
care for her students' success have earned her the respect and admiration of both her colleagues and students.

1) Do a recon trip if you can. The

2) Know the rules. People are recreating in close quarters at campgrounds, so leash laws usually apply. Bring sturdy leashes and walking collars or harnesses. In some parks, dogs are allowed in camp but not on trails, so plan for dog care while hiking etc.

3) Make a list and check it twice. I have a "horse camping" list that I use every time so I don't forget things. Make a "dog camping" list including food, bowls, toys and treats, poop bags, etc.

4) Check the weather. We enjoyed cool weather on this trip, but in hot weather it might be best to leave dogs at home.



tenure and the respect he earned from his colleagues.


Known for his kind nature, Paul was a gentle presence in the lives of those around him. He found iov in simple pleasures and was a beloved figure in his community.

Memories Are In the Eyes Of the Beholder ~ Michele Armanino

Clover Springs Lodge hummed with chatter on Saturday, June 22, as the Eagles from Cloverdale High's class of '68 returned for a reunion. The following morning, a well air-conditioned Citrus Fair Auditorium welcomed another all-class CHS gathering.



Here are some vignettes from those reunions:

"It's always stayed with me," says Nancy Gerke Miltimore, '68, "the kindness Richard Price,'68, showed me. I was never very athletic and he was a varsity baseball player who gave me confidence and encouraged me to keep playing baseball even though I was always the last selected for the team!" Gerke also recalls the excitement and satisfaction of making her very first pair of bell bottoms in her much-enjoyed home economics class. Recalling the music of the era, Gerke shares, "I loved the song, Brown-Eyed Girl, because," she says smiling, "I was also a brown-eyed girl."

"Mr. Connolly, the band instructor, taught lessons about performing in groups that stayed with me for the rest of my life." says Gail Giovannetti, '68. "Because of his influence, I went on to play the oboe in the Ukiah and Lake County Symphonies. Many of his music students went on to play professionally."

"I played bass drum in Mr. Connolly's band," remembers Dan Sutton, who in 1968, gave his class graduation speech on the Influence of Society on Education. "I wasn't that musically talented, but Mr. Connelly guided me through. One of my favorite memories is playing the 'Stars and Stripes Forever' on the football field at graduation, and me pounding the hell out of the bass drum!"

Jan Younggren Moore, '68 and Gail Giovannetti excitedly relay the fun they had playing softball and flag football, riding horses and floating down the Russian River on inner tubes. "My dad was the school district superintendent." says Moore. "That could pose a problem - like the time a few of us skipped school to go to the Foster Freeze. My dad pulled up next to us and asked, 'What are you Foster flies doing here?"

Sydney Smith, '68 senior class officer, sadly recounts that, "We were seniors in high school when Robert Kennedy was assassinated. It was probably the first time we felt the world wasn't as safe as we thought it was. But our faculty was very encouraging and helped us to be well-rounded. We heard all about what was going on in the San Francisco Haight Ashbury district, but here in Cloverdale, we had bonfires by the river with the occasional teenage pranks, but we were still innocent." she says smiling.

Girls," says Pam Lampson McPherson, '67, laughing. Pam and Carolyn Kindall, Vicky Groom, Chris and Leslie Myers and Linda and Toni Lampson were enough to create a girls' club!"

"My dad had a grocery store and butcher shop where the old Ice House is now." says Johanna Goodman Stockham, '69. "We used to cut school and go up to the snow in Pine Mountain." she says chortling. "But then, we'd get detention.

Every Eagle who embraced, laughed and cried that day had a different high school experience from one another. Classmates came back to share these memories and, as country western singer, Buck Owens, once crooned, "nothing else matters because we're together again."

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Gore Now President of National Association of Counties

Sonoma County District 4 Supervisor James Gore this week was named president of the National Association of Counties, an advocacy organization founded in 1935 to represent the priorities of county governments in the United States. Supervisor Gore was sworn in on July 15 during the association's Annual Business Meeting in Hillsborough County, Fla., after receiving broad, bipartisan support from elected leaders representing over 3,000 rural, urban and suburban counties nationwide. Supervisor Gore will serve as president for a year, leading the NACo executive committee in oversight of the association.

"With all the divisiveness in our state and national political arenas, it falls on us at the local level to bring truth to the table and forge progress," said Supervisor Gore. "I'm honored to serve and look forward to continuing to innovate, collaborate and tackle head-on the most difficult issues faced by my constituents in Sonoma County and counties across our nation."

Supervisor Gore also serves as chair of NACo's Programs and Services Committee, serves on the executive committee for the Latino Caucus of California Counties, and is co-chair of the North Coast Resource Partnership, a consortium of seven counties and 30 tribes. In 2021, Gov. Gavin Newsom appointed Gore to the executive committee for the California State Wildfire and Forest Resiliency Task Force.

Gore was born and raised in the 4th District, which stretches from northern Santa Rosa, northeast to Fulton and north to Healdsburg and Cloverdale. He was first elected to serve on the Board of Supervisors in 2014. In addition to his work with NACo, Supervisor Gore is past president of the California State Association of Counties and a former member of Resilient America Roundtable for the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine.

A Pickup In 3rd Quarter

Although California home sales remained stagnant in June, as the 30-year fixed rate mortgage remained above 7 percent throughout most of May, there may be some good news on the horizon.

"With interest rates coming down to the lowest levels since February and the availability of homes loosening up further in the last few months, the housing market is gearing up for another run in the second half of the year," per the C.A.R. 2024 Resale Housing Report. "We could see a pickup in market momentum at the start of the third quarter if rates decline in a more sustainable way in the coming weeks and buyers decide to take advantage of lower costs of borrowing."

The statewide median price set recent record highs but June's median price slipped from \$908,040 in May to \$900,720 in June. But the year-over-year gain was the 12th straight month of annual price increases.

Stronger sales of higher-priced properties continued. Million-dollar home sales in California have been rising more rapidly than their more affordable counterparts in the state. Sales of homes priced above \$1 million now make up 36.3 percent of all sales, nearly the biggest share in at least the last five years.

New active listings at the state level increased from a year ago for the sixth consecutive month. The statewide average price per square foot for an existing single-family home was \$440, up from \$412 in June a year ago. The 30-year, fixed-mortgage interest rate averaged 6.92 percent in June, up from 6.71 percent in June 2023, according to C.A.R.'s calculations based on Freddie Mac's weekly mortgage survey data.

August Gardening Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardeners

With continued irrigation, the ornamental garden largely takes care of itself this month as summer winds down, though there's always activity in vegetable beds. This is a month of planning for fall and keeping your eyes open for plants under stress.

- If you've never planted a fall or winter vegetable garden, think about doing it this year.
- Stay alert to signs of water stress, especially for plants in containers and hanging baskets. An occasional deep soaking during periods of high heat benefits most plants, even those that do not require regular water. Make sure your garden is well-mulched to conserve moisture.
- If you have a lawn and want to conserve water or reduce your water bill, you can forgo watering without inflicting permanent damage even though grass may turn brown and lie dormant. To reduce stress, keep grass 3 in. high and do not mow too often. Don't fertilize either, as this simply stimulates new growth that requires more water. Better yet,

remove turf altogether and rely on low water-use plants.

- Continue to deadhead perennials and annuals. Periodic freshening will keep containers going through the fall. Heavy bloomers can be trimmed and fertilized.
- If you plan to be away this summer, ensure that you have someone to water or set up your irrigation system on automatic timers. When you return from vacation, do a check of the entire garden to make sure that nothing was ignored while you were away.
- Start making a checklist of fall chores that may be unique to your garden. Plants that need to be moved or divided, for example, will appreciate your waiting until shorter days and cooler, moister weather. If you want to reduce water usage in the future, make a list of the biggest water-hogs in your garden and decide if they are worth keeping or can be replaced in the coming months with more droughttolerant species.

Update on the November 2024 Sales Tax Measure

As we approach the November 2024 elections, Cloverdale's City Council has been actively working to address the city's critical financial needs. Following the recent council meetings and community feedback, we have an important update regarding the proposed 3/4 cent sales tax measure that will be on the ballot. This measure aims to generate additional revenue for essential services and infrastructure improvements in Cloverdale.

Background and Need for the Measure

Cloverdale faces significant financial challenges, including a \$1,000,000 annual structural operational budget deficit, \$17,000,000 needed for a new police station, and \$30,000,000 required for road repairs and maintenance. These critical needs cannot be met with the city's current financial resources alone. To address these challenges, the City Council has proposed a 3/4 cent sales tax measure to be voted on in the upcoming November election.

Key Elements of the Proposed Measure

Financial Context: The city has limited financial capacity to fund critical capital projects and service priorities. Often, budget reserves are used to close expenditure and revenue gaps, but this is not a sustainable solution. The proposed 3/4 cent sales tax increase is expected to generate approximately \$1.6 million annually, providing a crucial revenue stream to support Cloverdale's essential services.

Allocation of Funds: The funds generated from the sales tax increase will be used for:

- Road Repairs and Maintenance: One-third of the city's roads are rated in poor or very poor condition. It will cost an estimated \$5 million over the next five years to maintain their current condition and almost \$31 million to bring all roads up to fair or good condition.
- Pedestrian and Safety Improvements: Over \$1 million is needed for unfunded pedestrian and safety improvement projects, such as sidewalks along Asti Road and restriping Cloverdale Blvd.
- **Park Improvements**: The city has identified over \$2.5 million for planned improvements at city parks, in addition to ongoing maintenance and repair costs.
- **Public Safety**: The police station is in poor condition and requires over \$10 million for replacement, including at least \$250,000 for design and planning. The Police Department also needs regular vehicle and equipment replacements.

Community Feedback and Support: The City Council has gathered valuable feedback from the community through town hall meetings and surveys. Although the Isom Advisors' study indicated that only 43.1% of respondents supported a 0.75% sales tax increase, the council believes that the proposed measure, with clear communication and accountability, can gain the necessary support. report on the revenue and expenditures every five years.

The upcoming sales tax measure is a critical step towards addressing Cloverdale's financial challenges and ensuring the sustainability of essential services. We urge all residents to review the details of this measure carefully and participate in the November 2024 election. Your vote will play a crucial role in shaping the future of our community.

Comparison with Other Sonoma County Cities: Many cities in Sonoma County have higher sales tax rates to support their infrastructure and services. For instance, Petaluma and Cotati charge a 1% sales tax, while Sonoma charges 0.75%. Healdsburg, with a 0.50% rate, collects significantly more revenue due to higher transaction volumes, generating \$1,288,376 quarterly compared to Cloverdale's \$247,460. Additionally, both the City of Sonoma and City of Sebastopol are placing local sales tax measures on the ballot. The proposed 3/4 cent increase in Cloverdale is necessary to ensure adequate funding for essential services.

Oversight and Accountability

To ensure transparency and proper use of funds, the proposed measure includes:

- **Annual Audits**: The ordinance requires an annual audit of the revenue collected and its expenditures.
- Citizen Oversight Committee: A three-person independent citizens oversight committee will be appointed to review and



City Council Report Eleanore Webster

At the June 26th meeting, the City Council adopted a resolution establishing and updating the schedule of fees and charges for City services and repealing previously adopted and conflicting fees and charges. The Council then considered approval of the City's Annual Engineer's report. This is the next step in the process of levying and collecting assessments for landscaping and lighting in Cloverdale for 2024 and 2025. Attachments on the budget, report and resolutions are included in the online agenda, https://www.cloverdale.net/agendacenter. The Report was approved.

Councilmember Bagby commented on the SMART meeting, saying it was an excellent groundbreaking event in the multi-mobile trail for Sonoma County as it comes further north. We're making progress. Windsor is expected to break ground in 2025, as the rail access moves north.

Mayor Lands thanked CalFire and the local fire district for their efforts in fighting the fire around Lake Sonoma and the more recent Preston fire. City Staff was also thanked for providing timely updates to Council Members. The City Manager then presented his report, highlighting the Watch Duty phone app which does an excellent job of keeping residents informed on fire activity in the area. The City Manager also reported that the grant application that included the Asti river bridge was not successful. Council members recognized the hard work put into the application as well as its importance and agreed that the application will be submitted again when the next opportunity arises.

The July 10th meeting was cancelled.

Breakthrough In Decades-Old Sarah Geer Murder Case

The Cloverdale Police Department has announced a major breakthrough in the decades-old Sarah Geer murder case, bringing closure to a tragic event that has haunted the community for over forty years. The cold case, dating back to the 1982 murder of 13-year-old Sarah Ann Geer, has finally been resolved.

Former Police Chief Jason Ferguson, who reopened the investigation in July 2021, retired in December 2023. His successor, Chief Chris Parker, continued the pursuit of justice alongside private investigator Kevin Cline and Cloverdale Detective Katie Vanoni. Sergeant Borruso initially took charge of the investigation in 2021, meticulously reviewing evidence and conducting interviews. A male DNA profile was identified from the evidence and through the use of modern DNA genetic genealogy technology, this dedicated team has successfully identified and apprehended James Unick, 62, from Willows, California. He has been taken into custody and is being booked into the Sonoma County Jail (Charges: 187(a) PC Murder, 261(a)(1) PC Rape, 207(b) PC Kidnapping, and 288(b)(1) PC Lewd and Lascivious acts with a minor under 14 by force.

Library Makes Materials in Spanish a Priority Tim Polk, Sonoma County Library

The Sonoma County Library has a team of nine translators who translate most, if not all, of the library's marketing and event materials into Spanish.

"Translating materials helps overcome the language obstacles many library patrons in Cloverdale and the greater Sonoma County area face," said the library's lead translator, Gabriela Vargas. "The language barrier is still very big in Sonoma County, and the Spanish-speaking community needs to know we are working hard to speak with them in their own language, using a voice that is friendly, trustworthy, and welcoming," Vargas said.

Mayra Arreguin, Director of Community Engagement for the Cloverdale-based non-profit La Familia Sana, said the library's Spanish language materials play a vital role for underserved people in the area. Providing materials in Spanish "is a great service and helps embrace our diversity," Arreguin said.

The translations team consists of both branch librarians and library headquarters staff, and each translator must pass a written test. At any given time, more than 30 projects are in various stages of initial translation, review, and approval. Translations are done for posters, flyers, online event calendar listings, bookmarks, radio ads, and more.

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Lake Sonoma and the Warm Springs Dam Elissa Morrash, Executive Director, Cloverdale Historical Society

Warm Springs Dam, which formed Lake Sonoma, was completed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in 1983. The lake provides flood control, irrigation and recreation. When full, the lake has a surface area of more than 2,700 acres and 50 miles of shoreline, forming the perfect setting for a wealth of recreational activities. Located just 8.7 miles from town, the lake is an easy 10 minute drive for Cloverdalians. This land is rich in Pomo history for thousands of years. For the last nearly 150 years the lake area provides a resort destination for locals and visitors. It has been the home of a wide variety of recreational activities, ranging from the famed Skaggs Hot Springs in the 1900s, to hunting and fishing, and now waterskiing, hiking, swimming and boating. The Milt Brandt Visitors Center, a beautiful park with shaded picnic areas, and the Don Clausen Fish Hatchery are all a part of today's Lake Sonoma experience.

The Warm Springs Cultural Resources Study, headed by Adrian Praetzellis and Mary Praetzellis, was one of the first large projects conducted under federal historic preservation laws and regulations enacted in the 1960s. From 1974 to 1984, before the filling of Lake Sonoma behind Warm Springs Dam, the area was intensively studied by a team of archaeologists, cultural anthropologists, architectural historians, ethnobotanists, historians, and Native American traditional scholars.





Philippines' First Governor-General Was a Cloverdalian Mary Jo Winter

James Francis Smith, the first Governor-General of the Philippine Islands, was another distinguished citizen who called Cloverdale home."Smithton," the large house where his family and five siblings lived, was located on Skunk Creek, now called Cherry Creek Road. Large palm trees, a low stone wall and iron gates are recognized today as part of the 7 Palms Mobile Home Park.

Born January 25, 1859, in San Francisco, Smith was educated at Santa Clara College and Hastings Law School. He was admitted to California Bar in 1881. Commissioned in 1898 as a Colonel in the 1st California Regiment, U.S. Volunteers, Smith served in the first expedition to the Philippines, and participated in the Battle of Malate Trenches and the capture of Manila.

In Manila, he was the Deputy Provost Marshall for the city and President of the Military Commission. On March 1, 1899, Colonel Smith assumed command of the then Philippine sub-district of the Island of Negros. He was soon promoted to Brigadier General and, by the end of July, appointed Governor of the Island of Negros.

A very rewarding event held for the past 24 years is the

His military career ended in 1901 with his appointment as an associate justice to the Supreme Court of the Philippine Islands. He was also a member of the Philippine Commission and Secretary of Public Instruction. From September 20, 1906, until his resignation on November 11, 1909, Smith was the appointed Governor-General of the Philippines.

He briefly returned to Cloverdale before being nominated by President William Howard Taft in March 2010 to become an Associate Judge in the U. S. Court of Customs Appeals in Washington D.C. He held this position until he died on June 29, 1928, after suffering a heart attack while on the bench earlier in the day.

Smith was buried with full military honors and laid to rest beside his wife at Holy Cross Cemetery in Colma, CA.

Let's Travel ~ Craig Clark

Flight canceled or delayed? Here's what to do next

I know we have talked about this previously but with an average of 20% of flights delayed and up to 2% cancelled*, let's review.

Always check the status of your flight on your airline's website. You can get flight status updates sent directly from Flight-Aware as well.

The airline app should probably be your first stop after you learn of a major hiccup in your travel plans. Can't find what you need on the app and you're at the airport, find an airline employee who can work the reservation and ticketing system. If the U.S. call center has a long hold time (which happens during widespread issues), you can try dialing an international number for faster service. You can often find those numbers on the airline's website. I Googled "United Airlines international reservations" and was able to access call center phone numbers throughout Europe.

Retreat to the airlines lounge even though you may have to pay for access. The agents there might be able to help you change or track your flight.

It's important to know what your rights are as an airline passenger. For instance, if your flight is canceled or significantly delayed and you choose not to travel, you're entitled to a refund, no matter the reason for the disruption. If it's a major disruption and you're stuck or stranded consider your options at airport hotels. Better to sleep in a hotel room rather than the airport terminal

Last but not least, be firm when making travel decisions when there's a delay or cancellation. The longer you wait to switch flights or book a hotel, the greater the chances you'll be at the mercy of whatever dwindling options are left as hundreds (or thousands) of other passengers rebook their plans.





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Cooking with David Maciel Sponsored by Ray's Food Place

If you're like me and refuse to turn on your oven / stovetop in these hot August days. This Prosciutto and Melon salad is the perfect answer. Not only does it work really well as a stand-alone lunch, but also goes great with lasagna or grilled chicken.

Prosciutto and Melon salad

Ingredients

- 1 tablespoon champagne vinegar or white vinegar
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 5 ounces baby arugula
- 1 small cantaloupe sliced or scooped into melon balls
- 1 small honeydew sliced or scooped into melon balls
- 8 ounces bite-size fresh mozzarella drained
- 2 to 3 ounces prosciutto torn
- Fresh basil leaves
- Fresh mint leaves

Instructions

Whisk the vinegar, salt and pepper while slowly pouring in the olive oil. Toss the dressing with the arugula and transfer to a serving platter.

Tuck the sliced or scooped melon in the arugula and top with mozzarella balls and tear the prosciutto into bite-size pieces and scatter it overtop as well. Scatter with the fresh basil and mint leaves, drizzle with balsamic vinegar and season with freshly ground black pepper.
