Farewell David Kelley



Cloverdale City Manager David Kelley has informed the City Council of his intention to leave his position at the end of the year. David has been the City Manager for over six years. His last day with the City is December 20, 2024.

David first joined the City of Cloverdale in February 2016 as the Assistant Manager/

Community Development Director, and became the City Manager in March 2018. During his tenure, the City faced significant challenges, including multiple wildfires, an extended period of extreme drought, the COVID-19 Pandemic, and budgetary pressures caused by high inflation.

David has been a committed public servant focused on improving the community. During his tenure, the City has achieved major milestones, including adoption of a new certified Housing Element, the opening of the Porterfield Creek Preserve as well as the acquisition of the Soda Springs Ranch open space. The City has also improved its financial condition, with debt decreased and the General Fund reserve significantly increased.

David oversaw substantial enhancements to the City's park amenities. These include the construction of a new pickleball court, new basketball courts, plaza restrooms, and a new dog park, providing residents with improved recreational facilities. Additionally, David led the effort to improve and enhance the resilience and emergency preparedness of the community through the establishment of the Resilient Cloverdale and CloveReady emergency preparedness initiatives.

As a resident of northern Sonoma County, David understood on a personal and professional level both the challenges facing the City, as well as how the strength of a smaller community is an invaluable asset. "I thank the Council and the community for the tremendous opportunity to serve as your City Manager," David said. "I look forward to seeing Cloverdale continue to prosper and wish the utmost success to the Council and community as you tackle the challenges that lie ahead." The City thanks David for his many years of dedicated public service.

The City Council plans a thorough recruitment to identify Cloverdale's next City Manager.

"Go slow to go fast." This motto was coined by a friend. Whenever I felt frantic in my previous job, she would gently coax me to try a new work ethic. Yes, it seems like an oxymoron, but surprisingly, it worked! Taking a slower pace amid chaos, overload, deadline pressures, and a scheduled calendar (both professionally and personally) allows us to breathe deeper, settle into the moment, reflect on the best next step, and open the mind to receive more efficient and effective solutions. The CloDems ask... Who Makes Policy and Who Carries It Out?

Boards of Trustees and City Councils adopt policies to address community circumstances that require regulation, revision or revenue. Councils also find themselves enacting or amending policy at the behest of another body like the state legislature or the court. Often, drafts of policy are subject to public hearing so citizens may lend their voice on the pending decision.

Once a policy is enacted, it becomes the responsibility of the Administrator (i.e.: School Superintendent or City Manager) to ensure the proposal is implemented or enforced. Administrators are like the CEOs of a corporation. Competent administrators have deep knowledge of established codes ~ labor, civil, education and more. Adherence to codes ensure that new policies don't run counter to existing laws and regulation ~ or the US Constitution. It is not reasonable to expect an elected member to possess an in-depth knowledge of these 'rules of the road.'

Things can get thorny when a member of the elected body slips into the role of Administrator for a pet project or peeve. Absent the skill set or expertise of an experienced administrator, actions may not always prove to be fiscally sound or defensible should tort litigation occur.

The essential protocol is this: Elected Boards and Councils hire competent Administrators to conduct business on a day-to-day basis. It is perilously outside the bounds of elective members' responsibility to make management decisions. When the practice of overstepping responsibility becomes habitual, good administrators look elsewhere. And cities and school boards have a difficult time replacing them, because in the professional circles in which our Superintendents and Managers often mingle, the word gets out.

Friends and neighbors running for office this fall should know that it is wise ~ critically so ~ to maintain an awareness of who is supposed to do what.

Mussel Dogs Meagan Schrier

Mussel Dogs is contracted through the Army Corp to inspect any watercraft for invasive species before it launches into our local area lakes. They use skilled human inspectors as well as specially trained canine inspectors to complete these inspections. The dogs are primarily used for the high-volume days such as weekends, holidays and fishing tournaments and are so efficient they can smell a microscopic mussel veliger through the wall of a vessel from the ground, even on top of a vehicle. All of this hard work is to mitigate the spread of quagga and zebra mussels into Northern California lakes, safeguarding our recreational and drinking water resource. Boat inspections are done daily from 7am-3pm, however, education is the most important piece of this puzzle as they cannot be there 24/7 to perform these inspections. Check out dontmoveamussel.ca to learn more.

If brought into a local waterway, a thumbnail-sized mussel called quagga and zebra mussels could force the closure of popular boating recreational waterways. There are currently no quagga or zebra mussels in North Coast waterways, including Lake Sonoma and Lake Mendocino. Let's keep it that way!

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American Legion Hosts "Illini 4000" Gene Marcinkowski



In August, the Cloverdale American Legion hosted 34 young bike riders biking from New York City to San Francisco. The "Illini 4000" is a group of students from the University of Illinois who annually raise money for Cancer research. Their organization started in 2007 and has raised over \$1,302,500 for their efforts. They have ridden through 25

states stopping in major cities such as Washington DC, Chicago, Yellowstone National Park, Portland and Cloverdale before their final stop in San Francisco.

Their day starts around 5:30 AM and they ride as much as 75 miles per day to reach their next overnight destination. This is the second year that they have stayed at the Cloverdale Veterans building, commenting that the small-town hospitality and the comfort of a large auditorium for sleeping and showers are perfect at the end of a grueling day of riding.

City Council Report Eleanore Webster

July 24th meeting: Elissa Morrash presented a plan for the historical "Ivy Church," which will close soon. The congregation wants to gift the property to the City, with conditions. They are forming an advisory committee and would like to work with City Council.

Mayor Lands presented a proclamation declaring July Disability Pride Month. Cloverdale teacher Jeremy Wilson and several students received recognition. There was also a proclamation declaring August 6th as National Night Out to encourage citizens to join with law enforcement and business, promoting cooperative efforts between police and community.

Council considered an amendment to Municipal Code regarding off-street parking for recreational vehicles. This discussion crossed into the August meeting. At the August meeting, changes were finalized on percentage of front yard paving; limitations on habitation and number of RV's. This was the first reading; motion accepted.

Council adopted a Resolution on a ballot measure in November for a \$0.0075 sales tax. The Resolution also requests that County Board of Supervisors consent to consolidation of this measure with the statewide general election. The measure will require annual audits of the expenditures, along with annual reports to Council, and an oversight committee appointed by Council. The funds would be used for street and sidewalk repair, public safety, open spaces, and health/security improvements. This is a general tax, so passage requires a 50%+1 voter approval and a 4/5 vote by City Council. All of the tax would go to the City of Cloverdale. City faces significant financial shortages and this tax will meet only a portion of the deficit. A future bond measure will be considered for other expenses, including a police station.

September Gardening Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardeners Sponsored by Sanz Nursery

Growth is slowing for most perennials since they monitor daylength, not temperature, but your garden may still need extra water during particularly hot spells. September is generally a very dry month, and it is not unusual to have some periods of heat before cooler weather sets in.

- Before fall planting and winter-readying begins in earnest, take advantage of plant sales at local nurseries. Several specialty nurseries have fall sales lasting a few weeks or longer. Caution: many sale plants are pot-bound and need extra care when planting. Some can be divided, doubling your savings. Any that are not planted right away need to be kept well-watered.
- Look for plants that have good fall color. Fall display is often neglected when planning gardens. Some species that enliven the landscape with September and October color are Sedum 'Autumn Joy', Ceratostigma, Viburnum, Cotoneaster, Cornus stolonifera, Cotinus, Berberis, crab apples, and Persimmon as well as smoke tree (Cotinus coggygria), red maple (Acer rubrum), and Chinese pistache (Pistacia chinensis). For crape myrtle blossom color, make selections before flowers die back. Many ornamental grasses continue to look their best through fall.
- Fall is also the right time for planting California natives. Native plant sales offer numerous species, such as Arctostaphylos, Ceanothus, and Rhamnus for structure; Ribes sanguineum, native Salvia, Epilobium, Penstemon, and Eriogonum for color and to attract pollinators and other beneficial insects.
- Spring-flowering bulbs begin appearing in nurseries and garden centers. It is generally easier to wait until after the first rains to plant them, but make purchases ahead of time so you are prepared.
- Continue to build your checklist of fall chores, including plants that need to be moved or divided during shorter days and cooler, moister weather. With a few exceptions, fall-blooming plants should be divided in spring, spring-bloomers just after flowering, and summer-bloomers in fall. Share your divisions with garden friends.

This year, Creek Week, National Pollution Prevention Week, and California's Coastal Cleanup Day all take place between September 16th and 29th. These events aim to educate the public and encourage active participation in keeping our waterways free from trash and pollutants.

Participate in Creek Week with the City of Cloverdale

Every September, the Cloverdale community comes together to learn about the Russian River Watershed and actively contribute by removing trash from our creeks, rivers, and beaches. Last year, dedicated volunteers from Cloverdale filled three 30-yard dumpsters—nearly 20,000 pounds of waste removed from our local waterways! Without these efforts, that trash could have



been swept downstream during the wet winter, impacting not just our river but also downstream communities and the Pacific Ocean.

This year, the City of Cloverdale will host two Russian River cleanup events on **Saturday**, **September 21st**, **from 9-11 am**. We need your help! Volunteers can choose to clean up the River at Asti Bridge (meeting at the Russian River bridge on Washington School Road) or at First Street Bridge (meeting near the cemetery on Crocker Road/E. First St.). All necessary supplies—gloves, trash grabbers, bags, and more—will be provided, and volunteers will receive a special gift as a token of our appreciation.

Groundwater Projects Connected to River Health




The City of Cloverdale is committed to sustaining and improving the health of the Russian River Watershed year-round, not just in September. The Russian River is a vital ecosystem and the source of Cloverdale's freshwater supply. Beneath our river lies an intricate aquifer of gravels, sand, and clay, from which our City draws its drinking water. This water is pumped from a wellfield near Cloverdale River Park, treated, and then delivered via an extensive distribution network to our residents and businesses.

However, during droughts and dry periods, our pumping system can encounter challenges. As groundwater levels drop and river flow slows, our ability to pump water through existing wells is threatened. When this happens, air can get entrained in the wells which can clog the filters at the treatment plant. Clearing these clogs requires flushing the filters multiple times a day, requiring additional water and electricity.

Recognizing that drought condition can affect our wellfield, the City has developed a plan to address air entrainment and improve water supply efficiency, especially during droughts. In 2022, these efforts were rewarded with a \$3 million grant from the Department of Water Resources as part of the Urban and Multibenefit Drought Relief Grant Program. This funding is being used for essential projects, including the replacement and upgrade of two aging supply wells that are prone to air entrainment. These upgrades will also include new above-ground systems that provide real-time water level information, enabling precise control and stable groundwater levels even during low flow or peak demand conditions.

This project is expected to save approximately 13 million gallons of water each year! Increased efficiency means less water diverted from the Russian River, reducing stress on the river's ecosystem. The design phase for the two replacement wells is complete, and construction will begin next year. This initiative exemplifies how identifying key projects and securing grant funding enables the City to enhance our water system's resilience to drought, directly benefiting the health of the watershed. Funding for the Well Replacement project has been provided in full or in part from the Budget Act of 2021 and through an agreement with the State Department of Water Resources.

At the end of February, I officially became a "Dasher" and a few minutes later I heard a loud "Ding Ding!" I didn't know what to do, I wasn't trained. I hopped in the car with my son and headed to McDonalds. My first order consisted of two McFlurries and I headed to a house near Jefferson School. I was filled with excitement, and as we are driving home from our first order, another notification pops up saying "A customer added \$5.00 tip on a past McDonalds order - keep up the good work"

Most full-time dashers feel very good about serving the community. Some of our regular customers need our assistance as they cannot do it themselves, so helping someone fulfill their needs is incredibly rewarding.

We primarily rely on tips, as Doordash pays us a base pay of \$2.25 per order. Ratings also matter to us - they make us proud and it is an honor to be a 5-star dasher. Know that we are affected by missing items reported to Doordash. The bags are sealed and cannot be opened by us and it is against our Doordash contract if we do. We also cannot go back to retrieve a missing item.

I have made connections with loyal customers, happy employees, and thriving business owners. Recently, I got a new customer to Doordash. His list of ingredients was beautiful but, I had to ask him about a particular pasta item. I've tried it before, so knowing he was going to buy it, I felt like he was going to ruin his meal. An hour later, I received a photo of the beautiful meal he crafted and it reminded me of the main reason why I Doordash - to see my community happy.



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When Not to Use Your Work Email Will Carter

In my line of work, I often help my customers with their email accounts, as well as the accounts which are opened using their email addresses. A common issue I see for my clients is relying on their work emails for all their email needs. This practice has three major risks:

Private or Sensitive Information: All businesses which provide email services to their employees have the capability to audit and view the emails of their employees. While many have policies against using these tools, everyone should expect that the messages and accounts tied to their work emails will be accessed by their employer. Never use your work email for medical, legal, financial, or job-hunting purposes.

Changes in Employment: Leaving a job, for any reason, is already a challenging process; using your work email for personal accounts can make it much worse! If terminated, you can expect your email account to be locked immediately. The process can be just as fast even if you leave a job voluntarily. Additionally, your employer might change your email address without notice or forwarding from your old address.

Sales Work and Relationships: Many industries are built on personal relationships between a salesperson, real estate agent, or service provider and their customers. If any of these categories apply to you, you might want to use your own email for customer relations, if this is permitted by your employer. You can even get a custom email address to maintain a professional appearance and brand identity.


Only ever use your work email address for work related messages and accounts you are willing to leave behind when you leave that job. If you have any personal accounts tied to a business email address, reach out to a trusted technology professional to get your accounts moved to your own email.

Crocker Road Pedestrian Bridge

A Crocker Road bike and pedestrian bridge over the Russian River in Cloverdale has been installed, adding significant safety improvements to the main road serving the city from the east. Installation of the pedestrian bridge is placed alongside the existing vehicular bridge on Crocker Road. The new bridge links the Cloverdale River Park Trail, a popular recreation area in the Sonoma County Regional Parks system.

Supervisor James Gore, who represents the Cloverdale area, said the vital safety improvement project was a big win for the community. "This state-of-the-art bridge represents a milestone in the County's commitment to promoting active transportation and creating a safer community for all," Gore said. "The new pedestrian bridge offers a range of benefits that will positively impact the lives of residents and visitors."

The pedestrian and bicycle bridge provides a new dedicated pathway, completely separated from vehicular traffic, ensuring the safety of pedestrians and cyclists, who previously have had to use vehicle lanes or a very narrow shoulder to cross the bridge. It also eliminates the risk of accidents and encourages more people to utilize active modes of transportation. The new bridge also caters to the recreational needs of residents, providing access to scenic routes and trail networks. The \$2.34 million project is mostly funded through CalTrans.



CUSD News Glen Senestraro, Superintendent

By the time you are reading this article, we will be in our second calendar month of school. Educators love the beginning of the school year. We are busy making connections with our students. We have some incredible staff educating our students in many different disciplines, skills and assisting with their mental health. An important aspect of learning is regular attendance.

CUSD will be continuing our campaign for greater school attendance awareness. School attendance is a predictor of school success. According to a comprehensive study conducted by the US Department of Education, students who attend class regularly are about 1.5 times more likely to achieve proficiency in core subjects such as math and reading compared to their counterparts with irregular attendance.

In addition to a greater chance of achieving success, public schools are funded on our Average Daily Attendance (ADA). We calculate the ADA based on our attendance rate. For example, if CUSD has an enrollment of 1,300 students and an ADA rate of 91%, we will get funded on 1,183 students (1,300 times 91%). A one percent increase would fund us on 1,196 students. The state funds public schools approximately \$13,700 per student. An increase of one percent in attendance translates to \$178,100 for the district.

CUSD is proud and honored to serve the greater Cloverdale community and its students. The district is governed by an elected Board of Trustees with regular Board meetings held on the third Wednesday of most months at 6:00 PM in the CHS Library. Our Board members are President Gabriela Mendoza-Torres, Clerk Jenny Candelaria-Orr, Trustee Preston Addison, Trustee Jacque Garrison, and Trustee Ashley Lopus-White.

The \$50,000 from the Merlo Foundation is a matching grant, intended to inspire additional support for the Alexander Valley Health and Wellness Center. Henken's Olympic Bronze



After five days of racing on international sport's biggest stage, Team USA's Ian Barrows (St. Thomas, USVI) and Hans Henken (San Francisco, CA) brought home a bronze medal in the Men's Skiff (49er) event at the Paris 2024 Olympic Games. This is the US Sailing Team's first Olympic medal in sailing since Rio 2016 and Barrows and Henken's first Olympic

appearance. "We put in so much hard work to get here and to have it all come together in this last race is just amazing," said Henken. "Ian and I had the goal of having a chance in the medal race – we knew that's a level that we had. Just to be there felt like an achievement in its own right, and to finish with this bronze medal is really the cherry on top."

Henken, with family ties to Cloverdale, has spent the majority of his career competing on the U.S. Sailing Team in the 49er class with his goal of competing at the Olympics. From 2011 to 2015, he was a member and captain of the Stanford University Sailing Team and in his senior year was named Stanford Conference Male Athlete of the Year during the Cardinal's most successful season. While competing with the Cardinal, he earned a master's and bachelor's degree in Aeronautical and Astronautical

Engineering, an invaluable resource to complement his sailing pedigree.

I will use stuff until it falls apart, I'm known for it. Doesn't mean in its original form necessarily. Perhaps you have that old tea pot that a loved one cherished, but, you know, you will never use it? Knock it on its side! Gently of course...

Grab yourself some Weld Bond, tube of Gorilla Heavy Duty construction adhesive, some blue tape, wire of your choosing (twine, albeit rustic looking, does not fare well in varied

weather), and lastly any decorative bits that make you smile, plus a little spoon if you have one. Old tea pot? Nay! Artsy Upcycled bird feeder? Now we're talkin'!

Pre-rip a few pieces of blue tape as then you can use the roll to sit the tea pot on its side and go ahead and make an "X" with the pieces of tape on the top of the tea pot lid. Recently, many of the questions have revolved around contaminated soils, gas and chemical plumes, buried gas tanks and more. After all, historically, Cloverdale was once home to a plethora of wood and saw mills, manufacturing facilities and gas stations. It would be impossible to address each property in Cloverdale that has dealt with some of these issues. Luckily, the State of California and the State Water Board have provided us with this very informative website:

You can search properties by address, APN, as well as by city and county. If you are inquisitive about what properties might continue to have issues, you may visit this site for all of your answers.

To answer a couple of quick questions:

- 101 North on the corner of Cloverdale Blvd and 1st Street.
 This retired gas station had the fuel tanks removed, the upper ground soil replaced and the ground monitoring wells removed. The Water Board issued an NFA letter (No Further Action) required prior to the sale to the current owner.
- 1201 S. Cloverdale Blvd. This 5 acre previous MGM Brakes site was a "Superfund Site". The amount of work conducted here is far too great to list. The property is in contract for sale and has also been cleared by the Water board with certain restrictions that are very conducive to development of the current buyer.

This is a wonderful marinade for chicken thighs. It has an Italian Mediterranean overtone. You can grill them out doors or in the oven.

Mediterranean Chicken Thighs

Ingredients

- $2-2\frac{1}{2}$ pounds bone-in, skinless chicken thighs
- ½ cup balsamic vinegar
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon pepper
- 1 sprig fresh rosemary (substitute 1/4 teaspoon of dried if fresh is not available)
- 2 sprigs fresh thyme (substitute ¼ teaspoon of dried if fresh is not available)
- 2 cloves garlic, minced

Instructions

- In a small bowl, mix together balsamic vinegar, olive oil, honey, salt, pepper, and garlic. Add chicken to a glass container or zip-top bag. Pour marinade over chicken. Add the fresh herbs. Cover container and place in fridge to marinate 15 minutes or up to 2 hours.
- Remove chicken from the fridge. Heat grill to mediumhigh heat, or in the oven at 400 degrees. Grill chicken or place on a sheet pan with a rack. The chicken is done with internal temperature reaches 165 degrees. Drizzle a bit of balsamic over the chicken & serve.

A Piece Of Riverside Cemetery History Mary Jo Winter

How did Lady Catherine Maria Campbell Oliphant, 1809-1881, wife of Sir Anthony Oliphant, 1797-1859, come to be buried in Cloverdale's Riverside Cemetery?

Married in Scotland in 1828, her husband was a Scottish lawyer who served as the Attorney General of Capetown, South Africa, from 1826 to 1838, Chief Justice of Ceylon from 1838 to 1855, and was Knighted in 1840. Their only child, a son named Laurence, was born in Capetown in 1829. He would grow up to become a well-known author, international traveler, lawyer, and a Member of the House of Commons. Sir Anthony and Laurence were responsible for introducing Tea in Ceylon with 30 smuggled plants from China.

Under the influence of Spiritualist Thomas Lake Harris and The Brotherhood of the New Life, and with a mutual interest in spiritualism, Laurence, his wife and Lady Catherine came to America to work in a Commune on the shores of Lake Erie at Brocton, New York. In 1881, Lady Catherine was suffering from cancer, so Laurence brought her to Santa Rosa where Harris had another Commune, located in what today is known as Fountaingrove.

Laurence was on his way to the healing waters of the Geysers when he found a healer in Cloverdale. Madam Emily Preston tried her remedies, but all to no avail. Lady Catherine Oliphant died in Cloverdale on October 25, 1881, and is buried at the top of Riverside Cemetery on the east side.
