Fueled by Passion

For as long as Logan Tate can remember, he has been interested in the inner workings of cars. From the moment he could walk, Logan followed his father, a Master Technician, around the garage. He enjoyed handing his dad tools and learning how different cars functioned and operated. At the age of five, Logan's parents, Jeff and Christina Tate, became co-owners of their NAPA Auto Care center, Cloverdale Automotive & Tires.

"Logan would wake his dad up at 6 a.m. every day and say, 'Get up, we're going to be late for work," Christina said. "Off to work they'd go, and from there I would pick him up from the shop and take him to kindergarten."

Logan helped at the shop by cleaning and moving tires. He was happy to help, no matter what task was asked of him. As he got older, Logan applied the diligence he learned from running around the shop to other parts of his life. As a 10-year-old, he did yard work for his neighbors, and by age 12 he was enthusiastically fixing his neighbors' lawnmowers and weed-wackers. Although Logan had already predetermined his career path – to become an automotive technician – he pushed himself to excel academically in high school, per his parents' request. "We insisted he take advanced high school classes and maintain at least a 3.5 GPA. Just in case he changed his mind about trade school, we wanted him to have options for college," Christina said.

Logan's grades and success in high school helped him get into the Wyoming Technical Institute (WyoTech), a private technical college in Laramie, Wyoming, where he maintained a 4.0 GPA and received an Associate Degree in business management specializing in automotive repair. Logan's hard work paid off, as he was recently distinguished as the NAPA/ASE Technician of the Year.

After college, Logan's parents encouraged him to work in other areas of the automotive industry for five years before joining the family auto shop. Eager to start, Logan applied to multiple dealerships and accepted a job at W.C. Sanderson Ford in Healdsburg. Just like in every other aspect of his life, Logan maintained his strong work ethic, and his new employer noticed. "Not only did he become Ford Certified, but he also took the initiative to become an ASE Master Tech and Advanced Engine Performance Specialist - and went on to earn his Smog Inspection License and Smog Repair License," Christina said. After putting in five years with Ford, Logan was eagerly welcomed as the youngest technician at Cloverdale Automotive and Tires in 2019.

Wildlife Habitat Garden

The National Wildlife Federation (NWF), America's largest wildlife conservation and education organization, is pleased that **Michael Princevalle** and **Nancy Lloyd** in Cloverdale, CA have successfully created a Certified Wildlife Habitat® through its Garden for WildlifeTM movement.



Every Certified Wildlife Habitat garden provides natural sources of food, water, cover and places to raise young and is maintained in a sustainable way that incorporates native plants, conserves water and doesn't rely on pesticides.

Quoting from Michael and Nancy:

"We enjoy watching wildlife, wanting to add more native California plants to promote biodiversity of birds, reptiles, mammals, and beneficial insects. Our small property has invited impressive wildlife watching opportunities. Many migrating birds visit us for native berries, local seeds, and water. Eliminating harsh garden chemicals, while reducing irrigation water usage, helps us to be greener, too. California native plants are well adapted to our long, dry summers."

"We provide ground-level water trays and birdbath height water fed by scheduled irrigation drippers for birds to drink daily. There is plenty of cover for birds in the native oak trees and toyon bushes on the property, and places to hide and raise young. We also trim dried plants seasonally and mulch them to stay on the property, which improves soil health. We have year-round quail visiting and have been lucky enough to attract other nesting birds. Check out this Youtube video of migrating robins feeding voraciously on our native toyon berries. We had many days this winter watching such feeding frenzies right outside our windows."

April Gardening Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardeners Sponsored by Sanz Nursery

- As rain tapers off, check your irrigation system for cracks, leaks and clogs. Dirty filters can wreak havoc, especially if you are on a well. Clean out filters and replace as needed.
- Flush out drip systems and make sure all emitters are working. Replace batteries on systems that use batteryoperated controllers. Ensure that timers are working. Do this now before it gets really hot and dry and plants need water immediately.
- Monitor soil moisture in planted areas so you know when to begin irrigating. Soil may dry out an inch or so on the surface but still retain ample moisture under mulch in the root zone around well-established plants. Hand water new plants as needed.
- Continue to lightly fertilize perennials that are emerging from winter dormancy.
- Aphids will flourish on tender new growth in warm weather;
 use insecticidal soap or spray with water from the garden hose as necessary. Wash off spittle bugs.
- The ground is soft enough to make weed pulling easy stay ahead of it and you will have fewer weeds going to seed.
- Fertilize or amend soil around azaleas and rhododendrons with acidic material or acid fertilizer. Work carefully to avoid damaging shallow roots; add mulch.
- Sow hardy annuals in pots or directly in the garden.
- Plant summer bulbs and rhizomes.
- If you still have a lawn, apply another half-dose of organic fertilizer now. It is possible to have a beautiful, healthy lawn and lower your water use without reliance on chemical fertilizers and insecticides. Most inorganic products contain a form of nitrogen that easily washes away and enters ground water and waterways.
- April is a busy time for finishing debris clean-up from late winter and early spring and for cutting back coldsensitive, summer-blooming perennials, such as salvia, nepeta and penstemon. Leave fading foliage of spring bulbs and let them whither; they provide nutrients for next year's blooms.
- The last frost date in Sonoma County is April 15 although there still may be very cold nights ahead.





County Authorizes Development of Advanced Composting Facility

The Sonoma County Board of Supervisors has authorized engineering and environmental planning for the first centralized composting facility in the county, expected to divert and process approximately 65,000 tons of organic material each year. The initiative moves the county toward carbon-neutral operations by 2030 and is supported by grant funding.

Since 2016, organic materials collected in Sonoma County, including weekly pick-up of residential curbside green bins and commercial food scraps, have been transported to facilities outside our county. The proposed composting facility, located at the former county landfill site adjacent to Charles M. Schulz – Sonoma County Airport, will implement sustainable design to minimize greenhouse gas emissions, integrating solar and other renewable technologies, energy recovery systems and green building materials.

A collaborative effort between the County and Zero Waste Sonoma, initial project planning is assigned to SCS Engineers in Windsor. The public project, coordinated by the Department of Public Infrastructure's Integrated Waste Division and Permit Sonoma's Natural Resources Division, in collaboration with Zero Waste Sonoma, represents a significant step towards local waste management and environmental resilience.

Sonoma County Opens Chipper Program

Sonoma County's free Residential Curbside Chipper Program is launching early this year in an effort to reduce residential wait times, expand service, and mitigate the risk of wildfires.

The Chipper Program, administered by the Permit Sonoma Fire Prevention Division, is designed to help residents create defensible space around their homes and reduce vegetation along important access routes. Once approved, properties in unincorporated Sonoma County are eligible to receive up to two hours of complimentary chipping and are eligible to receive a second visit as well. Visits are scheduled on a firstcome, first-served basis.

"By reducing vegetation and creating defensible space around structures, property owners play an active role in helping their communities stay safe," said Supervisor David Rabbitt, chair of the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors. "Don't wait to take advantage of this free county program."

In addition to home hardening, having 100 feet or more of defensible space has been demonstrated to help save homes in the event of a wildfire. Likewise, thinning vegetation on access roads can provide safer and more efficient access for residents and firefighters.

In 2023, the program served more than 800 properties, including homes from Cloverdale to Sonoma and Kenwood to Jenner. Those interested in participating are encouraged to apply as soon as possible and begin preparing their homes by following program guidelines.


New Partnership to Offer Lake Sonoma **Hatchery School Tours**



Youth and Seniors Ride Free on SMART


Beginning April 1, 2024, youth ages 18 and under, and seniors ages 65 and older, will enjoy fare-free rides on SMART. The SMART Board of Directors has approved this new fare structure as a pilot program, effective until June 30, 2025, with the primary goal of increasing ridership among these age groups.

Train conductors will continue to check passenger fares; youth and seniors may be requested to provide proof of age, such as a state ID, driver's license, or student ID. Youth and seniors will not be required to have a Clipper card or use the SMART e-ticket App. However, if a youth or senior passenger tags on with a Clipper Card, they will be charged a zero fare (\$0) when boarding a SMART train.

This pilot program aims to boost ridership among youth and seniors, and to contribute to environmental sustainability by encouraging the use of public transit—enhancing mobility options and promoting eco-friendly transportation choices for both younger and older demographics.


Washington School Wins Shauna Ferdinandson

Here is an update on the recent primary elections held on Tuesday, March 5, 2024, plus valuable information regarding the November 5, 2024, General Municipal Election often referred to as the Presidential Election, as well as crucial details for those interested in running for a seat on the Cloverdale City Council.

Primary Elections Recap:

The primary elections held on March 5th earlier this month marked a pivotal moment in our community's democratic process. Voters turned out to cast their ballots and voice their preferences for candidates vying for positions of leadership in the State Assembly as well as Measure H, which would approve a sales tax for local emergency services and disaster response.


The primary elections are essential as they narrow down the field of candidates, allowing the top contenders to advance to the General Municipal Election in November. The City of Cloverdale is situated within the 2nd District of the State Assembly. The top two leading candidates for State Assembly will face a runoff in the November 5 General Elections. At the time of writing this article, Measure H appears to have garnered over 60% approval on its way to becoming enacted. Measure H is expected to enable the Cloverdale Fire Department to hire additional full time firefighters and much needed emergency equipment.

Preparations for November 5, 2024, General Municipal Election:

There are two seats on the Cloverdale City Council that will open for election on the November 5 Election. In addition, Cloverdale will be considering whether to place various ballot measures before registered voters in the city including whether to update the City's Urban Growth Boundary and a potential revenue measure.

Interested in Running for Council?

If you're considering a run for the Cloverdale City Council, now is the time to take action. To become qualified candidate, must adhere you specific guidelines and timelines. The Nomination Period is a critical window during which prospective candidates must fulfill necessary requirements to ensure their eligibility.

Qualification/Nomination Process

In order to be elected into public office, all interested

candidates must become a Qualified Candidate (including write-in candidates). In order to become qualified, eligible candidates must make an appointment with the Elections Official during the Nomination Period. At this meeting, potential candidates will review the virtual Candidate's Guide and the mandatory nomination forms / papers which must be filed prior to the end of the nomination period.

Nomination Period (2024)

July 15, 2024 at 8 a.m. through August 9, 2024 at 5 p.m.

Cloverdale City Clerk Mike Maloney serves as the City's Election Official, and is responsible for managing this essential aspect of the electoral process:

- Establishing Procedures: The City Clerk, in collaboration with the Sonoma County Registrar of Voters and in accordance with state and local laws, establishes procedures and guidelines for the qualification and nomination of candidates. These procedures ensure transparency, fairness, and adherence to legal requirements throughout the process.
- 2. **Providing Information:** The City Clerk serves as a primary point

- of contact for prospective candidates, providing them with comprehensive information about eligibility requirements, nomination procedures, and key deadlines. This information is crucial for ensuring that candidates understand the steps they need to take to run for office.
- 3. Accepting Nomination Papers: During the designated nomination period, the City Clerk is responsible for accepting nomination papers from candidates seeking to run for local office. Nomination papers typically include forms and documents that demonstrate the candidate's eligibility and support for their candidacy, such as nomination petitions and statements of qualifications.
- 4. Reviewing Candidate Qualifications: Upon receiving nomination papers, the City Clerk carefully reviews the documents to ensure that candidates meet all eligibility requirements specified by law and municipal ordinances. This may include verifying the candidate's residency status, age, voter registration, and any other relevant criteria.
- 5. Certifying Qualified Candidates: Once the review process is complete and it is determined that a candidate meets all necessary qualifications, the City Clerk certifies them as a qualified candidate for the upcoming election. This certification signifies that the candidate has met the legal requirements to appear on the ballot.
- 6. Facilitating Ballot Placement: After certifying qualified candidates, the City Clerk coordinates with election officials to ensure that their names appear correctly on the ballot. This involves overseeing the printing and distribution of ballots and providing instructions to voters on how to cast their votes.
- 7. **Providing Public Notice:** Throughout the qualification and nomination process, the City Clerk is responsible for providing public notice of key dates, deadlines, and requirements related to candidate eligibility and the election itself. This ensures that residents are informed and have the opportunity to participate in the electoral process.

Our City Clerk plays a central role in upholding the integrity and efficiency of the qualification and nomination process for local elections. By administering procedures fairly and transparently, the City Clerk helps to ensure that candidates have equal opportunities to participate in the democratic process and that voters can make informed choices at the ballot box.

Stay Informed and Engaged:

Potential candidates should review the new digital Candidate Guide prepared by the City Clerk, available at www.cloverdale. net/24candidateguide, or simply scan the QR Code. This comprehensive guide outlines essential information, including eligibility criteria, nomination procedures, and key deadlines. Familiarizing yourself with these details is the first step towards a successful candidacy.

General Municipal Election Information:





Upgrading Your Desk Experience Will Carter

Every computer needs three basic additional devices, also known as peripherals, to work normally: a mouse, a keyboard, and a monitor. Some computers, like laptops and All-in-One desktops, have these devices built in. While these are the most common peripherals, you are likely familiar with some others - like webcams and printers. Upgrading or adding new accessories to your computer can help you be more productive and comfortable.

One of the best ways to improve your productivity is to increase the amount of information you can see. This can be achieved easily by adding a second screen or replacing your current monitor with a larger model. Having more screen area can allow you to keep multiple windows open comfortably - perfect for spreadsheets, visual art, and research projects! A larger monitor is also a common recommendation for my customers with deteriorating vision.

If you handle a lot of paper, especially for a business, a dedicated desktop scanner can make life much easier! At my own desk, I use a Fujitsu ScanSnap to record all documentation and paperwork I receive. These scanners outperform the larger scanners found on printers by accepting numerous pages of varied, even very small, sizes at once. These scanners usually also include utilities to automatically crop, rotate, and file scanned documents into your preferred folders.

Personally, my number one priority at my desk is comfort! The keyboard and mouse which came with your computer are perfectly adequate, however, it is possible to get peripherals which are much more ergonomic. There are also monitor mounts and stands to lift your screen to eye level, which eases strain on your neck, back, and eyes.

While none of these accessories are necessary for basic use of a computer, they can all help make your desk a more enjoyable place to work and relax. I've found that the above accessories have become necessities at my own desk, helping me to be more productive and stay as comfortable as possible.

The history of Rock & Roll runs deep into the very beginnings of the American culture. It seems as though every decade, broken into five-year segments, produced a change. The beginnings were named "Rockabilly" which included Elvis Presley, Johnny Cash, Roy Orbison, Jerry Lee Lewis, Charlie Rich and others who signed with Sun Records of Memphis. Cincinnati Disc Jockey Alan Freed coined the name "Rock and Roll" and used it effectively to describe and promote what was previously known as "Race Music" featuring African American artist heretofore segregated to airwaves of a limited number of radio stations, primarily south of the Mason-Dixon Line. There are many artists who benefited from the increased exposure, and with this fame came some degree of fortune, although some were not given the residuals that they deserved. Sometimes the bright lights of notoriety obscured their better sense of their futures.





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City Council Report Eleonore Webster

At the City Council Meeting on February 28th, the Community Development Director did a presentation encouraging artists to create work on utility boxes and murals in the City. This is part of a local public arts program to promote art and to enhance the local economy. City staff will develop an application process and guidelines to address questions such as stipends, review authority, and financial commitment. This was followed by promotional presentations for Cloverdale Police Officers Rickey Rhodes (new School Resource Officer); Katie Vanoni (promoted to Detective), and John Camara (promoted to Sergeant). A Letter of Support for RAISE was passed, supporting a collaborative grant request to obtain \$13.5 million to fund improvements including an Asti bridge over the Russian River, SMART path to Cloverdale and pedestrian improvements. Joanne Parker of SMART was recognized for her amazing efforts in collaboration and grant writing.

At the Council meeting on March 13th, members of the public expressed concerns about recreational vehicle parking prohibitions and the mobile home ordinance that is being developed. Proclamations were declared to recognize March as American Red Cross Month (present to receive recognition were Andy and Betsy Witthohn of the local Red Cross) and to recognize March as Women's History Month (present to receive recognition were members of the Sonoma County Commission on the Status of Women).

The Cloverdale Chamber of Commerce made a presentation on their accomplishments for the past fiscal year. The presentation highlighted how the City and the Chamber work together to market Cloverdale businesses and culture, and keep Cloverdale a wonderful place to live. The representatives then gave a sneak preview into their proposed scope of work for the Chamber in 2025/26, requesting \$83,000 from the City.

The Council adopted a resolution to sign a Letter of Intent by the Town of Windsor, indicating Cloverdale's support for a Regional Biosolids Facility. Council approved an agreement with West Yost & Assoc. to provide engineering services to design new water storage tanks to replace the existing Southcrest Reservoir. Grant and State funding was discussed, along with concern for the potential of water rate increases.







- Madame Preston's house north of town in Preston (burned in 1988 along with other buildings)
- Susan Bennett's cemetery tours at Halloween with her recounting of ghostly hauntings
- Ram sales at City Park
- First performance of the Old Time Fiddle contest in 1975, sponsored by the Historical Society
- Old grammar school and high school located where Kleiser Park is now, torn down in 1960
- Cloverdale High School boys' basketball team as State Champions in 1984



History Of Former Community Garden Property Mary Jo Winter

From 2009 to 2022 when the property was sold, Cloverdale's Community Garden was located on a long-vacant lot at 205 S. Cloverdale Blvd. just south of The Oaks Inn. The grounds were once occupied by a stately mansion and impressive garden owned by Charles Emile Humbert, one of the last leaders to have a hand in developing Cloverdale. He planted redwood trees on the grounds and surrounded his house with rare shrubs, trees, and plants, including many varieties of citrus and palms.

Born in 1864, the Illinois native grew up in Iowa, coming to Cloverdale in 1883 where he met and married the former Ida Louise Hoadley on New Year's Day in 1885. When he settled here for good in 1886, Cloverdale was just a hamlet with only a few hundred residents. Humbert had a varied career that included dry goods, real estate, mining, and insurance, as well as operating a large livery business and running the stage coach to the Geysers. At one time, he owned a large part of the present business district, originally purchased as undeveloped land. He helped lead the promotion of the Citrus Fair in 1894, eventually serving as director, secretary and president, as well as the parade Grand Marshal shortly before his death in 1955. He served two terms as town trustee before Cloverdale became a city and as Mayor in the early 1930s.

The Humberts were generous to a fault, regularly lending their spacious grounds to various non-profits for fundraisers. They also donated property for Cloverdale's first library, gave property to the American Legion on Broad Street where the post office is, and a right of way for the street in front of the Vets Building. These examples merely touch on a few of the

seemingly endless contributions made by Charles Emile Humbert.



Cooking with David Maciel

Sponsored by Ray's Food Place

April brings fresh asparagus and I love to make soup with the tender ends. I add roasted sweet Italian peppers to kick up the flavor.

Cream of Asparagus and Sweet Roasted Italian Pepper Soup

Ingredients

- 3 slices of bacon diced
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 2 medium shallots, diced
- 3 garlic cloves, minced
- kosher salt and pepper
- 2 pounds asparagus spears, cut into pieces with stems removed
- 8 ounces roasted sweet peppers, skinned & seeded
- ½ teaspoon dried dill
- 3 cups vegetable or chicken stock
- ½ cup heavy cream, plus more for drizzling
- 2 tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon juice
- crumbled feta cheese & bacon bits for garnish

Instructions

In a large pot on low heat cook the bacon until it's just crispy. Spoon out and save for later. Add the butter, shallots, garlic and a big pinch of salt and pepper. Cook until softened, about 5 minutes. Stir in the asparagus and dill. Cook for another 5 minutes. Add the sweet peppers and the stock and bring the mixture to a boil. Reduce it to a simmer and cook until the asparagus is tender, about 10 to 15 minutes.

Transfer the mixture to a blender carefully (or use an immersion blender) and blend until pureed. Pour it back into the pot and heat over low heat.

Stir in the cream and lemon juice. Taste and season with more salt and pepper if necessary.

Serve with a few drops of cream on top and the top of an asparagus spear! Sprinkle on crumbled feta for garnish.

Here are a few strategies that will help you find a lower air fare. Remember, the price of an airline ticket depends on availability, seasonality, and fare rules. Be flexible with your travel dates as lower fares may be available a few days before or after your target date. Date Flexibility is the key when you're looking for a lower fare. You can check air fares for your travel dates on Google Flights, Kayak, and Skyscanner.

Google Flights has quietly added a lot of helpful information on airfare searches, including airfare trend information, information about seasonality, and recommendations on the best time to visit. You can also monitor the price of your ticket for free on Skyscanner. When you're searching for flights, just look for the "Get Price Alerts" button. You can also set it so that you get notified in case there are even better deals on alternative routes.

Included with your ticket you can purchase a bundle or package as offered by the airline which includes the cost of checked bags or gives you extra flexibility for a lower price than if you bought everything separately "Bundled fares can offer a better overall value than the base fare."

You can often get that and more by signing up for the airline's credit card. Alaska for instance, offers first checked bag free, 50,000 miles and an annual \$99 companion certificate. As an example, if two of you are traveling and the airfare is \$700.00 each, you would save over \$500.00 using the companion certificate.

And don't forget to clear your cookies and use a VPN. Use a Virtual Private Network (VPN) to change your geographic location, clear your cookies and use an "anonymous" tab to force airline sites to display the lowest airfare.
