I'll see you around town!



Continuing A Legacy Of Daffodils

As a child, Merle Reuser's family and the Ernie Kohler family were neighbors. The Kohler's only daughter, Margaret Kohler Adams, born in 1896, became his adopted grandmother. By the time he was 10, she had him helping her harvest and deliver the many daffodils that dotted the landscape to her friends in town.

For about 30 years, their visits were sparse, but by the 1990s, their visits again became a priority and daffodils reappeared in Cloverdale. When Margaret died in 1999, Merle created a personal goal of giving away 1,000,000 daffodils by 2030.

Each year on Remembrance Day, he distributes daffodil bouquets at the high school in memory of former students Courtney Jade Davis, Phillip McCutchan, Andrea Peres, Justin Rainwater, Mariah Roat and Joanna Lynn Wegener, all of whom died from cancer.

Thanks to Merle's promise to his former neighbor to "give away a ton of daffodils" in her honor, Sonoma County has become the Daffodil Giveaway Capital of the World.

Thyme for Growing Deborah Owen

Growing food from seed is nature's way of helping us to be present in the moment, cultivate patience and anticipate the rewards. It's a fun activity for a single person or for families to enjoy.

Herbs are one of the easiest and most useful plants to grow. Place them in kitchen windowsills, raised beds, ground covers or tuck them in between existing plants. Springtime is the perfect time to start herbs from seed.

Growing Tips:

Prepare your soil by fertilizing, loosening and leveling it out flat. Moisten the soil first then place the herb seeds in the palm of your hand and use a tweezer to grab each one and place on the soil.

Carefully spread a fine layer of mulch over the seeds to protect them and water with a fine mist. I like to use a spray bottle to water my seeds as they germinate.

To protect outdoor seeds consider adding organic earwig and slug pellets over mulch and cover with bird netting or cheesecloth.

Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardeners

Rains generally taper off in April, so be prepared to start your irrigation system. Late rains or lack of rains affect the need for supplemental water. Stay focused on climate-appropriate plants that can withstand dry summers.

- Check your irrigation system for cracks, leaks and clogs. Dirty filters can wreak havoc, especially if you are on a well. Clean out filters and replace as needed.
- Flush out drip systems and make sure all emitters are working. Replace batteries on systems that use battery-operated controllers. Ensure that timers are working. Do this now before it gets really hot and dry and plants need water immediately.
- Monitor soil moisture in planted areas so you know when to begin irrigating. Soil may dry out an inch or so on the surface but still retain ample moisture under mulch in the root zone around well-established plants. Hand water new plants as needed.
- Lightly fertilize perennials that are emerging from winter dormancy.
- If growth has not yet begun, there is still have time to prune summer-flowering shrubs.
- Aphids will flourish on tender new growth in warm weather; use insecticidal soap or spray with water from the garden hose as necessary. Wash off spittle bugs.
- The ground is soft enough to make weed pulling easy—stay ahead of it and you will have fewer weeds going to seed.
- Fertilize or amend soil around azaleas and rhododendrons with acidic material or acid fertilizer. Work carefully to avoid damaging shallow roots; add mulch.
- Sow hardy annuals in pots or directly in the garden.
- Plant summer bulbs and rhizomes.
- If you have a lawn, apply another half-dose of organic fertilizer now.
- April is a busy time for finishing debris clean-up from late winter and early spring and for cutting back cold-sensitive, summer-blooming perennials, such as salvia, nepeta and penstemon. Leave fading foliage of spring bulbs and let them whither; they provide nutrients for next year's blooms.





Get Ready to Chase Down Sneaky Leaks! Lauren Lum

Toilet leaks are often silent and can waste hundreds of gallons of water each day, making the toilet the number one cause for a high-water bill. The Sonoma-Marin Saving Water Partnership is encouraging residents to find and fix toilet leaks.

Follow these simple steps to check your toilets for leaks:

- Remove the tank lid
- Drop the dye tab or food coloring into the tank. Do not flush!
- Wait 15 minutes
- Look in the bowl if the water is blue, you have a leak
- If the water is clear, you don't.

Carbon Gardening: A Dirt Simple Solution to Climate Change Connor DeVane

A carbon garden is a landscape that draws down and stores more carbon from the air than it releases into the air. Having more organic matter in soil means healthier soil, which means healthier, more productive and disease-resistant plants. Healthier plants make for better habitat for wildlife, and for more beautiful gardens. Healthy, carbon-rich soil can store more water, helping to minimize drought impacts. Here are 8 easy steps to get you growing:

- 1. Minimize soil disturbances there are trillions of soil organisms living in healthy soil. When we disturb them, CO2 is released.
- 2. Cover your soil leaving exposed soil allows it to dry out and be eroded by wind and water. Instead, cover it with living plants
- 3. Apply compost and mulch Mulch and compost protect soil, and add more organic matter and nutrients to it as they decompose.
- 4. Plant biodiversity plants thrive in diverse communities. You want a diversity of regionally appropriate species
- 5. Plant CA natives native species have a deep relationship with local soils. Bonus points for native trees, shrubs and woody perennials
- 6. Water properly –plants and soil are at their best when properly hydrated. Be sure to use plants that thrive in our climate and group them by water needs to make watering easier and to avoid overwatering.
- 7. Avoid synthetic chemicals and fertilizers these inputs will deteriorate your soil's health and make soils more dependent on their use in the future. They can also cause pollution of nearby waterways and habitat downstream from your garden during storm events. Garden pests can be controlled through less toxic integrated pest management.
- 8. Avoid external inputs –a carbon garden is what we call a closed-loop system. Everything it needs to survive and thrive comes from within. Make your own compost. Use all those fallen leaves and plant trimmings as mulch.

City Manager David Kelley

Earth day presents an opportunity to further raise awareness of conservation and sustainability on all forefronts of environmental topics such as water, energy, air, and wildlife. One of the City's greatest environmental assets is its location in the Russian River Watershed. The river is our sole source of drinking water, a critical source of irrigation water for the agricultural lands that surround our city, and is a key part of our economy, an important recreation resource for walking, hiking, swimming and boating, and is home to a host of plants and wildlife.

The Russian River Watershed encompasses an area of nearly 1,500 square miles of forests, agricultural lands and urban lands in Mendocino and Sonoma Counties. The mainstem of the Russian River flows 110 miles from its headwaters near Redwood Valley and Potter Valley along the eastern edge of Cloverdale before heading out to the Pacific Ocean near Jenner. The watershed is home to approximately 360,000 people, 238 streams and creeks, and 63 species of fish.

Russian River Watershed Association (RRWA):

The RRWA is a coalition of ten agencies including the City of Cloverdale, Sonoma and Mendocino counties, and a host of cities and special districts in the Russian River watershed that have come together to coordinate regional programs for clean water, habitat restoration, and watershed enhancement. The City of Cloverdale appoints a Councilmember to sit on the Board of Directors of RRWA. This year, Councilmember Morgenstern represents the City on the RRWA Board of Directors.

- Education Program for the annual high-school video contest for Water Awareness Month in which participating students have the chance to win cash prizes. In recent years a local Cloverdale high school student won a prize for their video! This year's prompt is, "How has drought impacted you or your community? How can we be more resilient to drought?" First, second, and third place videos are selected by a panel of professionals in the water and media fields. Cash prizes are split between the student(s) who create the winning videos and the high school they attend. The winning videos are used as educational outreach materials throughout the watershed. - RRWA continues to see success in collaboration with the Cloverdale Chamber of Commerce placing restaurant placemats at participating Cloverdale restaurants. Restaurant placemats are a way to reach out to children about the watershed, river wildlife species, and limiting storm drain pollution. Placemats are in MoE's Eagles Nest Deli, Papa's Pizza, Tian Yuen, 101 ThaiWay, Flavia's, Zini's Diner, and the Cloverdale Public Library. A new bilingual version has been developed and is being distributed to participating locations.
- RRWA facilitated the watershed-wide sign program "Ours to Protect" featuring the egret that we see along bridges throughout the watershed. Cloverdale has these signs at Porterfield Creek and Cloverdale Creek. Storm drains are

directly connected to our local waterways. All pollutants on roadways, sidewalks, parking lots, and other surfaces that drain to storm drains end up in our local creeks where they can harm aquatic species and negatively impact water quality.



- RRWA publishes environmental articles each month which can be found on their blog https://www.rrwatershed.org/blog/. Recent articles include, "Get Ready to Chase Down Sneaky
 - Leaks!" "New Year Brings New Opportunities for Safe Medicine Disposal," and, "Recycled Water: A Necessary Resource for Sustainability."
- The RRWA manages a regional contract for Our Water Our World (OWOW) to coordinate and implement pesticiderelated education and outreach at nurseries. The OWOW is a joint effort by water pollution prevention agencies, participating retail stores, and pesticide distributors and manufacturers — working together to reduce the risks

- associated with pesticide use. Ace Hardware in Cloverdale is a participating retailer.
- The Cloverdale Police Department hosts the Safe Medicine Disposal bin at the Police Station lobby. It's important to water quality that all medications, whether prescription or over-thecounter, including pet medications, be properly disposed of so they stay out of our landfills, sewer systems, and waterways. The DEA is having their 23rd National Prescription Drug Take Back Day on April 22. Your outdated medicines can be safely disposed of at Cloverdale's PD.
- The RRWA publishes the Russian River-Friendly Landscape Guidelines, a publication and a program of landscaping practices, which provide landscape professionals the tools to protect our watershed lands and waterways through an integrated approach to environmentally friendly landscaping.

The City of Cloverdale is committed to protecting the health of the Russian River watershed. Our partnership with RRWA enables the city to bring critical programs and activities that help improve water quality, for clean water, and watershed enhancement. The City is engaged in important planning efforts to protect the Watershed:

Recycled Water Study

The City of Cloverdale has embarked on preparation of a Recycled Water Feasibility Study and applied for federal and state funding for the program. The proposed Recycled Water Planning Program aims to improve the City's water supply resiliency by utilizing recycled water from its Wastewater Treatment Facility (WWTF) to supply an estimated 260 acre-feet of recycled water annually. The planning project will consist of a feasibility study, basis of design and pre-design report, and public outreach engagement. The feasibility study will focus on agricultural sites and existing large landscaped areas that are candidates for utilizing recycled water. Public and stakeholder outreach will be an important part of this project. The City will hold public meetings and prepare and distribute outreach materials to foster support of using recycled water as a sustainable option to enhance water supply reliability and combat the escalating impacts of drought.

Russian River Water Forum

Mayor Lands and City Manager David Kelley participated in an interview initiated by Sonoma Water (Sonoma County Water Agency) to help establish and facilitate a Russian River Water Forum. Sonoma Water and a collection of regional partners are initiating a collaborative process referred to as the Russian River Water Forum that aims to preserve the flow of water from the Potter Valley Project into the Russian River while also fostering collaboration to support water supply resiliency in the Russian River Watershed. The first step in the Russian River Water Forum engagement process was a series of interviews with stakeholders representing a range of communities and perspectives regarding the Russian River watershed. Next steps include developing a planning process and formation of a Planning Group to lead up the Russian River Water Forum, including:

- Outreach to elected officials at the local, state, and federal levels
- Launch of a Water Forum website
- Outreach to interested organizations and the general public

Russian River Reuse Collaborative (R3C)

The City of Cloverdale is collaborating with other Sonoma County Cities through a working group to:

- Establish a regional entity focused on reuse of water for resiliency and sustainability
- Create a regional plan, documentation for our vision and goals for regional collaboration on our projects and programs that help save water.
- Establish a regional entity to make us more competitive for federal and state funding opportunities.






A Celebration Of Quilts Every Quilt Tells a Story

When our forefathers drafted the California Constitution in 1849, they included a requirement; that "One or more grand juries shall be drawn and summoned at least once a year in each county." (Art.1, Sec. 23). Today, California is the last remaining state to have a comprehensive standing civil grand jury system in place. The mission of the Sonoma County Civil Grand Jury is to investigate the current procedures of local government – this includes all aspects of county and city governments, and special districts. Its work as a civic watchdog is an important part of our shared democracy.

If you are able to serve a one-year term from July 1 to June 30, commit 10 - 15 hours a week for jury meetings and investigations, are a U.S. citizen, enjoy working with others, and have basic computer skills, this may be the role for you!

I recently learned that amongst other things that April is both Stress Awareness & National Garden Month. It works out well that I had some air dry clay begging to be utilized and a friend with some exquisite Lavender that managed to survive Monsoon March and allowed me to steal a few pieces. Lavender + making stuff = instant stress reducer! Making something from the garden will be an awesome reminder that just about every storm thrown our way

eventually leads to some fresh blooms and a new day.

I sat down with clay, cutting board, a couple of pieces of parchment paper, rolling pin and 2 pieces of wood that were the thickness I wanted my plaque to be (chopsticks also work great!). Placing the chunk of clay onto the 1st sheet of parchment paper, I then covered with the second piece of parchment. I followed this by placing the 2 pieces on wood on either side so as I rolled out the clay, the pieces of wood would keep me from going too thin. I then removed top piece of parchment and placed the pieces of lavender and leaves I wanted to imprint in the clay in a design that made me smile. Placing the 2nd piece of parchment back over the top of the clay and the lavender, I then gently rolled the rolling pin over until I felt the impression was deep enough. I used straws to make the holes to hang later and let dry.

I applied some watercolor paint and then used metallic luster for some added impact. For the minimalists out there, leaving it white would be lovely as well. You can roll again if not to your liking and it is quite forgiving if it isn't left out to dry. Have some fun with it...I dare you!

You Better (Tsa Pre) Check Yourself

More often than not the standard airport security lines are full of people snaking around stanchions waiting in line. The TSA PreCheck line is usually less busy and quicker and without removing your shoes or laptop - a major perk of TSA PreCheck. You're usually through security in less than ten minutes. The rest of the passengers could take up to 30 minutes.

TSA PreCheck is worth it. Same for Global Entry. And many would make the case for Clear, too, because it enables you to cut the TSA PreCheck line. When you are enrolled in all of these services, you have the luxury of choosing the shorter line and decreasing your wait time. Even better, many credit cards offer statement credits when paying for TSA PreCheck, Global Entry or Clear, so the services could be essentially free.

TSA PreCheck is an expedited security program run by the Transportation Security Administration that allows you to speed through airport security without removing your shoes, laptop, liquids, belt and light jacket. PreCheck users also usually go through a traditional metal detector screening machine.

Global Entry is a U.S. Customs and Border Protection program facilitating expedited arrival into the U.S. for preapproved, low-risk travelers via automatic kiosks at nearly 60 airports. A Global Entry membership includes a TSA PreCheck membership and its aforementioned benefits.

When entering the U.S. at participating airports, Global Entry members don't need to fill out paperwork or wait in processing lines. Instead, they can approach a Global Entry kiosk, complete a customs declaration and Facial Recognition confirms their identity. To apply for Global Entry, complete an online application and submit a \$100 membership fee. Like TSA PreCheck, a Global Entry membership is valid for five years. https://ttp.dhs.gov/

All Roads Lead to Equality Michele Armanino

Local Author and feminist **Elaine Rock** has always expressed a keen interest in the history of American women. As a substitute teacher in the 1970s, she was assigned to teach a ten week module on Dissent in US History. Rock strategically included and chronicled the prevalence of sexism in



American history and was encouraged when her enlightened students were surprised at such historical events. So successful was the course, that when her sub job ended, parents protested against her removal.

Rock will tell you herself that she was no stranger to sexism beginning with her high school years in Northridge, Los Angeles. Rock was barred from a trade shop class even though she scored in the ninety-ninth percentile in language and mechanical ability on an aptitude test. "I wanted to take a woodshop and drafting class because my grandfather was a tool and die maker and those classes interested me. I was immediately shuffled into home economics courses." she says flatly. As a young woman entering the workforce in the early seventies, Rock was eager to apply for a systems analyst job but promptly received a note stating, "no women." Rock was savvy though, when on-the-job tech training classes were available, she snapped them up. Her fortitude, intelligence and competence soon led her to attain the title Vice President of Wells Fargo Bank in Santa Rosa.

While swimming at the YMCA one day in 2014, Rock was serendipitously introduced to Barbara "Dusty" Roads, a 1950s American Airlines flight attendant and Union lobbyist whose advocacy before Congress led to a change in the airline industry's employment standards for women. Elaine, whose late husband encouraged her to write about her own personal stories of sexism in the workplace, proposed writing Ms. Road's memoirs. A friendship and a book, **Dusty Roads**, resulted. In 2014 Elaine accompanied Barbara Roads back to her alma mater, Case Western Reserve University where Roads was the honored guest speaker. "I witnessed Gloria Steinem thank Dusty for being the real trailblazer and for accelerating the second wave of American feminism." Elaine states.

Rock's sage advice for young people today: "Don't give up on what you think is the right thing to do." "Change takes time."

Spring has arrived and it is the perfect time to start your garden! 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

Cooking with David Maciel

While working in the food industry in San Francisco I met Chef Nancy Oaks and Bruce Aidells who were opening up Boulevards a classic American cuisine. They showed me how to make this glaze and it's one that you will make many times. With Easter approaching I love a good bone in ham and with this very rich bourbon molasses and pecan glaze. I always look for shank end the bone adds in flavor and with the leftover shank it makes a great split pea soup.

Ham with Bourbon, Molasses, and Pecan Glaze Ingredients

Makes 12 servings

1/2 cup apple juice (preferably fresh unfiltered)

1/4 cup bourbon

1 3/4 cups (packed) dark brown sugar

1 cup pecans, toasted, cooled, finely ground.

1/4 cup mild-flavored (light) molasses

3 tablespoons dry mustard

1 whole bone-in 16- to 18-pound ham

Step 1 Boil juice and bourbon in small saucepan until reduced to scant 1/3 cup, about 6 minutes. Combine sugar, pecans, molasses, and mustard in bowl. Add bourbon mixture; stir to form thick paste. (Can be made 2 days ahead. Cover; chill. Bring to room temperature before using.)

Step 2 Position rack in bottom third of oven and preheat to 325°F. Line large roasting pan with heavy-duty foil, leaving overhang on all sides. Trim off skin and all but 1/4 inch fat from ham. Place ham, fat side up, in pan. Roast ham until thermometer inserted into thickest part registers 130°F to 135°F, about 10 minutes per pound or 2 hours 40 minutes for 16-pound ham.

Step 3 Remove ham from oven; increase oven temperature to 425°F. Lightly score fat on ham in diamond pattern. Rub glaze thickly over top and sides of ham. Return ham to oven and roast until glaze is deep brown and bubbling, about 25 minutes. Let ham stand at least 20 minutes and up to 45 minutes. Serve with chutney and spoon bread.
