Myrl The Barber Was One Of A Kind Mary Jo Winter

Mvrl's Myrl Graham and Barbershop are legendary in the annals of Cloverdale history. Encouraged by his dad who wanted him to have a trade to fall back on, Myrl started cutting hair in his dad's Eugene, Oregon barbershop when he was 12. Aside from a



few interruptions, like World War II, the trade served him well for more than 62 years, 45 of them in Cloverdale.



During the war, Myrl was stationed in Italy where he served as a "Belly Gunner" with the 459th Bomber Squadron, flying more than 50 missions over Europe. His barbershop was filled with photos and memorabilia of that time. He loved to tell stories, so his exploits and memories were shared with many Cloverdalians.

Myrl often said there was never a day he didn't look forward to going to work. Being an avid fly fisherman, though, he had to admit he might have missed a few days here and there because he'd gone fishing.

He moved to Cloverdale in 1957 and married his wife Rosemary a few years later. All of their children attended and graduated from Cloverdale schools. Rosemary was realtor Pete Matovich's secretary for more than a decade.

Myrl was an active member of the local VFW and a 28-year member and past president of

the Cloverdale Lions Club. They were married for nearly 40 years at the time Rosemary passed in 2003.

Myrl's first local barbershop was on Tarman Dr. before he relocated it to the Depot Hotel on Railroad Ave. In 1985, he settled into the pink building on the east side of S. Cloverdale Blvd. At some point, he aptly nicknamed his business "The Good Ol' Boys Barbershop." Before retiring in 2002, Myrl had cut hair for several generations of Cloverdale families. He even made housecalls for his customers who were housebound due to injury or illness.



Fate or Destiny? Nora Archambeau, M.A.

In graduate school, I took a surprisingly profound course called The I Ching with one humble, wise, and delightful Professor Yi Wu, Ph.D. Our textbook was The I Ching: The Book of Changes and Virtues (which Dr. Wu apparently wrote his own version of in 2013). The I Ching, a book of divination or oracle, "is believed to have been written by a Chinese man named Fu Xi around 1000 BCE." Dr. Wu assigned this single compendium (816 pages) for the semester. Depth rather than breadth...nice. My final paper was titled "Fate or Destiny?" I chose to conclude this paper with my belief in Destiny, and Dr. Wu shared how happy he was with this perspective. I still believe in Destiny and will pursue it until it manifests ten-fold!

How can we stay on track with our Destiny? One "obvious" way is to consistently reflect on our choices. Are they in alignment with our essential vibration and Soul's purpose? Are we happy underneath the hustle and bustle of life's constant activities? Are we getting sick because we need to slow down and make different decisions? I believe there is usually a psychological reason for becoming ill. (*How to Heal Your Life*, Louise Hay, 1984) Having a respiratory infection, then a sinus infection, one right after the other, I had a lot of time to name, process, and proceed with a new set of intentions. So there!

- 1. **Overwhelm**: Write down ALL that needs to happen. This is referred to as a "brain dump." Next, choose and highlight three items that are priorities. Intend to complete those, then attend to other items. (How to Stop Feeling Overwhelmed Right Now, Mel Robbins, YouTube)
- 2. **Health Routine**: Feeling under the weather? Hunker down, give yourself absolute permission to cocoon, stay warm, hydrate, eat chicken/veggie soup, etc.
- 3. **Never Give Up!** Gather people around you who support, lift, and reaffirm your inspirations, dreams, and Soul's mission.
- 4. **A Third Perspective**: Get out from under trauma-induced belief systems and consider that an unknown 3rd perspective IS possible. *Destined Lives are our birth-right!*

Measure W ~ Crucial Funding for Library Kat Gore, Sonoma County Library

Many consider their local library to be a cornerstone of the community, a welcoming place to enjoy resources and events for all ages. Sonoma County Library Commissioner Brooke Greene recently shared her journey and insights about the library's evolving role.

For Greene, the library was instrumental in choosing Cloverdale as her family's home. "In 1984, when my husband and I were expecting our second child, we started looking for a small town in which to raise our family," she recalled. "My bottom-line criterion was that the town had to have a library."

They found Cloverdale, moved into a house a block away from the library, and became regulars. Nearly 40 years later, she's an official library commissioner. Appointed by the Cloverdale City Council in February 2023, Greene was motivated to represent Cloverdale due to a gap in local representation on the commission.

The passage of Measure W and renewal of the one-eighth of a cent sales tax aims to sustain and expand library services made possible by a previous sales tax measure. "Before Measure Y passed in 2016, the library was only open five days a week," Greene explained. Thanks to the sales tax funding, libraries are now open seven days a week with extended evening hours. The new measure ensures continued investment in technology, collections and modernization efforts.



Pricing Your House to Sell Elissa Morrash

Real estate is one of those fields where everyone is an expert; the internet, a family member, a next-door neighbor. Advice abounds. And it's free! For some reason, we tend to believe everyone but the actual expert we have hired. It's just human nature.

This is advice on how to find serious buyers who are willing to pay your listed price.

Pricing your house higher than the market. Over pricing as a "test" does not work in the seller's interest. It's understandable and sounds reasonable: "Let's try the high price, and if it doesn't work, we will reduce the price." This not a good idea. Pricing your house for what you need. Some sellers actually do need to net a certain amount, to pay off a mortgage, or to pay credit card bills, for example. If what you need is much more than the market dictates, then think twice.

Pricing your house for what your neighbor's house sold for. A lot of things contribute to a property's price. Your neighbor's house may have a new roof. They may have more updates and upgrades (or fewer) than you have.

When pricing, I use the age, income and preferences of buyers, interest rates, comparable properties and neighborhoods, and the age and condition of the property. I study local market trends, and using the secret sauce of intuition and experience, recommend a price range.



This month marks the beginning of the gray whale migration season. These intelligent giants are traveling from the warm birthing waters of the Baja Peninsula to the chilly feeding areas in Alaska. Whale calves are making their first trip and can be seen swimming with their mothers.

Later in the season, Humpback whales will migrate too. A good place to see whales from a boat is the San Francisco Bay.



On land, acod spots for watching whales are Salt Point State Park, Stillwater Cove Regional Park, and of course, the Bodega Headlands. If you're up for a drive, and a lot of steps, you can try the incredible Point Reyes Lighthouse.

In February and March head to the Russian River on a quiet morning for a chance to see a river otter. In late winter and early spring mama otters are busy denning with newborn pups. So, rowdy yearling males venture out alone and can be seen exploring along riverbeds. I've seen otters and even seals in the Russian River out by Duncan's Mills on River Road.

Further afield, you might glimpse an otter youngster by coastal streams at Gualala Point Regional Park or by the Petaluma River.

If you spot an otter, you can become an otter spotter for the River Otter Ecology Project (say that ten times fast!) and report your sighting on their interactive map online.

As always, bring a camera and enjoy life on the wild side.

January Gardening Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardners Sponsored by Sanz Nursery

- Continue to monitor weather forecasts for nighttime lows. To protect frost-tender plants such as Citrus, Bougainvillea, Hibiscus, and Tibouchina, use an anti-desiccant spray such as Cloud Cover or a spun fabric floating row cover when frost is actually predicted. Covering plants with sheets or lightweight blankets or burlap is another option. If you use plastic sheeting, do not allow plastic to contact foliage. A strand of Christmas lights in a tree is often enough to protect a plant.
- Bareroot shrubs and trees will begin appearing in nurseries. Bareroot is a good way to plant many fruit trees, shrubs, and roses. If you can't plant the day of your purchase, submerge roots in a bucket of water up to 24 hours and plant as soon as you can

plant as soon as you can.

- Roses should be pruned between New Year's and Valentine's Day. Be careful not to compact soil around plants with your feet when you prune. Prune hard, leaving 3-4 young, vigorous canes per plant.
- Clean, oil, and store tools such as shovels, hoes, and pruners. Use light machine oil on metal parts to prevent rust.
- Prune pines and other dormant conifers, but do not trim back individual branches part way. Rather, thin where necessary by pruning out entire branches to the base.
- Winter is the season when rats forage—and damage ornamental plants. If you have had problems in the past or if your neighbors have noticed rats, put out traps early before they damage fruit trees, vines, climbing roses and shrubs.
- Rats favor heavy cover like overgrown ivy. If you have ivy, the best time to prune or remove it is winter when growth slows and soil is somewhat soft. If you wait until spring, ivy will quickly grow back, and roots will be harder to remove.

"Recently I was sworn in for my second term on the Cloverdale City Council and chosen to represent our city as Mayor. Serving as the mayor for the past three years has been one of the greatest honors of my life. It has also been one of the most challenging roles I've ever held. While Cloverdale may be small in size, it's incredibly diverse. Our community is made up of people with a wide spectrum of socioeconomic levels, beliefs, backgrounds, and perspectives. What unites us, though, is the deep, undeniable love of our community.

Like so many places across the country, our small town has not been immune to the divisiveness and tension that have dominated the national stage.

I've heard from constituents about their fear for the future. I've seen friends and neighbors turn against one another or stop speaking because of their lawn signs or political differences.

David began his tenure with Cloverdale in February 2016 as Assistant City Manager/Community Development Director and was appointed City Manager in March 2018. Throughout his time with the City, he made a lasting impact, particularly in the development and preservation of parks and open spaces. His leadership was instrumental in the grand opening of the Cloverdale Dog Park and the Porterfield Creek Open Space, as well as the acquisition of Soda Springs Ranch and significant improvements to existing city parks.

David's strategic vision and guidance also led to the successful passage of three vital ballot measures—Measure R (Utility User Tax), Measure CC (Urban Growth Boundary), and Measure DD (Sales Tax)—securing essential financial resources to support Cloverdale's future.


As David embarks on the next chapter of his career, we express our deepest gratitude for his many contributions and wish him continued success in all his future endeavors.



At the December 11 meeting, Neena Hanchett thanked the City Manager on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce, and the Student Liaison gave her report. The Consent Calendar, which covered election results, staff compensation (wages and benefits), obligation payments, and professional services agreements, was approved after the compensation increase for City Council members was removed. Mayor Lands feels that the increase for Council members is warranted, but timing is poor, given budget deficits. Council member compensation was considered separately and passed; it had been discussed at earlier meetings and complies with California regulations.



The Three Ways to Stream Will Carter

Streaming movies and television as an on-demand, online service started eighteen years ago when Netflix expanded beyond DVDs and launched the first 1,000 films on their streaming service. In 2007, the majority of Netflix users accessed the site from their computers, and the closest thing there was to a "smart TV" was TiVo. Today, you can access streaming services on your computer, tablet, phone, or television, but each is a little different.


In many ways, streaming from a computer is the easiest: simply enter the URL of the site (like "Hulu.com") into your web browser and sign-in. This is also the best way to get your account set up initially.

Tablets and phones are slightly more complicated, since you will need to download an app. On your smartphone, go to the App Store or Play Store and search for the service you want to stream, find the app and install it. Once installed you can just tap on the icon to launch the app. Mobile apps will also allow you to pre-download movies or episodes, letting you watch when travelling or otherwise offline. The app or your mobile browser are the second-best option for creating your account if you don't have a computer.

Finally, we get to what is now our default: watching on your television! This is like a phone or tablet, in that you will need to download an app. This process varies widely depending on your television, but once installed you should be able to get signed-in with the help of your smartphone or computer. Where streaming on TVs can get complicated is in the hardware. While most folks use either their cable box or smart TV functionality, these options are usually slower than a dedicated device like a Roku, Google TV Streamer, or Apple TV.

Whether you're a hardcore cord-cutter or new to streaming, it should be easy to find and watch the shows and movies you like. Between a couple of streaming subscriptions, services available from the Sonoma County Library, and sites like YouTube, I never find myself wishing for cable service, or a cable bill.



Tips To Avoid Travel Scams Over the Holidays*

Be skeptical of 'too-good-to-be-true' deals: If something seems to-good-to-be-true, chances are it probably is. Be on alert for fake ticketing and travel booking websites that offer extreme discounts for flights or accommodations.

Beware of AI chat bots: AI chat bots are being used to simulate live customer support interactions, says Clay. "These chat bots can convincingly answer questions about fake travel deals, accommodations or bookings, giving travelers the impression they are interacting with a legitimate representative

Verify the authenticity of travel websites: double-check website URLs, ensuring that they are the true website for the airline or travel agency in question.

Look at the domain name closely to ensure it is actually the site for whichever major travel provider you're hoping to book with. Look for misspellings in the brand name or other small errors such as capitalization.

Avoid off-platform transactions: Redirects to off-platform money wires or bank transfers to steal information and bypass secure payment methods that guarantee buyer protection.

Refrain from clicking on links in unsolicited emails: These malicious links can also redirect you to an unexpected webpage and prompt you to provide your personal details on that website, it may also infect your computer with a virus.

Work with a travel advisor: Yet another way to avoid scams is to book travel using a trusted travel advisor, which circumvents fraudulent internet actors altogether. *From Travel Pulse



Born Panagiota Belenis to Greek immigrants Paraskeva and Eleni (Kakridas) Belenis in the heart of San Francisco's Greektown, Marian passed away peacefully at 91 with her daughters at her side. Marian's early years were storied with the trials and tribulations of being a child of the Great Depression. Unable to speak a word of English, she enrolled in school and

quickly mastered the English language, which began Marian's lifelong love of school and learning.

At a young age, Marian and her younger brother Bill lost both of their parents. In 1944, she and Bill went to live with their Thea Katina in Richmond, where they learned to work the Victory Garden. Living in the east bay city, the siblings gained two big brothers, Bill Kolaites and Clare Karahalios, a loving sister-in-law, Alyce (Karahalios), and a strong circle of lifelong friends.

Marian graduated from the University of California, Berkeley in 1955 with a degree in English and began a career as an elementary school teacher in the Richmond School District. As a young woman, she attended many Greek gatherings in the Bay Area. At one of these events, Marian met Gust Zagorites, and soon after, he became her husband. The two were married for 49 years until Gust's passing in 2011.

After marrying Gust, Marian left Richmond in 1962 and moved to Cloverdale, where the two raised four daughters. Marian enjoyed hosting summer barbecues, birthday parties, and swimming at Boucher's. She could sew just about anything and loved to bake delicious cookies and pies, all made in a warm and inviting home for her family and friends. As the girls grew, Marian returned to the workforce at the Cloverdale Library, where she enjoyed her second career working for 21 years as a library technician.

In her retirement, Marian continued to sew, garden, and bake. She also took up photography, focusing on scenic views and beautiful flowers. With Gust, she traveled about Sonoma County in search of the best fresh fruit to make delicious jams and pies for family and friends. She stayed involved in the library and began researching her family history, writing a short story of her childhood memoirs. Throughout her life, Marian had a great love of the theater and enjoyed taking family and friends to see the latest musicals performing in the area.

Importance of Estate Planning Paula Hall

When your New Year's resolution is estate planning, it's easy to say, "I'm going to get my estate plan done this year." But where to start? First consider your assets, their value, and who you'd like to leave them to. The goal is to get the assets to your beneficiaries quickly, efficiently, economically and to avoid probate. If you have a very small estate, less than \$184,500.00 and no real estate, an affidavit procedure will work. A larger estate will require probate. Probate is the court supervised administration of your estate.

Probate is expensive, time-consuming, and public. If your estate is worth half a million dollars, your estate will pay statutory probate fees of \$13,000 to the executor and \$13,000 to the attorney; \$930 in court filing fees; probate referee's fees, for this example, of \$500; \$225 to publish in the newspaper, for a total of \$27,730.00 - money that your beneficiaries will not receive. Certain assets, such as life insurance, IRA's, retirement plans, and POD accounts pass by beneficiary designation. Designate your beneficiaries and you are done.

If you own a home, you could avoid probate by titling it in joint tenancy. Joint tenancy property, such as home or joint bank account, passes to the other joint tenant by operation of law. Joint tenancy will work to pass the asset to the surviving joint tenant. However, joint tenancy is not advisable if you have multiple children. Your assets could become subject to the child's creditors. If you own a home, a trust is necessary to transfer your property to your beneficiaries privately and efficiently, without the delay and expense of probate. To avoid probate, you must have assets that pass by beneficiary designation or by operation of law or a trust.

Wolf House Brewing Giving Beer a New Profile Michele Armanino

Partners Kevin Lovett and Elice and Dwayne Moran jokingly like to say that their First Street Wolf House Brewing establishment is the "first in and last out brewery in farthest Northern Sonoma County!"

Brewmaster, Kevin Lovett, brother of Elice, (yes, it's a family business) has been around breweries most of his life, devoting the last sixteen years to micro brewing. In 2019, the three partners purchased the former Ruth McGowan's and spent the next five months gutting and remodeling the place from top to bottom. When Covid hit, beer aficionados lined up at the door to get their Mason jars filled with specialty beers. "The community really saved us during that time" says Kevin, thankfully.

There are typically twelve beers on tap, and a few IPA's depending on the season. Lovett likes to describe one of their most popular beers, "Therapy Session, as a classic, crystal-clear IPA with no bitter tongue. It has a caramel balance but with big hops!" Burning Daylight Pilsner, Wolf's classic California Pilsner, is not your typical German-style Pilsner. Lovett adds, "The hops are there but not overwhelming." An impressive flagship IPA, Cryonic, is a newer style IPA made with cryo hops, a process (which Wolf is one of the first to use) that enhances lupulins, a waxy substance found in the hop plant that gives beer its flavor. This method makes the hops three times more potent while creating a clean, clear beer.

Complement your Wolf House cheeseburger, the most popular item on the menu, with any of Wolf's IPAs. "Everything is made fresh here." says Master Chef, Dwayne Moran. "We process twenty to thirty pounds of beef a day, ten pounds of chicken and only use the loin, the tenderest, butteriest and flakiest part of the Alaskan cod." A fried chicken sandwich teamed with Wolf's Burning Daylight IPA will surely make you nod your head!

In January we start the new year. If you're like me, I try to take off a few holiday pounds or just eat healthier. This roasted winter vegetable salad is an excellent way to do both. I do add some roasted chicken to mine for a very satisfying meal.

Roasted Winter Vegetable Salad

Ingredients

- 1 Red onion
- 1 Butternut squash small
- 10 Baby potatoes
- 2 Carrots
- 2 Parsnips
- 1 TBS Olive oil
- 1 pinch Sea salt and ground black pepper
- 4 handfuls of Watercress or arugula mix

Dressing

- 1 TBS Olive oil
- 2 TBS Balsamic vinegar
- 2 TBS Fresh basil finely chopped
- 2 TBS Fresh coriander (cilantro) finely chopped
- 2 TBS Fresh parsley finely chopped
- 1 pinch Sea salt and ground black pepper
- ¼ cup Light feta cheese

Instructions

- 1) Preheat your oven to 400°F
- 2) Chop red onion, butternut squash, baby potatoes, carrots and parsnips so they are fairly chunky. Put them in a bowl with olive oil and sea salt and ground black pepper and mix well.
- 3) Put onto a baking tray into the oven for 35-40 minutes.
- 4) Make the salad dressing by mixing together Olive oil, Balsamic vinegar, Sea salt and ground black pepper, Fresh basil, Fresh coriander (cilantro) and Fresh parsley.
- 5) Remove the vegetables from the oven.
- 6) Divide watercress or arugula salad mix between 2 bowls and top with roasted vegetables. Drizzle the dressing on top and crumble over the feta cheese.
