

Rain, rain, go to Spain! Mind you don't come back again. In this weather we don't like to be outside and neither do our dogs. This lack of exercise can lead to overgrown toenails. Some dogs




keep their own nails worn down from walking and playing outside on hard surfaces, while others have nails that grow very long despite exercise. In any case, it is very important to check your dog's nails at least once a month for signs of overgrowth. The nail on the dewclaw -- what would be a thumb on a person -- is especially important because it does not touch the ground. This nail can easily be overlooked. If your dog tolerates it you can do your own nail trimming at home. Be sure to use a scissors-style clipper made especially for dogs. You can use the cat one on a very small dog like a Chihuahua. Be careful to only trim away dead nail tissue and not the "quick" or live tissue inside the nail. If you are unsure you can have this done at your veterinarian's office or groomer.

How to Navigate Difficult Energies Nora Archambeau, M.A.


When beginning a new year (Chinese New Year is February 10), I take time to reflect on how I can better navigate difficult situations that arise. This might be a surly store attendant, a brash colleague, or an unexpected expense. Assessing the situation before taking any action is important rather than quickly judging it and possibly being reactive instead of responsive. There is a difference. Reactivity usually comes from the ego, which can sometimes be quite unhelpful, and can worsen the circumstances. Responsiveness gives space to an incident by allowing us time to act and come from a place of understanding, compassion, and awareness.

What are some of the "how to cope with life" tools in my tool chest that can be applied? Here are a few to consider in the moment:

- 1. **Humor**: Can making light of the moment relieve any tension?
- 2. **Detachment**: By remaining neutral, will this help dissipate the tenseness, in myself or in the other?
- 3. **Redirection**: This is a number one technique I utilize working in health and education that often channels a challenging situation into a softer, more effective result.
- 4. **Let it Go**: Easier said than done! But it works when forgiving the other's misstep and/or allowing my own sensitivity to remain intact.
- 5. **Practice Silence**: Is it necessary to say anything at all? Pause. See what other options present themselves for a peaceful resolution. Sometimes being a silent witness or compassionate listener is all that is required of us. Doing so just may ripple outwards that spreads Peace.

Here are other useful tools that I have developed over time with regular practice and patience: Stacked Breathing Meditation; Intentional Yoga; exercise; watching spiritually based Tarot, Astrology, and Angel Card video readings; creating a mantra (a word, a quote, a song) that helps recenter myself; and analyzing my dreams regularly offers insight on how to navigate difficult energies.

Luggage Smarts When Traveling Craig Clark

Always track your bags

Apple's AirTag, introduced in early 2021, is the most popular system used by travelers to track luggage. It is also the easiest to use. An AirTag doesn't require a subscription and uses Bluetooth technology.

How to avoid losing your luggage

Buy sturdy and colorful bag tags.

Mark it up. Use tape, strings, spray paint — anything that'll make your bag stand out.

Make sure it's going to the right place. Those three-letter airport codes can be counterintuitive, so if you don't recognize the one on your tag, ask the ticket agent.

Take a picture. Use your cell phone camera to take a photo of your bag before you check it in. It'll be easier to track down when you can show an airline or train employee a picture of the missing item.

Keep a packing list. If you lose your luggage, you'll know what's missing.

What to do when an airline loses your luggage

Look around. If you're at a luggage carousel or at a train station, have a look around. Sometimes, luggage arrives early. Airlines will place it next to the carousel or in a holding area.

File a claim. The sooner you let the airline, rail operator, cruise line, or hotel know of your loss, the sooner they can find it. Get something in writing that documents your loss. If necessary, call the police and fill out a report.

Ask for an allowance. You should be able to get a stipend to buy toiletries and clothes while they look for your belongings. Be patient. It can take weeks, and sometimes months, to recover lost luggage.

The last Christmas gift I gave my mom was to promise her that since she was the first one to hold me in her arms when I was born, that I would be holding her when she passed. I cannot describe the smile, but she said, "that is all I want."

January 11th at 11:58AM that is exactly what happened. One of the advantages of being the sole surviving member of my family is that there is no one's approval I seek on how I

choose to write her obituary.

Jude Latchford made it to 80, when she had always said that was her goal. She would tell you she had a wonderful life, a daughter she loved, a husband she was ready to unite with, missing him terribly since his passing in 2011. For every single Cloverdale resident whose life she connected with, I want to say a HUGE Thank You. Thank you for always making her feel a part of this amazing community and thank you for keeping a part of her alive in you with whatever memories you shared. My mom's favorite word was "hope" and may the seeds she planted here continue to take root and that all who knew her help to keep hope alive by feeding it, passing it on to others and reminding others that anything is possible if only we believe.

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February Gardening Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardeners Sponsored by Sanz Nursery

- To protect frost-tender plants such as Citrus, Bougainvillea, Hibiscus, and Tibouchina, use an anti-desiccant spray such as Cloud Cover or a spun fabric floating row cover when frost is actually predicted. Covering plants with sheets or lightweight blankets or burlap is another option. If you use plastic sheeting, do not allow plastic to contact foliage. A strand of Christmas lights in a tree is often enough to protect a plant.
- Clear vegetation as soon as possible. It is important not to clear brush and trees during bird nesting season March 1st to August 31st to protect our bird populations.
- Finish pruning roses. A general practice in Sonoma County is to have them pruned by Valentine's Day.
- You can plant bare root trees and shrubs that are now available at nurseries.
- Snails may begin making their presence known, either directly or by holes they eat in leaves. Removing by hand is an effective control method, but it takes dedication to go out in very early morning or after dark armed with a flashlight to catch as many as possible. The more you control snails before they lay eggs, the fewer there will be later.
- Clean and sharpen garden tools using a rasp or stone.
 Sharp pruners are easier on both plants and your joints.
 Storing hand tools year-round in a 5-gallon bucket of sand with some vegetable oil mixed in helps keep them sharp.
 Every time you push them into the sand, the tools will get an effortless cleaning and lubricating. Motor oil isn't recommended, as it's harsh on hands and difficult to dispose of properly.
- February is a good time for washing out old pots and trays.
 You can put clay pots in the dishwasher after first rinsing off dirt and debris. The dishwasher will sterilize them and they'll be ready for spring planting. Rub pots with linseed oil after cleaning to make them more attractive.







Update on City of Cloverdale's Budget Process- Revenue Sources

As the City Council and City staff embark on preparation of the City's budget in early 2024, it is helpful to understand the revenue sources including funds that support the City's programs, project and activities. Here is an overview of two key sources of revenue that contribute to the City's General Fund and support City activities:

- Property Taxes and
- Sales Taxes.

Overview of General Fund Revenue:

The general fund is a key component of a government's overall budget and finances. The general fund is flexible and covers a wide range of government activities, including public safety (Police & Dispatch) and a host of administrative functions such as Finance, Risk, Information Technology, Public Works, and Planning. The allocation of general fund revenue is determined through the City's two-year budgeting process, where priorities and spending decisions are made to meet the community's needs while maintaining fiscal responsibility.

Property Taxes

Property taxes constitute the largest share of the City's revenue stream, serving as a cornerstone for funding essential services. These taxes are levied on real estate properties within Cloverdale and play a pivotal role in shaping the budget. It's crucial to understand how property taxes are assessed, collected, and allocated to various City functions in order to provide residents with a comprehensive picture of how this revenue source impacts their community.

Assessment Process:

Annual Assessment: Property taxes in California are primarily ad valorem, meaning they are based on the assessed value of real estate. The county assessor evaluates property values annually. Proposition 13, a landmark property tax initiative passed in 1978, limits the annual increase of assessed values to 2% or the inflation rate, whichever is lower. This ensures property owners have predictability in their tax obligations.

Tax Rate Calculation:

The base property tax rate in California is 1% of the assessed value. This rate is applied to the assessed value determined by the county assessor. Local jurisdictions, including cities, school districts and special districts, may propose additional assessments, known as voter-approved indebtedness or bonds. When approved, these assessments contribute to the overall property tax rate.

Distribution of Revenue:

Property tax revenue is distributed to the City by the Sonoma County Auditor-Controller which is a position elected by the county voters. A significant portion (approximately 75-79%) of your property taxes are not distributed to the city but rather go to the county (~39%), schools (~33%), and special districts (Fire District 4% and Library 2%). A substantial portion of property tax revenue supports K-12 education, following the implementation of Proposition 98, which guarantees a minimum level of funding for schools. The remainder, approximately 21% of total property tax revenue, is distributed to the City. In the City's current budget, the City is forecast to receive approximately \$2.95 million in property tax revenue which constitutes nearly 52% of the anticipated general fund revenues.

Sales Tax

Sales taxes, another key contributor of approximately 20% of all General Fund revenue, are derived from sales transactions within the City. Understanding the dynamics of sales tax collection, rates, and distribution can offer insights into the economic vitality of Cloverdale. Of the total sales tax percentage (8.5%) paid In the City of Cloverdale, one percent (1.0%) is returned to the City.

A handful of businesses stand out as major contributors to the City's sales tax revenue, collectively forming the backbone of economic sustenance. The following top 25 sales tax generators play a crucial role, accounting for nearly 80% (\$792,398) of the City's total sales tax revenue:

The revenue generated by the City's top 25 contributors plays a pivotal role in funding critical City services, infrastructure development, and community initiatives. Understanding the concentration of sales tax revenue among these businesses empowers residents to appreciate the interconnectedness between their local commerce and the financial health of Cloverdale. Businesses including service stations, restaurants, and grocery stores contribute significantly to the City's total sales tax revenue of approximately \$1.1 Million annually. Sales taxes collected at service stations alone contribute nearly 32% of the City's sales tax revenue while restaurants contribute approximately 15% and food stores 8%.

When at all possible, **Shop Locally!** The community's continued support for local businesses ensures the sustained growth and prosperity of Cloverdale, creating a symbiotic relationship between our business community and community welfare.

Addressing the Financial Challenge: Meeting the Growing Needs of Cloverdale

While property and sales taxes serve as significant revenue sources for Cloverdale, they are facing challenges in keeping up with the escalating costs essential for sustaining existing services and initiating new projects. The demands on the City's resources have outpaced the growth in these revenue streams, necessitating a comprehensive review of funding options to meet the evolving needs of the community.

Revenue Challenges:

Existing revenue, primarily generated through property and sales taxes, has reached a plateau, falling short of meeting the rising costs associated with maintaining and enhancing essential services. The financial strain has become evident in the City's struggle to fund existing programs and address critical projects that are vital for the well-being of Cloverdale.

Exploring New Avenues:

Recognizing the imperative for additional resources, the City Council is actively exploring opportunities for a local tax measure in 2024. The decision to seek additional revenue is rooted in the commitment to ensuring the sustained growth and prosperity of Cloverdale. Recent polling indicates community support for increasing revenue through either a sales tax measure or a parcel assessment.

Community Support and Decision-Making Process:

While no final decisions have been made regarding the introduction of a revenue measure, the City Council is set to receive a presentation from staff in the coming months. This presentation will shed light on the potential components of such a measure, outlining the services and projects that could benefit from the additional revenue. The decision to place a revenue measure on the ballot will ultimately rest on the needs of the community and the potential positive impact such a measure can have on Cloverdale's future.

Several Sonoma County cities have already taken proactive steps by enacting local revenue measures to fund special programs and projects. Cloverdale aims to draw inspiration from these successful initiatives, considering the diverse ways in which additional funding can be channeled to address critical community needs.



Success Of 1924 Citrus Fair Beyond Expectations

One hundred years ago, the front page of the Feb. 22 issue of the Reveille featured a poem written by someone named Dale in anticipation of the 1924 Citrus Fair.

"It's bigger yes, and better than it ever was before, though we've had some famous Citrus Fairs in good old days of yore.

"But we've kept on growing, climbing since we made our youthful bow, and the folks who saw us as a kid would scarcely know us now.

'This Miss Cloverdale who greets you is the same sweet maiden rare, but she's grown so tall and stately that the sun's gold glints her hair.

"And she bids you hearty welcome to the Fair of Twenty-Four that is bigger, brighter, better than she ever gave before.

"Oh you golden Orange City of achievement and of fame! You are always up and coming, and you always play the game.

"So the folks have come to greet you and to see the sunshine glow, on the fields and on the orchards where the orange blossoms grow.

"Here the world is full of glory, here the rose and jasmine twine, here are joy and health and gladness, here the climate is divine.

"Here you needn't sigh for Beulah Land or any golden trail, for you're near enough to Heaven when you get to Cloverdale."

Thousands of people attended that year's event, with organizers deeming its success beyond expectations.

Organizers credited the cooperation of everyone in Cloverdale with keeping expenses down. Exhibitors built their own designs, local talent furnished the programs, and neighboring towns and communities loyally helped, as well.

Profits were in excess of \$3,000 – the equivalent of about \$55,560 in today's dollars – which was enough to finish paying for City Park. There was even talk of adding a pavilion and more improvements.

Affair Of The Heart And The Gut Anne Hillow, Alexander Valley Healthcare

I'm ambivalent about the big Valentine's Day month. Stores irradiate pink and red hearts, tone deaf to how one might feel. To us in the U.S, Valentine's Day traditionally celebrates romantic love and the traditional symbols abound. But is the heart, the storied seat of emotions, really the Queen of them? In fact, our emotions, whether it be "affaires de couer", or exasperation, are experienced in our hearts AND our aut.

A vital connection exists between these organs. Bessel Van der Kolk, in his book "The Body Keeps the Score", writes: "Intense emotions involve not only the mind but also the gut and the heart." Quoting Darwin: "Heart, guts and brain communicate intimately via the 'pneumogastric' nerve, the critical nerve involved in the expression and management of emotions in both humans and animals. When the mind is strongly excited, it instantly affects the state of the viscera so that under excitement there will be much mutual action and reaction between these, the two most important organs of the body."

Back to Van der Kolk: "...of course, we experience our most devastating emotions as gut-wrenching feelings and heart-break...But feeling as if our chest is caving in or we've been punched in the gut is unbearable. We'll do anything to make these awful visceral sensations go away, whether clinging desperately to another human being, rendering ourselves insensible with drugs or alcohol, or..." binge shopping, or binge eating. We've all been there. This is how powerfully our gut is involved in processing our emotions.

So a gut-wrenching experience really is just that: your viscera working in concert with your brain and your heart experiencing emotion alongside them. The next time you have a gut feeling, you'll know it's not just a figure of speech. The takeaway: Gut awareness and gut health are just as important as its co-Queen of emotions, the heart. Keep them both healthy with regular preventive care, good nutrition and physical activity.

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Now It Is Our Turn ~ Elissa Morrash, Cloverdale Historical Society

The founding of the Cloverdale Historical Society, the preservation of the Gould-Shaw House c 1862, the building of the History Center in 2009 and the preservation of the Mae Gibson Foster Garden are important moments in Cloverdale's recent history. We have many people to thank for bringing us to where we are today. In the Research Library on the second floor of the History Center, there are housed the original minutes of the July 15, 1968, meeting whose purpose was to form the Cloverdale Historical Society. The minutes are in an unassuming black binder, typed on a ribbon typewriter. It was decided that the name of the organization would be Cloverdale Historical Society. Campbell, Kathleen Domenichelli, Mike Shumway, Ruby Wilson, and Bill Wilson. Without these individuals and many more since then, there would be no historical society, no museum, and no historic garden in downtown Cloverdale, and it is likely that the city's heritage and story would be lost forever.

City Council Report Eleanore Webster

City Council members, who met Jan. 10, 2024, considered a Rotary request for naming rights to the new dog park. Rotarians feel this sponsorship would be a win-win arrangement that would help the City maintain the park. The grand opening is scheduled for January 27 (10:00 AM to Noon). The park has already proven to be popular with both dogs and humans; cats - not so much.

The Student Liaison then reported that seasonal events were held in several schools in December.

New Business primarily focused on the procedure for Council's consideration of proclamations, official announcements issued by City Council to recognize residents or organizations or special efforts. There is a set list of proclamations that are considered annually and presented by City staff to Council. These are reviewed first by a sub-committee and sent to Council as a block. There are also individual proclamations that are presented for consideration. Most proclamations are written by City Manager and some are received from national organizations for presentation. The City Manager asked Council to consider approving a procedure with an application form and guidelines. Individual proclamation requests will now go to the Mayor and Vice Mayor for review prior to being presented to the Council. Council members felt it is important that each proclamation reflect Council and City values, and that the focus be local and not international. The City Manager reviewed the process, including the ability of a Council Member to request a proclamation be brought forward through the agenda for discussion and public consideration. If a member of the public wants to have a proclamation presented, they can complete the application and better understand the parameters.

The Council then set sub-committee and board appointments. Sub-committee appointments for 2024 are:

- Finance/Adm/Police: Mayor Lands (chair) and Member Wolter
- Planning and Sustainability: Member Bagby (chair) and Member Wheeler
- Public Works and Facilities: Member Wheeler (chair) and Member Wolter
- Joint City and School District: Mayor Lands (chair) and Member Morgenstern
- Homelessness Committee: Member Morgenstern (chair) and Member Wheeler

Members also accepted appointments to various regional Boards such as SMART, Sonoma Clean Power and the Cloverdale Chamber of Commerce.

Once all the conditions of the contract have been met, escrow "closes" and "records," the seller gets paid, and the buyer takes possession of the property.

Escrow can be any length of time. Some are as short as 10 days, some 45 days or longer. Both the buyer's and seller's real estate agents will advise of the right length for your specific transaction.

Cloverdale Citrus Fair Wine Competition



Founded in 1983 as the Cloverdale Citrus Fair Wine Competition, this event has evolved over the years, broadening its base to a greater number of wine regions. The competition rapidly grew in the 1990s to over 100 wineries. Eligibility was gradually increased to include all wineries in Sonoma, Mendocino and Lake Counties. Consequently, it was renamed the Tri-County Wine Competition from 1996–99. The competition expanded to the entire North Coast Appellation in 2000 as the California North Coast Wine Competition. This area included all wineries in the counties of Sonoma, Napa, Mendocino, Lake, Solano, and Marin. During this period of time, wineries and wine entries exploded and the Cloverdale Citrus Fair was now the dominant wine competition in Northern California, dwarfing even the prestigious Sonoma County Harvest Fair Wine Competition. Major problems arose with the Cloverdale Citrus Fair Wine Competition as the competition outgrew the public tasting at the local regional fair during the Presidents Day Weekend in Cloverdale. Bob Fraser, the organizer of the wine competition, met with Dennis Banks, Advertising Executive of the San Francisco Chronicle and a seed was born for future collaboration of the Citrus Fair and the Chronicle and to bring the wine competition tasting "out of the country to the city" (San Francisco). The professional wine judging at the Cloverdale Citrus Fair is not open to the public.

In 2000, the Cloverdale Citrus Fair entered into a title naming sponsorship agreement with the San Francisco Chronicle for the wine competition. The wine competition was renamed the San Francisco Chronicle Wine Competition with the award tasting of the medal-winning wines to take place in San Francisco. The San Francisco Chronicle Wine Competition (SFCWC) is the largest competition of North American wines.

The Public Tasting at Fort Mason Center in San Francisco is available for all wineries participating in the competition. It gives the wineries an opportunity to showcase their wines to over 5,000 consumers of the Bay Area. Any grape or fruit grown in the United States on a bonded premises is eligible for entry.

The San Francisco Chronicle Wine Competition Public Tasting will be at Festival Pavilion, Fort Mason Center, San Francisco, February 17, 2024, 1:30-4:30 PM. All gold and above winning wines will be recognized in the San Francisco Chronicle Wine Competition Awards Special Section Publication. \$80 Advance tickets are available through midnight February 16, 2024. Regular tickets for \$100 are available or at the door through February 17, 2024.

A Life Underground Michele Armanino



Christel Longo's fascination with crystals began at a young age. Longo's French-born parents, who settled in Alabama, regularly took her and her brother to campsites around the south. The youngsters were avid fossil diggers and marveled at the variety of specimens discovered from region to region. Christel recalled how thrilling it was to venture down into the deep, dark Tennessee caves. "Our guide would flick on the lights and suddenly

there would be this burst of color. The structure and beauty of the stalagmites and crystals were breathtaking. There are so many wonders under the ground that we never see!"

Christel, a Cloverdale resident and teacher by trade, reevaluated her life after the death of her parents. "I thought, 'What is it that I really want to do?''' she mused. Inspired by her life-long love of crystals, Longo began forming her business, Crystabelle Fine Minerals, by collecting crystals from reputable dealers in Peru. "I have personal relationships with the families and the miners." she states. Following the success of her Etsy store, she bought the building at 119 S. Cloverdale Blvd and set up a spectacular showroom. All of her showcase pieces are unique with crystals from Brazil, Africa, India, Madagascar and more. The biggest crystal in the store is a 145 pound Pyrite while the smallest is a gemstone under a carat.

Half of Longo's customers are mineral collectors while the other half are into the healing, metaphysical part of crystals. The store offers literature explaining the force, mysteries and healing power of crystals. "My shop is also an educational platform for students learning all about minerals and the earth. For example, Native Americans in the Sonoma County region believe in the healing power of Obsidian." she states. Longo explains that minerals in the store are grouped by the continents for a better understanding of the earth.

Crystabelle Fine Minerals offers beauty, education and health to its clientele. A presentation and yoga experience using crystals will take place this summer on the patio at 119 S. Cloverdale Blvd.

Cooking with David Maciel

I've traveled to Hong Kong & many provinces in China and have always enjoyed the spices & sauces used in many Chinese recipes. This sesame sticky chicken combines sweet & heat - it's easy to make. Gung Hai Fat Choi

Crispy Sesame Chicken with a Sticky Asian Sauce **Ingredients**

- 5 TBS vegetable oil
- 2 eggs lightly beaten
- 3 TBS cornstarch
- 10 TBS plain (all-purpose) flour
- ½ tsp salt
- ½ tsp pepper
- ½ tsp garlic salt
- 2 tsp paprika
- 3 chicken breast fillets chopped into bite-size chunks

Sauce


- 1 TBS sesame oil optional you can leave out and sprinkle with sesame seeds at the end if you prefer
- 2 cloves garlic peeled and minced
- 1 TBS Chinese rice vinegar white wine vinegar will work too
- 2 TBS honey
- 2 TBS sweet chilli sauce use more or less depending on the brand and how spicy you like it
- 3 TBS ketchup
- 2 TBS brown sugar
- 4 TBS soy sauce
- 2 tbsp sesame seeds
- Small bunch spring onions/scallions- chopped

Heat the oil in a wok or large frying pan until very hot. While the oil is heating, place the egg in one shallow bowl and the cornstarch in another shallow bowl. Add the flour, salt, pepper, garlic salt and paprika to another shallow bowl and mix together.

Dredge the chicken in the cornstarch, then dip in the egg (make sure all of the chicken is covered in egg wash), and finally dredge it in the seasoned flour. Add to the wok and cook on a high heat for 6-7 minutes, turning two or three times, until well browned. Remove from the pan and place in a bowl lined with paper towel

Add all of the sauce ingredients to the hot wok, stir and bubble on a high heat until the sauce reduces by about a third (should take 2-3 minutes). Add the chicken back in and toss in the sauce to coat. Cook for 1-2 minutes.

Serve with hot white rice or chow mein noodles

The State of Ad Blockers in 2024

Perhaps you have recently seen this message when trying to watch a YouTube video: "Ad blockers violate YouTube's Terms of Service", followed by a request to disable your ad blocker to watch the video. I know this has been a common issue among my customers and it's time to share the facts of, and how I use, ad blockers.

What is an "Ad Blocker"? Simply put, it is a tool you can install in your web browser which prevents advertisements from loading on the sites you visit. These tools have been popular for many years, as they make web browsing more pleasant. However, they come with a cost: Whether you mean to or not, you might be stealing the content you enjoy.

Almost every website and service on the internet is, to some degree, supported financially by advertisements. When you use an ad blocker, you might be preventing a writer, editor, or entire business from earning the money they expect for their product. It wouldn't be fair to expect Cloverdale **Connect** to release a monthly issue without the support of advertisers; The same is true for artists, documentarians, authors, news reporters, and any other content creators online.

So, what do I do? I have an ad blocker installed and running on all my computers. However, I manually disable it on any site which is local, a small business, or provides me value enough to endure a couple of ads! I have also chosen to pay for some sites, like YouTube, which offer ad-free browsing experiences for a monthly subscription. This allows me to run Google searches without distracting ads, support most sites I visit by allowing ads, while guaranteeing the best possible experience on my favorite sites I find worth paying for, like YouTube.

Everyone needs to make their own choice when it comes to ad blockers, but please keep the people who create websites and content in mind when choosing to block ads!
