

I wish you a happy, healthy, holiday season.





Christmas is right around the corner and you're thinking of the very best gifts for your loved ones. Should you give a pet as a gift? The answer is it







At Cloverdale Unified School District, we're dedicated supporting every student's academic, and emotional growth. Last year, we began implementation of a framework known as MTSS (Multi-Tiered System of Supports). We are in the second year of a three-year process, which tailors support to meet the unique needs of each student.

where it's needed:

- 1. Tier 1 Universal Support: This tier involves school-wide classroom-based or support available to all students. In Tier 1, teachers use research-based teaching practices and strategies to promote a positive learning environment. This includes proactive approaches like setting clear expectations, fostering inclusive classrooms, and using data to track student progress.
- 2. Tier 2 Targeted Support: For students who need additional support beyond what is provided universally, Tier 2 offers targeted interventions. These are typically small-group activities focused on specific skills, such as reading comprehension, math fluency, managing social interactions. Targeted support is designed to help students overcome challenges before they become larger obstacles to success.
- 3. **Tier 3 Intensive Support**: For students facing more significant challenges, Tier 3 provides individualized interventions. These are intensive, often one-on-one supports to address specific needs in a focused and consistent way. Examples include specialized instruction, counseling, and other resources.

December Gardening Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardners Sponsored by Sanz Nursery

- Protect frost-tender species such as Bougainvillea, Hibiscus, Citrus, Tibouchina, and other tender species. You can use an anti-desiccant spray such as Cloud Cover or a spun fabric row cover. Covering plants with sheets or lightweight blankets or burlap is another option. If you use plastic sheeting, do not allow plastic to contact foliage. A strand of Christmas lights in a tree is often enough to protect a plant.
- Continue to plant California natives and hardy trees and shrubs. Water well after planting in the absence of rain and do not allow root balls to dry out.
- If you have deciduous trees, rake up leaves as they fall.
 Shred large leaves before composting or run a lawn mower over them. You can put them out for recycling as well, but it's best to put their nutrients back into your own garden.
- Dormant-spray fruit trees and roses with horticultural oil after they have lost their leaves to control fungal infections and kill overwintering insect eggs.
- Make sure your garden is amply mulched for the winter.
 Mulch will insulate roots and retard weed growth.
- Plant any remaining spring-blooming bulbs. Sow wildflower seeds.
- Clean, oil and store tools such as shovels, hoes, and pruners. Use light machine oil on metal parts to prevent rust.
- Clean out gutters to avoid overflow and direct water to downspouts.
- Plant amaryllis or paperwhites indoors and decorate with evergreen boughs to echo the pleasing atmosphere of an outdoor garden.

Amid November Election Outcomes



On November 13, 2024, the Cloverdale City Council appointed Assistant City Manager Kevin Thompson as the new City Manager, following the retirement of David Kelley effective December 20th. Thompson brings over two decades of dedicated service in municipal government and community development, beginning his professional journey in Cloverdale as an Assistant Planner from 1999 to 2001. This

foundational experience in Cloverdale's Planning Department shaped his career trajectory, igniting a passion for building vibrant, resilient communities through community and economic development and public engagement.

Kevin Thompson's Journey and Vision for Cloverdale

Kevin Thompson's career in community development and municipal leadership has been marked by a commitment to fostering high-quality growth, economic sustainability, and community well-being. In his early years as an Assistant Planner in Cloverdale, Thompson developed his skills in project entitlement, use permits, and design review applications. This role laid the groundwork for his advancement into more complex leadership positions, including roles in Ukiah and the Town of Windsor, where he served as a Senior Planner, Economic Development Manager, and eventually Planning Manager.

Thompson holds a Master of Business Administration (MBA) from Sonoma State University. With a diverse background that includes affordable housing, land-use planning, cannabis ordinance implementation, and capital project management, Thompson has demonstrated a capacity to lead across multiple facets of city government. In his current role as Cloverdale's Assistant City Manager and Community Development Director, which he has served in since 2018. He has overseen crucial infrastructure studies, multiple park and recreation projects, and affordable housing initiatives, and has worked closely with the City Council, Planning Commissioners, Chamber of Commerce and community members to achieve community goals.

Thompson's appointment as City Manager reflects the Council's confidence in his ability to guide Cloverdale through its next phase of development. "I am honored to take on this role," Thompson stated, "and I look forward to building on the foundation of strong community relationships and sustainable growth that David Kelley help to foster in Cloverdale."

November Election Results: Council Seats and Local Measures Moving Forward: Priorities for Cloverdale

Cloverdale's recent November election featured key issues on As City Manager, Kevin Thompson has identified several the ballot, including two City Council seats and two important local measures: Measure CC and Measure DD. The Sonoma County Registrar of Voter is currently tabulating the final election results. Assembly Bill 3184 requires the Registrar of Voters to complete final ballot counts no sooner than December 3rd; and unless they have no outstanding ballots to be signature cured, the ROV is planning to certify on that date.

City Council Election

Current vote tabulations by the Registrar of Voters indicate that the apparent successful candidates for the two councilmember seats include current Mayor Todd Lands and new Council candidate Mark Laskey. While the results will not be official until finalized by the ROV, the current results are very likely to be maintained. The City Council is scheduled to ratify the election results at their December 11th City Council meeting ,at which time the newly elected councilmember and Mayor Lands will be sworn in and seated for a four-year term from 2024-2028. The updated council composition balances experience with new perspectives, equipping the Council to address Cloverdale's evolving needs and priorities.

Cloverdale Welcomes Kevin Thompson as New City Manager Measure CC: Amending Cloverdale's Urban Growth Boundary

Measure CC, which is currently on track to pass with greater than a 70% voter approval, focuses on amending Cloverdale's Urban Growth Boundary (UGB) to include the western hills adjacent to the city. The measure's primary goal is to extend the UGB's term from 2030 until 2050, maintaining local control over any future development for the foreseeable future within the updated boundary.

Key points about Measure CC include:

- 1. **Purpose**: Measure CC proposes expanding Cloverdale's UGB to incorporate the western hills, aligning with the city's commitment to managed, strategic growth.
- 2. First Step Toward Annexation: While Measure CC enables the process of annexing the western hills into Cloverdale, it requires further approvals, including amendments to the City's Sphere of Influence and clearance from the Sonoma County Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO).
- 3. Local Control: Upon annexation, Cloverdale will have jurisdiction over potential development within this area, providing local oversight instead of county control.
- 4. No Immediate Development: Importantly, Measure CC does not authorize new development in the western hills. It solely establishes a framework for future decisions that will require additional public and regulatory input.
- 5. **Voter Oversight**: The measure ensures that any future modifications to the UGB before January 1, 2050, must receive voter approval, extending an existing requirement that was set to expire in 2030.

This measure underscores Cloverdale residents' desire for careful planning and sustainable growth while preserving voter influence over significant land-use decisions.


Measure DD: Investing in Public Services ~ 3/4-Cent Sales Tax

Measure DD, a 3/4-cent sales tax measure, also appears likely to be approved by voters with greater than a 55% voter approval rate as of the writing of this article. Projected to generate around \$1.6 million annually, the revenue from Measure DD will go into Cloverdale's general fund, supporting a range of public services such as street maintenance, park improvements, and public safety enhancements.

The measure increases the local sales tax rate from 9% to 9.75% and mandates the establishment of a Citizen Oversight Board to ensure transparency and accountability. This board will review and report on tax revenue and expenditures annually, with audit results accessible to the public. The approval of Measure DD demonstrates Cloverdale residents' commitment to improving the city's infrastructure and services while ensuring responsible management of public funds.

immediate priorities aligned with the recent election outcomes. With Measure DD providing necessary funds for infrastructure improvements, Thompson plans to recommend projects that will enhance street conditions, public safety facilities, and community parks. His background in urban planning will also be instrumental in advancing planning and open space initiatives under Measure CC, working closely with stakeholders to ensure the protection of open space on the western foothills of Cloverdale through the development of a Hillside development Ordinance.

CloDems Opinion: The Value in Civil Discourse **David Delgardo**

Early in my career as a school administrator, I attended a school board meeting and witnessed a parent rail about a proposed change of a bus stop. The Board President explained the law that necessitated the change, but the citizen continued, becoming more and more caustic. Having heard enough, the President gaveled the woman down and said, "God gave you two ears so you could listen twice as much as you talk!"

I thought the comment was rude, but as decades have passed, I have come to understand the point. Conversation that is one-sided is not conversation. It is not debate. It is not discussion. And it produces little more than rancor. Civil discourse requires both listening and talk.

In the wake of our recent election season, it is easy to imagine the polarization that may have occurred among our fellow Cloverdalians. Forgotten are the elements of life that we share. Our loves. Our losses. Our stubbed toes. Our disdain for the LA Dodgers. Such things are the glue that binds folks within communities together. Civil discourse ~ a pleasant chat ~ can bridge some divides.

How do we foster civil discourse? It might start with a plate of fresh cookies* on the doorstep of the family with that other sign in their yard. Or maybe a neighborhood potluck or barbecue. It may result in a "we're here for one another" conversation before the chips are down ~ before the catastrophic fire, earthquake, or flat tire on the family car. Civil discourse builds a human-to-human understanding that can undergird our casual relationships and may result in public meetings where two-way interaction leads to healthy compromise and a stronger feeling of community.

Civil discourse is not a lost art; rather, it may simply be a practice we need to... well... practice.

City Council Report ~ Eleanore Webster

October 23rd meeting: the week of October 5th was proclaimed Water Professionals Week to recognize the Cloverdale Water Department staff. Three staff members were present to receive recognition.

A presentation was made on the Cloverdale Active Transportation Plan. This is an update of the 2014 plan and is funded by a grant. The plan addresses access around Cloverdale, plus a County connection. The plan considers walking, biking and rolling and how to make sure these are safe and appealing. More and detailed information is available by linking from the Agenda to the Report and Presentation. Priorities include safety, disadvantagedcommunity improvements, and improvements near schools and transit stops.

There was a hearing on potential RV parking amendments to City Ordinance. The changes were made based on public comments made at an August meeting to address paving, condition of the trailer, and placement. The ordinance is Attachment 1 on the Agenda, available online. Council was thanked for their reconsideration.

November 13, 2024 meeting: November was proclaimed as Native American Heritage Month. Ursula Swan was present from the Tribal Progressive Alliance to accept recognition. Ursula is with the Cloverdale Rancheria.

The consent calendar was accepted, but the Budget Amendment was pulled so it could be discussed on the record.

Kevin Thompson was appointed City Manager effective 12/21/24. The term is about 3 years. More details are on the Agenda, Attachments 1 and 2. Kevin has served on City staff as Assistant City Manager and Community Development Director prior to this promotion.

An Ordinance increasing Council Member compensation was considered. Currently the compensation is \$555/month, set in 2016. The State sets maximums by size of City. This Ordinance increases the compensation to the \$950/month maximum. Mayor Lands is opposed to the increase. Other Council Members disagreed with the Mayor, and it passed.

Council Member Morgenstern gave a report for the Homeless Committee. In Rohnert Park, there is a Hub for services that is in one spot. The thought is that it would be nice to have a single source for assistance in Cloverdale.

Mayor Lands said that the ballot measures are doing well, but ballots are still being counted.

Do I Need a VPN? ~ Will Carter

In the last several years, a new "security" product has been booming in popularity: the VPN. Antivirus companies including Norton, McAfee, and Avast have joined the likes of NordVPN, Proton VPN, and Express VPN in offering customers a VPN as a security service. This prompts three important questions: what is a VPN, what do they do, and do I need one?

VPN is an initialism for Virtual Private Network. In their original use, VPNs are a way for someone to access a local network from a remote location. For example: You might use a VPN to connect to your office network, where you can access your work server, print to office printers, and view local security cameras, all from the comfort of a coffee shop, library, or even while tucked into bed. However, for most consumers this is not what a VPN is used for.

When sold as a "security" service, a VPN does not give you access to any other network. Instead, it encrypts your connection to the internet and tunnels it to an exit node elsewhere. The promised security offered by this is twofold: Encryption of your data to hide your traffic from others on your network, and moving your traffic to an exit node to hide your IP address. The bad news is also twofold: >80% of traffic, including everything you do, is already encrypted, and hiding your IP address does little to protect you against the most common threats.

Since your information is already encrypted and no one is likely to exploit your IP address anyway, why are VPNs so popular? Sadly, it's good old fear-based marketing. To be clear, there are also serious drawbacks; "Security" VPNs will, by nature, make your internet slower, prevent sustained sign-in on websites, and block many sites and services altogether. For the vast majority of users, there is no need for a VPN at all. If you are thinking you might want to get a VPN service or configure a VPN of your own, reach out to a trusted technology service provider for guidance!

Holidays Were More Simple 100 Years Ago Mary Jo Winter

December is here and holiday shopping is once again in full swing. Local merchants are ready with an array of gift items, such as candy, clothing, jewelry, crystals, artwork, housewares, home décor, electronics, sporting goods, tools, toys, bicycles, and more.

Special events include a Holiday Crafting Open House at the History Center on Nov. 29, the Cloverdale Lions' annual Toy Run on December 8, "Claus for a Cause" at 207 Gamay from 5-7:30 p.m. on December 8, the Winter Festival and Tree Lighting on December 13, photos and treats with characters from the Nutcracker at Encore Dance Theatre on December 13, the Holiday Tea at the Senior Center on December 14 and, on December 25, "The Christmas Table," a free community dinner for all.

Have you ever wondered what this month was like in Cloverdale 100 years ago?

In 1924, a wrestling match, sponsored by the American Legion and featuring Osmon "The Terrible Turk" Mohmat and Paul Poulos of Ukiah was held on December 13 at the Druid's Hall.

Movies at the Orpheum Theater, located where La Familia Sana is today, were silent films and included "My Man," starring Dustin Farnum and Patsy Ruth Miller, and "Borrowed Husband," starring Florence Vidor.

The Cloverdale Pharmacy sold box cameras for \$2.50, watches for \$1-\$3.50, a harmonica for 50-cents, musical tops for only 15-cents, and stuffed dolls ranged from 35-cents to \$1.25. Vanity boxes were \$5, while ornaments and other decorations could be found for a penny.

At George Cavallis' store, electric irons sold for \$4 and a box of cigars was \$1.75, while at Butler & Zittleman's, roller skates were \$2.50 and a Winchester rifle, advertised as being "for boys who are going to learn to shoot," could be purchased for as little as \$9.

A few other advertised gift suggestions were footballs, fishing rods, razors, billfolds, crockery, incense burners, perfume, and waffle irons.

Open Letter to the Citizens of Cloverdale



Many of you are aware that United Church of Cloverdale has faced challenging times over the past decade, as have many churches within our state and country. We have been able to continue our ministries, including weekly worship, only by spending down our church's endowment funds. In recent years, we predicted that at the current level of staffing and with fading membership, our endowment funds

would be depleted within 2 to 3 years. With this in mind, our Moderators, Council members, and Pastor Jen began prayerfully studying our options, with assistance and guidance provided in part by our UCC Northern California-Nevada Conference minister.

Unfortunately, we have reached the point where we have determined that we cannot sustain the church as it is now and we voted to release Rev. Jen Collins from her call as pastor of United Church, effective December 31, 2024. We do not plan on hiring another pastor. Jilloni Hopkins will still be our Church Administrator as we continue into 2025. We plan to continue to operate Heaven's Closet Thrift Shop and to participate in the Food Pantry. We are seeking ways in which United Church's legacy and missions can be preserved into the future, even if we cease being a viable congregation. Leaders of United Church and the Cloverdale community have been working together to find these ways.

Concurrently, Good Shepherd Episcopal Church held an event ("A Joyful Noise") in May 2024 to discuss the hopes and needs of the people of Cloverdale, as represented by churches and other organizations within the city. In that initial meeting, we shared that United Church was likely to have to close before the end of 2025, but we wanted to contribute our remaining resources to continue to assist those in need within our community. Also concurrently, La Familia Sana, founded in 2021, has been growing in staffing and outreach to support their mission of assisting underserved people in the wider community, and specifically to address long-term needs for healthcare, jobs, food, and education.

La Familia Sana has been seeking additional space to house their growing staff and at the present time, we are in discussion with them about ways in which United Church's property and facilities might aid in their mission. In many ways, this opportunity matches our desire to continue our legacy of outreach to our community and also complements the conversations that have emerged from 'A Joyful Noise.' In part, this includes that La Familia Sana has staff and expertise to pursue grants and financial resources at both the local, regional, and state level that could allow United Church's property to become a "community resource center" for the people of Cloverdale.



On the Wild Side Jennifer Molidor

Part of holiday fun is celebrating nature, bringing pine trees indoors, making wreaths, or gathering for earthy foods by the fire. Our cooking now turns to root vegetables and soothing, hearty soups. Simmer pots with wild or gardened herbs, like rosemary, can fill your house with the aromas of the outdoors. And don't forget to spend time outside in the winter sun.

What a perfect time to boost our winter wellness. It's time to make plant medicines, like fire cider — an old folk concoction to build immunity and ward off colds and sniffles. Making sure our gardens grow herbal medicine can also help us support biodiversity.

Ingredients & Directions

- 10 cloves garlic cloves (peeled)
- 1 onion (chopped)
- 1/2 cup ginger root (sliced)
- 1 lemon (sliced)
- 1 orange (sliced)
- 2 rosemary sprigs
- 2 Tbsp. thyme
- 1/4 tsp. cayenne pepper
- 2 Tbsp. oregano
- 1 Tbsp. turmeric
- 1 tsp. black pepper
- 1-2 cinnamon sticks
- ½ cup halved rosehips
- Apple cider vinegar
- 1/4 cup (or more, to taste) raw honey

Prepare a large mason jar. Add ingredients and spices, stir, and pour in apple cider vinegar until all ingredients are covered. Seal with a non-metal lid or place cheesecloth under the lid. Place the jar in a dark, cool cupboard for thirty days. Strain. Add honey. Take 1 tbsp. as needed or daily. Mix and match amounts as you like. Food is nourishment and investing mindfulness into your cooking can make your remedies more powerful. Growing your wild apothecary: rosemary, onions, garlic, thyme, and oregano are excellent places to start. Jade Weymouth received the Spirit of Wetzel award. For Jade Weymouth, commitment to community is a family value and longstanding practice. Her dedication to health equity and social justice helps make Cloverdale's grassroots non-profit a trusted, essential partner to Latine residents. Years before becoming executive

director of La Familia Sana, seven-year-old Jade was selling raffle tickets to fundraise for a Latine college fun. "I grew up in a community-minded family," says Jade. "For the past decade, my focus has been on serving the Cloverdale community, its families, and ensuring access to high-quality resources and services." Thank you, Jade, for your lifetime of service and advocacy.



Deborah Howell's career started in for-profit business administration. After time spent as a stay-at-home mom, she expected to resume that course. But fate intervened when her son's bicycle accident required urgent care. Debbie took him to Cloverdale's Coppertower Family Medical Center, then a Rural Health Clinic. Impressed

with the care, she was later inspired to apply for a position with Coppertower. "I wanted to work in an environment that helped people live their best life and where my skills could make a difference," she said. Hired in 2001, the Board offered her the role of Chief Executive Officer in 2003. Today, Coppertower is now Alexander Valley Healthcare, where Debbie continues to oversee the evolution of this vital player in the region's healthcare ecosystem – including construction of its new Health & Wellness Center, "a state-of-the-art medical facility in downtown Cloverdale." For her extraordinary leadership and tireless contributions to the region's system of care, Deborah was recognized with the Wetzel Community Leadership Award.

The Healthcare Foundation formed in 2001 when a group of community members rallied together to save their local hospital. The resulting \$14.5 million capital campaign succeeded in keeping the Healdsburg District Hospital open and contributed to significant improvements, expansions, and upgrades including a new Wetzel Family Emergency Department, the reopening of the hospital's intensive care unit, adoption of robotic telepresence allowing medical staff to work directly with specialists in remote locations, state-of-the-art equipment for its Women's Health Center, new radiology and diagnostic equipment, and more.



Cooking with David Maciel

For me Christmas is about family & friends coming together to celebrate the holiday. A frittata is an excellent brunch dish, or you can add meats for a hearty dinner meal. The eggs are a blank slate so you can be very creative with ingredients. I like to cook mine in cast iron, but any good baking dish will do.

Frittata

Ingredients

- 6 large eggs
- 1/3 cup heavy whipping cream
- 1/2 tsp salt, adjust to taste
- 1 cup grated mozzarella cheese
- 1/2 cup goat cheese
- 1/2 cup cherry tomatoes
- 1/2 cup bell pepper, red, orange or yellow
- 1 cup arugula
- i tosp unsaitea butter
- 1 tsp fresh herbs, for garnish

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 400F. Whisk eggs, heavy cream and salt until you get a smooth and even texture. Set aside.
- 2. Cut tomatoes in half. Chop bell peppers into small pieces.
- 3. Melt butter and coat the sides of the baking dish with it. Spread vegetables and greens evenly on the bottom of the pan.
- 4. Pour over the egg mixture. Sprinkle the cheese on top. Using a fork, distribute the cheese around a little to incorporate it into the eggs. Bake for 15 to 17 minutes, or until the edges and center are set and the top is golden. The internal temperature of the frittata should reach 160°F on a thermometer.
