



Spring weather is upon us and we are spending more time outdoors. While working in the garden, you notice a cat hanging around. A dog



follows you home from your walk. What should you do when you find a stray pet?

- 1) **Check for ID**. Dogs may have a collar with engraved or QR code tags, or a dog license. This is a quick way to contact the owner.
- 2) **Scan for microchip**. There are scanners at Curly Doodle Dog Grooming, DogGonit Pet Supply, and other locations around town. If the chip is registered, you can contact the owner.
- 3) **Post on local social media**. Nextdoor is a great tool for reuniting lost pets. Also local Facebook groups like Community of Cloverdale.
- 4) **Contact animal control**. If you cannot hold the pet or if it is a hazard, like a dog behaving aggressively or running in traffic, animal control will help. In City limits call North Bay Animal Services, and in unincorporated call Sonoma County Animal Services.

Be aware that many cats live outdoors and are best left alone unless they appear ill, injured, or pregnant. You can contact Forgotten Felines for info on TNR (spay-neuter) in your neighborhood.

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Special-Needs Dental Clinic

Visits to the dentist can be a source of anxiety for any parent or child. But for children with sensory challenges or development delays, this rite of passage — a visit to the dentist — can cause a heightened sense of stress.

That's why on one Saturday every month, Providence Santa Rosa Memorial Hospital's dental clinic only books appointments for patients under age 21 with a disability such as autism, Down Syndrome or cerebral palsy. This designated time ensures patients enter a calm and supportive environment for basic services such as cleanings and filling cavities.

Dr. Victor Costanza, a general dentist at Santa Rosa Memorial, has been on staff for over 15 years. He's developed several techniques to familiarize clinic patients with the sights, sounds and feelings of being in the dentist's chair. And even if a patient only stays for a few minutes to sit in the big dentist's chair, Dr. Costanza considers the time well spent.

Janet Mclaughlin's son has been a patient at the clinic for the past 15 years. "My son is now able to handle x-rays and cleanings in a way he hasn't been able to in the past. The clinic has been so very kind and understanding and our family is grateful for the work they do."

The program is made possible through funding from the hospital's Community Benefit and Community Health efforts, focused on transforming the wellbeing of our most vulnerable neighbors.

A Graphic Love for Cloverdale Michele Armanino



Ann Mackenzie was a United Airlines flight attendant working in Chicago one morning when the wind chill temperature dipped to 53 degrees below zero. "That's when I knew I had had enough!" the Michigan native said. After thawing out in Honolulu for a time, she moved to San Francisco and began doing something she had always enjoyed but never had the confidence to pursue - drawing. She began creating greeting cards, memo pads and prints featuring drawings of dogs and cats.

At the Academy of Arts in San Francisco, she spent a year and a half learning how to use a computer to create graphic art. In 1990 she started her own business, Mackenzie Design Studio, now located at 117 Broad Street - a building that was originally a pharmacy and still has the drive-up window! Ann says that there isn't a day that goes by that she and her husband, Jack, don't comment on how much they love the town of Cloverdale.

While at the post office, Ann always observed people collecting their mail and immediately throwing away advertisements that they barely looked at. She made it her goal to create art that people would keep and appreciate. "I knew I had succeeded when the marketing director at the River Rock Casino told me he couldn't bring himself to throw away the postcard I designed of the Alexander Valley Wine Growers, so he kept it on his desk for a year!

As the in-house designer for River Rock Casino, Ann creates all the River Rock billboards visible from the sides of the freeways. She also created graphics for the Cloverdale Police Department and City Hall. She worked with the Cloverdale Chamber of Commerce to create evacuation maps and zones for Resilient Cloverdale and CloveReady. And, she jokes that she knew the map she redid for the Alexander Valley winemakers actually worked because she used it to navigate back to the winery where she picked up her paycheck!!



May Gardening Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardeners Sponsored by Sanz Nursery

- Flush out drip systems and make sure all emitters are working. Replace batteries on systems that use batteryoperated controllers. Ensure that timers with batteries are working.
- If you start to irrigate this month, practice waterconservation by watering in early morning or evening and using slow-release methods such as drip or soaker hoses.
- It's time to plant flowering annuals and all summer veggies—beans, cucumbers, eggplant, kale, lettuce, melons, peppers, squash, and tomatoes
- Be sure to acclimate transplants started indoors before planting them in garden beds. Harden off transplants by setting pots outdoors during the day and moving them indoors at night for a few days before leaving them outdoors for several more days.
- When planting and transplanting, watch sun exposure and heat. When transplanting young plants into direct sun, provide some shade. Wait until fall and the onset of the rainy season for any major planting and transplanting projects. New plants struggle and often fail in summer heat.
- Add edible flowers to your garden for a pop of color and to attract beneficial insects that pollinate food crops and ornamentals and provide an ecological balance against harmful pests. Common edible flowers include carnations, violas, lilacs, roses, lavender, marigolds and nasturtiums as well as flowers of rosemary, basil, thyme and sage.
- Continue to fertilize roses and other heavy feeders.
- Prune all spring-flowering trees and shrubs after bloom. Pruning forces new growth that will bear flowers next spring.
- May is a windy month in much of Sonoma County. Take care that new plantings, especially trees, are staked properly.
- Deadhead azaleas, camellias, and rhododendrons once they've finished blooming. An estimated 70% of a rhododendron's energy goes into the formation of seed. Use a whisk broom to lightly dislodge spent blossoms on azaleas. Use pruners or 2 fingers to deadhead flowers on rhododendrons and cut just above the 2 new leaflets. During spring and summer, feed these shrubs monthly with a balanced organic fertilizer formulated for acid-loving plants.

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

George served his country at the Army's hospital in Stuttgart, Germany, achieving the rank of Second Lieutenant.



City Council Report Elegnore Webster

At the March 26th meeting, a PG&E Representative spoke during the public comment section about the measures PG&E is taking to be more environmentally friendly. Citizens also thanked the Council for the Town Hall Meeting on the Potter Valley water project. Mayor Lands said this issue will be covered on a regular basis, and there will be a video on the meeting released soon. March was proclaimed Women's History Month.

The Audited Financial Statements as of June 2024 were then presented by Terry Krieg, CPA. Just a note: the video link is very garbled during this presentation and the captions don't help much either. Go to the Agenda attachments for more information. There was a deficit of \$460,000, and about \$37.5 million in cash and investments. Krieg concluded that the City's Finance Director and staff are doing an excellent job of properly maintaining the accounts. Council members asked about the deficit and recommendations for corrective action. Budget cuts are expected.

There was follow-up on the citizen Oversight Committee for the November sales tax measure. The measure provides for the appointment of a 3-person committee. Staff requested guidance from the Council about the frequency of meetings, recruiting and selection, etc.

An Agreement was adopted to provide City water service to Clearwater Ranch properties. The process must go through the County for approval, so this is the first step in a long process. The high level of arsenic in the water needs to be addressed. Cloverdale Regional Library opened after some remodeling and modernization; funding came from the Claire M. McGowen Fund. There is a survey being conducted on the downtown streets; see the City website to participate.

The video and audio for the April 9th meeting were not working and it was a night I could not attend in person, so no details to report. The Agenda discussed the City pool, the River Park, and budgetary matters, as well as an ordinance on vacant commercial properties. Reports are in the agenda. See https://www.cloverdale.net/agendacenter. The meeting minutes will be posted after they are approved. At this April 9th meeting, minutes from the meetings of January 8, 2025 through to March 26, 2025 were approved.

Claire McGowan's Legacy at the Cloverdale Library Kat Gore, Sonoma County Library



Cloverdale Regional Library is in the midst of a modernization project, and the new patio under construction is thanks to a local legend. The project began in March and is expected to be complete in May, improving both the patio and public restrooms. The library is open for full service during construction.

The project is funded by the library sales tax and a generous donation

from the Claire M. McGowan Trust. Claire moved to Cloverdale in 1968 to teach elementary school. She taught with the Cloverdale Unified School district for 32 years and upon retirement served an additional 17 years as a reading tutor at Jefferson Elementary School. Her donation will continue her legacy of building a community of readers in Cloverdale.

Sonoma County Library Commissioner Brooke Greene met Claire in 1987 when they both worked at Jefferson Elementary School. Brooke remembers Claire as a devoted fan of Cloverdale High School basketball and a fierce advocate for literacy. Between 2013 and 2018, Brooke and Debbie Myers (of Jefferson Elementary School) coordinated United Way's Schools of Hope volunteer tutoring program in Cloverdale.

"Claire was one of several retired teachers who shared their skill with young emerging readers in one-on-one tutoring sessions. It was a pleasure to have her on our team," Brooke said. "Claire is remembered fondly by hundreds of students and her close circle of friends, and her memory will live on in our beautifully remodeled patio."









When It's Time to Care for Mom

When it is time to care for Mom, first see what needs to be done. Visit with Mom. Talk to her and ask how you can help. Moms are used to being the caretaker, so it may take time to reverse roles. Review Mom's power of attorney to see who is appointed and when the power becomes effective. Some powers of attorney are effective upon signing; others, first, require a doctor's letter to demonstrate incapacity. Because most banks require the power of attorney to specifically grant banking powers, determine whether her power of attorney includes those powers.

Does Mom have a trust? The trustee can manage her bank accounts and home held in the trust. If Mom is the trustee, she may be ready to resign and allow you to become trustee. Should Mom's home need to be sold to pay for assisted living, as trustee, you would have the authority to sell it. When you sell the home, deposit the proceeds in an account held in the trust. Mom may want to remain home, so consider home care.

Extra love and attention goes a long way. You do not need any documents to help around the house, give hugs or bring meals to share.

Winery Ruins Are A Touchstone To History Mary Jo Winter

Clover Springs by Del Webb sits on 175 acres in south Cloverdale that was once a thriving vineyard and home to Moulton Hill Winery, founded in 1882 by Josiah Moulton.

Following Moulton's death, Danish immigrant Hans Frederick Albertz leased the property in 1890, adding 200 acres of vines east of the Russian River and building a large four-story home next to the winery.

At Moulton Hill, Albertz produced award winning wines. Reports indicate that one year he crushed 4,000 tons of grapes and had a vintage of 600,000 gallons of wine. The winery had eight buildings, as well as its own electric plant.

A fire, believed to have started in the dynamo room, destroyed the winery on Feb. 5, 1899. The residence and barn were saved, but all other buildings and their contents were lost, including 250,000 gallons of wine. Loss was estimated at \$100,000, the equivalent of \$3,853,000 today.

Known locally as "the castle," the historic mansion, an architectural replica of a castle on the Rhine River, consisted of a stone cellar, three main floors and an attic. Upon completion, Albertz had hosted an open house for everyone in the vicinity. Dinner was served to 250 guests, followed by dancing in the ballroom.

In February 1949, a fire of undetermined origin destroyed the home, which had by then been divided into apartments. The eight occupants escaped moments before the roof collapsed and the 20-room structure was a blazing inferno. All that remained were the stone cellar and stone walls of the first floor.

Consideration was briefly given to demolishing the historical ruins and constructing an elementary school, but the plan failed to garner the needed support.

The Moulton Hill Winery ruins remained intact and today serve as a visible touchstone to Cloverdale's past within the Clover Springs development.

May is the tail end of coyote pup season. You may hear coyotes howling. In the hard times of 2020, we listened to our neighbors howl to each other as the sun went down, as if to say, "we're still here." It's a bit like what coyotes are doing.

Coyotes make some people nervous. However, what can sound like 50 coyotes howling in the night may be only two. That's called the Beau-Geste effect.

In the novel "Beau Geste," French Legionnaires propped up dead soldiers to seem like there were more of them. Coyotes use a similar tactic with a range of vocalizations.

Coyotes have a special place in some cultures as "God's song dog." Some individuals have interspecies friendships. On occasion, coyotes and badgers hunt gophers together (its called "mutualism"). Look for "coyote and badger" videos online to see the excited way coyote gets excited to see her friend badger, so much like our own dogs.

Coyotes are "generalists" and they're part of nature's cleanup crew. They

can live about anywhere. You might find a coyote in the wilderness, in a suburb, or on a city train (they've been spotted coming in and out of stores, waiting at traffic lights and riding trains). UC Davis studied what coyotes were eating in San Francisco. Counter to the urban legends of coyotes eating pets their diet in the city is mostly human garbage and rats and mice. And if we clean up our mess we won't attract hungry wildlife.

Still, for everyone's safety, when you're enjoying nature and walking the trails, avoid known coyote dens during pup season, and be mindful when out walking at twilight and dawn. We can all be better neighbors, reminding each other we're still here.

I recently came across a woman camping in a restricted area. Before she moved on, she told me that she'd owned a boutique in Oakland. When the property ownership changed hands, she could no longer make rent and had to close up shop.

Once, while assisting with the annual homeless count, I was accompanied by a man whose landscaping business failed when his pickup broke down. He had to let go two part-timers, lost twelve of nineteen accounts, and when he couldn't make rent, his wife and child moved in with relatives down south.

Another time, an individual I met had lost his affordable apartment in the wake of one of our many regional fires.

On top of those? My 40-year-old nephew decided not to be a part of 'the machine,' and opted out of work. He's now encamped somewhere in Shasta County. (My brother and I are at a loss about this.)

Clearly, there are many reasons for homelessness. Many, but not all, are the result of circumstances beyond the control of the individual.

Cities and counties across the state, including Cloverdale and Sonoma County, wrestle with how to accommodate unhoused citizens; grappling with litter, sanitation, hunger, crime, and... well... image.

No one agency or locale has created the perfect program to address the poverty, mental health or addiction issues that can be associated with homelessness. A comprehensive solution requires local governments and non-profits working with state and even federal authorities to address the underlying causes: really affordable housing, perhaps, being primary.

The City of Cloverdale can't do it on its own. Knowing that, we should pay heed to the wisdom offered by former City Councilmember Gus Wolter when he said, "We are all just four flat tires from being homeless ourselves."

We can choose to decry our homeless neighbors and hold them down, or understand their stories and, perhaps, lift them up.

Before Disneyland, You Went to Asti Kevin Moore & Cloverdale Historical Society Staff

A very popular tourist destination near Cloverdale was the Italian Swiss Colony Winery at Asti. It was said that between 1950 and 1962, approximately five million people visited the Asti winery. Local legend says that before Disneyland opened in 1955, Asti Winery was the number one tourist stop in the West.

Before the existing freeway was constructed, travelers passed right by large billboards as they approached the entrance to the winery on what is now the frontage road.

The winery even went as far as to letter the roofs of the buildings and had an oversized wine bottle displayed next to the highway.

The tasting room at the Italian Swiss Colony winery in Asti was a popular tourist stop. The winery had its own official US post office, and postcards mailed there had an Asti, CAL postmark. Customers could choose a postcard and mail the card for free in the tasting room. A wine barrel was the official mailbox.



Asti winery offered tours of the spectacular gardens and a family-oriented tour of the winery. At the end of the tour, guests were offered a free postcard with a postage stamp included. Local author Jack Florence's book, Legacy of a Village noted, "In 1962, ISC had 6 million postcards printed. There were always about 6,000 postcards in the tasting room, offering 5 or 6 selections at a time." Often, during the summer months, some 3,000 postcards were mailed daily from the official Asti post office.



The "Little Old Winemaker – Me" was part of the Italian Swiss Colony advertising campaign. The winemaker was featured in TV ads as well as print media like this postcard.



Have you ever wondered why there is a freeway off ramp at Asti when there isn't much around? Jack Florence noted in his book that it was estimated that 10 percent of the cars traveling the Old Redwood Highway in 1962 stopped by the winery. Years later when the freeway was built, the Asti off ramp was included.

Real ID requirements become effective on May 7 for domestic flights and access to certain federal facilities. Real ID is a driver's license or identification card that is federally accepted and are marked with a golden bear and a star. Passports are accepted as Real ID in case your driver's license is not compliant.

To prevent your luggage from getting lost purchase a sturdy and distinctive looking bag. Zebra, leopard spots, bright colors or whatever makes it stand out and easy to identify. You can also use Air Tags so you'll know exactly where your bag is upon your arrival.

In case your bag tag is missing be sure to place a copy of your itinerary inside the bag, or an outside pocket, with phone numbers and other contact information.

And of course you should always check the airport identifying code on your airline luggage tag. Sometimes a mistake can occur and instead of SJC to San Jose, Ca, SJD for Cabo San Lucas could be printed.

It never hurts to do a double check on those tags.

Cooking with David Maciel

I was asked by a good friend if I had a salisbury steak recipe.

A bit of history - it was first made by James Salisbury during the civil war era. There are 100s of variations, but I've made this one countless times. It's from the 1920s menu for The Palace Hotel SF. It's certainly a belly warming meal especially with a nice hunk of sour dough bread.

Here ya go, Melanie Hall. Bon appétit!

Salisbury Steak

Ingredients

- 1 pound lean ground beef
- 1/4 cup panko breadcrumbs
- 1 large egg, beaten
- 1 Tablespoon ketchup
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- ½ teaspoon dried oregano
- 1 teaspoon Kosher salt
- ½ teaspoon freshly ground pepper
- 1 Tablespoon olive oil, for the skillet
- 1 medium onion, sliced
- 7 ounces cremini mushrooms, sliced
- 3 Tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 Tablespoon water
- 2 Tablespoons salted butter
- 1 ¾ cup beef broth , divided
- 1-2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
- ½ teaspoon garlic powder
- Kosher salt to taste
- Freshly ground black pepper to taste

Instructions

Steaks

In a large bowl, mix by hand the ground beef, panko, egg, ketchup, mustard, oregano, salt, and pepper until just combined, being careful not to overmix. Divide the mixture equally into 4 portions and shape into oval patties, about 3/4-inch thick.

In a large skillet, heat the olive oil over medium-high heat. Add the steaks and cook 3 minutes per side, or until golden brown on each side. Reduce the heat if browning too quickly. Transfer to a plate.

Gravy

In the same skillet, sauté the onion and mushrooms, stirring occasionally, over medium-high heat 7 to 9 minutes, or the onions are tender and the mushrooms are seared. Transfer to the same plate as the patties.

Add the butter to the skillet and reduce heat to medium low. Whisk in the beef broth, Worcestershire, and garlic powder until well combined.

In a small bowl, stir together cornstarch and water until smooth. Whisk into the skillet until combined.

Transfer the onions, mushrooms, and beef patties (with any juice) back to the skillet. Cook 10 minutes, or until the steaks reach an internal temperature of 160°F on a digital thermometer and the gravy has thickened. Add 1 Tablespoon water or beef broth if the gravy gets too thick. Season with salt and pepper. Serve immediately with mashed potatoes or noodles.
