

"The Cloverdale Unified School District embraces innovative practices that engage all students and staff to maximize potential, achieve goals and build community." This is the vision statement shared by Trustee Preston Addison as he addressed the public at the May meeting of the Cloverdale Democratic Club.

Mr. Addison shared that attributes essential for the successful Trustee include the ability to think critically, understand one's voice is part of a team, and commit to and follow through on long-range goals. He added that successful Board members are critical to the health of the District and – most importantly – the future of the students that the Trustees serve.

He outlined these specifics to those interested in running for a position on the Board of Trustees:

- Three seats are open in the November Election.
- Trustee terms are four years.
- Candidates must be residents of the Cloverdale Unified School District (which is geographically larger than the City of Cloverdale.)
- The filing period begins July 15th and ends August 9th.
- Filing is completed at the Sonoma County Registrar of Voters Office – 435 Fiscal Drive, Santa Rosa. As a part of the filing process, candidates must supply signatures of registered voters and/or pay a filing fee.
- Should three or fewer individuals file for a seat, no election will be held and those who filed will be appointed.

Membership on the Board of Trustees involves both a commitment of time and of one's heart. It is both challenging and rewarding. Like any elected official, Trustees soon find that it is impossible to please every member of the electorate, but having a hand in shaping the policies that foster today's youth as they become the productive community members of tomorrow is gratifying beyond measure.

Interested? Up for the challenge? Willing to serve others? Again, three seats are open in November.

The mission of the CloDems is to foster an informed and engaged electorate.







Potter Valley Water Project Eleanore Webster

On May 22nd, City Council declared Public Works Week. Cole Timmer and Bobby Spagnola were present to receive the recognition on behalf of their coworkers. They expressed their desire to continue working as they are self-proclaimed "young, hard-working men". Everyone present agreed and photos were taken. There was also an interesting presentation on the Sonoma County library system and the Cloverdale Regional Library.

Supervisor James Gore gave an important presentation on the Potter Valley water project. This project will have a major impact on our future water availability. Cloverdale has sustained water because of diversion from the Eel River to the Russian River. The diversion was created in the early 1900's to provide hydropower, leading to Scott and Cape Horn Dams on the Eel River; this evolved in the 1950's to manage flooding in the lower Russian River, eventually creating Lake Mendocino/ Coyote Dam and Lake Sonoma/Warm Springs Dam. Diverted water filled Lake Mendocino for people in Potter Valley. When Lake Mendocino fills up, water goes through Ukiah/Alexander Valley to agricultural wells in our area. The whole water system is based on plentiful water. Municipal wells in Cloverdale, Geyserville, and Healdsburg depend on this system. PG&E no longer needs the dams, which has led to this evolving project.

Humboldt, Lake, Mendocino and Sonoma counties all have stakes here, as do area Native American tribes. Northern Sonoma County is fragile because we don't have connection to Lake Sonoma. The goal is to keep sustained flows from the Eel River so Cloverdale has reliable water access. Any proposals would have to go before the State Water Board, PG&E, and others. This will take years, lots of money and lots of negotiation.

The Eel-Russian Project Authority (ERPA) was formed between the area Counties and Water Agencies. Supervisor Gore represents Sonoma County on ERPA's Board of Directors. Check the website, www.eelrussianauthority.org for more information. Supervisor Gore told Council that Cloverdale needs to stay involved to protect its water availability. There is a bond on the ballot in November; we need to make sure it includes our area. Check out the recording of the meeting for more information:

Your Digital Estate ~ Will Carter

On April 12th, 2021, my father, Greg, passed away following a battle with lung cancer. After his death, I found myself responsible for stewarding my father's digital existence and much of our family history. As our lives have involved more and more technology, our legacies are changing: photo albums are replaced by cloud storage, important letters and correspondence by files, and many personal and business relationships are now password protected. These changes present new concerns in estate preparation and to anyone whose loved one has passed. Luckily there are a few simple steps to take in either of these circumstances to make the process easier.

In your own planning, you should discuss your technology use with your lawyer, executor(s), or other trusted party. Things to review include any digital copies of personal or family photos and documents, any online-only friends or acquaintances to be notified, and the passwords and other security measures on any accounts that might need to be accessed. If you expect to be survived by a partner, spouse, or other immediate family member, consider transferring some accounts to their name in advance.

If you are responsible for the digital aspects of an estate, you will want to proceed carefully to protect accounts and data. Since many accounts use a phone call or text as verification, or to reset a password, you will want to keep any phone lines connected until you have transferred or closed all accounts. Many service providers will be happy to help you at this time if you lose access, however, they will need to verify your identity and your claim. Be sure to have a digital copy of the Death Certificate and any document that proves your relationship (Marriage Certificate, Birth Certificate, Trust/Estate Documents, etc.) available to send as needed.

The time following the death of a loved one is rife with mourning, upset, and frustration. Taking some time to plan for your digital estate will help ease this process. If you need help figuring out how to plan, or help following the passing of your loved one, ask a trusted friend or consultant for help.

On the Wild Side: Black Bears Jennifer Molidor

Summer is here and children are ready to get outside and splash, snack, and explore. This season's new Black bear cubs are too. Black bears have been seen lately in Sonoma County regional parks and even near a Guerneville home. So as you head out to camp and spend time outdoors, here's how to be bear-wise.

First, don't panic. Black bears (who can be black, brown, cinnamon, blonde, or white) are the smallest, least aggressive bears in the U.S. In California, if you see a bear, it's a Black bear (there are no grizzlies here). Black bears are timid and run from loud noise. They are not a threat to humans or pets.

Second, if you see a bear, give a loud "Hey bear!" and give room for them to pass. Bang pots, raise your voice, or set off a car alarm. This will send them scurrying into the trees virtually every time. Otherwise, call Fish & Wildlife at (916) 322-8911.

Third, secure your food, trash, and compost. When camping, store food in bear boxes - don't leave food in your car. Bears are looking for food to fatten up before winter hibernation. Don't worry, even if you consider yourself a snack, they don't! Finally, don't approach to take photos, just give them space and we'll all stay safe.

- Black bears are great swimmers and swim up to a mile and a half.
- Black bears are climbers too and send cubs up trees when scared.
- Black bears are omnivores: they eat plants, insects, and fish.
- A group of Black bears is called a sloth.
- Bear paws are as big as a baseball glove!

July Gardening Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardeners Sponsored by Sanz Nursery

July is the month when gardeners typically start to observe water problems, especially if they have not been practicing waterwise gardening methods.

- We are now well into the hot, dry season; check to make sure all irrigation systems are working and drip lines have not been disturbed by pets or wildlife.
- If you planted any trees, shrubs, or perennials this spring or summer, they likely need extra irrigation to adjust. Foliage and root growth may be stressed. Root balls must never dry out while plants are getting established. Water them evenly and thoroughly to encourage both lateral and deep root growth.
- Avoid killing spiders in your garden. Spiders do not harm plants and they help keep down other insect populations.
- Weeds are usually more vigorous than flowers and will rob plants of water and nutrients. Remove weeds regularly especially before they produce seed.
- Cut back flowering perennials to force new growth and keep their blooms coming.
- Deadhead perennials and annuals to prevent them from setting seed, which slows continued flowering.
- If you are looking for summer color, continue to add annuals to beds and containers. Try not to do any major planting of perennials, shrubs, or trees in summer.
- If you find plants at the nursery that you cannot resist, make sure that if you plant them in established beds, you are vigilant about keeping them frequently watered. Another solution is to designate an out of the way, shaded spot and group together any summer purchases. Check them every other day or so and water as needed. Small pots may need watering once a day during heat waves. Plant them in the fall once rains resume.

Library Facing Funding Challenges

Sonoma County Library is bracing for significant impacts due to a budget deficit faced by the State of California. The library community understands the state's budget challenges but emphasizes that balancing the budget should not come at the expense of children's nutrition or essential library services.

Key Programs at Risk:

- 1. California Library Services Act (CLSA): 50% reduction of \$1.8 million for both FY 2024-25 and 2025-26. CLSA funding is crucial for offsetting delivery costs, including those between Sonoma County, Lake County, and Mendocino County libraries, supports the sharing of physical and electronic materials, ensuring access to information for all residents, including those without internet access.
- 2. **Lunch at the Library**: A cut of \$2.5 million to the lunch program Sonoma County Library offers this service at seven branches during the summer, including Cloverdale, providing nutritious meals to youth from Monday to Friday. For some children, this may be the only meal they receive all day.

The Library Director urges residents to contact state legislators to advocate for the restoration of funding. Templates for letters to legislators are available through the library. Formore information, please contact library info@sonomalibrary.org. Your support and advocacy can make a difference in preserving these crucial programs for our community.

November 2024 Ballot Measures Overview

City Manager David Kelley

We're excited to bring you an update on the upcoming November 5, 2024 Election. Two significant local measures will likely be presented to Cloverdale voters. The first measure involves the amendment and extension of the City Urban Growth Boundary (UGB), while the second measure will likely propose a ¾ cent sales tax increase to generate additional revenue for essential city services. This article provides an in-depth overview of these measures to inform and educate voters.

Proposed Sales Tax Measure

The City Council is considering placing measure on the ballot to generate additional revenue to address Cloverdale's critical financial needs. This measure is pivotal for maintaining and enhancing the city's infrastructure and services, particularly in parks, streets, and public safety.

Financial Context:

Like many cities, Cloverdale has been facing budget deficits and significant funding needs for essential services and infrastructure maintenance, in part due to significant inflation in recent years. The city's General Fund, which supports a wide range of services, has been stretched thin, often relying on budget reserves to bridge gaps. The Long-Term Financial Forecast and 5-Year Capital Infrastructure Plan have highlighted these challenges, underscoring the necessity for additional revenue sources. The City's financial needs include, but are not limited to:

- Road Repairs. 1/3 of the City's roads are rated in poor or very poor condition. Over the next five years it will cost an estimated \$5 million to maintain the current condition of the City roads, and almost \$31 million to bring all City roads up to fair or good condition.
- Pedestrian & Safety Improvements. The City currently has over \$1 million dollars in unfunded pedestrian and safety improvements projects for the next two years, such as sidewalks along Asti Road and restriping of Cloverdale Blvd.
- **Park Improvements**. The City has identified over \$2.5 million of planned improvements at City Parks, in addition to ongoing maintenance and repair costs for existing park facilities and equipment.
- **Public Safety**. The City's Police Station is in very poor condition and needs to be replaced. The cost of replacement is over \$10 million, including at least \$250,000 for design and planning. The Police Department also has ongoing needs for vehicles and equipment to be replaced regularly.

Proposed Sales Tax Increase:

The City Council has considered different potential revenue measures to help fund these critical needs, including a potential increase in the sales tax. Cities may enact sales tax increases, the revenue from which remains completely with the City. Cloverdale is one of only two cities in Sonoma County which has not enacted a local sales tax measure. Seven cities in Sonoma County have enacted local sales tax measures ranging from ½ cent to 1 cent. A ¾ cent (\$.0075) sales tax increase would generate approximately \$1.66 million annually for the City. This entire amount would stay within Cloverdale, and no portion would be shared with the County or State.

Council Consideration:

At the regularly scheduled City Council meeting on July 24, 2024, the City Council will vote on whether or not to place a ¾ cent sales tax increase on the November to fund infrastructure repairs and critical services. Members of the public are invited to attend the meeting to hear more information on the City's financial condition, and provide their feedback on the measure. The potential sales tax measure would require simple majority (50%+1) support to pass.

Urban Growth Boundary Amendment and Extension

The Urban Growth Boundary (UGB) is a component of Cloverdale's land-use planning strategy. Established by Measure G in 2010, the UGB delineates the area within which urban development can occur, thereby preserving the surrounding rural and agricultural lands.

Background and Need for Amendment:

In recent years, there has been increased interest in limited development of land areas just outside the current UGB, particularly from organizations like Clearwater Ranch, who serves families of individuals with developmental disabilities. This non-profit adult care facility, located off Cherry Creek Road, has faced limitations due to its location outside the UGB and the city's Sphere of Influence, restricting its access to city services, such as water and sewer. Clearwater Ranch, along with other property owners in the western hills, have expressed a desire to amend the UGB to allow for future annexation and expansion. In addition, the City's two major open spaces areas are currently outside of City limits and therefore the City is required to pay significant annual property taxes to the County for these properties. On June 12, the City Council vote 5-0 to place a measure on the November 5, 2024 ballot to amend the boundaries of, and extend the term of, the UGB

Proposed Changes:

The proposed ballot measure has two components:

- 1. Modify the UGB Location: The measure amends the location of the UGB to include areas in the western hills adjacent to Cloverdale's current City boundaries. This extension is designed to bring properties like Clearwater Ranch within the UGB, facilitating future annexation and development under city, rather than County, zoning and development standards. This shift would facilitate the city retaining control over development, aligning it with Cloverdale's goals of preserving the western hillside while allowing for some limited expansion.
- 2. **Extend the UGB Term**: Currently, any changes to the UGB before January 1, 2030 require voter approval. The proposed measure will extend this date to January 1, 2050.

Impact:

If approved, the measure would bring additional areas within the UGB. Those areas could then move forward with the process of being annexed into the City. The annexation process is governed by the Sonoma County Local Agency Formation Commission ("Sonoma County LAFCo"). When property annexes into the City, it is subject to Cloverdale's development standards, rather than the County's. The City's development standards emphasize preserving the character and environment of the western hills. Additionally, property that is annexed into the City can receive City services, including water and sewer.

Voter Consideration:

The question presented to voters will be:

"Shall an Ordinance be adopted to extend the term of the City's Urban Growth Boundary by 20 years and modify the City's Urban Growth Boundary to include the western hillside adjacent to the City's existing boundary to facilitate City rather than County control over development in this area to further the City's goal of preserving the hillside from significant new development?"

A simple majority (50%+1) is required for the measure to pass. Approval would mark the beginning of a lengthy process involving amendments to the City's Sphere of Influence and subsequent annexation procedures, subject to Sonoma County LAFCO's approval.



Recent Town Hall Meeting Eleanore Webster

On May 22, the City Council meeting transitioned to a Town Hall. The Town Hall started with a a presentation by the City Manager and department staff on the City's budget shortages. Council members wanted feedback from the public on a November ballot measure. The key needs are parks and recreation, police, and public works. The budget shows a significant shortfall for items like repair and replacement of community owned assets. Cloverdale needs a new police station, funding for parks, and ongoing programs. There are two measures that can be placed on the ballot: a general tax that must be approved by a simple majority of the voters, and a special Bond measure that requires a 2/3 super-majority. Cloverdale is one of only two cities in the County that do not have its own sales tax; most have a .5% sales tax.

Transactions and Use Tax (TUT) is a local sales tax allocated to the city. It provides much more revenue than the small portion we receive from the statewide sales tax. A sales tax of .75% would be about \$39 on \$5000 taxable purchases. Revenue from sales tax also comes from outside (tourists for example). The bond measure helps spread the cost of expensive projects over many years. It can be used for capital improvements, not services, and is repaid by property taxes. A bond could be about \$300 annual tax on a property of about \$500k.

Mayor Lands explained the urgency of the matter, especially given the State's budgetary problems, and concerns about the State failing to meet its funding promises. Members of the public were asked to voice their opinions. Some expressed support for sales tax but not property tax, and some felt a property tax was fairer because the sales tax is harder on lower income folks. There were about 30 members of the public present. Concerns were expressed about the number of revenue measures that will appear on November's ballot, as well as about lack of funds to meet needs such as fixing potholes and giving us a police station that will remain in operation during the next emergency. Council members listened and thanked participants.

Also on May 22nd, City Council declared Public Works Week. Cole Timmer and Bobby Spagnola were present to receive the recognition on behalf of their coworkers. There was also an interesting presentation on the Sonoma County library system and the Cloverdale Regional Library.

Supervisor James Gore gave an important presentation on the Potter Valley water project. This project will have a major impact on our future water availability. (see "Potter Valley Water Project" article, page 5, June Cloverdale Connect)

At the June 12th meeting, two proclamations were read in support of LGBTAIA+ Pride Month and Boys and Girls Club Youth of the Year awards.

The City of Cloverdale Biennial Budget was adopted with a forecasted reduction in the reserves. Revenue and cost-cutting measures will be needed.

A resolution was adopted to extend the City's Urban Growth Boundary to incorporate Clearwater Ranch.

The revenue measure discussed earlier at the Town Hall meeting was then considered. Council decided to put a .75% sales tax on the ballot for projects such as fixing the roads, with the recognition that future funding would be needed for a police station. We are one City out of two in the County that do not have a dedicated sales tax and this lack of funding is evident in our roads and sidewalks.





Cloverdale's July 4th celebration in 1924 Mary Jo Winter

One hundred years ago on July 4, 1924, Cloverdale's City Park on West Second Street was dedicated. It was also the date of Cloverdale's first community-wide celebration of Independence Day.

Plans for the big day were first discussed during a Chamber of Commerce board meeting shortly after the conclusion of an exceptionally successful Citrus Fair earlier that year and the recording of the deed transferring the new park property to the city.

It was decided that no May Day Festival would be held that year. Instead, organizers would devote their full attention to planning the big July 4th event.

Crowds began arriving early that day, and Boy Scouts were on the grounds to arrange parking. An estimated four to five thousand people were on the grounds at some point during the day.

At noon, the free BBQ was like a magnet. In the afternoon, a jitney dance was well attended, and the playground was a favorite hangout for the children. Entertaining musical numbers were rendered, games were played, and a sports program proved to be of considerable interest.

Congressman Clarence E. Lea paid tribute to the farsightedness of the community in procuring such a fine recreation spot in his concluding remarks, congratulating all who had made it possible.

That evening, a grand ball was held in the open-air platform and the refreshment stand was a popular place until well after midnight when the festivities concluded.

Kudos were given to the Chamber of Commerce for the successful way the event was handled from start to finish.

While the celebration was not conducted as a money-making enterprise, there was still a \$90 surplus after all bills were paid. The money was then added to the Chamber's treasury.

How To Renew Your US Passport Online

You may now be able to renew your passport online at https://travel.state.gov/ Renew Online - Beta Release. Applications open at 1 p.m. Eastern time daily, on a first-come, first-served basis. If you aren't able to start your application that day, keep checking back to see if a slot opens up.

Expect six to eight weeks for routine service and two to three weeks for expedited service, online or by mail.

You must meet these qualifications to renew online:

The passport you are renewing was issued between 2009 and 2015, or over 9 years but less than 15 years from the date you plan to submit your application.

- 1. You are not changing your name, gender, date of birth, or place of birth.
- 2. You are not traveling internationally for at least 8 weeks from the date you will submit your application.
- 3. You are applying for a regular (tourist) passport. You cannot renew a special issuance (diplomatic, official, service) passport online.
- 4. You live in the United States (either state or territory). You do not qualify to renew online if you live in a foreign country or have an Army Post Office (APO) or Fleet Post Office (FPO) address.
- 5. You have your passport with you, and it is not damaged or mutilated, and you have not previously reported it as lost or stolen. Keep your most recent passport and do not mail it to us.
- 6. You can pay for your passport using a credit or debit card.
- 7. You can upload a digital passport photo.
- 8. You are aware that the passport you are renewing will be canceled after you submit your application, and you cannot use it for international travel.

This Old House Jennifer Jordan, Cloverdale Historical Society

I have always had a curiosity about old houses. If only they could talk! We could hear stories about who built them and who lived in them— stories about the families, the births, deaths, marriages, parties, and scandals over the years. In my own way, I have explored the streets and houses here in Cloverdale. I was always curious about a Victorian house at 221 North Jefferson Street, loving its decorative windows and eaves troughs. It looked like a house with a story, so I did some research and found out it was built in 1880 by Fred Yordi. (Yorty Creek is named after him although it is misspelled.)



Who was Fred Yordi? He had a large mercantile business in the old Shaw-Bowman building, located at Second St. and Cloverdale Blvd., which he had purchased from those two early merchants in 1888. He also had a large stock ranch four miles west

of town. The house originally had four acres of land around it which was planted with fruit. Apparently, there were 200 orange trees on that property. In the late 1880s and early 1900s, Cloverdale was known as the Orange Belt of Sonoma County. Our Citrus Fair is a relic of that name.

Today, the land around the house has shrunk with just a couple of orange trees. It still retains its Victorian flavor. Next time you pass by this old house, think about the people who lived there originally and throughout the years. If you would like to do your own research, the library at the Cloverdale History Center is a wonderful place to start.


New SMART Larkspur Shuttle






Cloverdale Creative Corner Christy Anne

Well kids the heat has arrived a bit early; it is an awesome time to hide indoors with a good fan or a/c and have fun creating things at the kitchen table. I am guessing many have seen pics transferred to wood, but I realized I had never given it a go, so perfect timing indeed and I am both happy and, if I am honest, a bit surprised how easy it was!



So much potential, but not wanting to waste materials if it didn't work out, I decided to start small. Now, there are different versions of this, but I opted for the Mod Podge version as it is a medium many are familiar with and already have on hand. So, supplies needed for actual transfer? A photo printed on paper using a laser printer, Mod Podge, a piece of raw wood, sandpaper to smooth out surface and, a foam or regular paint brush, and lastly something to smooth down the paper with a clean flat edge.

I lightly sanded the wood and wiped it off. After cutting picture to size I brushed the entire face of wood with Mod Podge, on a piece of foil I dredged the cut-out photo through a puddle of Mod Podge to coat and placed face down in the position I wanted it. I lightly held corners and proceeded to smooth out the photo, releasing all the air bubbles and removing the excess Mod Podge and left overnight to dry. Once fully dry you can use any washcloth and spray with some water and slowly start to rub off all the paper. Be gentle as it takes a few runs to get all the paper off without damaging image. Once all the paper is off, let dry and seal with a clear coat of some kind. Then it's up to you - leave simple or add whatever makes your heart smile. With small nails and a glue gun...the sky is the limit!









County Wide Early Literacy Program


On June 1st the County of Sonoma took a giant leap into supporting early literacy by kicking off the Sonoma County Chapter of the Dolly Parton Imagination Library. According to Rachel King of the Dollywood Foundation, the county wide expansion was inspired by the long-term relationship between Dollywood and Cloverdale. "When the state expansion was launched Julie, who now sits on the Sonoma County DPIL Advisory Board, was one of the first people to reach out to us," explained Kina.



Sailing Into the Olympics Hans Henken*

As a California native, I began sailing at six-years-old in the Naples Sabot. Over my career I have competed at the highest levels of the sport in classes such as the 29er, 49er, the International Moth and most recently the supercharged, hydro-foiling F50 in the global SailGP Championship. In 2008, I competed on the world stage for the first time and won a bronze medal at the World Sailing Youth World Championships, and then proceeded to top that the following year when I became an Under 23 World Champion at the 2009 International Moth World Championships. I have spent extensive time with the US Sailing Olympic Development Team, and US Sailing Team, honing my craft and campaigning on the Olympic circuit. While pursuing my dream of one day competing at the Olympic Games, I attended Stanford University from 2011-2018, where I earned a Bachelor's Degree and Master's Degree in Aeronautical and Astronautical Engineering. During my time at Stanford, I was a member of the Stanford Varsity Sailing Team and was Team Captain from 2013-2014 during the Cardinal's most successful season.



While studying at Stanford, from 2015-2020, I campaigned along-side my longtime partner, Judge Ryan, for the 2016 and 2020 Olympic Games where we finished 2nd and 3rd respectively at the United States Olympic Trials in the 49er Class. At the end of 2020, I made a bold decision to switch teammates and immediately began competing with my new teammate, Ian Barrows. During the course of our 4-year campaign together for the 2024 Olympics we have achieved many great milestones and success. To name a few, we have won the US National Championship, and North American Championship multiple times, medaled at the Princess Sofia World Sailing World Cup, attained a World Sailing World Ranking of 2nd in the World and won the Gold Medal at the 2023 Pan American Games in Santiago, Chile.

This January we competed at the US Olympic Trials in Miami, Florida and won and are now officially selected to compete at the 2024 Paris Olympic Games this summer! Since being named to the US Olympic Sailing Team, we have been non-stop competing and training in France getting ready for the Olympic Games. Over the course of the next 2 months, we will be living and training exclusively in Marseille, France, where the sailing will take place during the Olympics, and pushing ourselves as much as possible to be able to sail at our best this summer.

* My parents and I moved to Cloverdale in July of 2021. My parents still currently live there now.




Scott Holm Award For Tylie Hatcher

Cooking with David Maciel

July is a time we tend to BBQ more and spend time outdoors. I enjoy making salads to go with the BBQ. This coleslaw is a perfect match, and you can add cooked chicken or shrimp to make it a meal.

Creamy Mexican Coleslaw Ingredients

- 5 cups shredded cabbage red & green mixed 50/50 blend
- 1 cup shredded carrots
- 1 avocado
- 1/3 cup cilantro
- ½ cup green onions, chopped
- ½ cup mayonnaise
- 1 tbsp lime juice
- 1 tbsp honey or white sugar
- 1 tsp lime zest
- ½ tsp cumin
- ½ tsp garlic powder
- ½ tsp chili powder (optional)
- Salt and pepper

Instructions

Start by making the dressing. Combine the mayo, lime juice, honey or sugar lime zest, cumin, garlic powder, chili powder, salt, and pepper. Taste and season as needed. (You can also use a packet of taco seasoning)

Chop the remaining ingredients into bite size pieces and toss together the cabbage, carrots, avocado, green onions, and cilantro add the dressing. Let sit for 10 minutes and serve.
