




Message from the Chamber ~Turning the Page



The 2023 Pete Peterka Award

The Department of Emergency Management annually honors an individual, group, or program for their outstanding commitment to emergency management by presenting the Louis "Pete" Peterka Award at the December meeting of the Emergency Coordinators Forum. This year, the 2023 Pete Peterka Award goes to Resilient Cloverdale/CloveReady Initiative.

The award is named after the grandfather of emergency management in Sonoma County, Pete Peterka. He led what was then known as the Sonoma County Office of Emergency Services from 1977 to 1985. Pete is a legend in the field of emergency management and is recognized as one of the pioneers instrumental in turning moribund local civil defense programs into functional, multi-hazard plans and responses.

The efforts of all these individuals in the Resilient Cloverdale group have significantly advanced emergency management in the Sonoma Operational Area, specifically the City of Cloverdale and surrounding area.

For their outstanding commitment to emergency management in the Sonoma County Operational Area, the County of Sonoma Emergency Management Department honors Resilient Cloverdale with the 2023 Pete Peterka Award. 



Tu B'shevat Is Coming! Riva Orr

What is Tu B'shevat?

It is useful to think of this holiday as the Jewish Arbor Day.

The 15th of Shevat on the Jewish calendar - celebrated this year on Thursday January 25, 2024 - is the day that marks the beginning of a "new year" for trees. Commonly known as Tu Bishvat, this day marks the season in which the earliest-blooming trees in the Land of Israel emerge from their winter sleep and begin a new fruit-bearing cycle.

We mark the 15th of Shevat by eating fruit, particularly from the kinds that are singled out by the Torah in its praise of the bounty of the Holy Land: grapes, figs, pomegranates, olives and dates. On this day we remember that "man is a tree of the field" (Deuteronomy 20:19), and reflect on the lessons we can derive from our botanical analogue.

New Prayer Box Installed

A new prayer box was recently installed in front of Good Shepherd Episcopal Church on Main Street. The initial idea for a public prayer board at the church came about many years ago as a way to reach out to the community. Gene Marcinkowski installed and maintained the original prayer board. However, with rainy winters and hot sun throughout the year, it became a challenge to keep the prayer board in "working order".



The concept for the new prayer box was based on one at a church in Texas. This design will keep the supplies and prayers protected from the elements. The attractive painted metal box, similar to a mail box, was created by Healdsburg Sign.

Keeping Your Tech Green Will Carter

I hope everyone got the technology gifts they were hoping for this holiday season! However, today I am writing about your old technology those new gifts might have replaced. Growing up, I was taught the environmental mantra "Reduce, Reuse, Recycle." Here are some key steps you can take to limit the environmental impact your technology has on the planet.

Reduce. Reducing our individual demand for technology is the first step to being a conscious consumer of technology. The best way to do this is to keep using what you already have. If you need to recycle a device, check out the Zero Waste Sonoma website to find where you should take it for safe disposal and recycling: zerowastesonoma.gov.



January Gardening Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardeners Sponsored by Sanz Nursery

- Continue to monitor weather forecasts for nighttime lows.
 To protect frost-tender plants such as Citrus, Bougainvillea, Hibiscus, and Tibouchina, use an anti-desiccant spray such as Cloud Cover or a spun fabric floating row cover when frost is actually predicted. Covering plants with sheets or lightweight blankets or burlap is another option. If you use plastic sheeting, do not allow plastic to contact foliage. A strand of Christmas lights in a tree is often enough to protect a plant (non-LED).
- Clear vegetation debris when the ground is dry enough to walk on. It is important not to clear brush and trees during bird nesting season March 1st to August 31st to protect our bird populations.
- Bareroot shrubs and trees will begin appearing in nurseries. Bareroot is a good way to plant many fruit trees, shrubs, and roses. If you can't plant the day of your purchase, submerge roots in a bucket of water up to 24 hours and plant as soon as you can.
- Roses should be pruned between New Year's and Valentine's Day. Prune hard, leaving 3-4 young, vigorous canes per plant.
- Winter gardening break is a perfect opportunity to have blades sharpened for cleaner cuts of lawn, shrubs, and trees.
- Clean, oil, and store tools such as shovels, hoes, and pruners.
 Use light machine oil on metal parts to prevent rust.
- Prune pines and other dormant conifers, but do not trim back individual branches part way.
- Begin to cut back deciduous ornamental grasses, pruning within a couple of inches from the ground.
- Rats favor heavy cover like overgrown ivy. If you have ivy, the best time to prune or remove it is winter when growth slows and soil is somewhat soft.



Update on City of Cloverdale's Two-Year Budget Process

A formally articulated budget and sound fiscal policies provide Preparation: the foundation for assuring the City's long-term fiscal sustainability while allowing the city to fund essential city services such as Police, Park and street functions as well as much needed infrastructure improvements. In the coming months of 2024, the City Council and staff will be embarking on preparation of a new two-year budget for the new fiscal year starting on July 1, 2024. The new budget will cover the periods of July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2025 and July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2026. This article will provide an update on the City's budget for the current fiscal year, the current audit in process and development of a new two-year budget.

Overview of Current Budget

In June 2022, the City Council adopted a two-year budget that covered the period of July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2024 referred to collectively as the Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-24 Budget. The City's Budget identifies expenditures and revenues for a series of funds including the General Fund, Water and Wastewater Enterprise Funds and a series of special funds and revenues dedicated to specific purposes including Lighting and Landscape Assessment District funds, gas taxes, development impact fees from new development, Measure M (Local sales tax revenue for road improvements), and retirement funds.

- The FY 2023-24 adopted budget identifies \$19.8 Million in total operating revenue and \$19.5 million in total operating expenses in FY 2023-24.
- The City's General Fund, identified revenue of \$7.49 Million and expenses of \$9.32 Million.
- The annual operating deficit was closed with fund balance (the City's savings account).
- The FY 2023-24 budget will expire June 30, 2024.

Annual Independent Auditors Report

The City's financial statements (balance sheet and income statement) for FY 2022-23 that concluded on June 30 2023 are currently being reviewed by the City's Independent Auditor. The audited financial statements will be presented to the City Council in early February 2024. The Independent Audtiors's Report will consist of a series of financial statements. The components include:

- The government-wide financial statements which include the Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities and report information about the City as a whole including all assets and liabilities using the accrual basis of accounting. This type of accounting is similar to the accounting used by most private sector companies.
- Fund financial statements describe how City services are financed in the short term as well as what resources are available for future spending. Fund financial statements also report the City's operations in more detail than the government-wide statements by providing information about the City's most significant funds.

The Independent Auditors Report will provide a picture of the City's financial health and help to determine whether the current fiscal year's activities contributed positively to the overall financial well-being and help to inform the development of the budgets for the upcoming fiscal year. Development of New Two-Year Budget for Fiscal Year 2024-2025 and 2025-2026

Starting in early 2024, the City Council with the assistance of City staff will begin developing a new two-year budget for FY 2024-2025 and FY 2025-2026. The budget is expected to fund all City operations, projects, and programs and provide a plan for revenues and expenditures within each fund.

Our budget development process is a structured sequence of steps designed to ensure careful planning, allocation, and management of financial resources. Here's a condensed overview of the City's budget process:

- Needs Assessment: The City Council and City staff Identify and assess the needs and priorities of the community. This involves input from the City Council, City staff, local businesses and organizations and residents. The City Council will hold a workshop in early 2024 to discuss key budget goals and City priorities. Improvements in local infrastructure (parks, streets, water and wastewater) continue to be a high priority.
- Revenue Projections: As part of the budget development process, the City's Finance staff will estimate the expected revenues from various sources including sales, property and hotel (TOT) taxes, city fees, and federal, state, and local grants. The revenue projection will inform the budget development process. Once revenue forecasts are established, they become a crucial input for budget planning. The city's Finance staff use revenue forecasts to provide a recommendation to the City Council on the allocation of funds to different departments and programs, set spending priorities, and ensure that projected expenditures align with expected revenues. A detailed discussion of major revenue sources will be provided in next month's Cloverdale Connect article.

Drafting the Budget:

- Departmental Requests: Departments submit their budget requests, outlining their financial needs for the upcoming fiscal year. The budget requests developed by the City staff are intended to address mandatory requirements as well An example of a mandatory as discretionary projects. expenditure is chlorine for our Water and Wastewater Treatment Plant. Discretionary budget expenses refer to the portion of a budget that is flexible and can be allocated at the discretion of the governing body or decision-makers within an organization. These expenses are not fixed and are typically non-essential in nature, meaning they are not mandatory or required for the organization's basic operations.
- Budget Formulation: The finance department works with departmental heads to develop a comprehensive budget proposal. The budget proposal will ultimately be submitted to the City Council and made available for public review.
- Balancing the Budget: The City is required to adopt a balanced budget to ensure that expenditures do not exceed anticipated revenues. In the last few budget cycles, it has been necessary to utilize a portion of the fund balance (the City's savings account) to fully fund city operations.

Review and Approval:

- Public Input: Throughout the budget process, transparency, accountability, and public participation are essential elements to ensure that the budget reflects the needs and priorities of the community. Review of the draft budget is typically conducted by the City Council meeting starting in April. During the budget review meeting, the City Council and the public are able to review the draft budget and provide input and feedback on proposed expenditures and initiatives.
- Approval: The draft final budget is typically presented to the City Council at their last meeting in May and finalized at their first meeting in early June prior to start of the new fiscal year. Once the budget is adopted, it becomes the official financial plan for the fiscal year.

Please keep your eye out for additional information about the City's budget. In next month's article, the City will continue to provide updates on the City's budget with a focus on key revenue sources including Property Taxes, Sales Taxes, Utility User Taxes and local hotel taxes.





City Council Report ~ Eleanore Webster

The Dec. 13th Council meeting began with several proclamations acknowledging the hard work of local residents. A Certification of Appreciation was given to the volunteers who worked on the cemetery, cleaning up the area and making the roadway safer and more accessible. Especially active were the Sons of the American Legion, Post 293. Bob Cox spoke about the work involved and Leader Al Delsid was recognized for his hard work. This was followed by a proclamation for Youth Sports Championship. The Cloverdale Chargers Junior Varsity received the Championship title for the Mendo Lake area, after having trounced top competitors. The Lions Club was recognized for their continuing support and sponsorship. Coaches thanked the sponsors, and the City Council declared that the team was now a part of Cloverdale history. A proclamation was read that recognized retiring Police Chief Jason Ferguson for his many years of service. Ferguson started in Cloverdale in 2019

and was recognized for is significant contributions to emergency preparedness, homelessness solutions, and animal control.

New business included setting the City Park Scouts Cabin as a priority project. This work is included in a CDBG application for funding. The declaration of a priority project is needed to support the application. The plan is to upgrade the facility and make it ADA accessible. The grant will be for FY 2024/25, so work will pend funding of the grant. Additional funds will be considered for next year's City budget.

Mayor Todd Lands was nominated to continue as Mayor, with Council Member Brian Wheeler serving as Vice Mayor. Members of the public were given an opportunity to nominate and comment. No additional nominations were put forward, votes were taken and the Mayor and Vice Mayor were elected. Subcommittee appointments were referred to the City Manager, who will take into account preferences of the Council Members.

Books on Board ~ Michele Armanino

In 1790, Franklin Public Library in Massachusetts may have supplies lots of juvenile material. A visit to the Pride Parade been one of the first libraries to loan out books in the U.S. Flattered by his eponomyn, Benjamin Franklin donated 116 books to the town of Franklin. However, the thought of a horse and coach that distributed books directly to his community was probably something that never crossed the ingenious inventor's mind.



Since 2018, Sonoma County's Bibliobus, a solar-paneled mobile bus, equipped with Wifi and a certified librarian, Briana Herrod, travels around the rural and central towns of Sonoma County

bringing books and a love of reading to adults and children alike. "The King's Valley community has a lot of strong library users," Briana says. "But, some of them can't make the trip to their local library anymore because of mobility issues. This is where the Bibliobus does its best work!" Briana forms bonds with community members discussing books and researching requests on her computer. Visits by the Bibliobus to the Vine Ridge Senior Living facility have resulted in independent volunteer work by a Cloverdale librarian who reads to the seniors at the center. "This is a unique and very fulfilling job." Briana says happily.

Kathy DeWeese, Youth Services Administrator and Coordinator of Children's and Teen Services at the Cloverdale Library, discusses the bus's diverse reading materials available in both English and Spanish. "We regularly switch books out depending on where we are going. A senior center event has books available with larger print and a children's event focuses one-hundred percent on Queer themes, while stops at local Native American tribes display culturally appropriate themes."

The County hopes to have a second Bibliobus in the future that will service preschools and senior out reach areas and provide regular delivery of books to areas such as Bodega Bay and Cazadero. A Bibliobus request form can be filled out at: sonomalibrary.org/bibliobus. "We love to visit people in the community, and we are looking into getting the Bibliobus to the Citrus Fair." Briana says enthusiastically. Sonoma County libraries continue to serve our local communities in a variety of creative and inspiring ways.



Cloverdale's Very Own Captain Morgan Mary Jo Winter



Did you know there is a real Captain Morgan buried at the Cloverdale Cemetery who played an integral role in the town's early history?

Born Oct. 11, 1811, in Concordia Parish, Louisiana, David Bannister Morgan, Jr., was the eldest son of General David Bannister Morgan, Sr., and Elizabeth B. Middleton. As a young man, Captain Morgan

was given an appointment to the Naval School at Annapolis by President Andrew Jackson. In 1833, he married Harriet Swift and, for a time, was Superintendent of Public Works for the State of Louisiana. During the Texas War for Independence, he was Commander of the U.S. Steamer Fashion. He was also commander of other steamboats before coming to California in 1850 where he became master of the first steamboat running between Sacramento and Red Bluff.

For a time, Captain Morgan lived in Sonoma where he engaged in farming before moving to Cloverdale in 1870 and buying a ranch on Sulfur Creek. He quickly became an active and well-respected member of the community, becoming the first Clerk and Recorder for the City of Cloverdale upon its incorporation in 1872, a position he held until his death on April 19, 1886. In addition, Captain Morgan was elected Justice of the Peace and also served as a School Trustee.

At the time, his funeral procession was said to have been the largest ever held in Cloverdale. Flags were lowered to half-staff and businesses were closed for the day. Afternoon school sessions were canceled so students and teachers could attend his service together. Survivors included his wife, three adult children, and 12 grandchildren.

During a 2018 inventory of grave sites at the cemetery, it was discovered that he had no stone or marker. One was finally ordered and placed in October of that year.

Students – Time To Register To Vote



Airline Passenger Rights ~ Craig Clark

A credit instead of a refund for a canceled flight?

Airlines are not allowed to issue a credit instead of a refund for a canceled flight unless you specifically agree to the credit offer. Your rights to a full refund are protected under consumer protection rules and U.S. Dept. of Transportation rules.

The U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) has established regulations that protect your rights in the event of a flight cancellation. According to DOT rules passengers are entitled to a full refund for a canceled flight if the flight was scheduled to depart from or arrive in the United States. If your airline forces you to accept a ticket credit, you can file a complaint with the DOT and it will investigate and could help you receive a full refund.

European Union rules

If you're traveling on a flight within the European Union (EU) or on flights operated

by an EU airline, you have more rights under EU Regulation EC 261 mandates that passengers receive a full refund for canceled flights if the flight was scheduled to depart from an EU airport, was operated by an EU airline and was scheduled to arrive at an EU airport. In addition to a refund, you may be entitled to compensation.

Australian passenger protection laws

The Australian Consumer Law (ACL), prohibits airlines from offering a ticket credit instead of a refund for a canceled flight without the passenger's explicit consent. If offered a ticket credit instead of a refund, it must clearly disclose the terms of the credit, including the expiration date and any restrictions on its use. The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) can investigate complaints and take action against airlines that breach the ACL.



Footprints From the Past Elissa Morrash, Cloverdale Historical Society

The Congregational Church, at 439 N. Cloverdale Blvd, was built in 1869 on land donated by James Kleiser and is the first known church building in Cloverdale. In 1906 or 1907 the church was moved to the back lot and a new church was built with a new steeple. Two huge windows of beautiful leaded, stained glass grace the church with an orange citrus theme reflecting Cloverdale's nickname as the Orange City. The church's



2-manual 9-rank pipe organ was built by Berkeley organ builder Thomas Whalley in 1907 and is perhaps one of only a few instruments by this organ builder that still exists. At the time, it was powered from a Pelton wheel connected to the city water system. The Congregational Church became the United Church of Cloverdale in 1979 when it joined with United Methodist. The United Church, also known as the "Ivy Church", is famous for its brilliant colors each fall. The Boston ivy was planted in 1910 by E.A. Cooley, one of Cloverdale's original families. The church is among the most photographed buildings in Cloverdale.

The "Ivy Church" is among the few buildings in Cloverdale from the 1800s that are still standing, mercifully unaffected by fires in the olden days. With services each week on the original pipe organ, the church is a community treasure.



William Wareham's Sculpture Gets Facelift Janet A. Howell

Due to the generosity of Andres Marquez with Symphonic Finishing, a painting, restoration and Design company in Cloverdale, William Wareham's piece, Without a Shout, received a complete makeover. After the recent vandalism spree to three pieces of sculpture in the Cloverdale Sculpture Trail, this generous gesture was a welcome surprise.



Without a Shout was one of the first pieces of sculpture installed in 2005 in the Cloverdale Sculpture Trail. This piece has welcomed residents and visitors to Cloverdale for nearly 20 years with its whimsical form and bright yellow paint. The artist, William Wareham, passed away and the piece was donated to the City of Cloverdale. But after nearly 20 years, it was in need of a new paint job as it was rusting and peeling. Andres Marquez stepped forward volunteering his services to restore the piece to its natural beauty. The three-day process involved washing, sanding, priming, anti-rust painting and then the final finish of paint. Andres tried to find a perfect yellow match and settled on Lemon Citrus, an appropriate nod to the Cloverdale Citrus Fair and Citrus Fair Drive, where Without a Shout is located in its permanent home.

Sticks And Wood Gerald French

After graduating from High School, Bryan Dorsett was always making things. His first job was working for Arthur Benny, a Santa Rosa jeweler polishing rings. This trained him to succeed in doing fine detail work. Later he joined Miguel Archuleta constructing homes. Jim Smith, a master builder in Santa Rosa, taught Dorsett the ability to build quality homes.



He was thumbing through a WWI Aviation Magazine where there were plans to build a SRES Royal Scout Aircraft, at a 5% scale model. Originally the plane was built to become a stable gun platform for the aircraft in WWI. For only a hundred dollars, the 30 pages

of plans were available. He was hooked! His extra time, in the evenings and on the weekend was spent with the love of his life, Lisa, and building the plane. This was in 1988. With \$200, he brought some "sticks and wood," and started building. He always like building, and over time he built over 500 homes, refinished motorcycles and restored collectors' cars.

In 2021, he finished building the airplane. The prop is made of wood and is a thing of beauty. The plane can cruise at 90 mph. Presently the plane is hangered at Cloverdale Airport. Bryant said, "If it wasn't for the support of my wife Lisa, the plane would never have been built. She was a great encouragement." They have been married 35 years.

Bryan doesn't have a license and does not know how to fly a plane.

Grant Funds for CHS

Cloverdale High School has received over half a million dollars towards their CTE (Career Technical Education) programs in the last year.

They were awarded over \$300,000 to expand their agricultural pathways from one to four. These pathways include Agricultural Business, Animal Science, Floral Design, and Agriscience. These funds came from the Strong Workforce Grant.

With the funds for the agriculture grant, CHS plans to improve their greenhouse, add a walk-in floral cooler, provide shelter for sheep and goats on the school farm so that more students can show at the Sonoma County Fair, and expand the existing chicken coop and orchard so that students can manage enterprises that teach them business skills. They will also provide students with more equitable opportunities to participate in FFA and leadership programs using these funds.

Additional grant dollars have been awarded to initiate an Early Childhood Development program. This program would allow students to earn hours toward a credential, earn early college credit through SRJC, and become CPR & First Aid certified.

Riley Dale's position as CTE and Work Based Learning Coordinator is a new role that started this year which helps these initiatives come to life and ensure the longevity of our CTE programs through long term planning.

Data shows that students who complete a CTE pathway have a higher overall GPA, are less likely to drop out, and are less likely to be suspended. Cloverdale High School is committed to expanding our CTE offerings and ensuring more students have access to pathways that lead to high-wage, high-demand careers in Sonoma County.

Additionally, there is also a Construction and Digital and Media Arts pathway.



Cooking with David Maciel

As we embark on 2024 it's the time of the year when I reflect on my life. Like many I want to knock off a few holiday pounds. I look for recipes that are filling and rich in flavor but low in calories and fat.

This vegan based recipe is all of that. You can certainly add lean chicken, shrimp or tofu if that's your fancy.

Vegetable Curry

Ingredients

- 1 tsp coconut oil
- 4 green cardamom pods (slightly crushed)
- 1 medium yellow onion, diced
- ½ tsp turmeric
- ½ to 1 tsp cayenne(use more or less based on your preference)
- 1 TBS ginger garlic paste
- 2 medium sweet potatoes (diced into ½-inch cubes)
- 2 medium potatoes (yellow or red, diced into ½-inch cubes)
- 1 large carrot (sliced into thin rounds)
- 1 large green bell pepper(diced)
- 2 cups green beans (chopped)
- 1½ cups vegetable stock (or water)
- 14 oz chickpeas (canned or cooked from scratch. Drain thoroughly before adding)
- 1½ TBS curry powder (or substitute with garam masala. It will produce a slightly different flavor but works just as well)
- 14 oz coconut milk (one can, stirred)
- 3 scallions (green & white parts chopped, optional)
- 2 TBS lemon juice
- 2 TBS cilantro (chopped, for garnish)
- Salt to taste

Instructions

- 1. Heat the oil. Add the onions followed by the cardamom pods and saute over medium heat until the onions start to sweat and turn translucent
- 2. Add the turmeric, cayenne and ginger garlic paste and stir-fry for 30 seconds
- 3. Add the sweet potatoes, potatoes, and carrots. Season with some salt and cover the pan. Turn the heat to low and let the vegetables cook about five minutes. If the veggies start to stick, add some water
- 4. Add the green beans and green peppers and ½ cup of water or vegetable stock. Cover again and cook five more minutes.
- 5. Check to see if the potatoes and sweet potatoes are cooked and fork-tender. If they are not, continue to cook, covered, for a few more minutes. Stir in the chickpeas, curry powder and another cup of vegetable stock. Bring the mixture to a boil. Add the coconut milk and scallions, if using, and just let the curry heat through.

Stir in the lemon and cilantro and add more salt if needed. Serve hot.

Cloverdale Library Community Connection John Koetzner, Children's Services Librarian

Recently, Sonoma County Library Director Erika Thibault dropped by the Cloverdale Regional Library to spread good news about all the great things going on with Sonoma County Library and to talk with patrons in Cloverdale.

She told the audience that over 2.6 million items circulated at Sonoma County Library in this past year and that over 1.4 million items were downloaded or borrowed electronically. She noted that there was a great new er Brooke Green, Sonoma County electronic resource called Alexander Street that includes

filmed productions of stage plays, dance performances and more. She shared one of her favorite platforms, Kanopy, that includes foreign films, vintage American films, documentaries, and short subject films.

Following her discussion of some resources, she spoke of some of the improvements that have happened at Cloverdale Library. The Measure Y monies helped replace the old doors on the library with the new sliding automatic doors, and brought us the study pod for private conversations or study. She also mentioned that there was the upcoming patio project that would include a small staging area for music performances and other events. She said, "Other things that are on the horizon include a Bibliobox, which will allow patrons to check out materials 24/7 when they place a hold. Besides those changes," she said, "the library will be moving to a more flexible platform for computers by adding a laptop kiosk that will allow patrons to sit at a table or in a soft chair to use a computer instead of the current format of a bank of computers."

Not afraid to roll up her sleeves, Thibault has even attended community events with the new Bibliobus. When asked about plans for visiting Cloverdale in the future, she said, "I plan to visit all the branches more in 2024."
