloverdale is committed to increasing the City's resiliency to cope with and respond to drought conditions. As part of the City's continued drought response efforts, the City of Cloverdale was awarded a \$3,005,000 grant from the State Department of Water Resources (DWR) in September as part of the Urban and Multi-benefit Drought Relief Grant Program to help fund water supply and distribution system projects across the city.

The DWR grant agreement included funding for the following three projects:

- 1. Advanced Metering Infrastructure Upgrades
- 2. Supervisorial Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) Expansion
- 3. Well Replacement and Rehabilitation

The City is beginning its first project funded under the Grant, which will replace and upgrade approximately 3,300 existing water meters throughout Cloverdale to an Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) system. This innovative "WaterSmart Meter" technology is part of the City's continuing efforts to conserve water, enhance customer service, replace aging infrastructure, and be more efficient.

Currently, City staff manually read customer's water meters once a month to record water use readings. The Smart Meters will provide safe and secure remote updates to the City's customer portal in near real time.

The WaterSmart Meter upgrades will allow the City to:

- detect leaks within its water system in near real time so that repairs can happen quickly
- provide customers increased billing transparency
- streamline staff time allotted to meter reading and inputting data for more efficient customer service
- replace aging infrastructure
- reduce fuel consumption and costs associated with driving
- conserve over 10 million gallons of water each year

In addition to conserving resources, the WaterSmart Meter upgrades will save water customers money by allowing residents to manage and monitor their water consumption through an online web portal. Customers will be able to:

- review near real-time water use
- recognize potential water leaks and respond to needed repairs quickly
- avoid unintentional high water consumption by adjusting irrigation activities and systems to maximize conservation
- Improve water efficiency

The existing meters will be replaced with cutting edge Neptune MACH 10 Ultrasonic Water Meters. These new meters will provide:

- high resolution measurements and sustained accuracy
- lead-free and corrosion resistant long-term use
- meet or exceed American Water Works Association standards
- Made in the USA

Water use data will be sent wirelessly from the WaterSmart Meter using an encrypted, low powered radio signal for less than one minute every day. Water customers will be able to login to the City's WaterSmart Portal to review water use and pay water bills.



The WaterSmart Meter Project is estimated to cost \$4.2 million with \$1.6 million funded by the grant award. In addition the City Council committed approximately \$1.0 Million in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Funds toward the project cost. The remainder of the project costs will be funded through an equipment Lease that will be paid for by rate revenue. The City's revenue recovery model calculates how the project costs will be recouped by the City over time. For example, replacement of existing meters with WaterSmart meters with a guaranteed accuracy rate of 98.5% can be expected to recover over 26 million gallons of water consumption, translating to an estimated annual revenue recovery of nearly \$200,000 for the City. In addition, the City's annual operation and management costs associated with meter readings and repairs are estimated to be nearly \$200,000. These costs are expected to be reduced by as much as 75% with the upgraded system.

Residents can expect to see work progress across the city over the next year. The City's contractor will replace and upgrade every customer's water meter, equipped with communication technology that will allow customers to monitor their water use. If a customer's meter box is damaged or if it is undersized for the new meter and equipment, the meter box will either be repaired or replaced. It is anticipated that customers might typically experience approximately 30 minutes of water shutoff during installation, unless there are further complications.

The City's contractor will be installing antennas on City poles and the County tower that will allow the customers' AMI meter to communicate with the City's Customer Service WaterSmart Portal. The City's Utility Billing Team will be receiving equipment and software upgrades that would allow it to detect leaks in the water system and securely share water use information with customers through a web portal.

When completed, customers will be able to see their own daily water usage and make informed decisions on how to manage their water. As the project reaches completion, the City will provide updates and share how customers can connect to the WaterSmart web portal to monitor their own water usage.

Funding for the Water Meter AMI project has been provided in full or in part from the Budget Act of 2021 and through an agreement with the State Department of Water Resources.

Staying Healthy This Season Gina Berry, MS, RD, CLT

It has been a rough cold and flu season thus far and many folks are wondering if there is something more they can do to stay healthy. According to the National Institute of Health, oral zinc (lozenges, tablets, syrup) may help to treat colds by reducing the length of a cold when taken right at the start. They also report Vitamin C may slightly improve cold symptoms when taken prior to being sick. Unfortunately, there is no golden ticket to cure a cold or flu. The Mayo Clinic recommends plenty of rest and staying hydrated with water, 100% fruit juice, broth, or warm lemon water with honey.

The Institute for Functional Medicine highlights some important ways to prevent illness. Heading into winter we naturally accumulate less vitamin D from the sun, so ask your doctor to check your vitamin D status as it is one of the most important nutrients for immune support. Regularly eating plenty of brightly colored fruits and vegetables can help boost immunity, as well as including probiotics - "good bacteria" to support gut health. Try making a frozen fruit smoothie with tofu and kefir. Or a delicious winter soup with vibrant butternut squash, garlic (another immune booster!), and plain yogurt. Stay well!

Cloverdale Neighborhood and City Parks

City Park is a 7.4-acre community park at 450 W. 2nd Street, shaded by 200+ year-old Live and Valley Oak trees. Park amenities include children's play structures, a baseball field, basketball and volleyball courts, horseshoe pits, Scout cabin, snack shack, and restrooms.

Furber Park is a 6-acre community park at 298 Elbridge Avenue. Park amenities include children's play structures and swings, a joint-use baseball/soccer field, snack shack with announcement booth, drinking fountains, and restrooms. A year-round creek runs through the park.

Tarman Park is a half-acre neighborhood park at 45 Clark Street. Park amenities includes the largest play structure in town as well as picnic tables and a drinking fountain.

The Cloverdale Cemetery is a 13.5-Acre historic landmark at E.1st Street before the Crocker Bridge. It was a burial site for early pioneers and residents primarily in the early 18-1900's. The cemetery walking paths highlight local history including a veteran's memorial.

Vintage Meadows Park is a 3.5-acre neighborhood park at N. Foothill Boulevard and Healdsburg Avenue. This park offers two children's play structures, basketball courts, drinking fountains and restrooms, a large multi-use field, as well as a footpath that runs through and around the park.

The Downtown Plaza Park is adjacent to City Hall and the Cloverdale Police Department. Plaza Park features a stage, seating areas, a drinking fountain, various shade arbors and a restroom is coming soon. Plaza Park is home to community events and activities.

River Park is 58.2-Acre Open Space east of the Cemetery parking lot and the south end of McCray Road. There are 3 miles of trail that runs along the west side of the Russian River. There is a ramp for water access to the river on the McCray trailhead to launch a boat or swim.

The Porterfield Creek Open Space is a 250-acre preserve at the western edge of Cloverdale. With diverse terrain, perennial water flow in the creeks, and serpentine geology, the Preserve supports a diversity of plants and wildlife and is a great location for hiking and biking.

Mary Catherine (Gambetta) Nichols



Christmas Brunch Casserole

The holidays can be hectic & on Christmas morning I like to make things easy in the kitchen. This casserole is a great way to feed the family. It can be served warm or is tasty cold. It can be prepared a day ahead of time to save time on Christmas morning.

Ingredients

- 2 pounds bulk pork sausage
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 2 cups cooked rice
- 3 cups crisp rice cereal
- 3 cups shredded cheddar cheese
- 6 large eggs
- 2 cans (10-3/4 ounces each) condensed cream of celery soup, undiluted

1/2 cup whole milk

Directions

In a skillet, cook sausage and onion over medium heat until meat is no longer pink; drain. Place in a lightly greased 13x9-in. baking dish. Layer with the rice, cereal and cheddar cheese. In a bowl, beat the eggs, soup and milk. Spread over top. Bake, uncovered, at 350° for 55-60 minutes or until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean. Let stand for 5 minutes before cutting. Refrigerate any leftovers.

Composting and Food Waste Reduction

At the beginning of 2022, the new state law Short-Lived Climate Pollutants, (Senate Bill - SB 1383) went into effect. The law is a statewide effort to reduce the amount of organic materials such as food, paper products, and plant trimmings discarded into landfills. The law requires all residents and commercial businesses to subscribe to regular collection of organic materials (green bin service) in addition to recycling and garbage. All organic materials, including spoiled left-over foods, fruit and vegetable scraps, meat, bones, dairy products, food-soiled napkins should be placed in the green bin which is sent to composting facilities.

The average U.S. household wastes 31.9% of what they purchase annually. This may take the form of forgotten left-overs in the back of the fridge, spoiled produce, bread gone moldy on the counter, or meat products purchased during a sale but now have freezer burn.

Here are suggestions for reducing food waste at home:

- Shop with a list and avoid purchasing perishable foods in bulk.
- Cook only as much as you can eat to avoid leftovers.
- Eat and use all parts of the plant or animal. For example, cauliflower leaves, kale stems, and cilantro stems are full of flavor and tender after cooking.
- Store foods properly to extend shelf lives
- Eat the most perishable foods first
- Get online inspiration and have a few go-to recipes that are flexible with the ingredients. Chili/soup, casseroles, rice bowls, omelets, fried rice, chilaquiles, and curry are some examples.
- The combined efforts of making small lifestyle changes like composting, recycling, and reducing the amount of food wasted can make a big difference in the face of a climate crisis.

- Scraping excess grease into a container and disposing it in the garbage when cooking
- Placing food scraps in appropriate containers or compost piles.
