


Rotary Distributes Spanish Dictionaries in Guatemala





Too Many Passwords! Will Carter

If you're like most folks, you have more passwords than you can remember! So, how can you "remember" all these passwords and store them in a secure way? The answer is called a password manager. In the most basic example, when your web browser or device offers to save sign-in information, that is a password manager.

The most common password managers people use is their web browser. Google Chrome, Microsoft Edge, and Apple's Safari all offer to save passwords for their users. This is convenient since people use their web browser for most of their online activity. If you also connect your web browser to your online account (Google, Microsoft, & iCloud accounts respectively) you can utilize several additional features: including the ability to sync passwords across multiple devices, storing multiple sets of credentials for a given site, and they can even help you find out if your password has been compromised!

In addition to these familiar options, you can choose to use more advanced password managers from LastPass, Dash-Lane, 1Password, and many other brands. These products usually require a monthly subscription of \$2-6, but for this price you get more features, most of which enhance security or convenience. Consider these premium options if you're managing passwords for an organization/business, require extra security, or want the convenience features offered.

Whether you save your passwords in your browser, subscribe to a stand-alone password manager, or simply jot down your passwords in a notepad, keep them secure and private. The best practices for more secure passwords are: Make them longer, use each unique password for only one account, don't use information others might know as part of your password. If you are locked out of an account, or you're concerned your passwords might not be stored properly, reach out to a trusted computer service provider to get set-up with a password manager that works for you.



Message from Cloverdale Police Chief

As your chief, I am deeply saddened and troubled by the horrific act of violence that resulted in the brutal and senseless death of Tyre Nichols at the hands of police officers. Across the nation, we find ourselves once again sickened by these senseless acts of police violence and abuse of power under the guise of law by those who are sworn to serve and protect their community.

The actions of these five police officers are contrary to the values, training, and protocols of our law enforcement profession and do not reflect all the meaningful work that the Cloverdale Police Officers, Dispatchers, and staff perform daily.

I want to reassure the Cloverdale Community that our agency has strict policies in place that prohibit the use of unreasonable force, require officers to immediately intervene if excessive force is attempted or used, require a duty to immediately report all use of force incidents, and provide immediate professional medical attention when needed.

The Cloverdale Police Department remains genuinely committed to our efforts to serve our community members, and provide services in a professional, fair and equitable manner, and with dignity and respect for all people and human life. We are also committed to holding officers accountable should they violate policies and laws that exist to protect the public.

Safe Medicine Disposal

Sonoma County residents now have more convenient opportunities to safely dispose of their expired or unwanted medications and home-generated sharps waste. CalRecycle is the State agency that manages oversight of this new industry-run statewide stewardship program that provides safe and convenient disposal options for pharmaceutical and home-generated sharps waste at no cost to the consumer.

Medication collection bins will be popping up at your local pharmacies. Large chain stores like CVS, Safeway, Lucky Pharmacy, and Rite Aid are participating in this new stewardship program along with local pharmacies to provide safe drop-off of medications at the same place you pick up prescriptions. There will also be more mail-back options available. Some local law enforcement agencies also provide collection bins for residents to drop-off medications.

Where and How Do I Dispose of Pharmaceuticals?

For now, home-generated sharps and needles will continue to be collected as Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) at local HHW collection facilities and collection events. California residents can order free sharps mail-back kits with containers through the participating stewardship organizations.

Update on City of Cloverdale's Park & Recreation Projects eXperience Cloverdale Parks Today!

City Manager David Kelley

and continue to make progress on various projects currently underway. Many of these projects, are financed by either development impact fees, which are paid by developers, grant funding and/or Measure M funding approved by the voters of Sonoma County.

Updated Parks Webpage

The City's Parks and Recreation website, www.Cloverdale. net/PARKSANDREC was officially launched in September and features information about the city park system including trails and open spaces, links to reservations and permits, volunteer opportunities, youth and sport activities, aquatics, public art as well, as links to future park project and meet the staff. Included on the website is information about the City's Adopt-A-Park and Park-A-Month Program. The website also enables residents to submit a park service request to report issues including vandalism, irrigation leaks and broken park equipment.

Pickleball Courts at Furber Park

The city constructed two new pickleball courts at Furber Park. The courts were painted a vibrant blue, adding a flare of color. The site was chosen with the assistance of Parks Superintendent, Hector Galvan, because it's shady and is conveniently located near parking. The Cloverdale Pickelball group, led up by Ambassador Brad Horrall, was a local advocate and strategic planning partner on this project. The City has partnered with the Cloverdale Senior Center and La Famila Sana to provide rackets and balls for community members.

New Basketball Courts at City Park

The original basketball courts at City Park were constructed in the 1970's and were in need of replacement. The City Council approved a grant application to the State of California, which was awarded to construct two new fullsized courts at City park. The two new full-sized courts, under construction, will be made of asphalt, fully striped, and ready for half or full court games. The project is expected to be complete by early March 2023, weather permitting.

New Restrooms at City Plaza

Next year's Friday Night Live series in the City Plaza will have a great new amenity, a permanent restroom. Final touches were made surrounding the newly constructed restrooms at our downtown plaza. Features offered at the Plaza restrooms include:

- ADA compliant drinking fountains
- Doggy bowl fountain
- Filtered bottle refill station
- Exterior mounted sinks
- Soap dispenser



Our Cloverdale Community Development and Parks Hours of operation will change depending on events and Department have delivered some exciting new park elements season, but normally will remain open daily from 8am -10pm. This is one of many exciting current park projects that will benefit the community, especially during events at our downtown plaza.

New Dog Park Near Cloverdale Train Station

A new dog park is coming to Cloverdale soon! After a long search, and the evaluation of many sites, the City is closing in on a dog park site. The site is located just south of the transit station along Asti Road. The site is owned by the Sonoma Marin Area Rapid Transit (SMART) and this project represents a partnership between the city and SMART. Although subject to change as the design process moves forward, the proposed dog park will be 250' x 55' with one double gated public entrance and a second gate to allow service vehicles in. The proposed size is like the dog parks in both Windsor and Cotati. Mulch specially designed for dogs will be used, creating a nice surface for running. A drinking fountain and doggie bag distribution are also included.

One of the critical components in the creation of the park is constructing an ADA ramp that will provide access from the parking lot to the entrance gate. The ramp must be designed to ADA requirements and the city will hire an engineer to complete the design work. To keep our furry friends safe, a 4-foot-high black cyclone fence will enclose the park. The plan includes the planting of shade trees along the western edge of the park and drip irrigation. The City's plan will establish the park, but due to budget constraints, some features like a shade structure may be deferred to future phases. There may be an opportunity for you to help, stay tuned!

Porterfield Creek Open Space Vegetation **Management Project**

The Porterfield Creek Open Preserve is a 250-acre preserve owned by the City of Cloverdale featuring hiking trails, a spring fed creek, and incredible views of the Alexander Valley, part of the city's General Plan policies that encourage the preservation of the western hills. Parks staff, with the assistance of The Northern Sonoma County Fire Fuels Crew, CALFire, Northern Sonoma County Fire-Geyserville and Cloverdale Fire, finished Phase 3 of the Vegetation Management project. The goal of this phase of the project was to manage 12 acres of heavy vegetation on the eastern side of the park. The project creates a fire break to nearby residents from potential fire threats. Thinning vegetation coupled with prescribed burning reduces surface and ladder fuels to help protect the park's natural resources including native trees and adjacent communities from future wildfire severity. Staff is collaborating with the Ag + Open Space to dedicate additional open space opportunities to our residents. We hope to announce additional open space opportunities in the near future!

Measure M – Parks provides funding vital to Local **Parks Projects**

Thank you to the voters of Sonoma County for approving Measure M which provides approximately \$120,000 annually for local parks in Cloverdale. Measure M, a one-eighth cent sales tax that supports Sonoma County's regional and city parks, was approved by 72.6 percent of voters. The "Sonoma County Parks Improvement, Water Quality and Fire Safety Measure" went into effect in April 2019 and will provide funding for parks for 10 years. There is an oversight committee which oversees that Measure M Parks funding is spent in accordance with the voter approved ballot measure.


Dylan Jones has made official wrestling history with his performance at NSC, breaking his collarbone mid match and becoming the first eagle to ever win a medal at championships!




Varsity boys tip off against Athenian





Earle Cummings Turns Things Around! Michele Armanino



Earle Cummings is a turner. That is, he is skilled at operating the ageold lathe, a machine dating back to perhaps the 6th century BCE, which "turns" raw wood into bowls. Cummings crafts sleek, richly grained wooden bowls from discarded pieces of wood found by roadsides in Sonoma County.

Earle graduated from Sonoma State in 1970 and worked for his Uncle Hugh Codding, developer of Santa Rosa's Coddingtown, performing airport maintenance at the then Coddingtown airport. During the summer months, he enjoyed leading naturalist tours for elementary students at the San Mateo County Park and Recreation. A Master's from UC Davis in Ecology opened up a variety of job opportunities including research related to wildlife genetics. Eventually, of a full house. He donates his pieces to conservation auctions where, "they get a lot more money from them than if I had made a donation!" he laughs. He explains that in order to turn a twelve inch bowl, a slice from a trunk measuring a little over twelve inches in The piece is then sanded, sealed, diameter is needed. varnished and waxed. "It takes about two weeks to produce a bowl," Cummings says.

> So, if you happen to cross paths with Earle, his arms brimming with wood, on a brisk winter day, the preservationist in you will smile knowing that from that fallen tree, something inimitable is in the works!





available then and the gym was not built until 1942. It contained a stage which was the original band room and was also used for plays. The gym, in addition to sports events and P. E., was used for school assemblies and band concerts. Photos of these types of events are likely to



show something of the interior. Once the large gym was built on School Street in 1958 for the boys' sports activities, the old gym became "the girls' gym" and is likely to be known by that name by many former students.



Who Was Mae Gibson Foster? Mary Jo Winter

Who was Mae Gibson Foster and why is there a wooden wall plaque dedicated to her in the Cloverdale Historical Society's garden?

Born in Eureka in 1885, Mae was the daughter of pioneer parents Fred and Maren Gibson. She received her education in San Francisco and San Rafael. She married Robert N. Foster, son of the president and owner of the Northwestern Pacific Railroad, in 1909. Shortly thereafter, the newlyweds moved to the Foster family ranch in Hopland.




The couple became parents to three children, two of whom died in infancy. Following the accidental death of her husband on their ranch in 1914, she and their son Arthur moved to Cloverdale where she lived until her death in 1969.


An accomplished actress and playwright, Mae founded the Cloverdale Redwood Players, for which she both wrote and acted. She also participated in the Sonoma County

Community Theater. A recognized authority on Early California History, she once served as the curator of the Society of California Pioneers in San Francisco.

Additionally, Mae was a former chairman of the Cloverdale Chapter of the American Red Cross, a member of the Women's Improvement Club and a charter member of the Cloverdale Historical Society. At the time of her death, she was also a director of the First National Bank of Cloverdale.

In 1987, her son Arthur, former president of WestAmerica Bank, generously gifted \$10,000 to the Historical Society to help purchase the vacant lot adjacent to the museum. It had previously been part of the original Shaw House property. His donation, together with a loan by long-time Cloverdale residents, the late Pete and Gladys Matovich, had secured the property. During the opening ceremony of the Victorian Garden in 1988, Arthur unveiled the carved wooden plaque dedicating the garden to the memory of his mother, Mae Gibson Foster.



Good lord! After the cold we had in February, one can only imagine how much everyone is looking forward to the arrival of Spring! With the shifts in weather starting to sneak in, for me at least, this is the time my creative side is starting to wake up, but is still in a bit of hibernation mode. Which is why simple projects with a big impact can be just the way to start dabbling and dust off the power tools.

A dear friend of mine was kind enough to give me a

few salvaged slabs of cut wood and oh my, they have already dried, which in woodworking land means instant playtime! Sure, I could use one or two in their simple beauty to display art or whatever on, but I thought, ya know - these puppies will work out great to finally allow my dream of having ferns in the house and out of reach of our kitty, dear T'Challa (aka: plant destroyer).

The great thing about a project like this is that one simply needs a power drill, a few drill bits and something to suspend it with. I cannibalized a white rope basket that was no longer useful and measured out two pieces. Next, I took the smallest of my drill bits and after measuring where I would get the best balance once hanging, marked with a pencil and did my first small holes. Tip here: always good to start with smaller holes and build up! I then followed up with two larger sizes, the last being ½" which was perfect for the rope I was using. Once again ACE saved the day and I got four ceiling plant hooks so they could support the weight and with a little patience presto! Safe from the destroyer, suspended in front of the window for morning light and my fern babies have a new and safe home. Dive in kids - small projects can bring so much joy! to share our joys - if you can think of it, we can celebrate

Our Community Food Pantry

The Cloverdale Food Pantry, 202 Commercial St., has been serving those who are food insecure since 1988. It began when the pastor at the United Church of Cloverdale, Gayle Madison (formerly Gayle Waring) was approached by a woman who lived across the street from the church. Her children were hungry and hadn't had any fruit in six weeks. The churches had been giving out vouchers and food to the itinerant homeless but not to Cloverdale residents. Hodges Vichellio from the Baptist Church (currently the Living Water Church) embraced the vision and hard work. Many volunteers from the two churches made it happen. In record time they were filling bags of groceries for many hungry families who had previously been invisible. An unused garage behind UCC's parsonage was converted into the distribution site. Shelves were stocked and distributions took place on Fridays. In 1999 a fire destroyed the parsonage and made it impossible to continue the Food Pantry at that site. St. Peter's Church loaned a space until the location at Second and Commercial was found.

Benefactors include: Ray's Market, La Paloma Mexican Bakery, Dahlia and Sage, Grocery Outlet, Dollar General and Costeaux Bakery. Monetary donations are always welcome. 


A Celebration of Quilts Every Quilt Tells a Story





- The Boys and Girls Club, Geyserville Community Foundation and Healdsburg Jazz Festival, among others, benefitted from his free legal expertise in gaining non-profit status.
- He donated time serving on the Cloverdale Planning Commission, Cloverdale Healthcare District, and served as president of the Cloverdale Citrus Fair Parade Assoc.

I really enjoy roasting meats, and pork is at the top of the list. This recipe is very easy and the meat can be used in many ways. I serve it hot with veggies & potatoes. Or let it cool for killer sandwiches.

Whole Roasted Pork Tenderloin

Ingredients

- 2 pork tenderloins (about 2 pounds each)
- 3 tbs brown sugar
- 1.5 tbs paprika
- 1.5 tsp salt
- 1.5 tsp ground mustard
- 1 tsp black pepper
- 1 tsp onion powder
- ½ tsp garlic powder
- 1–2 tbs olive oil
- Preheat oven to 425°(F).
- Mix all dry ingredients in a small bowl.
- Trim pork tenderloin of any excess fat or silverskin.
 Pat pork dry and coat with olive oil.
- Rub seasoning mix all over pork tenderloin.
- Place seasoned pork into a shallow baking dish and bake in oven 25-30 minutes (internal temp should be at least 145°)
- Remove from oven and place pork tenderloin on a plate and let rest at least 5 minutes before slicing.

Let's Travel Craig Clark

For California residents there's a fund to help resolve financial travel disputes.

The fund is a private corporation named The TCRC (Travel Consumer Restitution Corp) governed by the Seller of Travel Law. It is not a government agency or an insurance company. The restitution fund was created by law to pay out on claims arising from the seller's failure to provide the contracted for goods and services owing to its own wrongful taking of your payment, bankruptcy filing, or closure of business. If you are located in California and purchase from a registered seller of travel whose principal place of business is also in California, and you do not receive what you have paid for, you can file a claim with the Travel Consumer Restitution Corporation ("TCRC"). which operates the Travel Consumer Restitution Fund.

Claims for restitution may be filed with TCRC at https://tcrcinfo.org/

Claims brought by California residents are reviewed by a board of 4 travel agents, a representative from the Dept of Consumer Affairs, and a representative from the Attorney General's Office. Travel agents pay into the fund and serve on the board, on a voluntary basis, for a term of 2 years.

In order to possibly receive restitution the consumer must have purchased travel from a California registered Seller of Travel. Travel purchased from an agency out of state or from an internet agency that is out of state and not a participant in the fund will not be protected.

When contacting a seller, ask for the registration number and expiration date of that seller's current registration. Registration is good for one year and must be renewed annually. Do not deal with any seller who does not disclose its registration number in advertising materials, or who declines to tell you the number and expiration date.
