
#### **OUTSIDE THE HOUSE**

- Gather up flammable items from the exterior of the house and bring them inside (patio furniture, children's toys, door mats, trash cans, etc.) or place them in your pool.
- Turn off propane tanks
- Move propane BBQ appliances away from structures
- Connect garden hoses to outside water valves or spigots for use by firefighters. Fill water buckets and

- 5 Don't leave sprinklers on or water running: they can affect
- Leave exterior lights on so your home is visible to
- firefighters in the smoke or darkness of night Put your Emergency Supply Kit in your vehicle.
- Back your car into the driveway with vehicle loaded and all doors and windows closed. Carry your car keys with you.
- Have a ladder available and place it at the corner of the
- house for firefighters to quickly access your roof. 10 Seal attic and around vents with pre-cut plywood or
- Monitor your property and the fire situation. Don't wait for an evacuation order if you feel threatened and need to
- 12 Check on neighbors and make sure they are preparing to leave.

- 13 Shut all windows and doors, leaving them unlocked.
- 14 Remove flammable window shades and curtains. Close metal shutters.
- 15 Move flammable furniture to the center of the room, away from windows and doors.
- 16 Shut off gas at the meter. Turn off pilot lights.
- 17 Leave your lights on so firefighters can see your house under smoky conditions
- 18 Shut off the air conditioning
- 19 Locate your pets and keep them nearby.

## Heaven's Closet - Treasures for All Michele Armanino

Tucked away off of N. Cloverdale Blvd., sits Heaven's Closet, a tidy brown shingled thrift store affiliated and operated by the United Church of Cloverdale. "Heaven's Closet is a welcoming sanctuary for all", Pastor Jen Collins of the United Church of Cloverdale conveys. "It's not about selling clothes, but being present for all individuals."



Pastor Jen speaks appreciatively about her staff who nurture relationships and trust with their customers. "We can't help with a need if we don't know there is a need." She gives an account of a young mother who relocated

to Cloverdale and whose preterm baby was in the NICU at an out-of-town hospital. "This was a place for her to talk about her baby and know that we listened and cared about her needs."

Customers concerned about the environment feel satisfied that they've done their part by upcycling an item and reducing their carbon footprint by an average of twenty-five percent per wear. Shoppers also feel gratified that revenue aids the Food Pantry, La Familia Sana community needs, the unhoused and low-income population and more. Proceeds also generate scholarships for deserving Cloverdale high school students.

Artists, crafters and sewists find inspiration at Heaven's Closet. Upcycled jeans display newly embroidered flowers along the hem, a lace curtain not only transforms into a christening gown but embellishes the border of a t-shirt; repainted candlesticks pop with a fun, glossy color; a decoupaged wooden bin is filled with gently used toys: an eclectic selection of dinner plates creates a boho dining experience; a wide-ranging collection of books results in a tempting library; and an old coffee table is repainted and stenciled using free recycled paint disbursed from most local recycling centers - all projects deserving of an environmental savings award!

Since the Cloverdale Goodwill closed, there has been a resurgence in business at Heaven's Closet and volunteers are warmly welcomed and needed. Heaven's Closet has treasures for all - everyone's a winner in the end.

#### **Whisker Talk**

"Helping pet lovers live their best life"

What can you do if your dog has dry, flaky skin? As with people, healthy skin comes from the inside out. A good quality diet will contribute to overall health for your dog. Dogs are omnivores so



they don't need an all-meat diet like cats, but the more meat versus grain fillers like corn and wheat the better. Read the ingredients of your dog food. While you don't need to buy the most expensive one, a food with recognizable meat as the first ingredients will be better than one that says by-products or simply "meat." Some dogs are allergic to certain proteins which could cause itchy skin.

If you suspect this, try a different protein source. Some brands even offer unusual meats like bison or venison for the dog who doesn't do well on more common proteins like chicken and lamb. While kibble is convenient, canned or fresh foods can be more nutritious and a better source of moisture. Oil can also be added to dog food to help the skin. Fish oil is commonly given to dogs as well as flaxseed oil and olive oil. Before feeding your dog any supplements, especially those made for people, ask your veterinarian.

Why are Episcopal Church doors red? The tradition of red doors originated in England during the Middle Ages. If you were being pursued by someone, you would be safe if you could reach the church door. No one would dare commit violence on holy ground; furthermore, the Church didn't have to abide by civil law. Pursuers could proceed no further, and victims knew that the red doors meant sanctuary, refuge, and safety. The person who claimed sanctuary like this could state his case to the priest and ask for justice

to be served. The red doors also represented protection from spiritual evil as well.

Today many Episcopal churches, as well as Lutheran, Methodist, Roman Catholic and others, paint their doors red to symbolize that they are a haven for emotional and spiritual healing and a place for forgiveness and reconciliation.

## Let's Travel ~ Craig Clark It's Time To Learn The Abc's Of Travel

- Know the airport city codes of your origin and destination airport. Like for passengers flying from Chicago O'Hare (ORD) and Orlando (MCO). Non-stop or direct? A direct flight is one that does not change aircraft but stops "en route". A nonstop flight just takes off and lands with no stops.
- Travelers should inform their credit card issuing bank before they leave the country. In order to prevent fraud, many banks will freeze debit or credit cards after a transaction has taken place in a foreign country.
- Familiarize yourself with your geographical location and proximity of your destination from your point of origin. Have a general knowledge of your location.
- Standard travel insurance is filled with named exclusions, items that are not covered. If you want to cancel for any reason, buy the more expensive cancel-for-anyreason policy.
- Travel literacy means at least basic language literacy, learn a few words in the local language — "please" and "thank you" are a good start — and it will make the entire travel experience a lot smoother. A grammar book and some audio lessons will help.
- Airfares appear to be cheaper than ever, but passengers have to do their homework. The extra fees can add up quickly. Need to check a bag? Get an advance seat assignment? Chances are, they'll cost more.
- The Smart Traveler Enrollment Program (STEP) is offered by the State Department allowing U.S. citizens traveling abroad to register for updates with the nearest U.S. embassy or consulate. If you need to be evacuated from a potentially dangerous area, this service makes it much easier.

Discovering music in high school was his saving grace. It led him to becoming an accomplished musician, which enabled him to travel around the world. In addition, he regularly plays trumpet at Cloverdale's Memorial Day and 9/11 ceremonies.

While living in Australia in 1994, Jim began studying astrology in earnest after being cast in the role of Mercury in a stage production where the planets were brought to life through Improv Theater. He's been studying, teaching, writing about, and practicing its ancient principles ever since. He has garnered an international clientele. In August alone, that included India, Fiji, Canada, Italy, France, and Australia, as well as Texas, Kentucky, North Carolina, and California.

Astrology means "science of the stars." It is not fortune telling. People often consult an astrologer when they are at some sort of a crossroads in their journey and seeking some useful guidance. Others may be more interested in finding out about relationships or career compatibility.

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
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## October Gardening Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardeners Sponsored by Sanz Nursery

- Shred or run a lawn mower over large leaves before composting. If large moist leaves are not shredded, they will mat together while still moist and decompose slowly, making a slippery, gooey mass in your compost pile or on beds.
- If you haven't been cleaning up leaves as they fall from roses, be sure to do it now. A single rose leaf on the ground can carry millions of tiny fungal spores that overwinter and infect roses the following year. Put leaves in the trash, not the compost pile.
- Bulbs are on display in nurseries and garden centers and good selections are available from specialty catalogs.
- As days become cooler and shorter, you can begin to divide and transplant ornamental grasses and clumpforming perennials. Keep the divisions well-watered until it rains.
- If this turns out to be a dry fall, make sure you continue to irrigate and pay special attention to new plantings and those in containers.
- If you have soil high in clay content or sand, apply ample amounts of compost this fall. Spread it out about 3-4 in. deep and work it lightly into the top few inches of garden beds, avoiding digging deeply.
- Perennials should be completely dormant before you cut them back to just above ground level from November to January. It's too early to start now. Leaving foliage intact allows leaves to continue feeding the root system throughout fall. You can cut back flowering stems and trim some unsightly leaves, but leave the rest until foliage dries completely or is killed by frost.
- October is a good time to take hardwood cuttings of woody plants such as lavender, rosemary, and manzanita.
   Take small cuttings, dip them in rooting hormone, stick in damp vermiculite, and keep misted. Covering with plastic helps hold in moisture. Keep out of direct sunlight and wait for roots to form in several weeks to a couple of months, depending on the species.



## Save Our Creeks Dispose of Yard Waste Properly

Lawn clippings, leaves, and branches that are intentionally thrown into a creek can smother and kill the existing vegetation protecting the creek bank. Tree branches which are thrown into creeks have the potential to cause blockages at bridges and culverts along the creek channel.

Lawn clippings and leaves, when intentionally thrown into a flowing creek, will decompose thereby reducing the amount of dissolved oxygen in the creek. A creek with decreased levels of dissolved oxygen will have a difficult time supporting aquatic life such as fish and amphibians. Yard waste which may contain fertilizer and/or pesticides should never be thrown in a creek.

Yard waste (lawn clippings, leaves, and branches) should be placed in your green yard waste bin and placed at the street on your regular collection day. You can reduce the amount of yard waste by composting lawn clippings and leaves. An added benefit will be compost to use in your garden. Never place yard waste on the street since it has the potential to enter the creek/waterway through a storm drain.

#### A Dog Park Is Coming to Cloverdale!

The search for a site to accommodate a new dog Park is finally over! After a multi-year search for a location, the city is moving forward with the construction of a new community dog park at 501 S. Asti Road. The project site, located just south of the Train Depot on Asti Road, is owned by the Sonoma Marin Area Rail Transit (SMART). The City collaborated with SMART on a License Agreement that enables the City to use the SMART property for the new park. The proposed dog park is positioned on underutilized open space that will provide Cloverdale residents a safe place for their dogs to play off leash while accommodating freeway travelers looking for a place to stop with their canine companions.

#### **Project Budget and Design**

In February of 2023, the City Council approved a budget of \$245,000 for the design and construction of a new dog park including an accessible entrance path. The proposed dog park is designed to be approximately 12,500 square feet (250 in length X 50 feet wide), which is comparable to neighboring cities' parks, and is a generous space for our four-legged friends. In terms of amenities, the site will be totally enclosed with new fencing, and new water service will be extended to the site to provide fresh drinking water. The site will be graded, drainage installed, and dog friendly mulch will be spread across the site. A total of 30 trees are to be planted along the west side of the park. That, and in time, will provide lots of shade and a landscape buffer from the adjacent roadway and train track. Although not currently in the plans now, the installation of the restroom could occur in the future.

The city solicited bids for the construction of the project in August. On September 13th, the Council awarded a construction agreement to local contractor Andersen Excavating for grading the site, installation of water service and construction of the accessible entrance pathway. The first thing you'll see is the construction of the ADA ramp that will extend from the existing parking lot at the SMART station to the entrance to the park. Once the path construction is complete, a 5-foot-high fence will be installed with a double gate to provide safe entrance to the park. Expect to see work commencing in early October of 2023, with an estimated completion date of late 2023.

Existing parking at the Train Depot will provide ample parking spaces while the newly constructed pathway will enable quick access to the newly constructed park entrance. We expect the new dog park to provide a much needed play area for our furry friends with the amenities to support an enjoyable experience for dog owners. In addition, we are optimistic that the park will be an attractive amenity that enlivens the Train Depot and brings new people to town who will spend time and patronize our businesses.

The construction of a dog park is the culmination of investments made by the City Council in park improvements including new Pickleball Courts at Furber Park, new basketball courts and bag toss (cornhole) at Second Street City Park, a new restroom and park benches at Plaza Park as well as new open space. The addition of new parks and facilities represents the Council commitment to support the health and wellness of our community.



#### **Benefits of Dog Ownership**

According to a recent article from The Trust for Public Land, "...the hottest new city park issue to hit America (is) the skyrocketing support for creating places to let dogs run free...". Cloverdale has witnessed an

increase in demand for park and exercise areas including

off-leash dog parks. Increased dog ownership is a societal phenomenon that has further spurred Cloverdale's Parks & Recreation Team to work with our many constituents to satisfy dog owners and non-dog owners in their desires and needs for parks and open space.

Having a dog is a positive step towards a healthy lifestyle. Pets offer a wide range of benefits to their owners and to society as a whole. Here are some of the key benefits of having dogs:

- Companionship: Dogs are known for their loyalty and companionship. They provide emotional support and can help alleviate loneliness, depression, and anxiety in their owners.
- Physical Activity: Owning a dog encourages physical activity. Regular walks, playtime, and outdoor activities with your dog promote exercise and help keep owners active and fit.
- 3. **Stress Reduction**: Interacting with dogs has been shown to reduce stress levels and lower blood pressure. Petting a dog can trigger the release of oxytocin, a hormone associated with bonding and relaxation.
- 4. Social Interaction: Dog owners often find it easier to socialize and meet new people. Dogs are natural conversation starters, and taking your dog to parks or social events can lead to meaningful interactions with others.
- Security and Protection: Many dogs serve as loyal and protective companions. They can provide a sense of security for their owners and deter potential intruders.
- Emotional Support: Dogs have an uncanny ability to sense their owner's emotions. They can offer comfort during times of sadness or distress and provide unconditional love.

- 8. Watching your pet play having a good time is good for you, if for no other reason than it makes you happy. We look forward to you being able to have a seat at the new Cloverdale Dog Park and simply play and relax.

#### Measure M Funding for the New Dog Park

The City used Measure M, Parks funds to help pay for the Dog Park project. On November 6th, 2018, Sonoma County voters approved Measure M a one-eighth cent sales tax (0.125%) to support County's Regional and City Parks for 10 years. The city is grateful for the voters' approval of these funds which have enabled the City to fund key investments in the City's parks system. The entire community of Cloverdale including the surrounding unincorporated area benefit from Measure M funding. In Cloverdale, youth (School aged children) and adult sports leagues benefit from enhanced maintenance of our parks, fields, and facilities. In addition, the residents of northern Sonoma County routinely make use of our parks and facilities including hiking and bicycle trails, picnic areas, play fields while fostering a healthy environment for native plant and animal species who also call the parks their home.



#### \$7.4M Vegetation Management Grant

The Cloverdale and Northern Sonoma County Fire Protection Districts, operating under a joint power authority as "North County Fire," are set to receive \$7.4 million in grant funding from FEMA and CalOES for fire prevention and vegetation management work in the wider Cloverdale area. The work will include removing understory vegetation, creating shaded fuel breaks that promote keeping a wildfire from spreading into the tops of trees, and reducing embers in the highest priority areas in the fire district.

Phase I of the grant, scheduled to be completed by May 28, 2024, will focus on planning and environmental reviews to advance the Community Wildfire Protection Plan for developing shovel-ready projects that will be carried out in Phase II. The County of Sonoma's Vegetation Management Grant Program provided the initial funding to complete the Cloverdale Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP).



There are four total books in the Owen Women's series.



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

#### **New SMART Connect Shuttle**

SMART Connect is an on-demand shared shuttle providing a first and last-mile connection between the SMART Sonoma County Airport station, the Charles M. Schulz Sonoma County Airport (STS), and the surrounding area.

The shuttle operates 8 AM – 6 PM, 7 days a week, and some holidays. From the SMART train station, passengers can take the shuttle to the airport, work, and nearby wineries, breweries, and attractions. All trips must start and end in the service zone. Weekday and weekend service zones are different.

Luggage may be brought aboard the train and the shuttle. Start your trip right by taking the train and the allelectric SMART Connect shuttle to the airport. Public transit is a convenient, economical, and climate-friendly way to travel, plus you'll save money on parking fees and gasoline.


From SMART's Sonoma County Airport station, commuters can take the SMART Connect shuttle to their place of work. The shuttle's weekday service zone centers around the Sonoma County Airport and the various offices and businesses nearby, making it easy to commute to work on SMART. Rides on the SMART Connect shuttle may be booked with the Ride Pingo App.

#### Sonoma County Airport Improvements

The Sonoma County Airport recently celebrated the completion of the final phase of the \$40 million air terminal modernization project. The final segment features a renovated front entrance of the terminal, which has been transformed by glass paneling. Bronze statues of Charlie Brown and Linus have also returned to the front of the terminal to welcome travelers.

The terminal modernization project included a renovated ticketing lobby, improved double-lane security lanes, a large main lobby with four additional boarding gates and dedicated concessionaires, an outdoor seating area, a new baggage claim area equipped with two baggage carousels, improved public viewing areas and car rental areas, and local artwork recognizing the airport's namesake, Charles M. Schulz. An additional pet relief area has also opened, complete with a fire hydrant, sink and bench.

New amenities include two private lactation rooms located pre-security and post-security. Also, a post-security outdoor patio with shade umbrellas and seating has been added where guests can enjoy meals from concessionaires offering pizza, soup, sandwiches, and ice cream, as well as beer, wine, and non-alcoholic beverages. In addition, a new wine bar, Crush, offers local beer and wine, as well as a full bar and select breakfast and lunch items.

#### Eye-Catching Nutrition ~ Gina Berry, MS, RD, CLT

In a world where screens dominate our daily lives, safeguarding our vision has never been more crucial. There is growing evidence that nutrition can significantly impact our visual well-being. Often referred to as the "eye vitamin," vitamin A is essential for good vision. It helps maintain the health of the retina. Foods rich in vitamin A include carrots, sweet potatoes, cantaloupe, and spinach. Omega-3 fatty acids are healthy fats that have anti-inflammatory properties and are crucial for the health of the retina. Omega-3s can be found in fatty fish like salmon, mackerel, and trout, as well as in flaxseeds and walnuts. Lutein and Zeaxanthin are antioxidants known to protect the eyes from harmful high-energy light waves like ultraviolet rays. They are found in high concentrations in leafy greens, such as kale and spinach, as well as in egg yolks. Vitamin C is an antioxidant known to reduce the risk of cataracts and slow the progression of age-related macular degeneration (AMD). Citrus fruits, strawberries, and bell peppers are excellent sources. Another powerful antioxidant, vitamin E, may help protect the eyes from oxidative damage. Foods like almonds, sunflower seeds, eggs, and spinach are rich in this nutrient. Incorporating these eye-friendly nutrients and foods into your daily diet is a simple and effective way to support your vision.










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

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#### Ed Seghesio September 8, 1926 – August 15, 2023

As the sun was rising over his vineyard in the Dry Creek Valley, Ed Seghesio died peacefully on August 15, 2023. He was born September 8, 1926 to Arthur and Irene Seghesio. He spent a happy childhood with his older brother Ray at the Home Ranch in Cloverdale. He learned to speak Italian from the family matriarch, Angela; he learned wine making and farming from his father; and he developed a love of growing flowers and cooking delicious Italian food from his mother.


When Ed was twelve, he began working in the family vineyards, thus beginning his life's work of growing quality grapes to make fine wine. Ed was still working in the tasting room

welcoming folks to the winery until he was 93, when the pandemic forced him to "retire".

He attended grades 1-8 at Washington School, a one room schoolhouse in Asti. Adopting a strong work ethic, he helped his respected teacher, Mrs. Scherrer, daily by sweeping the school room floors and erasing the blackboards for \$1.50 per month. It was at Washington School where he first met Fay Pellegrini. He said of her that "she was so smart that the teacher would send her home early".

At Cloverdale High School, Ed was Student Body President. He excelled in sports, especially baseball. After high school, Ed served in the US Army in Italy. WWII had ended and he aided in the munitions clean-up. Upon returning home, he played baseball for the Odd Fellows and the Healdsburg Prune Packers. He said he always batted fourth and always had a batting average over 350. He remained a Prune Packer fan, throwing out the first pitch at the age of 95 in 2022.

In June of 1949, he married Fay Pellegrini. The Seghesio family had recently purchased a second winery site in Healdsburg where Ed and Fay began their lives together. They remodeled the antiquated farm house and welcomed their five children to this home. Ed was the head winemaker at Seghesio Winery, a family owned and operated business



since 1902, for the next 30 years until he was able to hand the responsibility over to his son, Ted.

Ed was a Rotarian, served on the Healdsburg Fair Board while his children were in 4-H, was president of the Wine Growers Association, and did a stint on the Sonoma County Grand Jury. He was a member of the Healdsburg Lighting Committee. They raised funds and brought lights to Rec Park that now illuminate Packers games, local sporting events and the fair. Throughout his life Ed had many good friends. Memories of Buck's Lake fishing trips, multi-family campouts and Friday nights with the Mortadella Gang were very special to him.

In the late 70's, the Seghesio Family began putting their own label on the wine they produced. Besides still working in the vineyards and winery, Ed was very proud to promote the wine during sales trips and events. He served wine buyers, grape growers and industry leaders employing his exceptional cooking skills at his family table.

From 1994 to 2019, Ed was married to Donna Colli. They enjoyed dining out, entertaining and traveling together.

Ed was an amazing husband and father and was cherished by his children Julie Neumiller (Jim), Ted Seghesio (Dana), Suzanne Gunnink (Jim), Sally Wilson (Rex). He was predeceased by his first wife, Fay, and youngest son, David. He was a much loved "Papa" to fourteen grandchildren, three step-grandchildren and thirteen great-grandchildren.

For most of Ed's life he had a loyal Labrador Retriever by his side. In lieu of flowers, please consider donating to Canine Companions for Independence or the Sonoma County Humane Society. #### The ABCs of USB Type-C ~ Will Carter

Last month, Apple announced their iPhone 15, the first iPhone to use a USB Type-C port, replacing Apple's Lightning port. I am very excited for this development since it represents full adoption of USB Type-C.

How did we get here and what is Type-C? To understand that we need to look back, all the way to 1995, the year of the founding of the USB Implementers Forum (USB-IF). Before USB was ubiquitous, there were many competing standards including IEEE 1394 (branded FireWire by Apple) and the older parallel and serial standards. IBM, Intel, Microsoft and NEC were among the original members of USB-IF, whose purpose is to promote and improve the USB standard. This has, obviously, been a huge success as USB is now everywhere.

USB Type-C is a small, durable, reversable (you can't plug it in wrong!), interface which allows for unprecedented versatility. Type-C can carry data, video, power, and even Intel's Thunderbolt standard to and from your devices. Despite being loaded with tech, Type-C is also very hard to use wrong, making it the perfect standard for consumers.

Let's review three important things to know about Type-C:

A is for Adapters: The main frustration my customers face with USB Type-C is the need for adapters. Your current devices likely don't use USB Type-C and you will need adapters (also called dongles) to use older devices, cables, and ports. If you're looking for USB Type-C adapters, I recommend the brand Anker.

**B is for Batteries**: One of USB Type-C's greatest features is USB Power Delivery (USB-PD), which allows for the tiny USB Type-C port to carry over 100w of power. This means your Nintendo Switch, Android, and now even your iPhone can all use the same charger!

C is for Change: Part of how USB came to be so powerful is the ability of the USB-IF to improve and modify the standard. Expect USB to continue to change for the better as newer standards are introduced.



## Two Sculptures Violently Vandalized Janet Howell

"Sometimes overlooked, often misread, public art is a sign of life." ~ Art Historian, Patricia C. Philips



Sometime, in the early morning of August 20th, two pieces in the current sculpture trail were violently vandalized. The Sculpture Trail is approaching its 20th year of bringing public art to downtown Cloverdale. In its history, pieces have

occasionally been tagged but have never experienced destruction on this level. Diego Harris's piece, Tidal Wave, on the corner of Cloverdale Blvd and third street was pushed over. Thanks to a kind citizen (or more), the piece was up-righted and suffered minor damage, the artist was able to come and buff it out, and the city of Cloverdale has secured it with bolts. Unfortunately, Peter Crompton's piece, Celestial Poodle, in front of the Arts Alliance, did not fare so well and is beyond repair. It was pushed over and the legs broken off and it had to be removed immediately due to safety concerns. This is a sad incident in our community.

Public art has been around for centuries and people have been etching drawings in public spaces throughout the ages. The earliest western public art, which can be found in ancient Greek and Roman cities, was mostly limited to architecture or architectural sculptures. In the United States, the first organized public art came about under Franklin Roosevelt's New Deal, which was created in 1934. This program identified public art as essential and put thousands of artists to work and created jobs for thousands more. Cloverdale is extremely lucky to have this unique program. However, if vandalism continues, the Cloverdale Sculpture Trail will cease to exist due to one or more individuals careless, ignorant and hateful actions.

Anyone who may have witnessed or has knowledge of this incident can contact the Cloverdale Police Department, where a report was filed. We would also like to thank the individual(s) who erected Diego's piece, so please let the police department know. It was greatly appreciated.

#### **Cooking with David Maciel**

When our son was little, I always looked for an easy dinner on Halloween like pigs in a blanket. I put a twist on this recipe to give it a more gourmet taste that should satisfy any appetite.

These cheesy stuffed weenies are a perfect dinner or a great appetizer for those holiday parties or before trick or treating

#### **Cheesy Gourmet Pigs In A Blankets**

#### **Ingredients**

- 1 cup whole Milk Mozzarella Cheese, shredded
- ½ cup Shredded Parmesan Cheese
- ½ cup bacon, diced small and cooked until crispy
- 1 small red bell pepper, diced small
- 1 small sweet apple (like Honey Crisp or Gala), diced small
- ½ cup dates, finely chopped
- ½ cup fresh parsley, finely chopped
- 4 packages (4 each) all-natural smoked or plain sausages
- 4 tubes crescent roll dough

#### Dipping Sauce:

- ½ cup honey mustard
- 1/4 cup Whole Milk Ricotta Cheese
- 2 tablespoons apple cider vinegar

Preheat the oven to 375°F and line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper.

In a medium-sized bowl, stir together the Mozzarella, Parmesan, cooked bacon, red bell pepper, apple, dates and parsley. Reserve the mixture to the side.

Make a lengthwise slice in the sausage that cuts down half the depth of the sausage. Line up the sausages on your cutting board and stuff each with 1 tablespoon of the cheese stuffing. Set them to the side until you're ready to assemble them.

On a clean, lightly floured surface, roll out the crescent roll dough and pair up the triangles to make 4 rectangles per tube, ready for assembly. Evenly sprinkle approximately 1 tablespoon of the cheese filling over the rectangles and gently push the filling into the dough. Then, carefully roll each sausage up in the crescent roll dough, keeping the filling in the sausage. Slice each rolled-up sausage in half with an angled cut.

Arrange your piggies on baking sheets, one inch apart, and bake for 13–15 minutes, or until they're puffed and golden brown.

In a small bowl, combine the honey mustard, Ricotta Cheese and apple cider vinegar. Serve the dipping sauce alongside the gourmet pigs in a blanket

#### When Should You Sell Investments?
