### Editor's Note


It's June! Time for shorts and T-shirts and summer activities. With this great weather, we've been working in our yard (correction – **he** works, I point, he drags something, I say

### **Whisker Talk**

Summer is on its way and wild animals emerge from winter hiding, including snakes. You may have seen the tragic case on Facebook of a dog who recently died in Cloverdale from a rattlesnake bite. Here are some steps you can take to avoid such an encounter.



- 1) Clean up your yard. Snakes love to hide under piles of wood or junk. Don't make your yard hospitable to them. When cleaning wear gloves and be aware!
- 2) Stay on trails while hiking with your dog. This will keep him or her away from snakes as well as ticks and poison oak.
- 3) Keep your dog on a leash. Snakes often cross trails or sunbathe right out in the open. A curious dog may approach and be struck before you know it.
- 4) Learn to identify the rattlesnake. King snakes, gopher snakes, and other species are not venomous and are beneficial. They eat small prey including rats which we have in abundance here near the river. Do not harm these snakes but steer clear of them as they may strike defensively.






Insurance, once a box to check in a transaction, has become a major barrier for sellers and buyers. Here's what you can do about it.

### June Gardening Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardeners Sponsored by Sanz Nursery

Mulch in the garden not only adds a decorative element but also a practical one. A 3-4 in. thick layer of mulch keeps weeds to a minimum going forward.

- Be sure to mulch around new plantings to cut down on weeds and prevent soil from drying out quickly. Keep mulch at least 6 in. away from the base of all woody plants—trees and shrubs—to prevent fungal growth that can cause fatal damage.
- Continue to fertilize roses and other heavy feeders. Gardeners who have regularly amended their soil with ample compost and mulch at least once a year have found that additional products are seldom needed.
- Dead-head roses frequently. Cut stems for bouquets early in the morning and quickly sink them into deep, warm water. They will remain fresh longer in vases.
- Pull or cut suckers from the base of sucker-prone plants such as wisteria, crab-apples, poplars, and fruit trees.
- If you have wisteria, prune it aggressively after bloom, cutting back to 2 nodes on new branches to ensure a robust display of blossoms next year. Prune again in the fall.
- As the weather warms, any aphid problem will lessen but stay alert for remaining or new colonies; spray them off with water.
- Fill in empty spaces in flowerbeds or borders with annuals such as zinnias or impatiens.
- If you plan to be away this summer, ensure that you have someone available to water plants. If not, set up your irrigation system on automatic timers.
- In the midst of June chores, enjoying the garden is high on an activities list. Plentiful flowers bring out bees and hummingbirds in full force, and many other birds are still busy courting and building nests.

### Playing it Safe on the Russian River

Summer on the Russian River - It's an iconic Sonoma County experience, and each year thousands of residents and visitors look forward to swimming, paddling, and tubing on this beautiful warm-weather playground. However, playing in the river is not without risk. Yes, the water looks calm and inviting on a hot summer day, but there can be unseen hazards beneath the surface, including sudden drop offs, changing currents, snags and boulders. So at the risk of sounding like your mom, we ask you to please be safe out there.

Most of Sonoma County's Russian River beaches do not have full-time lifeguards on duty, so we recommend swimmers wear life vests, especially if you're not a strong swimmer or you're drinking alcohol. Children always should be in life vests when they're in the river.

Another safety issue we encounter on the river is excessive drinking. Alcohol and swimming are a dangerous mix, so please practice moderation when you're enjoying a day at the beach. River swimming requires a lot of judgment calls, and you don't want your thinking impaired.

And, lastly, please be a good neighbor while visiting river communities. Respect private property near the beaches. Stay out of people's yards, keep the noise down, and don't litter. (That may mean packing out trash to the parking lot or to your car.)

The Russian River truly is a treasure for us in Sonoma County, so let's enjoy it safely.

### Be Ready, Be CloveReady Emergency Preparedness

The Cloverdale Police Department in partnership with the Cloverdale Chamber of Commerce developed the Cloverdale Wildfire Community Evacuation Plan also known as CloveReady to enable our community to have a strong understanding of the steps you can take before and during a mandatory evacuation to protect the health and wellbeing of your family and neighbors. With the onset of summer and warmer drier temperatures, the City of Cloverdale wants you to be prepared for fire emergencies that have the potential to impact our community.

Resilient Cloverdale, a group of Cloverdale residents, businesses, and civic organizations, has developed for you CloveReady – how to be prepared in case of emergency. There are four easy steps you can learn to ensure that every resident understands the actions they can take before, during, and after an emergency to protect the health and well-being of their household and immediate neighbors.

- 1. Know Your Evacuation Zone
- 2. Get Alerted via Nixle or SoCo Alerts
- 3. Pack a Little Bag
- 4. Have a Plan to Reunite

Visit our website https://cloveready.org/ to learn more about the initiative and ways you can get involved. Let's walk through the four steps below.

**Know your zone:** The City of Cloverdale Police Department has established standardized evacuation zones for the incorporated area. The city encourages its residents to be familiar with their zone in case of an evacuation. The city map containing each boundary and zone can be found on the City of Cloverdale's website. Learn your zone for home and work and be ready to go when an evacuation order or warning for your area is issued. Share your zone with out-of-town friends and family for their situational awareness.

**Plan:** When it's time to evacuate and action is required, the City encourages residents to have a plan in place. Planning will give you the confidence to act and provide you with the necessary tools to stay safe. Below are some tips that you can use to help build your plan:

- Remember, our Police and Fire Departments will be overloaded in a disaster; help yourself by planning in advance.
- The Safety of you, your family and pets are your priority.
- If you need help to evacuate, quickly reach out, in advance, to neighbors, family, or friends and discuss how they can assist you, what you will need, and a backup plan in case the immediate help is not able to assist.
- Be sure to have an extra supply of life-saving medications and copies of prescriptions.
- Complete a Personal Emergency Plan and have it ready to go.

Alerts: The City of Cloverdale has experienced disasters over the past several years, including floods, power shutoffs, a pandemic, and wildfires that have threatened the incorporated population. The City's alert and warning system is vital in early alert notifications, and residents are encouraged to sign up to receive life-saving alerts. Below are the apps to sign-up and receive critical information from different warning systems within Sonoma County.

**Nixle** – Receive email and text messages from local fire and law enforcement agencies that include public safety messages and emergency information. Text your zip code to 888777 to opt-in or sign up online to receive email or text messages with alerts and advisories.

**SoCoAlert** – Upon signing up for SoCoAlert, select to receive alerts through landline calls, cell phone text messages, or pre-recorded verbal messages and email. The system also works with telephone devices for the deaf.

National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Weather Radio – This alert system is available at a relatively low cost. When properly programmed, the National Weather Service can remotely turn on these radios and send basic alerts, including for wildfires. The message may be accompanied by a warning tone, depending on the model of radio you purchase.

Sonoma County residents may tune their NOAA radio to: County of Sonoma Frequency 162.475

Northwest Sonoma County Frequency 162.550

Southwest Sonoma County Frequency 162.475

**Build a Go Kit**: Everyone in your family should have a Go Bag that contains essential supplies needed when an earthquake strikes, or an emergency evacuation is ordered. Personalize kits and keep them where they can easily be reached—at home, in the car, at work, or at school. This is particularly important when a quick getaway may be needed during fire season.

- Personal Preparedness Go Bags should contain a minimum of 72 hours' worth of essential supplies:
  - ► Medications/List of Medications
  - Pet Food/List of Pet Medications
  - Cell Phone Charger Cord
  - Extra Set of Keys to cars/storage units/RV's
  - Flashlights w/Batteries
  - Sanitizer/hand wipes, N95 mask
  - Original Documents (Passports, Birth Certificates etc.)
  - ▶ Clothes

Also: Keep your phones and laptops and tablets fully charged.

- Home Preparedness Kits should contain a minimum of 7 days' worth of emergency supplies.
- Vehicle Preparedness Kits should contain a minimum of 24 hours' worth of emergency supplies.

### Have a Plan to Reunite

Because disaster can happen at any time, have your plan in place to reunite with your family members before there is an emergency. Talk to your family members about locations within and outside of Cloverdale to reunite if separated. Remember that local cell service and phone lines will most likely be disrupted in a disaster, so have a family member or friend outside of the County that will be your point of contact. 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### City Council Report ~ Eleanore Webster

During the April 24th Council meeting, a proclamation announced Administrative Professionals Day/Week. Leticia Barajas received recognition on behalf of the City Staff and was recognized by the City Manager and Council members.

Isom Advisors made a presentation on results of a voter survey about a potential revenue measure for significant capital and infrastructure improvements. The City would like to place a measure on the November ballot because of severe budgetary constraints. The survey was conducted in Fall 2023 and considered both sales tax and general obligation bond measures. The options are a tax on home values, of \$45 to \$60 per \$100,000 of assessed property value, or a sales tax measure. Isom Advisors suggested going with the sales tax measure, but keeping the percentage low, such as .5%. Council members discussed the impact of a sales tax v. a property assessment on various income levels. Other sources of funding have been considered and are not available. The City Council scheduled a town hall meeting in May to get input from the public.

Rent control in mobile home parks was finalized. The maximum allowable annual rent increase was changed to be 3% or 70% of CPI, whichever is less. There are also provisions for vacancy rent increases. One member of the public thanked the Council members for being willing to listen and for their understanding of the impact on renters.

During the May 8 meeting, Council proclaimed Professional Municipal Clerk's Week, recognizing City Clerk Mike Maloney. A second proclamation recognized May as Lyme and Tick-Borne Diseases Awareness Month.

A presentation was made about the Bay Area Housing Finance Authority. The Sonoma County Community Development Commission Director presented information about the 2024 Regional Affordable Housing Bond. The bond is designed to raise up to \$20 billion to build and preserve affordable homes in the nine Bay Area counties. It requires voter approval to be enacted. The bond would be funded by a property tax of about \$12 to \$24 annually per \$100,000 of assessed value. The funds would provide and maintain homes for seniors, folks with disabilities and low-income households. Cloverdale currently has about 160 affordable homes and about 23 homeless people. Cloverdale's goal is to enable people to live and work in Cloverdale, keeping people housed, and reducing the need to commute.

## Inchy Bookworm Vending Machine Rhonda Knowles

With a grant that has been in the works for over two years, The Inchy Bookworm Vending Machine is now installed at Jefferson Elementary School, offering free books for the students to keep. At a recent ribbon cutting ceremony celebrating literacy, students received free books, made book markers, along with a drawing for any student who participated in the celebration. Drawing winners were given a special Inchy coin to use for "purchasing" a book from the vending machine. Doctor Nicole Odell is shown cutting the ribbon. She is our Director of Curriculum, Instruction, and Accountability. She was a driving force with our Library Manager to achieve this dream.



The vending machine is part of our Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports Program. The students earn Eaglet Wings throughout the school year. They may turn these in for rewards like popcorn with the principal, extra recess, extra recess with a friend, wall of fame, golden lunch table, and the newest addition is an Inchy Bookworm coin to purchase a book from the vending machine.

There is also an award each week awarded to a class: the "Skoob the Shelf Elf" Award. The library elf travels weekly to classrooms that demonstrate library etiquette. The class receives an extra library visit and there are Leggos, magnets, building blocks, board games, an art table, Lincoln logs, bubbles, chalk, and reading to a stuffed animal. As part of our PBIS, there will 2 or more students randomly chosen to receive an Inchy Book worm coin for the vending machine.

### Washington School Transitions ~ Shauna Ferdinandson

This is the time of year so many students have been waiting for! Our Washington Middle School 8th graders are joining the high school, and the Jefferson Elementary 4th graders are getting ready to join us at Washington. Bright, resourceful, spirited, and kind, these students bring smiles to our staff each and every day. They are readers, athletes, mathematicians, inquisitive scientists, artists, history buffs, and some are even comedians! Cloverdale High School, ready, set go! Here they come!

At Washington, we are so excited to meet and get to know our new students. This coming school year we will launch our new WEB Program. WEB, which stands for "Where Everybody Belongs" is a middle school orientation and transition program that welcomes 5th graders and makes them feel comfortable throughout the first year of their middle school experience. Built on the belief that students can help students succeed, the program trains mentors from our 8th grade class to be WEB Leaders. As positive role models, WEB Leaders are mentors and student leaders who guide the 5th graders to discover what it takes to be successful during the transition to middle school and help facilitate success.

More and more studies show that if students have a positive experience their first year in middle school, their chances for success increase dramatically. WEB provides the structure for 5th graders to receive support and guidance from 8th graders who have been through the challenges that middle school poses and understand that the transition to a new school can sometimes be overwhelming.


WEB also acts as an anti-bullying program for our school by providing it with a cohort of student leaders who look for

## Cloverdale Citrus Fair Partners with Redwood Empire Food Bank



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### **Museum Talk** Michele Armanino

Elissa Morrash narrates such palpable stories about the Old West, that you'll soon envision yourself trotting down Cloverdale's dusty boulevard on your trusty Palomino. The Executive Director of the Cloverdale Museum of History and board member of the Cloverdale Chamber of Commerce is a fountain of information regarding the history of Cloverdale's bygone days.

Morrash, a Pennsylvania native and Temple University graduate, majored in American History and world culture, and has always had an interest in the history. She landed in Cloverdale in 2005 when Christopherson Homes hired her as Vice President of Marketing. Currently, the Sonoma County Realtor divides her time between W Real Estate and the Cloverdale Museum of History.

"There are many exciting things happening at the Cloverdale Museum." Morrash effuses. "A video, 'Hear Our Voices', is currently in the making about four Latino Pioneer families and their contributions to Cloverdale. It's so important for school children who tour the museum to see their cultures and histories reflected in the museum."

The Gould Shaw House Museum, at 215 No. Cloverdale Blvd., spotlights genuine western relics such as an antique piano, donated by the Kleiser family, which arrived in Cloverdale possibly via the Cape Horn and a grand, handsome stagecoach, which once ventured up and down to The Geysers Resort. Museum visitors can follow the infamous Black Bart's story and learn how the elusive bandit, who roamed Sonoma County and robbed Wells Fargo stagecoaches, was finally apprehended. The museum also includes the eccentric Madame Preston, Icaria Speranza's Utopian Colony and a display of skillfully woven baskets of roots, shells and feathers created by the Pomo Indians.

"Volunteering is great for your emotional well-being and enriches your life." Morrash says. "Challenge your creativity by building an exhibit, writing a story or leading a docent tour." she says. Morrash knows from experience that there are more opportunities to learn, interact with visitors and make a difference in a small town museum like Cloverdale.

### **Steve Ginsburg: Activist And Farmer** Mary Jo Winter

Cloverdale's first Certified Farmers Market was organized and managed by the late Steve Ginsburg (1938-1997). Opening May 29, 1988, it was held weekly from May to November at various locations around downtown until closing for good on July 31, 1994.

Many Cloverdalians knew Ginsburg, but what they may not have known was his connection to the Gay Liberation Movement. Born in Minnesota, he lived in Los Angeles during the 1960s, later relocating to San Francisco and then to Cloverdale. On July 7, 1966, he became the founder and first president of "Personal Rights in Defense and Education," otherwise known as P.R.I.D.E.

P.R.I.D.E. was a male organization with the goal of altering the relationship between police and the gay community, as well as providing social events for gay men outside of bars. P.R.I.D.E. also provided information supporting the safety of LGBTQ individuals by publishing legal and community information. Its newsletter eventually evolved into the Los Angeles Advocate newspaper. During a 1967 New Year's Eve event, a Los Angeles gay bar was violently raided, and arrests were made. In response, a protest in support of the community was organized and the term P.R.I.D.E. was first used at this time.

The Steve Ginsburg papers, located at the GLBT Historical Society on Market Street in San Francisco, document his activities as a founder of Chutzpah (later Achvah), the first gay Jewish group on the West Coast, and as Parade Co-Chairperson of San Francisco's 1973 Gay Freedom Day Committee. The collection includes flyers, and newsletters from both groups, his letter of resignation from the Gay Freedom Day Committee, and photographs of the 1973 and 1974 parades.

Ginsburg passed away in Ukiah of respiratory failure in 1997. Despite his other claims to fame, his grave marker simply identifies him as the founder of the Cloverdale Farmers Market.

Never one to be beaten down by my own impulsiveness (after almost 52 years I am used to me), I decided to finish up with enthusiasm and instead have a fun ice cream sculpture, ya know... for when one needs such an item.

But the fun things I did play with and learn: paper mâché is awesome for a more time flexible project (50/50 water to glue brushed on, under, and over each layer – 24 hours to cure

between layers), plaster wrap is always fun for those feeling a bit more confident with the speed and the acceptance that it will be opaque, Loctite spray foam (ACE) for big spaces is a blast and within a mere hour can carefully be carved with a knife if needed, and adding food coloring to wood or Elmers glue can make some pretty nifty looking fudge sauce and dries in under 24 hours and topped with resin sprinkles can create a visually pleasing result.

### The Library Sales Tax

Have you noticed the newly installed BiblioBox smart locker in front of the Cloverdale Library? This innovative addition to library services is brought to you by the library sales tax, the community's investment in free public libraries.

In November 2016, 72 percent of Sonoma County voters approved Measure Y, a one-eighth of one cent sales tax to support the 14-branch Sonoma County Library system. Since the measure passed, Sonoma County Library has been able to add Sunday hours at every branch and expand collections, programs, and services. The funds are also being used to maintain library facilities and increase access for everyone in the community. Nearly 40 percent of our library funding comes from this source.

Measure Y is set to expire in 2027, and the Sonoma County Library Commission is considering placing a sales tax renewal measure on the November 2024 ballot. ### **REAL ID Will Take Effect in 2025**


Passed by Congress in 2005, delayed three times over the past five years, the requirement likely actually will take effect on May 7, 2025. Beginning on that date, a driver's license will only be acceptable ID at the airport if it has a REAL ID seal.

However, many other forms of ID are also acceptable, including: A US passport book or card, an enhanced driver's license, available in Michigan, Minnesota, New York, Vermont and Washington, a DHS trusted traveler card (Global Entry, NEXUS, SENTRI, FAST), a US Department of Defense ID, including IDs issued to dependents, a permanent resident card, an acceptable photo ID issued by a federally recognized, Tribal Nation/Indian Tribe, a foreign government-issued passport, a US Citizenship and Immigration Services Employment Authorization Card (I-766), a US Merchant Mariner Credential, a Veteran Health Identification Card (VHIC).










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




Drawing direct comparisons between the two was never easy and has only gotten harder after every update and new release. Apple now makes their own processors, which muddy direct performance comparisons. Windows is available at all price points, winning price conscious customers for Microsoft. In my experience, the better question is: "Which is better for you?" Turns out, most folks don't like that answer either: "Whatever you already use!" 


According to experts, children who don't read during the summer can lose up to two months of learning by the time they return to school in the fall, a concept known as the "summer slide." Jefferson Middle School fourth grade lead teacher Jonni Conway said that summer reading plays a vital role in helping her students retain and improve their reading abilities. "Reading over the summer is crucial for students to maintain comprehension," Conway said.

Conway also suggests that parents visit the library and read with their kids. "Books can be shared and discussed, listened to, and read aloud together," Conway said.

Sonoma County Library Director Erika Thibault said Summer Reading is just one of the many extra resources the library offers to patrons. "The library isn't just books and magazines," Thibault said. "We have many programs every month, in addition to Summer Reading, where we connect with our community, and help our visitors have fun and grow as readers and adults."

During the Summer Reading program, all reading counts, including physical books, eBooks, audiobooks, and graphic novels. Last year, more than 4,000 people participated in the Summer Reading program throughout Sonoma County, and branch librarians expect participation to grow this year.

### **Camp Noyo**



Camp Noyo was developed as a logging camp for the Union lumber Company in 1907. Originally called "Camp Four," it was the fourth camp established by the lumber company as they progressed east from Fort Bragg along the current

route of the California Western Railroad. In 1933, the Union Lumber Company donated the property to the Boy Scouts of

America, who began using the site in the summer 1934 and continue to use the property for several weeks every summer.

In 2012, Allan Hemphill, his son Brian, and a small group of family friends purchased the property from the Boy Scouts. The Hemphill family had been caretaking Camp Noyo for over 60 years prior to the purchase The group opened the property to the public in 2015 for camping in the summer.



### **Cooking with David Maciel**

As we start the summer months, a lot of fresh veggies come into season. I enjoy making kabobs combining meat and veggies. This recipe calls for chicken, but you can use pork beef or seafood or a combination.

### Grilled Marinated Chicken & Veggie Kabobs

#### **Ingredients**

- 1 pound of chicken breast cut into 1 inch cubes
- ¼ cup olive oil
- ¹/₃ cup soy sauce
- ¼ cup honey
- 1 teaspoon minced garlic
- Salt And Pepper
- 1 red bell pepper cut into 1 inch pieces
- 1 yellow bell pepper cut into 1 inch pieces
- 2 small zucchini, cut into 1 inch slices
- 1 red onion cut into 1 inch pieces
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley

### Instructions

- Place the olive oil, soy sauce, honey, garlic and salt and pepper in a large bowl.
- Whisk to combine.
- Add the chicken, bell peppers, zucchini and red onion to the bowl. Toss to coat in the marinade.
- Cover and refrigerate for at least 1 hour, or up to 8 hours.

Soak wooden skewers in cold water for at least 30 minutes. Preheat grill or grill pan to medium high. Thread the chicken and vegetables onto the skewers. Cook for 5-7 minutes on each side or until chicken is cooked through. Sprinkle with parsley and serve.
