

Should you welcome a Doodle into your family?

One of the biggest pros to this breed (mix) is that they are ADORABLE. With the right grooming, they resemble a living teddy bear with a soft round face and a button nose. They



are clownish, funny, and playful. That said, every dog is an individual requiring love, exercise, and training to be their best self.

They can be a good choice for individuals with allergies. While no dog is truly "hypoallergenic," dogs that do not shed can work in such a home. Poodles do not shed, but the other parent (Labrador, Golden, etc.) definitely does, so it's a toss-up if the offspring will or not.

You can choose which size and breed type works best for your family. Doodles can be bred (to an extent) in different sizes. Be aware, however, that as a mixed breed, adult size is a bit of a gamble. I have seen "mini" Doodles weighing 50lbs!

Doodles MUST be groomed regularly, no exceptions! Do not get a Doodle if you can't afford it or can't be bothered. Be prepared to pay \$150+ every 6 weeks at minimum.

There are many Doodles available for adoption in shelters and rescues, so I would encourage you to start there. If you decide to buy a puppy, I strongly suggest you choose a local breeder so you can visit, interact with the dogs, and ask questions about health, temperament, and socialization.

Oh, and one more thing you'll appreciate, if you decide to share your life with a Doodle: put your socks away!

City Council Report ~ Eleanore Webster

During the January 24th meeting, Sandra Hoevertsz was thanked by Council members and recognized for her four years of service on the Cloverdale Planning Commission, particular for her advocacy for seniors and her work with several housing and public projects in town. She will be joining the Sonoma County Council on Aging.

Jeff Duval, Director of Sonoma County Dept of Emergency Management, presented the 2023 Louis "Pete" Peterka Emergency Management award to the City and the Resilient Cloverdale Emergency Preparedness Program. Daniel Homsey, son of Cloverdale's Kay Wells, was recognized as getting the ball rolling. Kay and her daughter Diane were there to receive recognition on his behalf. Sadly, Kay passed away just a few weeks after this presentation. It is fortunate she was able to receive the recognition.

Furber Park Survey results were presented. Goals that can be addressed quickly include a doggie bag station, cornhole boxes, garbage receptacle, a disc golf course, improved staircase, and creek viewing access. The Council adopted a resolution to add a flagpole at the southwest corner of City Hall, along with the existing US/California flagpole and will be used to fly commemorative flags.

During the meeting on February 14th, the Council recognized Black History Month. The designated recipient was Michael Driver, basketball coach, who passed away just a week before the meeting. His daughter was present to receive the recognition, along with many of his friends and students, who were there to express their love and appreciation for Coach Driver. City Staff also presented the mid-year financial report to the Council members, showing that the City is in good financial shape.

The Council heard a staff request to support an application for County funding to develop improvements allowing safe and accessible use of Soda Springs Ranch Open Space Preserve. Members of the public expressed concerns about parking and privacy. City Staff expressed their determination to provide safe surroundings for park users and bordering neighborhoods. The final new business item concerned a new Mobile Home Rent Control Ordinance. City staff checked with other cities to see what they were doing, so they could make informed recommendations. Goals focused on protections for mobile home renters. Council members expressed support for staff recommendations. Several park owners were present to express concerns for fairness.

Low Income Home Energy Assistance

North Coast Energy Services (NCES) is a non-profit organization that receives federal funding for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) through the State of California to assist low-income households with utility bill assistance and weatherization services.

NCES can provide assistance with electric, natural gas, propane, kerosene or heating oil bills. Your bill must cover at least 22 days of service. If approved, a pledge may be made on your account and the payment would be credited within 8-12 weeks.

Some of the measures that NCES may be able to do for a home are:

LED light bulbs
Thermostatic shower valves
Door weather-stripping
Air conditioner/swamp cooler
Heater repair/replacement
LED night lights
Occupancy sensor switches

Fix/replace windows
Door repair/replacement
Advanced power strips
Attic insulation
Refrigerator/microwave
Solar shade screens



When Life Gives You Lemons Nora Archambeau, M.A.

What do you do when life gives you lemons? "H.J. Whitley, the father of Hollywood, circa 1900, bought 500 acres in the heart of Hollywood. He turned lemon orchards into Hollywood. At a banquet, his business partners toasted him by saying, 'If life gives you lemons, make lemonade." (Gaelyn Whitley Keith, 3/31/19, Stack Exchange) How often do you use this phrase? When do you apply it? Is it just a phrase or does it hold some weight in your life? My cousin recently shared that she thinks people are feeling an onslaught of difficult situations these days. I agree. I felt this in 2023. I believe 2024 will bring more intensity worldwide. Yet this year will also offer us so many possibilities for good things to happen, for better choices to be made and for small and big dreams to start coming true. My personal goal is to finish a day, a week, a month knowing that more good is happening than hardship, more levity felt than visceral pain. When life gives us lemons, how can we best make lemonade? Some ideas:

- 1. **Dig Deeper**: Go within yourself. Be quiet. Close your eyes and visualize going down, down, down into the Earth. The Earth that is nurturing and rooted in the colors of green and brown. Take whatever angst, worry, or pain that exists and begin to release it bit by bit into Mother Earth. Allow Her to take your cares away, envelope them and place them in the ground for transmutation to occur. Imagine yourself lighter. Gradually, rise upwards above ground into reality. Last, invoke Light in and around you imbued with hope, determination, and optimism. Open your eyes and note how you feel.
- 2. **Trust**: Believe in something larger than yourself, e.g., the Universe, God, Goddess, the Divine, whatever is seemingly outside yet still a part of you. When I put confidence in the Divine, it liberates me from feeling "It's all up to me!" And that, my friends, is scary.
- 3. Let it Be: Give Abraham Hick's mantra a try: "Life is always working out for me."

10 Years Later, Do You Know Sonoma Clean Power?

As a Cloverdale resident, you may receive your electricity from Sonoma Clean Power. SCP is the local power provider for Sonoma and Mendocino counties, offering cleaner energy to homes, businesses, and municipalities.

SCP is a not-for-profit public agency led by a Board of Directors made up of elected officials from each of the communities they serve. SCP offers services and programs designed to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and help customers save energy.

SCP was formed to provide an alternative to the for-profit, investor-owned utility (PG&E), and create transparency in the power procurement and rate setting process. Today, SCP is one of the 20+ community-owned power providers serving residents across California.


If you are an SCP customer, you might be wondering why you see both SCP and PG&E charges on your monthly bill. As a shared customer, you pay SCP for electric generation service – the sourcing of the energy you use – and PG&E for delivery service – the maintenance of power lines and infrastructure.

SCP's electric generation costs are not an extra charge. If a customer chooses to opt out of SCP, they will continue to pay for electric generation service, but to PG&E instead of SCP.

Customers who receive generation services from SCP are saving money on their total monthly bills, compared to customers who receive both generation and delivery services from PG&E.

Since 2014, SCP's power purchase agreements have directly supported more than 195 megawatts (MW) of brand new renewable energy and storage projects in California, including six local solar facilities such as the 1 MW Cloverdale Solar Center. SCP is currently leading an effort to build 600 MW of new, local geothermal capacity to improve the state's grid reliability and reduce the use of natural gas.

In May, SCP will celebrate ten years of service. The agency remains steadfast in its commitment to offering customers a choice, upholding public decision-making, providing cleaner energy, and creating climate solutions tailored to local needs. Additionally, SCP continues to invest revenues locally to support community initiatives, energy education, rate stability, and unique customer offerings.

Let's Travel Craig Clark

Regarding credit card disputes involving Travel Purchases:

If you see a wrong charge on your credit card, you can dispute the charge. The Fair Credit Billing Act (FCBA) gives you 60 days from the time you receive your credit card bill to dispute a charge. However, credit card agreements often extend the time to file a dispute. The FCBA protects consumers from unfair billing practices including: charges you didn't authorize, incorrect charges, charges for goods or services not delivered, a good or service that was not as described by the merchant, and math errors in calculating the total.

Note: The FCBA only covers credit cards or charge accounts. It does not protect debit cards or money wired through a service like Zelle or PayPal. However, many electronic non-credit card transactions are covered by the Electronic Fund Transfer Act (EFTA).

Requirements for a credit card dispute.

- a) The transaction must be \$50 or more. It has to be made in your home state or within 100 miles of your home address. This rule doesn't apply if the merchant is affiliated with the bank that issued the card.
- b) It has to be in writing. Once you dispute a charge, the bank must acknowledge the dispute within 30 calendar days, and it must resolve the dispute within 90 days.
- c) You must give the merchant a chance to work it out.

How to dispute a charge on your credit card.

The easiest way to file a chargeback is to visit your bank's website. Most major banks will allow you to initiate a dispute online. Your bank or credit card company will follow up with a request for documentation. So, you'll want to keep any supporting evidence, including invoices, receipts, and emails.

March Gardening Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardeners Sponsored by Sanz Nursery

- Fertilize roses. Give them a first application at bud break then once a month thereafter.
- Fertilize other perennials that are emerging from winter dormancy.
- If you still have a lawn, apply a half-dose of fertilizer now and again in 6 weeks. If the thatch layer is more than ¾ in. deep, de-thatch. Dethatching relieves compaction and improves aeration and water absorption. Consider decreasing the size or removing lawn altogether, and replace water-demanding grass with a water-wise garden.
- Plant summer bulbs such as gladiolus, dahlia, callas, amaryllis, and lilies.
- Continue to look for and control snails. Hand pick them or apply Sluggo (non-toxic to pets, children, and wildlife) to control snails that are hatching now.
- If you have not yet pruned summer-flowering shrubs, such as crape myrtles or any that bloom on new wood, do it this month.
- Pull out what weeds you can by hand. If you get to them before they go to seed, put them on your compost pile.
- Use a few layers of newspaper or cardboard and cover with mulch to discourage areas of unwanted grass or weeds. By the end of the season, the paper barrier along with dead grass and weeds will be decomposed and become compost.
- Very hardy flowers can be planted 4-6 weeks before the average frost-free date; in Sonoma County, that is April 15. Indoors, sow warm-season flowers such as ageratum, celosia, cosmos, marigolds, sunflowers, and zinnias.
- To speed up decomposition in your compost pile, add sources of nitrogen such as food scraps, alfalfa meal, blood meal, cottonseed meal, or fish meal and stir the pile every day or two.
- Remember, the last frost date in Sonoma County is April 15th. Don't be fooled by any heat spells; cold nights are still possible.

Updates from the Police, Finance, Public Works, and Planning Departments

City Manager David Kelley

Police Department:

Under the direction of Chief Parker, the Cloverdale Police Department has undergone significant changes in its personnel and leadership, reflecting its ongoing commitment to service excellence and community engagement.

• Officer Katie Vanoni transitioned to the role of Detective, bringing a wealth of experience and dedication. With a background in Criminal Justice from SRJC and Sonoma State, she has overseen the resolution of over 700 cases and collaborated with various law enforcement agencies, including



the FBI, DEA, and local investigative units. Her involvement in high-profile cases, such as assisting in a murder investigation with the Sonoma County Multi-Agency Incident Response Team, underscores her commitment to public safety and justice.

• Officer John Camara has been promoted to Patrol Sergeant after 24-year career at the Cloverdale Police Department. With a diverse range of roles, including K-9 Officer and tactical rifle instructor, Sergeant Camara has been instrumental in drug investigations, apprehensions of wanted individuals, and confiscation of illegal



weapons. His proactive approach to addressing community concerns, particularly regarding homelessness, highlights his dedication to fostering a safe and secure environment in Cloverdale.

• Officer Rickey Rhodes has been assigned as the School Resource Officer (SRO), with 12 years of law enforcement experience and extensive training background. His commendable service record underscores his commitment to serving the community and ensuring the safety of Cloverdale's



youth. School Resource Officer Rhodes will soon commence duties, initially working one day a week. This arrangement will continue until the Police Department is fully staffed, then will transition to full-time.

Finance Department:

On February 14th, the City Council received a mid-year report and presentation about the Fiscal Year 2023-24 Budget, reflecting the strategic vision set forth by the City Council, emphasizing key city-wide goals and initiatives. The mid-year financial report covering July - December 2023 provides a mid-year overview of expenditures and revenue for various funds, including the General Fund, major enterprise funds (sewer, water, and airport), special funds (Measure M Transportation Fund and gas Tax).

General Fund Analysis:

The General Fund is crucial for funding essential services such as Public Safety, Parks, and Planning. Key points from the mid-year report include:

- Revenue sources are around 50% of the budget, with property tax slightly over budget but Cannabis Excise Tax and Sales Tax revenues lower than forecast.
- The estimated ending year General Fund unassigned fund balance corresponds to an 18% budget reserve and a total reserve balance of 55% including assigned and committed reserve account balances.
- Overall Expenditures are on target with the budget, with department expenditures ranging from 26% to 53% of their respective budgets.

Budget Amendments and Adjustments:

- The City Council approved budget amendments totaling \$1,203,580 for projects and additional expenditures, which reduce the overall general fund reserve balance to 55%.
- Additional amendments were approved for the Water Enterprise Fund (\$126,609) and the Sewer Enterprise Fund (\$128,488).

By closely monitoring revenue and expenditure trends, the City Council can make any adjustments needed to ensure the City remains well-positioned to address current needs and plans for the future. The City of Cloverdale also maintains an Online Budget Book and Transparency Portal where the community can follow and track budget expenses and revenue.

Public Works Department:

The Public Works Department continues their work to maintain and improve our city's infrastructure and has been hard at work maintaining the water system that provides Cloverdale residents with clean drinking water year-round. The Water Treatment Plant team is making progress on three critical projects.

- Replacement of the Cherry Creek (Southcrest) Water Tank With the assistance of a professional engineering firm, the City completed a hydraulic evaluation of the 200,000 gallon Cherry Creek reservoir. The city favors a two-tank alternative which would allow the possibility of keeping the existing tank in service while a new tank is constructed.
- Implementation of the Smart Water Meter System. The City of Cloverdale is continuing the final installation of meters as part of the Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) system. This project involves replacing and upgrading approximately 3,300 water meters with "WaterSmart Meters," enabling near real-time updates to the city's customer portal. Through an online web portal, residents will have the ability to monitor their water consumption and make informed decisions to manage their usage.
- Implementation of SCADA for the City's Water Transmission system. The Water treatment plant provides around the clock access to important treatment plant operational data and automated function control. The SCADA system is being extended from the Treatment Plant to the Transmission System and undergoing updating and maintenance to provide safety of operation and security of the treatment plant computerized system.

Community Development & Parks Department:

The Planning Department plays a vital role in shaping the future of Cloverdale. The Community Development & Parks have been busy delivering new park improvements including:

New pickleball courts at Furber Park, new basketball courts at City Park, new restroom in the Plaza, A new dog park at the Train Depot, acquisitions and planning for a new 250 acres open space.

Community Development has also been updating the City of Cloverdale's General Plan. After recently completing an update to the City's General Plan Housing Element, the City is undertaking the following planning projects:

- **Update of the General Plan Circulation Element** The process of updating the General Plan Circulation has been initiated by the City with the assistance of a transportation and planning firm.
- Update of the City's Mobile Home Rent Control Ordinance. The City Council is considering updates to the existing Mobile Home Rent Control Ordinance to provide improved regulations of rent control in mobile home parks. In addition to adopting a mobile home rent control ordinance, the City may make changes to its Zoning Code in order to protect mobile home residents.

Conclusion:

The City of Cloverdale extends our gratitude for the community's continued support and engagement. The City thrives on the active participation and enthusiasm of its residents. We encourage you to stay informed, get involved, and be part of the positive changes happening in our community.



Identifying Suspicious Emails Will Carter

Mean spirited folks have been taking advantage of others forever. In the case of emails, the Nigerian Prince Scam is by far the best known and you have likely heard of it, so I don't need to give you that warning! However, most scam emails today are not as obvious as that. Here are several things to check to make sure an important looking email is legitimate.

- 1 Who sent the email? Check not only the name provided, but also the actual email address of the sender. Banks, businesses, and other institutions should not be sending messages from free email services like Gmail, Outlook, iCloud, or Yahoo. For example, a legitimate email from PayPal might come from service@paypal.com, ha9632632@gmail.com!
- 2 Is the email clear and well written? Many scam operators do not speak or write English as their first language which will often give them away. Look for unexpected capitalization, commas as decimals, poor spelling, DD/MM/YEAR date formatting, and dollar signs after numbers. These issues are almost never found in legitimate emails.
- 3 What is the email about? Often scam emails will claim to be renewals or bills for services you have never used. Others will pretend to be a friend or acquaintance in need of a favor. Of course, there are also those which blatantly ask for money orders, wire transfers, or gift cards. If an email fits any of these descriptions it is best to treat it as suspicious.
- 4 Does everything fit together? If the email includes emails, phone number, or addresses, look them up to see if you can confirm they are associated with who they claim to be. Make sure that any links in the email actually open the site they claim, not a site which looks similar, but with a different URL.

Ultimately, if an email passes the above checks, it is probably not a scam. Any time you are dealing with an important email, it is better to be safe than sorry. Run through this checklist and if anything doesn't look right, reach out to someone you trust to help you make that determination.

Vote With Facts Not Fiction Misinformation Effects Democracy

This is an important election year. We have "seasoned" candidates who have served many years in Congress and in the Senate asking us to support their continued service in state and federal positions. Some people read the Santa Rosa newspaper, The Press Democrat, which provides information in their editorial section. You can sort fact from fiction by checking some online resources that are non-partisan and provide facts. Here are a few to check.

The League of Women Voters is a nonpartisan grassroots organization, that does not support or oppose candidates or political parties. Their voting and election resource, VOTE411. org, provides reliable, nonpartisan information.

Justfacts VoteSmart is another website that provides information about who is representing you and where they stand on issues you care about.

News Literacy Project has resources that can teach you how to identify credible news information. You can empower yourself with quality and vetted voter information.

We have eight months to gather information to decide how we want to be governed. So be an informed voter when you make your mark on the ballot. INFORMATION IS POWER!

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
Live Music at La Tequila

Footprints from the Past Jennifer Jordan Cloverdale Historical Society Volunteer

Imagine going back in time to summer 1905, living in the Bay area, and deciding to "rusticate" in Cloverdale, to escape city life or summertime chill. After crossing the bay by ferry (no Golden Gate bridge until 1937), you ride north on the train. You arrive and stay at the U.S. Hotel on West Street or Pop McCray's rustic resort in Oat Valley,

How to" rusticate" in Cloverdale? You can swim or boat on the Russian River, or travel to Italian Swiss Colony winery in Asti, founded in 1881 by Andrea Sbarboro and Pietro Rossi, a winery renowned for its Tipo Chianti and parties at the Villa Pompeii. You can go to mineral springs like Alder Glen on Hwy. 128 or Skaggs Hot Springs, which accommodated 300 guests! The spring is now at the bottom of Lake Sonoma! Or you can travel by stagecoach to Cloverdale's most famous turn-of-the-century resort, the Geysers, located on Big Sulphur Creek. The grand hotel, surrounded by bubbling springs and fumaroles, attracted visitors from around the world, including Mark Twain, Ulysses S. Grant, and the Prince of Wales (later Edward VII).

How to get there? Travel involved an exciting, sometimes perilous journey through 16 miles of steep hills and unpaved roads by stagecoach. Bandits like Black Bart could lurk. In later years, cars and buses made the journey. It was a bumpy ride but one to tell your friends about.

Today you can visit our own Cloverdale History Museum and see one of these stagecoaches first hand. This stagecoach was discovered in Willits in 1993 with a sign that read "Cloverdale to the Geysers". Willits Museum donated it and after repairs, it is now in our museum. Come down to see it and other historical treasures.

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Earthquake Brace + Bolt Grants Now for Available Eligible California Homeowners

Thousands of California homeowners are now eligible to applyforEarthquakeBrace+Bolt (EBB) seismicretrofitgrants. Now since February 21st, eligible homeowners can apply for \$3,000 seismic retrofit grants to help strengthen their homes against earthquake damage. There are more than 1.2 million houses in California built before 1980 in high-hazard areas that are vulnerable to collapse or destruction by sliding off the foundation during a strong earthquake.

More than \$20 million in grant funding will be available to help offset the cost of seismic retrofits that brace the crawl space walls of older homes, when present, and bolt houses to their foundations, making them less vulnerable to earthquake damage. In the ten years since it began, the EBB program has assisted more than 23,000 homeowners in strengthening their homes against earthquake damage.

Income-eligible homeowners may qualify for supplemental grants. Up to \$7,000 in additional grant funds are available for households with an annual income at or below \$87,360, which may be able to provide up to 100% of the funds needed to cover a seismic retrofit. Grants are contingent upon meeting eligibility requirements and available funds.

Established by the California Residential Mitigation Program, EBB offers up to \$3,000 to help California homeowners retrofit their house to reduce potential damage from earthquakes. Residential seismic retrofits bolt the house to its foundation and add bracing, if required, around the perimeter of the crawl space making it more resistant to earthquake activity. The California Residential Mitigation Program was established in 2011 to help Californians strengthen their homes against damage from earthquakes. CRMP is a joint powers authority created by the California Earthquake Authority and the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services.


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



Progress continues! The AVH Board has established a committee to review the 3 bids from general contractors and finalize the project budget. Once this process is complete and a GC is selected, permit applications will be submitted to the City of Cloverdale.

Our Capital Campaign is ongoing, with close to \$2 million (including \$1 million from the County) raised towards our \$5 million goal. The final application and completed feasibility study for the Tax-Exempt Bond issue will be submitted to Cal Mortgage for approval at their Advisory Loan Insurance Committee (ALIC) meeting in June. We hope for bond financing by July/August of 2024.

Electric Tumbleweed is rolling through the western terrain, leaving a kaleidoscope of fresh musical intrigue. This blend of Psychedelic Rock, Outlaw Country, and soulful Americana is a new phenomenon fueled by many years of collective experience.

Creative Corner Christy Anne

A bit early this year, Spring is less than a few weeks away. I can almost hear the shouts of "Yes Please" and "Thank the Lord" with all the rain we have been blessed with this year. There is only so much even the proclaimed lovers of the rain (yours truly included) can proclaim with any modicum of honesty, when the assault of rain feels never-ending, that we too, have had enough.

Of course, with all the rain and havoc it has wrought, the threatening takeover of weeds and blown about branches will be keeping many of us busy for awhile leaving extra energy for projects at a deficit. So, a simple little project for Spring for those that want to add a little sunshine themselves to the world at large and their gardens, I thought an old school and simple project would fit the bill.



Wildflower seed paper. We often see in card form or other creative ways artisans have come up with. But there is no reason even younger kids (with a wee bit of help from their elders with the blender or food processor) can't make them, themselves. The ingredients are easy enough: old scraps of paper ripped up into tiny shreds, water, and a packet of seeds. Oh, yes and the tough part – some patience. Simply shred what paper you have and soak in water until it turns soggy. Drain excess water and combine in mixing device of your choice, run until well blended. Again, drain excess water, scoop into a bowl, and mix in a packet of seeds (Thank you Cloverdale Nursery for the Bee Feed). Easiest is to wrap in cheesecloth and squeeze excess water out, but straining through fine mesh works as well. I found putting between 2 sheets of parchment paper and using a rolling pin to be the easiest way to get flat. Then allow to dry out – patience! Once dry, slowly cut into desired shape and they are ready to go. Place under thin Layer of soil in a sunny spot & keep soil moist through germination (4-14 days), water as needed and enjoy!

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Evolution Of Cloverdale's Public Library Mary Jo Winter

From 1884-1911, Cloverdale's first library was located in the 200 block of N. West Street (now Cloverdale Blvd.) in a two-story building known as Library Hall. A fire on the night of June 1, 1911, destroyed about \$12k worth of downtown business property and seriously damaged Library Hall, although all of the books were saved.

The second library, the Cloverdale Free Library, was sponsored by the newly chartered Women's Improvement Club and started in 1913. With help from volunteer librarians and donations from the community, it opened in a small room in front of the old Citrus Fair Pavilion.

The Women's Improvement Club (WIC), with their focus on the social, moral and intellectual improvement of a community, then set their sights on raising funds to construct a standalone library building. They held fundraisers and successfully circulated a petition requesting a town library tax of \$0.03 per \$100, bringing in about \$14 per month.

Land for the proposed project, located at 231 S. Cloverdale Blvd., was generously donated by Mrs. and Mrs. Charles Humbert. The building was completed in September 1921, and by March 1922, the construction debt was completely paid off.

In 1956, the Sonoma County Library system took over and in February 1979 the new Cloverdale Regional Library was opened in its current location. A \$350k remodel in 2016 has been the only major renovation to the building since opening.

Proceeds from WIC's sale of the former library building helped to greatly reduce the cost of the new building. WIC also contributed to the cost of landscaping and the purchase of new books.

Several different businesses have occupied the former library building, including Bowman Lumber, Fiesta Travel, and Voss Signature Vintage. Currently, it is home to the Kelley & Young Tasting Room and the recently-opened Crystabelle Fine Minerals.

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Cloverdale Unified School District News Glen Senestraro, CUSD Superintendent

CUSD has many projects planned for the rest of this school year and the next. We are in the planning stages for eight (8) new Kindergarten and Transitional Kindergarten classrooms at Jefferson. These classrooms will be built on the north side of campus to replace the current portables. Construction on the new modular buildings will begin in the Fall of 2024. We are anticipating occupying the new classrooms in August 2025. The next project is the new school bus turnout at Washington. With the planned expansion of Washington Street to Healdsburg Avenue, CUSD is creating a school bus turnout adjacent to the street. This will create a flow of traffic for drop off and pick up at the school as well as trying to alleviate safety concerns.

Lastly, CHS is upgrading and modernizing their Career Technical Education (CTE) garden area. We plan to erect a new greenhouse, build a barn to house small animals, bring utilities to the area, and make a clean, well-structured learning space.

We are proud and honored to serve the greater Cloverdale community and its students. CUSD is governed by an elected Board of Trustees. Our regular meetings are on the third Wednesday of every month at 6:00 PM in the CHS Makers Space. Our Board members are President Gabriela Mendoza-Torres, Clerk Jenny Candelaria-Orr, Trustee Preston Addison, Trustee Jacque Garrison, and Trustee Ashley Lopus-White.

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Cooking with David Maciel

Easter is always a nice bone-in ham at our dinner table. I love this sweet nutty glaze with the smokiness of ham. You can use a boneless ham but not the pre-sliced hams. Happy Easter.

Ham with Bourbon, Molasses & Pecan Glaze

Ingredients

- 1/2 cup apple juice (preferably fresh unfiltered)
- 1/4 cup bourbon
- 3/4 cups (packed) dark brown sugar
- 1 cup pecans, toasted, cooled, finely ground
- 1/4 cup mild-flavored (light) molasses
- 3 tablespoons dry mustard
- 1 whole bone-in 16- to 18-pound

Step 1

Boil juice and bourbon in small saucepan until reduced to scant 1/3 cup, about 6 minutes. Combine sugar, pecans, molasses, and mustard in bowl. Add bourbon mixture; stir to form thick paste. (Can be made 2 days ahead. Cover; chill. Bring to room temperature before using.)

Step 2

Position rack in bottom third of oven and preheat to 325°F. Line large roasting pan with heavy-duty foil, leaving overhang on all sides. Trim off skin and all but 1/4 inch fat from ham. Place ham, fat side up, in prepared pan. Roast ham until thermometer inserted into thickest part registers 130°F to 135°F, about 10 minutes per pound or 2 hours 40 minutes for 16-pound ham.

Step 3

Remove ham from oven; increase oven temperature to 425°F. Lightly score fat on ham in diamond pattern. Rub glaze thickly over top and sides of ham. Return ham to oven and roast until glaze is deep brown and bubbling, about 25 minutes. Let ham stand at least 20 minutes and up to 45 minutes.

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Cloverdale Library Community Connection John Koetzner, Children's Services Librarian

Sonoma County Library had over a million checkouts of physical items last year and over three million digital items checked out. Many of our patrons already use the Libby app for getting access to our more than 100,000 eBooks and eAudio titles on their phones and tablets. If you read eBooks or listen to audiobooks, one of our newest apps, the Palace Project, includes Libby, but it also adds several other apps for eBooks and eAudio.

For example, it adds more than 90,000 Enki eBook titles, as well as the California State Library's over 23,000 eBook and eAudio titles, and over 15,000 eBook and eAudio titles from the Shared California eBooks for all program. Finally, the Palace Bookshelf has over 17,000 eBooks that are free to download and keep. What a deal. All of them are free!

The good news is that we are still getting new physical books and audio books, along with DVDs and other materials in all the time. So, be certain to visit the library to see exhibits of books, media, etc. that we have on display, especially in March for Women's History Month. We're waiting for you at the desk.
