That Book Cover Guy Michele Armanino



John Koetzner is not your conventional kind of guy. Back in 2018, Koetzner applied for the job as Children's Services Librarian at the Cloverdale Library. Forsaking the traditional suit and tie, he appeared at the interview outfitted in a t-shirt fashioned out of children's book covers. Koetzner read The Seals on the Bus by Lenny Hort to the panel and assigned each interviewer an animal noise to make as he read their part. The committee received stickers from Koetzner at the end of the interview. "Even if I didn't get the position," he remembers, "I got a kick out of seeing adults acting

like children again!" Needless to say, he nailed the job!

Koetzner, who has a Master's degree in Library Science, ran the college library program at Mendocino College in Ukiah where he later worked in the Child Development Center Storytime Program. "I just melted when small children thanked me for reading to them." he says. "Now that the Cloverdale library is open again after COVID, it's very touching when kids come in and ask, 'Do you remember me?" And he certainly does!

"There's always something fun going on inside or online at the Cloverdale library," Koetzer adds. Available 24/7 under the Sonoma County Library home page, Elibrary, are: Book Flix, which offers children's fiction/nonfiction books in Spanish. Kanopy offers foreign films, academy award winning movies, animated picture books and nonfiction books also in Spanish. On the second Tuesday of the month, the Cloverdale Library presents, Spanish Music and Movement, with Koetzner presenting bilingual storytime with the aid of a Spanishspeaking parent. A craft cart, designed by colleague, Heather Lewers, allows children to express themselves using art supplies, and Wonderbooks actually read stories to children while computer stations offer educational games. The outdoor patio is about to get a redesign which will include a stage for presenters and musicians. In keeping with the festive holiday spirit of downtown Cloverdale, the library will offer a gingerbread making workshop on December 12.

Time: A Key Element Of Investing

December Gardening Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardeners Sponsored by Sanz Nursery

- Protect frost-tender species such as Bougainvillea, Hibiscus, Citrus, Tibouchina, and other tender species. You can use an anti-desiccant spray such as Cloud Cover or cover plants with sheets or lightweight blankets or burlap. If you use plastic sheeting, do not allow plastic to contact foliage.
- Dig up and divide grasses and perennials if the ground is not completely saturated from rain. Make sure that once you've excavated a plant to keep roots moist.
- Continue to plant California natives and hardy trees and shrubs.
- Rake up leaves as they fall. Shred large leaves before composting or run a lawn mower over them. If not shredded, large, moist leaves will mat and decompose very slowly, making a slippery, gooey mass in your compost pile or on beds.
- Make sure your garden is amply mulched for the winter. Mulch will insulate roots and retard weed growth.
- Plant any remaining spring-blooming bulbs. Sow wildflower seeds
- Clean, oil and store tools such as shovels, hoes, and pruners.
 Use light machine oil on metal parts to prevent rust.
- Clean out gutters to avoid overflow and direct water to downspouts.
- Winter is the season when rats forage—and damage ornamental plants. If you have had problems in the past or if your neighbors have noticed rats, put out traps early before rats damage fruit trees, vines, climbing roses and shrubs.
- Rats favor heavy cover like overgrown ivy. If you have ivy, the
 best time to prune or remove it is winter when growth slows and
 soil is somewhat soft. If you wait until spring, ivy quickly grows,
 and roots are more difficult to remove.
- Plant amaryllis or paperwhites indoors and decorate with evergreen boughs to echo the pleasing atmosphere of an outdoor garden.

Introduction of New Police Chief Chris Parker

It is my privilege to introduce the new leader who will be

taking the helm of our Police Department. Lieutenant Chris Parker, who has served with distinction in various roles within our department, will assume the position of Police Chief effective December 15th. Chris is a highly experienced law enforcement professional with a career spanning over two decades. His



journey in the field began in 1998 when he started as a police reserve officer for the city of Mountain View. In 2001, Chris was hired as a police officer for the city of Cotati, where he quickly made his mark and was promoted to the rank of sergeant in 2005.

Throughout his career, Chris has taken on diverse assignments that have showcased his versatility and dedication to community safety. He has worked on and supervised numerous undercover operations and probation enforcement operations, demonstrating a keen understanding of addressing quality-of-life issues. 



\$1,000,000 Investment For Alexander Valley Healthcare's Vision

In a move that will transform access to healthcare in the region, the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors has demonstrated a profound commitment to Northern Sonoma County by authorizing the Department of Health Services (DHS) Director, Tina Rivera, to execute a funding agreement with Alexander Valley Healthcare (AVH). The County will provide a critical investment of up to \$1,000,000 towards AVH's capital costs and services expansion in their plans to build a state-of-the-art Health and Wellness Center in downtown Cloverdale.

A cornerstone of the community for decades, AVH has long been dedicated to providing essential medical, dental, and behavioral health services to a population with limited access to medical care.

Supervisor James Gore, who championed utilizing 4th District Community Infrastructure Funds for the project, expressed his enthusiasm. "We are proud to partner with Alexander Valley Healthcare to expand healthcare access in this region. Discussions have already taken place with DHS and the Human Services Department to establish satellite offices in the new facility to bring additional services to Cloverdale and the surrounding areas. This is our investment in the well-being of our community and is a step towards ensuring that everyone in Sonoma County has access to the care they need."

The ambitious Health & Wellness Center project carries a total cost of \$40 million which will be raised through a combination of sources including tax-exempt bond financing, County, State, and Federal grants, and a \$5 million Capital Campaign. The proposed new three-story facility will offer a wide range of services in addition to those already provided by AVH, including Urgent Care, preventative health screenings, medical specialty services, wellness programs, and community outreach initiatives, all under one roof.

Alexander Valley Healthcare CEO, Debbie Howell, expressed her gratitude for the investment, "This generous capital support from the County of Sonoma Board of Supervisors is a tremendous step forward for healthcare in our community. We are ready to put these funds to work and build a health center that will benefit individuals and families throughout Northern Sonoma County."

AVH is a Federally Qualified Health Center dedicated to providing patient-centered healthcare with excellence in quality, service, and access for all. Their mission is to improve the health and well-being of the community by offering comprehensive, accessible, and compassionate care.





Christmas, Children and Cloverdale Mary Jo Winter

Since moving to Cloverdale 36 years ago as Editor of the Cloverdale Reveille, I've been privileged to witness and participate in the true spirit of Christmas. Here are a few examples.

A few days before Christmas in 1987, someone ransacked a residence on Lile Lane. When the couple and their 12-year-old daughter returned home, they were devastated to discover all of their presents had also been stolen. Already struggling financially, they had no money to replace any of it.

The Reveille's submission deadline had already passed, so our staff personally contacted local businesses to let them know what happened. The response was "genuinely Cloverdale," with donations more than replacing what was stolen. Everything was wrapped and delivered on Christmas Eve.

Clear Water Ranch, a residential treatment facility for 34 abused and neglected children between the ages of 5 and 12, opened the following year. Again, the Reveille stepped up and the Christmas Angel Project was born.

For the next three Christmases, each child compiled a threeitem Wish List. Community members then choose a name to fulfill one or all of the gift wishes, thus ensuring none of the children were forgotten on Christmas morning.

When the facility closed, Cloverdale Family Service immediately developed a similar outreach for children in town. Beside toys, their program included food boxes and warm clothing.

Now called the Christmas Wish program, it has continued in one form or another for 35 years. Various groups and organizations have sponsored it, along with support from school groups, service clubs, churches, and businesses. The Kiwanis Club has spearheaded it for the last three years.

La Familia Sana, a grassroots organization assisting underserved members of our community, has "adopted" 158 families this year, including about 400 children, many of whom are homeless, or living in a single room or a garage.

The St. Vincent de Paul conference at St. Peter's Church provides meals and grocery gift cards at Christmas for those in need.

Angela Cordova, her family and a small cadre of donors and volunteers try to catch families who might otherwise fall through the cracks, by fulfilling their wish lists, providing warm clothing and gift cards to Ray's Market.

David Maciel, through his "Second Life Bicycle Rescue" charity, has been giving away 20-24 totally refurbished children's bikes each of the last few Christmases. Contact him with questions via Facebook Messenger or at djm0816@att.net.

The 26th annual Cloverdale Lions Toy Run, which contributes around 200 toys each year, takes place on Dec. 10 at the Citrus Fair. Admission is \$10 plus a new, unwrapped toy, and includes music, raffles, silent auction, and BBQ, as well as a Pack Ride with Santa.

To top it off, a free Community Dinner will be hosted by Parkside Christian Chapel and The Bridge Foursquare Church on Christmas day from 4:30-6:30 p.m. in the East gym at the high school. There will be a children's choir, kids' stockings, and a raffle. Everyone is welcome. RSVP to parkside@gmail.com.

We were lucky to apply for and receive several grants to help us provide classes and programs to help our community. One of the grants provided funds for 20 Wellness workshops that focused on mental and physical well-being. It also helped support our now four-day-a-week lunch program. Another grant provided several thousand dollars for urgent food needs to those who are food insecure.

We offered a Grief Support Group twice this year to support those who were going through a difficult time in their life. We had several food distributions aimed at our seniors in need thanks to the collaboration with Redwood Empire Food Bank. We held a Needs Assessment Focus Group in association with Area Agency on Aging to hear what aspects of life our seniors were dealing with. We also had a lot of fun and socialization with classes like Country Fusion Dance, Belly Dancing, Bean Bag Baseball, and many more.

Peter Van Gelder and friends provided musical entertainment in March to benefit the Senior Center. Gretchen Peters and fellow talented artists shared their musical and songwriting talents with the community at our big fundraiser, Nashville Comes to Sonoma County, which was a partnership between our local CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) and the Senior Center.

It was so nice to see so many familiar faces support our Pancake Breakfast during the Car Show in September and at the Holiday Craft Fair in November. We are so grateful to be able to bring back our popular Holiday Tea in person this year for the first time since 2019, local favorite band, The Fitch Mountaineers, is providing the musical entertainment.

During this holiday season, all of the team here at the Senior Center want you to know how grateful we are for your support of what we do. We wish you and your loved ones peace, love, joy, and happiness now and into the new year.

Let's Travel ~ Craig Clark

Here are some great tips for avoiding jet lag from a long flight in economy class:

Jet lag's potential side effects include dehydration, feeling sick from high altitude, fatigue and an increased risk of deep vein thrombosis, a potentially fatal condition. If you're taking a long flight, book an airline specializing in long-haul flights, like Air New Zealand, Qantas, Singapore and others. Avoid all connections when you travel long distances as it disrupts your sleep and rest patterns.

Dress the part. Wear loose clothing and bring a comfortable neck pillow, eye mask and noise-canceling headphones, like Sony's in-ear headphones WF-1000XM4. Take eye masks, and remember the compression socks.

Your risk of developing deep vein thrombosis (DVT) is significantly higher on long-haul flights. Not moving for more than 10 hours can cause a deadly blood clot. It's critical for travelers on long-haul flights to stay active during all aspects of the flight. This can mean wiggling your feet and toes, getting up to walk around, anything that keeps the blood from pooling in your feet. You should give your body a break by standing up every 30 to 45 minutes.


Don't stop drinking water. You know the advice to stay hydrated on a plane? Make that a double on a long-haul flight, say experts. "Hydrate, hydrate, hydrate!

There's a new method for handling jet lag called FlyKitt, developed by a company called Fount. It uses an IPhone app, patented supplements and light-filtering glasses to adjust you to the new time zone quickly. The app tells you when to sleep, when to take the supplements, and meal timing.

Andrew Herr, Fount's CEO, says the technology came from his work with Navy SEALs, where he discovered that the pressure change in flight causes inflammation.

City Council Report Elegnore Webster

At the October 25th Council meeting, there were several members of the public who spoke about housing, diversity, and racism, and the need for more activism in the City. The Student Liaison gave a report on improved school security and the celebrations for Dia de los Muertos. The Council considered a proclamation condemning the terrorist attacks on Israel and reaffirming its stand against violence in any form. A member of the public spoke about her experiences in Palestine and about the tragedies and deaths that are occurring.

The Urban Growth Boundary (UGB) Ballot Initiative was discussed. The UGB separates the city from surrounding open space and farmland. If the UGB is moved, the City needs to develop modifications to zoning and land use designation. County approval would also be involved.

A resolution was presented that allowed the City to continue to use the Cloverdale Performing Arts Center for its meetings. This agreement will provide a home for City meetings going forward. The resolution passed unanimously.

At the November 8th meeting, there were comments from the public about the need for more low-cost housing. The Student Liaison mentioned that merit awards were handed out at Washington School, and high school students were able to do a trip to the Santa Rosa Junior College to view the campus. The Council declared November as Native American Heritage Month and recognized the economic, cultural, and spiritual contributions of the local Native American community. Several members of the Point Arena, Scotts Valley and Dry Creek Pomo Indian bands were present to accept the honor. (Editor's note - see page 10)

Tanya Galloway, a Sonoma County native, was sworn in as the newest Dispatcher for the Cloverdale Police Department. Dispatcher Galloway was surrounded by an enthusiastic and very supportive group of family and friends, along with her new coworkers. If Ms. Galloway brings as much enthusiasm to her job as her supporters did to the swearing-in ceremony, she is sure to do very well in her career.

There was a request to hang a flag in December honoring the Sons and Daughters of Pearl Harbor Survivors. This led to discussion about an additional flagpole and the need for a revised policy regarding commemorative flags. The Council decided to fly the Pearl Harbor flag on the current flagpole in front of City Hall in December, and to send the matter back to sub-committee for discussion of a revised policy. The City Manager reported that the dog park construction is underway and making progress.

Your Annual Computer Checklist Will Carter

Many of my customers ask me about what they can do to keep their computers in good condition and running as fast as possible. I have previously written in July about three outdated myths of modern computer maintenance. In this issue, I will be sharing what I recommend my customers actually do every week, month, and year to keep their computer in good health!

Once a week: Restart your computer! It is not usually a problem to leave your computer on, but Macs and PCs both do important updates and routine maintenance during restarts. Allow laptop batteries to drain. Many of people keep their laptops plugged in continuously, this puts a strain on the battery which will dimmish it's longevity.

Once a month: Check for and install updates. I mean all of them. That little pop-up from the printer, do it! Windows wants to restart, let it. Driver updates from the manufacturer, you bet! Updates are critical to security and functionality on modern computers. Check on your backups! Check your backup software on your computer, as well as your smartphone, and make sure they're backing up and have done so recently!

Once a year: Verify your software subscriptions! Microsoft 365 (formerly Office), antivirus software, backup services, and cloud storage are all common services which can be billed monthly or annually. Check what services you're paying for and make sure you're only paying for what you need! Run hardware diagnostics. All major PC brands (and Macs!) come with diagnostic software preinstalled, some run at boot, others from the operating system. If you don't know how to run hardware diagnostics, you can look it up on the manufacturer's website. These diagnostics can warn of hard drive, memory, or battery issues before failure. Dust! Obviously, you can do this one more often, but I recommend wiping the dust from any vents on your pc at least once a year.

Hold on to this list and make it a New Years resolution to stay up to date with these tasks throughout the year. If these tasks raise concerns, reach out to a trusted computer repair service provider for help!

Herb Steiner passed away peacefully at his home in Santa Rosa surrounded by family on October 14, 2023 at the age of 85.

As a pharmacist, Herb was passionate about establishing rapport, maintaining friendships and building trust with his customers. He would often receive calls in the middle of the night from a physician in need of medication for a patient. After a 12-hour workday he'd quickly drive back to the pharmacy without complaining, and never charge the customer for his late-night trip. Herb was a successful pharmacist not only because of his keen knowledge of the industry, but his genuine care and concern for his customers. Everyone knew Herbie would greet them with a smile, offer to help, and follow up with his witty sense of humor and uncanny ability to tell a great story.

Friends, family members, neighbors, and colleagues have described Herb as a successful businessman, devoted family man, dear friend, world traveler, pillar of community, mentor, rare gem, and salt of the earth. He was a true gentleman, had a twinkle in his eye, and lived a long, full life, touching the hearts of everyone he met. Herb was a man of remarkable



strength, wisdom, and kindness. He enjoyed traveling to Idaho, Montana, Utah, Colorado for fishing, duck hunting, golfing, and snow skiing. Herb was a beloved husband, father, grandfather, and friend. As a devout Catholic, Herb was a loyal parishioner at St. John's Church. He dedicated his life to his family, friends, community and career.

Herb was predeceased by his parents Albert and Angelina Steiner and three of his siblings Dorothy, Bob and Dick. He is survived by Wendy, his loving wife of 61 years, son Mark, daughter Karin, grandchildren KC and Kaitlyn, and brother Gene.

Transportation News

The Sonoma-Marin Area Rail Transit District (SMART) is pleased to announce the agency has been awarded a \$32M grant in Federal Railroad Administration, Consolidated Rail Infrastructure and Safety Improvement funds.

This grant award marks a significant milestone in SMART's ongoing effort to extend passenger rail to Healdsburg and Cloverdale. The grant is comprised of two major components: \$28M for the implementation of Positive Train Control (PTC) Systems for SMART's 5.5-mile passenger and freight rail line between Windsor and Healdsburg and \$4M for the replacement of older, high-emission freight locomotives with lower emission, environmentally sustainable Tier IV freight switcher locomotives.

Congressman Jared Huffman's support and advocacy for this project was instrumental in securing the grant award. "SMART is a vital artery in our communities, connecting people and commerce throughout the North Bay. They have been a leader on innovative infrastructure improvements, like this project that will cut greenhouse gas emissions and provide a reliable public transportation alternative," said Rep. Huffman. "This has been a long time in the making with a massive display of support communitywide – and I'm glad to have been able to assist by securing this latest grant. This tranche of funding will help SMART extend its reach while keeping pace with a changing climate, better serving our region and the people who depend on its services."

Extending SMART northward to Windsor, Healdsburg, and Cloverdale will unlock opportunities for individuals residing along the entire SMART corridor.

"This grant is a testament to the remarkable momentum we've achieved in our mission to secure the funding necessary for the Healdsburg rail extension. The recent grants we've received are due in part to the expressions of incredible community support for the northern extensions through the application process. This milestone propels us closer to realizing our vision of a more accessible and sustainable North Bay, where SMART's services reach Windsor, Healdsburg, and beyond," said Eric Lucan, SMART Board Chair.

Each component of this CRISI-funded project brings its own set of benefits. The PTC Systems will ensure enhanced safety and efficiency on the rail line, enabling the restoration and expansion of passenger and freight rail services. Replacing locomotives with environmentally friendly Tier IV models will reduce emissions and enhance the reliability of SMART's freight services.

The extension to Windsoris fully funded, and construction is expected to resume this fall. The rail and path extension to Healdsburg has secured \$106M of grant funds, estimated at 65% of the needed funds to complete the project.

Passenger rail service is a vital part of the North Bay's economy, and expanding the SMART railway northward will bring economic opportunities by strengthening our housing, business, and community infrastructure and creating hundreds of construction jobs.

Extensions to Windsor, Healdsburg, and Cloverdale include extending the bicycle and pedestrian pathway and connecting people to SMART passenger services for first- and last-mile transportation choices. When completed, the bicycle and pedestrian pathway—part of the Great Redwood Trail system—will connect communities from Marin to Humboldt County.

I checked my phone and realized I had missed a message from her, Wonder Woman. She had said she was sending a sheriff out to me. I wrote her back and said he had just left but there was little he could do. Then I thanked her profusely for what she did and said how much I was touched by her sending a deputy to check on me.

Then Wonder Woman said "on my way with gas". Yes, I cried again. And less than 5 minutes later I see headlights approaching and there she was...Wonder Woman.

My hero, the wind beneath my wings, the reason I had a little extra faith in humanity that morning. A light in the literal dark. She got me home to a very annoyed dog and some very hungry kitties. But I was home.

Cooking with David Maciel

December is always a festive time of the year for me in the kitchen. Christmas & New Years dinners I pull out all the stops to celebrate.

This sweet potato & cranberry dish will pair well with beef ham, turkey & also pleases a vegetarian. It's a great side dish if you are invited to a potluck party. Trust me, you won't be bringing leftovers home.

Sweet Potato Cranberry Bake

Ingredients

- 4 large, sweet potatoes
- 2 cups fresh or frozen cranberries
- ½ cup packed brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons butter, melted
- ½ cup orange juice

Topping

- ½ cup chopped walnuts
- ¼ cup packed brown sugar
- ½ teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 3 tablespoons cold butter

Directions

Place sweet potatoes in a Dutch oven; cover with water. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; cover and simmer until tender, 20-30 minutes. Drain. When cool enough to handle, peel potatoes and cut into 1/4-in. slices.

- 1. Place half in a greased 2-1/2-qt. baking dish. Top with half of the cranberries, brown sugar and butter. Repeat layers. Pour orange juice over top. Cover and bake at 350° for 30 minutes.
- 2. In a small bowl, combine the walnuts, brown sugar and cinnamon; cut in butter. Sprinkle over sweet potato mixture. Bake, uncovered, until topping is golden brown, about 10 minutes longer. Bon appétit
