# If These Walls Could Talk, What A Story They Could Tell Mary Jo Winter

New York native, Issac Ellis Shaw (1829-1905), came to town in 1872, the same year Cloverdale was incorporated as a city. He was the first president of the Cloverdale Banking and Commercial Company and assisted in starting the Citrus Fair in 1892.

The Issac E. Shaw Building at 219 North Cloverdale Blvd., is one of only two downtown structures listed in the National Register of Historic Places by the United States Department of the Interior. The other is the Gould-Shaw House Museum next door.

Built in 1875 as a post office and express office, it is the second oldest commercial building in Cloverdale. It is also where the first office of the Cloverdale Reveille was located in 1879.

Currently home to Bolt Fabric + Home, past tenants have included a jewelry store, ice cream shop, print shop and several restaurants, such as Scandia and 219 North.

In the 1930's, Christo Potter operated Potter's Coffee Shop. His only son, Billie, was an Army pilot whose plane was shot down over Belgium in WWII. His body was never returned. Although Potter died in 1952, some say his spirit still inhabits the old coffee shop waiting for Billie to come home.

Kate Barrett, owner of Bolt Fabric, has not experienced any paranormal events since opening her store, but employees of prior businesses reported hearing heavy footsteps upstairs and finding furniture moved during the night.

Albert and Nancy Walker bought and renovated the building in 1989, opening the Cloverdale Coffee and Ice Cream Company there later that year. They are credited with applying for the building's inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places.

Before moving to E. First St., Michael Shanahan named his print shop Low Knob Press in recognition of the lower-than-normal door knob on the building's front door. Check it out next time you visit Bolt Fabric.



We checked in at Kelley & Young Wines located in the old library building on Cloverdale Boulevard. Under an umbrellacovered patio, we sipped a Nuits de Young, better known as a red-wine-drinker's rose. Local chef, Robert Montes, from SoCo Paella, entertained us with his cooking skills as he created his specialty, the festive Paella.

We sauntered over to the eco-friendly SoCo Trading on First Street where Shawn poured a bubbly Brut made by his winemaker wife, Lise Asimont. We popped in next door and took in Erin Mavis Clothing's rich display of spring-colored clothes and appreciatively had our glasses splashed with a 2021 Reserve Chardonnay from Fritz Winery.

It rained on us as we skipped down Cloverdale Boulevard holding on tight to our glasses. But respite was quickly found at MoE's Eagles Nest Deli which provided us with complimentary melt-in-your-mouth, buttery grilled cheese sandwiches accompanied by either potato leek or tomato soup. Rolling with the artsy vibe at the Cloverdale Art Alliance, we strolled the gallery and viewed quilt, painting and pottery displays featured by community artists as we imbibed in wines served by Icaria Winery.

Craig, from Trattore Estate Wines, poured us a delicious 2019 Stone soup Rhone red at Nova Salon on First Street which hopped with activities like specialized grooming services and a pop up cookware display. Musician Pat Simmons gave us a nod and a smile as he played some cool jazz on the sidewalk in front of W Real Estate where we sampled Coppola's Director's Cut Sauvignon Blanc and a tasty Cinema red blend.

Painter Mylette Welch was born in Oahu. Her family moved 3 years later to dusty, dry Bakersfield. "Something was missing." She remembers thinking, "Where did all the color go?" For anyone who has seen Welch's paintings, it's obvious that the color went into her playful portraits of stray dogs, children, old diners, and rusty trucks.

Mylette's paintings are rooted in the Sonoma County landscape- nostalgic places, farmer's markets, the vineyards, neighbor's gardens.

Growing up in Chicago, **Tim Montesonti** was exposed to architecture and art at a very young age. Tim says "My favorite part of what I saw was the myriad of stained-glass windows in all of the old buildings. The mixture of color and light fascinated me. The transmission of light through the glass and the way the colors bounced around the room was a thrill to behold. I found my passion. When I was just 16 and getting my driver's license the warning I received from my dad was, "Now don't be looking at stained glass windows and drive off the road." I learned glass work in my early 20's and have never stopped.

Clay Vajgrt grew up exploring the fields, ponds, streams, forests, and fields of the upper midwest. Clay says he "would use my imagination to bring in many of the mythologies I learned about from Greek and Native American myths to Pop culture tales of Hobbits, Jedi Knights, and Superheroes. To this day exploring the natural world gives me a great feeling of oneness, calmness, and joy as I take these feelings into my studio to create mythical places of respite for the viewer to find their own "Fortress of Solitude".

# Cloverdale Fourth Graders Hit the Cloverdale Sculpture Trail Janet Howell, Trail Coordinator

With clipboards, pencils and an illustrated map in hand, Cloverdale Jefferson School fourth graders set out on a tour of the Cloverdale Sculpture Trail. Over the course of two weeks in April, I met Jonni Conway, Stephanie Fernandez, Emilie Barrow and Anna DeLaney's fourth grade classes sharply at 9:10 a.m. in front of M.C. Carolyn's, Big Red Candy Apple at the entrance to the library. After a brief introduction of the trail, we followed the map through town with a stop at each sculpture ending up in front of Pierre Riche's, Salvaged Horse, where they examined it and spotted how many old tools were used in its creation. On the reverse side of the map, specific questions unique to each piece were asked, which opened the conversation up to more questions by the students.



I was impressed by the depth of their answers and questions. They studied each piece carefully and answered thoughtfully. At Stan Huncilman's piece, Hekate, the question was: This Sculpture was created for everyone to see something different. What do you see? The hands shot up and their answers were interesting and varied, such as: binoculars, a giant camera, a ship, an engine, a propeller, a man with glasses. At Sculpture Jam's, Derrick, in front of Papa's Pizza, it didn't take long for the students to figure out how to make him speak and make noises. Derrick was the crowd pleaser due to the fact he could talk, was made out of found objects and focused on sustainable energy.

When asked why they thought David Mudgett's piece, The Disc, was voted Best of Show by the judges, some shouted "because it is so cool." Hard to argue with that answer. It was wonderful to witness their enthusiasm for the Sculpture Trail and their acknowledgment of how fortunate Cloverdale is for having public art in our community. One student asked, "Why doesn't every town have sculpture on their sidewalks?"

#### June Monthly Gardening Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardeners Sponsored by Sanz Nursery

Mulch in the garden not only adds a decorative element but also a practical one. A 3-4 in. thick layer of mulch keeps weeds to a minimum going forward.

- Be sure to mulch around new plantings to cut down on weeds and prevent soil from drying out quickly. Keep mulch at least 6 in. away from the base of all woody plants—trees and shrubs—to prevent fungal growth that can cause fatal damage.
- Continue to fertilize roses and other heavy feeders.
   Gardeners who have regularly amended their soil with ample compost and mulch at least once a year have found that additional products are seldom needed.
- Dead-head roses frequently. Cut stems for bouquets early in the morning and quickly sink them into deep, warm water. They will remain fresh longer in vases.
- Pull or cut suckers from the base of sucker-prone plants such as wisteria, crab-apples, poplars, and fruit trees.
- If you have wisteria, prune it aggressively after bloom, cutting back to 2 nodes on new branches to ensure a robust display of blossoms next year. Prune again in the fall.
- As the weather warms, any aphid problem will lessen but stay alert for remaining or new colonies; spray them off with water.
- Fill in empty spaces in flowerbeds or borders with annuals such as zinnias or impatiens.
- If you plan to be away this summer, ensure that you have someone available to water plants. If not, set up your irrigation system on automatic timers.
- In the midst of June chores, enjoying the garden is high on an activities list. Plentiful flowers bring out bees and hummingbirds in full force, and many other birds are still busy courting and building nests.

#### Winged 5 Sage Smith Taylor

"Life is like riding a bicycle. To keep your balance, you must keep moving." ~Albert Einstein

Almost immediately after Steve Taylor's passing, the Winged 5 became a symbol of kindness and compassion, helping remind us to care for one another and that by coming together, we can make the world a better place.



About a year ago, Steve Taylor Excavation was contacted by the promoters of Levi's Gran Fondo, one of the biggest bike races in the United States (like Tour de France) and they asked if we would be willing to let the cyclists use a lot slated for our future yard near the Cloverdale airport as an aide station. We agreed to support the riders in this way, but instead of money, I shared the story of the Winged 5, what it means to me and our community, and asked that somehow this special symbol be honored... and boy did they do something special! At this year's event, thousands of riders will be wearing the Winged 5 on the traffic side of their jerseys as they accomplish their goals and, on the longest courses, swing by our future yard for some Cloverdalian hospitality!

This epic race is a fundraiser for at-risk youth, often incredibly intelligent young people who are struggling to find their way... and as most of you know, STE works year-around to support our young people too. It's that time of year again, and the City of Cloverdale wants you to be prepared for emergencies that have the potential to impact our community. Resilient Cloverdale, a group of Cloverdale residents, businesses, and civic organizations, has developed for you **CloveReady** – how to be prepared in case of emergency. There are four easy steps you can learn to ensure that every resident understands the actions they can take before, during, and after an emergency to protect the health and well-being of their household and immediate neighbors.

- 1. Know Your Zone
- 2. Get Alerted
- 3. Pack a Little Bag
- 4. Have a Plan to Reunite

Visit our website **https://cloveready.org/** to learn more about the initiative and ways you can get involved. Let's walk through the four steps below.

Know your zone: The City of Cloverdale has established standardized evacuation zones for the incorporated area. The city encourages its residents to be familiar with their zone in case of an evacuation. The city map containing each boundary and zone can be found on the City of Cloverdale's website. Learn your zone for home and work and be ready to go when an evacuation order or warning for your area is issued. **Plan**: When it's time to evacuate and action is required, the City encourages residents to have a plan in place. Planning will give you the confidence to act and provide you with the necessary tools to stay safe. Below are some tips that you can use to help build your plan:

- Remember, first responders will be overloaded in a disaster; help yourself by planning in advance.
- People and pets are your priority.
- If you need help to evacuate, quickly reach out, in advance, to neighbors, family, or friends and discuss how they can assist you, what you will need, and a backup plan in case the immediate help is not able to assist
- Be sure to have an extra supply of life-saving medications and copies of prescriptions.
- Complete a Personal Emergency Plan and have it ready to go.

**Alerts:** The City of Cloverdale has experienced disasters over the past several years, including floods, power shutoffs, a pandemic, and wildfires that have threatened the incorporated population. The City's alert and warning system is vital in early alert notifications, and residents are encouraged to sign up to receive life-saving alerts. Below are the links to sign-up and receive critical information from different warning systems within Sonoma County.

**Nixle** – Receive email and text messages from local fire and law enforcement agencies that include public safety messages and emergency information. Text your zip code to 888777 to opt-in or sign up online to receive email or text messages with alerts and advisories.

**SoCoAlert** – Upon signing up for SoCoAlert, select to receive alerts through landline calls, cell phone text messages, or pre-recorded verbal messages and email. The system also works with telephone devices for the deaf.

National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Weather Radio – This alert system is available at a relatively low cost. When properly programmed, the National Weather Service can remotely turn on these radios and send basic alerts, including for wildfires. The message may be accompanied by a warning tone, depending on the model of radio you purchase.

**Build a Go Kit**: Everyone in your family should have their own Go Bag that contains a minimum of 72 hours' worth of essential supplies. These kits are collections of supplies needed when an earthquake strikes, or an emergency evacuation is ordered. Personalize kits and keep them where they can easily be reached—at home, in the car, at work, or at school. This is particularly important when a quick getaway may be needed during fire season. A backpack or other small bag is best for these kits to be easily carried in an evacuation.

- Personal Preparedness Go Bags should contain a minimum of 72 hours worth of essential supplies:
  - Medications/List of Medications
  - Pet Food/List of Pet Medications
  - Cell Phone Charger Cord
  - Extra Set of Keys to cars/storage units/RV's
  - Flashlights w/Batteries
  - Sanitizer/hand wipes, N95 mask
  - Original Documents (Passports, Birth Certificates etc.)
  - Clothes

Also: Keep your phones and laptops and tablets fully charged.

- Home Preparedness Kits should contain a minimum of 7 days' worth of emergency supplies.
- Vehicle Preparedness Kits should contain a minimum of 24 hours' worth of emergency supplies.

Have a Plan to Reunite: Because disaster can happen at any time, have your plan in place to reunite with your family members before there is an emergency. Talk to your family members about locations within and outside of Cloverdale to reunite if separated. Remember that local cell service and phone lines will most likely be disrupted in a disaster, so have a family member or friend outside of the County that will be your point of contact. 



In addition to olives, the farm hosts sheep, goats, chickens, burros, horses, dogs and feral barn cats. Also grown are 60 fruit and nut trees

as well as vegetables, berries and melons.

The Showa Farm olive oil is medium intensity, with notes of herbs, garlic, artichoke, and eucalyptus with a mild peppery finish. It is harvested early (usually the 2nd week of October) to capture the maximum flavor and is milled the same day and produced in limited quantity.





#### Whisker Talk ~ Brigid Wasson, First Street Pets "Helping pet lovers live their best life"

In case you haven't noticed, it can be difficult to schedule dog grooming services in Cloverdale! We have some amazing professional groomers here and as a result they are booked up with waiting lists. My company offers baths and nail trims for all dogs and professional grooming on a limited basis through Clover Dog. Recently we've been asked to express anal glands and when we declined, we realized that most dog owners don't understand the purpose of this procedure or when it should be performed.

According to Drs. Silva and Smith from Animal Hospital of Cloverdale, routine anal gland expression is unnecessary

and can in some cases cause irritation. While it is not legally considered a medical procedure so can technically be performed by anyone, in my opinion it is best done by a medical professional. A veterinarian or veterinary technician will check for other issues like masses,



infection, or foreign bodies like oxtails while performing the procedure. According to the Drs., if a dog shows signs of distress like scooting their bottom on the floor, or has a history of impacted anal glands, they should be seen by a vet and treated every 6-8 weeks.

Cookies allow you to stay signed-in on your favorite websites or email, let you choose to "trust" a computer for quicker sign-in, and for advertising purposes. These days it is required by law for sites to allow you to opt-out of most cookies. I recommend choosing only the cookies you need on each site, instead of rejecting all cookies or deleting them.

**Myth 3**: My computer needs a defrag & tune-up. Defragging was one of several popular "tune-up" steps previously run by users. Today defragging and dozens of other maintenance processes are run automatically while your computer is idle. Defragmentation, registry repair, driver updates, and more are now handled by Windows/MacOS!

But Will, my computer is so slow! It is normal for computers to appear slower over time. There are several factors that work together to cause this effect, but it isn't always a sign of something wrong. The best thing to do is to ensure you're up to date on updates for all software and Windows/MacOS. If your computer has suddenly gotten slower, or become unusably slow, reach out to a trusted computer repair provider to get the issue diagnosed!



#### From Combat Medic to Medical School



Cloverdale hometown hero, Rico Pesce, aspired to become a physician since he was a certified nurse assistant in a skilled nursing facility over a decade ago. He became a medic for the 75th Ranger Regiment in the United States Army and served on five combat deployments to Afghanistan over seven years. After his service, he completed his undergraduate education Columbia University, where he studied computer science. During the initial

wave of the pandemic and his last undergraduate summer, Pesce harnessed his military medical skills to work as a COVID tracheostomy care provider for New York-Presbyterian in New York City.

After graduating from Columbia, he earned a joint Master of Translational Medicine degree from UC Berkeley and University of California San Francisco while he applied to medical school for the first time, which was unfortunately unsuccessful. "Not getting into medical school on the first try was heartbreaking and extremely stressful," he said. "I struggled with school before the military and adjusting to college just six months after being in combat proved challenging. It took me a couple of years to learn how to learn. Despite doing well on the MCAT, I was unable to demonstrate my academic capability accurately. I knew I had to prove that I had what it takes for a rigorous medical education. I also knew that the Accelerated Interdisciplinary Biomedical Sciences M.S. Program (AMP) would be perfect for me to improve my candidacy."

Rico already knew about the AMP program through his partner, Zach Thomas, M.D. '25, who completed the program in 2021. "After seeing the positive impact that the AMP program had on Zach's career, I knew that it would prepare me well for medical school and allow me to demonstrate my academic aptitude," said Pesce. I was very familiar with the campus and knew it was an ideal place to focus on school while still having access to amazing clinical opportunities and New York City. The guaranteed interview and admissions opportunities were also very attractive."

After doing well during his first semester in the AMP program, Rico was offered admission at the Icahn SOM at Mount Sinai and the Geisel SOM at Dartmouth. He is also waiting on final admissions decisions from Georgetown and New York Medical College, where he recently interviewed. "I knew the AMP program was going to help my application, but I am truly surprised at my success in applying to medical school the second time. I was able to show that I can be successful in medical school because I was already doing it. It feels like a dream."

Pesce has volunteered for many organizations in various capacities, including the Three Rangers Foundation, Special Operations Medic Coalition, Journal of Special Operations Medicine, Gay Men's Health Crisis, NYU Langone Health and Westchester Medical Center. Pesce plans on becoming a physician innovator focused on creating solutions to meet the health needs of the 21st century through a patient-centered approach.



#### **Cooking with David Maciel**

June is the start of the fresh produce season. On these warmer summer days, I enjoy grilled meat salads. The lettuce is a canvas for whatever you like, so have fun with it. You can substitute beef or omit the meat and the tequila is optional.

#### Grilled Tequila Lime Chicken Salad Ingredients

• 4 boneless, skinless chicken thighs or breasts

#### Tequila Marinade

- 1/2 cup lime juice (2 limes)
- 1/3 cup Tequila and a little more for sipping
- 3 tablespoons honey
- 1 teaspoon garlic, minced or crushed
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin

#### Salad

- 4 cups Romaine lettuce leaves, chopped (or Cos lettuce)
- 1 cup grape tomatoes, halved
- 1 yellow pepper, deseeded and sliced
- 4 mini tortilla wraps

#### **Avocado Dressing**

- 1 ripe avocado, peeled and seed removed
- 1/2 cup plain yogurt or sour cream
- 1/4 reserved Tequila Marinade (see instructions below)
- salt to taste

**Step 1** In a large, shallow bowl, whisk marinade ingredients together to combine. Pour out 1/4 cup the marinade into a jug or cup, and refrigerate to use later in the avocado crema / dressing.

**Step 2** Add the chicken fillets to the marinade in the bowl, and marinade for two hours if time allows (or overnight).

**Step 3** Heat about one teaspoon of oil in a grill pan or skillet over medium-high heat and grill chicken fillets on each side until golden, crispy and cooked through (grill in batches to prevent excess water being released.) Once chicken is cooked, set aside and allow to rest.

- a. Wipe pan over with paper towel; drizzle with another teaspoon of oil and fry pepper strips until cooked to your liking.
- b. While chicken and peppers are cooking, combine the avocado, yogurt (or sour cream), reserved tequila marinade, and salt to taste in a blender, and blend until smooth. Add a couple tablespoons of water or milk to make it thinner in consistency if needed.
- c. Optional: Warm tortillas on another pan over low heat until soft and warmed through. Transfer to warmed plates and cut into strips.
- d. Slice chicken and prepare salad with leaves, peppers, tomatoes and chicken. Drizzle with the avocado dressing and serve with lime wedges and taco strips.
