We are smack dab in the middle of a hot Cloverdale summer - the heat reminds me of childhood summers at the beach on the



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
Cloverdale Senior Multipurpose Center **Melanie Hall**

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

There's something about shopping at a family business that always makes me feel like they have my best interests at heart. Saw and Mower, located at 1301 S. Cloverdale Blvd., has been family owned by the Siberts since 1976 when Darren's dad Chuck purchased the business from Johnny Long. Maybe it was the 1978 three quarter ton pick-up

truck that sixteen-year-old Darren worked on with his dad that spurred a proclivity towards the mechanical field, but today, Darren, his wife Nina and their two children, Kelsi and Keller, are all partners in the business. "I thought I wanted to be a welder or work for the PG&E, and now here I am, a partner in my dad's almost fifty-year-old business." Darren tells me.

Sibert shows me Saw and Mower's original, long rectangular building running parallel to Sandholm Lane. "We built ninety percent of this building ourselves back in 2000," he says motioning to the main store on the right. Sibert prides himself on being an authorized dealer for top quality brands which most Big Box stores don't carry: Husqvarna, Briggs and Stratton, Honda, Stihl and more are brightly displayed on shelves upon entrance into the store. "You've got the best tools around!" I hear a construction worker yell out to Darren from one of the side isles.

Sibert states that Cloverdale was once a lumber town, but a lot has changed in fifty years. "You have to transition," he says knowledgeably. "We cater to landscapers, vineyard management, homeowners, construction, tree services and more." He explains that today, trade classes are few. "Learning a trade is becoming a thing of the past." Sibert says, as he gestures to the lineup of outdoor power equipment waiting to be repaired. "We make sure that your product is running and working before you leave the store." Personalized business is the name of the game here.

Giving back to the community is important to the Siberts. They donate to the Eagle Pride Booster's and Lion's Club, sponsor Little Leagues and helped pay for the new football scoreboard at CHS. Looks like the Siberts consider everyone family in this town.

Printer Picking & Picky Printers

While other in-home technology has gotten easier to use and more intuitive, printers continue to be a major frustration for my customers! Here are some tips for choosing, maintaining, and troubleshooting printers.

Choosing a printer is a three-step process: 1. Inkjet or Laser? Inkjets are perfect for those who frequently print vibrant colors or photographs. Laser, while cheaper per page, is best suited to those who print primarily documents. 2. Choose your preferred brand. HP, Epson, Canon, and Brother are all popular home printer brands. Choose the one you trust! 3. Pick your features! Many printers these days come with built in scanners, copying ability, and double-sided printing. For productivity, you might like an automatic document feeder or second paper tray.

Maintaining modern printers is luckily very simple! Printers will come with instructions on installing their original ink/toner cartridge; keep these around for replacement. When it is time to replace the cartridges, choose either OEM cartridges or remanufactured cartridges which offer a warranty. Some printers will have additional wear parts. If you get a notification to replace something other than a cartridge, visit the manufacturer's website for instructions and to order the part.

If your printer is not printing, there can be several things wrong. First, make sure it is on! Most printers will have an obvious button, while others have a switch near the back. If you connect using Wi-Fi, make sure the corresponding light or icon is on. If you get an error on your computer, it might be a previous job clogging the works, try clearing the print queue. If the printer spits out a blank, streaky, or incomplete page, you might be low on supplies! Inkjet printers can also dry out, plugging the printhead. Most inkjet printers can be instructed to clear the dried ink from their software or built-in menu. Finally, if a "brand-new" ink cartridge doesn't seem to work, check for an expiration date.

Printers can be a source of much frustration and while it is often best to replace an older printer, a little know-how can save you replacing a perfectly good device!

Deficiencies in B12 have been associated with memory loss, mood disorders, and even neurological impairments. Animal products like meat, fish, eggs, and dairy are rich sources of B12, making it essential for vegetarians and vegans to consider supplementation. Older adults and individuals with low stomach acid may also have difficulty absorbing B12 from food, highlighting the importance of regular check-ups, checking your lab values, and potential supplementation. 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New Brownie Troop Forming



Communities across the country will celebrate National Health Care Week 2023 from August 6-12. Elected officials will join in recognizing the work health centers do to keep our communities healthy and safe. Their visits and messages will demonstrate that not only is it possible to move beyond the partisan divide over health care, but to support and agree on a program vital to our communities.

Alexander Valley Health Care (AVH) is proud to be part of a national systems of Community Health Centers which provide preventive and primary care services to over 30 million people. Together, we are the backbone of the nation's primary care system, lowering health care costs, reducing the rate of chronic diseases and stimulating local economies.

At Alexander Valley Healthcare we provide medical, dental, and behavioral health services to the whole community. Looking beyond medical charts we address factors that contribute to poor health, such as poverty, homelessness, substance use, mental illness, access to nutritious food, and unemployment. August Monthly Gardening Tips From Sonoma County Master Gardeners Sponsored by Sanz Nursery

- If you've never planted a fall or winter vegetable garden, think about doing it this year.
- Stay alert to signs of water stress, especially for plants in containers and hanging baskets. An occasional deep soaking during periods of high heat benefits most plants. Make sure your garden is well-mulched to conserve moisture.
- To reduce stress on your lawn, keep grass 3 in. high and do not mow too often. Don't fertilize either, as this simply stimulates new growth that requires more water. Better yet, remove turf altogether and rely on low water-use plants.
- Continue to deadhead perennials and annuals. Periodic freshening will keep containers going through the fall. Heavy bloomers can be trimmed and fertilized.
- With major summer chores behind you, continue to check staking on trees, supports for vines, and other general structural needs.
- If you plan to be away this summer, ensure that you have someone to water or set up your irrigation system on automatic timers. When you return from vacation, do a check of the entire garden to make sure that nothing was ignored while you were away.
- Start making a checklist of fall chores that may be unique to your garden. Plants that need to be moved or divided will appreciate your waiting until shorter days and cooler, moister weather. Make a list of the biggest water-hogs in your garden and decide if they are worth keeping or can be replaced in the coming months with more drought tolerant species.



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CLOVERDALE City Set to Begin Installation of New Smart Meters in August

Cloverdale remains committed to increasing the City's resiliency to cope with and respond to drought conditions. While our reservoirs are currently operating at near full capacity, we are continuing with implementation of a comprehensive water meter replacement program using innovative "WaterSmart Meter" technology as part of the City's continuing efforts to conserve water, enhance customer service, replace aging infrastructure, and be more efficient. The project will replace and upgrade approximately 3,300 existing water meters throughout Cloverdale to an Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) system.

WaterSmart Meter Installation Information

Residents can expect to see contractors installing new Smart meters in Cloverdale starting in August. The City's contractor will replace and upgrade every customer's water meter, equipped with communication technology that will allow customers to monitor their water use. If a customer's meter box is damaged or if it is undersized for the new meter and equipment, the meter box will either be repaired or replaced. It is anticipated that customers might typically experience approximately 30 minutes of water shutoff during installation unless there are further complications. A door hanger will be placed on customer's front door that the water meter is replaced.

The City's contractor will also be installing antennas on City poles that will allow the customers' AMI meter to communicate with the City's Customer Service WaterSmart Portal. The City's Utility Billing Team will be receiving equipment and software upgrades that would allow it to detect leaks in the water system and securely share water use information with customers through a web portal.

When completed, customers will be able to see their own daily water usage and make informed decisions on how to manage their water. As the project reaches completion, the City will provide updates and share how customers can connect to the WaterSmart web portal to monitor their own water usage.

You Received a NEW Water Meter Today!

Your water meter was upgraded today by RTS Water Solutions, LLC, the authorized meter installation contractor for the City of Cloverdale. Changes in water pressure during the installation process can result in temporary:

- Discoloration of water
- Air in the water lines, and
- Small particles of sediment

Prior to using your water, we recommend that you flush your lines by turning on your bathtubs **COLD** water faucet for 3 to 5 minutes or use an outside faucet. Avoid flushing faucets that have aerator attachments or hot water faucets that may draw sediment into your water tank.

PLEASE NOTE: you DO NOT need to boil water because of this work.

The Details

City staff does not actively monitor the amount, time or volume of any customer's water use. If a customer requests assistance, City staff will review the hourly water use with the customer when requested. The hourly data is a tool customers can use to better understand how they use water throughout the day, help identify leaks and prevent unforeseen high water bills.

The water meter measures the amount of water used over a one hour period. It is impossible to know what the water is being used for or the exact time of the use.

The WaterSmart Meter does not have the ability to turn off a home's or businesses' water, or adjust the flow of water coming through the meter. The water can only be turned off in person at the location of a home or business.

Your household's and business's water use and the timing of that use is private and secure. This information is not being shared outside he City, including the state or any other agency/organization. The water use data registered by the WaterSmart Meter data is encrypted and includes a unique meter number and no identifying customer information. Both measures protect data from external entities and threats. Customers may access their water use online using the WaterSmart portal which requires a private password the customer creates. City staff does not investigate or review a customer's water use accounts unless requested by the customer.

The new WaterSmart Meter combined with the WaterSmart portal offers Cloverdale's water customers near real-time water use, potential leak alerts, avoid unintentional high water consumption, improve water efficiency, and access water saving rebates.

The WaterSmart Meter Project will help the City enhance and streamline customer service, use water more efficiently, replace aging infrastructure, use staff time more efficiently and reduce the environmental impact of the City's operations.

All meters within the City of Cloverdale service territory need to be replaced because they have reached their useful life.

The City carefully planned the project so it would not result in additional costs to customers. To date, City of Cloverdale has received over \$1.5 million in grant funding from the Department of Water Resources to offset the cost of the project.

The WaterSmart Meter Project has been presented to the City Council as "Advanced Metering Infrastructure" or AMI. The WaterSmart Meter Project refers to the installment and operation of Advanced Metering Infrastructure and these terms may be used interchangeably.

The field work is scheduled to begin August. The first phases include replacement of meter box lids and a limited installation of WaterSmart Meters. Citywide installation of WaterSmart Meters is anticipated to be complete in late 2023/ early 2024.

Customers will be notified with door hangers, by email and with their utility bill when their water meter replacement will occur, describing the project and what to expect and who to contact for more information.

Customers do not need to be present during the water meter upgrade work. To prepare, please make sure the area around the meter box is clear and accessible, including unlocking gates to allow meter access, restraining dogs to ensure workers' safety and moving vehicles if parked over a meter.

There will be a short interruption in service of approximately 30 minutes or less for residential customers. The meter installer will attempt to contact you before beginning work by knocking on your door. Businesses, where possible, will be scheduled to limit any interruption to service.

Currently, water meters are manually read by City of Cloverdale staff once a month to obtain customer water use readings. The new WaterSmart Meters provide remote updates on a daily basis (instead of monthly) and customers will have 24/7 access to this information. The information from the WaterSmart Meter is transferred to the City using an encrypted wireless radio signal.

The City of Cloverdale's licensed contractor will perform the meter upgrades. All installers will be dressed in uniform and can present identification if asked. Their company logo will also be displayed on all vehicles.

Rancho Casllama - A Unique Part Of Cloverdale's Agricultural History Mary Jo Winter

Did you know that in the not-so-distant past there were llamas in the hills above River Road?

For more than a dozen years in the 80s and 90s, owners Cog and Alexa Morrison bred and sold quality llama breeding stock from their Cloverdale ranch they dubbed Rancho Casllama.

One year, their llamas won three blue ribbons, including a Grand Champion Female, in the Halter Class Division at the Sonoma-Marin Fair's Northern California Llama Extravagana.

The Morrisons regularly hosted tour groups like the Cloverdale Preschool Co-op and often transported several of their llamas to the nursing home and senior center where the animals freely dispensed their special brand of llama love. Alexa was a special guest speaker for several of the service clubs and, in addition to exhibiting her animals at local events like the Cloverdale Regional 4-H Fair, was an invaluable source of information for the local 4-H Llama Project.

Rancho Casllama was not only home to a small herd of llamas, but also a small flock of chickens, a Great Pyrennes dog named Oso and a flock of rare Navajo Churro Sheep, the only primitive hair sheep in the world.

At the time, there were only about 600 of these sheep in the entire world and the Morrisions were the only breeders in the local area. They were participating in a project to breed the sheep back into existence for the Navajo Indians.

One Wednesday in August 1988, a fire burned 1,833 acres east of the river and forced a dozen residents to evacuate, including the Morrisons. Unable to safely transport all of their animals to safety, they walked each of them downhill to an open field instead. By Friday, everyone was back home - just in time to rest up for the 2nd annual Llamarama at the Citrus Fairgrounds that Saturday.



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Sacred Ground

Recently, a small group from Good Shepherd Episcopal Church has begun participating in an 11-session dialogue series called "Sacred Ground" – a documentary film and reading-based series on race and faith. This series asks participants to learn the histories of people of color and how cultural and systemic practices impact racial equity. The program is part of the Becoming Beloved Community initiative of the Episcopal Church, a long-term commitment to racial healing, reconciliation, and justice in personal lives, ministry, and society. There are two core books - "Waking Up White" by Debby Irving and "Jesus and the Disinherited" by Dr. Howard Thurman. In addition, there are numerous film clips, videos and support materials created to guide the participants on this journey.


Supervisor Gore and Mayor Lands Conduct Tour



Fourth District Supervisor James Gore, Mayor Lands and other Council members recently lead a tour of Cloverdale highlighting several City/County projects underway or set to begin soon.

These key projects include:

- The Smart Station: Sonoma County acquired a building near the railroad tracks for the storage of emergency supplies for natural disaster response. This will ensure adequate supplies when they are needed. Supervisor Gore and Mayor Lands also provided an update on Northern Sonoma County CERT (Community Emergency Response Team).
- 2. **New Radio and Fire Location Tower**: This newly installed radio tower outside of town, will provide early fire detection as well as emergency communication facilities.
- 3. Cloverdale River Park: A discussion of the new pedestrian and bike path was conducted. The 10' wide path will be installed next to, but separate from, the eastbound travel lane atop the bridge trusses. This long-awaited project is scheduled to be completed this summer and will provide pedestrians and bicyclists safe passage over the river.
- 4. **Alexander Valley Health**: a visit to the future home of the Alexander Valley Health center. The new Alexander Valley Health & Wellness Center will increase services and attract more medical providers to Cloverdale.
- 5. **Asti Bridge**: although not in town, the Asti Bridge is an important project for the City for local traffic and an evacuation route in case of emergency. The County has \$1.5M in funding to complete environmental work needed for planning the project.


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Our Neighbor Was A Mountain Man Bram & Gretchen Glaeser

The year affirmative action passed we found ourselves with a brand-new California Teaching Credential and very few job opportunities in California. A friend of ours was rafting down the Salmon River, "The River of No Return" in the Idaho Wilderness and stopped at Mackey Bar, a hunting and fishing resort. During their stay they found out they needed a teacher for the managers' and guides' children. We were contacted and agreed to the position.

Having just lost three family members in the past 9 months, we were ready for a change. We sold all our belongings and with a couple suitcases and my old army footlocker, we were off to Mackey Bar on the Salmon River in the middle of 5 million acres of wilderness.



We soon met our closest neighbor, Buckskin Bill, just five miles away at Five Mile Bar. He told me about the unfortunate teacher they found, face down dead, in a creek on a ranch up north. It was a great

beginning to one of his many stories, sad but true, we would hear over our stay on the River.

Buckskin moved to the wilderness at the end of WW2. He tried to join up, but had a heart problem, so with his engineering background he worked on the highly secret Norden bomb site project. He created a life at 5 Mile Bar building several structures and a magnificent garden. He was featured in National Geographic magazine and a book by Peterson titled "The Last of the Mountain Men", which is available on Amazon. He was an engineer, hunting guide, mill




worker and all-around back country artist. He had a degree in English literature.






Erin's Book Nook

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Cloverdale Creative Corner

Sometimes, I stumble into a project that a friend or neighbor has requested, and it holds its own sort of magic with it's possibilities. This is one of those types of occurrences and turned out to be a fun little side adventure.



The request: a piece of plywood with a shim at the back (to fill in the gap where the cushion naturally drops), so I have a level surface to set a beverage on the couch while watching television. Mission impossible? I think not! Plywood with a shim... when said friend has a beautiful home...Lord no!

I am in fact quite lazy at times so when I locate not only a great piece of repurposed wood but happens to be almost the size I need – score! This is now

where creativity kicks in. I want to use stuff I have and not spend a week waiting for elements to cure, dry, etc. Tools needed? Electric knife (nothing works better at cutting foam), fine sandpaper, staple gun, glue, screws, and a drill. Additional materials needed? Foam, fabric, upholstery tacks, and if feeling fancy some wood oil or beeswax.

How to make you ask? Try not to overthink it. Think of how a sandwich is made and apply the same logic: layers. Cut the foam to fit the area you need, cutting the angle or curve you need. Wrap the foam with fabric and staple in place along the sides. Now here is where I will share the extra bits I used. As the wood I found was ALMOST the size I needed, I cut 3 strips of wood to mold around exposed edges to create the additional size, but also to create a lip around the edge and hide the edges of fabric. I ran a thin bead of glue around 3 sides and screwed the pieces in place. The upholstery tacks created the finished polished look. Functional and not too hard on the eyes.

Local Grass Roots Radio




The Observer sold in 1987 and the Hanchett family came into possession of the Cloverdale Reveille newspaper. By then Val had moved to Santa Rosa, soon working as publisher at the Reveille alongside his then widowed mom and his younger sisters. Soon his current wife, Neena Tripathi, was at his side and the couple worked to produce another fine weekly paper until its sale in 2013.

Val was a bright and complicated man. In his later life he was a mentor to fellow members of his AA Fellowship offering important support and advice. His sense of humor was legendary, and he was never above self-deprecation.

Val leaves his loving wife, Neena of Cloverdale and three children, Lisa Davey-Bates and her husband, Perry Bates of Ukiah; Ross Hanchett and his wife, Sara Katey Hanchett, of Lincoln; and Janelle MacDonald and her husband Charles MacDonald in the Netherlands. He is survived by his sisters: Mary Stowell of San Diego; Roberta Lyons of Lower Lake; and Kathryn McKaig of San Jose. Cooking with David Maciel

With August comes fresh corn on the cob and I love the way this corn comes out. It's a bit of work but you'll be way happy with it. You might want to make more than one per person. The corn is a wonderful buttery garlicky juiciness of corn heaven.

Buttery, Garlicky Corn on The Cob Ingredients

4 fresh ears corn on the cob with husks attached

1 cube of unsalted butter

3 fresh chopped cloves of garlic or more if you like garlic

16 sheets of double thick aluminum foil, cut to wrap the corn

Pull the corn husks back to the end of the stock leaving them attached. Clean the silk off.

In a saucepan, melt the butter over low heat & then add the garlic. Let simmer for a few minutes.

Cut a piece of aluminum foil long enough to cover the corn cob. Lay the corn cob over the foil and spoon on the garlic butter on one side. Wrap the corn cob tightly with the foli. Then pull the husks back over the foil wrapped corn cob and wrap the entire corn cob and husks in a large sheet of foil.

Place the corn indirectly on a hot BBQ and let cook for 30 to 40 minutes turning a few times. To serve, pull the outer layer of foil and husks back, then with a sharp knife cut the husks off. You can serve the corn this way and let your guests unwrap each cob.

Note, you can also do this is the oven at 350 degrees for the same cooking time as above.
