





## Cloverdale Mayor Todd Lands Announces Campaign for Supervisor

Mayor Todd Lands today announced his campaign for Sonoma County Supervisor, District 4, seeking to follow incumbent James Gore who has announced his run for State Senate.

In announcing his campaign, Lands stated, "My family has lived in Sonoma County for three generations. I have seen our community grow, change, and overcome disaster. As a Deputy Sheriff, School Board Trustee, and Mayor of Cloverdale, I have been honored to play a part in that story and work to make our community a safer and more prosperous place to call home."

Lands began his career in law enforcement, serving ten years as a Sonoma County Deputy Sheriff. Todd held a variety of assignments, including as a correctional officer, mental health officer, training officer, bailiff and SWAT team entry and sniper. After retiring from law enforcement, Todd went on to start a small business, Todd Lands Construction.

In 2012, Lands was elected to the Cloverdale Unified School District Board of Trustees. Lands took a district that was in dire financial straits and on the verge of being taken over by the state, turned things around, and renewed academic excellence, campus safety, and the long-term fiscal health of the school district.

In 2020, Lands was elected to the Cloverdale City Council, where he has been a strong voice for fiscal responsibility, public safety, and quality of life. Lands has been chosen by his colleagues to serve as Mayor for four consecutive terms.

Lands is running for Sonoma County Supervisor District 4, representing the North County communities of northeast Fulton, the Larkfield-Wikiup area of Santa Rosa, the Town of Windsor, the City of Healdsburg, the community of Geyserville and the City of Cloverdale.

Lands is married to another lifelong Cloverdale resident, and together they are raising two daughters. He enjoys coaching youth sports, camping, and racing cars.

## **Geyserville Post Office Finds New Life**

The Old Geyserville Post Office building, a local landmark since 1948, has found new life. The building, which served as the town's post office until 2007 and has sat largely vacant for the past decade, was recently purchased by David and Amber Cadenhead.

Originally renovated by previous owner Hal Hinkle, the building Melanie Hall has a relaxed outdoor courtyard and an energy efficient solar Michael Olson panel roof. It is designed for a café, wine bar, and market. The Michael Armanino Cadenheads share the vision for a neighborhood-focused café, Mike Barnett wine bar, or market and will announce more details soon.

Based out of Wyoming, the Cadenheads are real estate investors and run a beef cattle ranch called Grazing Star Ranch. Their high-quality wagyu beef often sells out online after launching their wagyu Tomahawk at Taylor Sheridan's 6666 Ranch Restaurant pop-up concept at the Wynn Las Vegas. The Cadenheads also recently expanded into the olive oil business with a 126-acre ranch in Geyserville, Sonoma County.



## **August Gardening Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardeners** Sponsored by Sanz Nursery

- Stay alert to signs of water stress, especially for plants in containers and hanging baskets. An occasional deep soaking during periods of high heat benefits most plants, even those that do not require regular water. Make sure your garden is well-mulched to conserve moisture.
- If you have a lawn and want to conserve water or reduce your water bill, you can forgo watering without inflicting permanent damage even though grass may turn brown and lie dormant. To reduce stress, keep grass 3 in. high and do not mow too often. Don't fertilize either, as this simply stimulates new growth that requires more water. Better yet, remove turf altogether and rely on low water-use plants.
- Continue to deadhead perennials and annuals, especially those in containers. Summer heat takes a toll on some annuals and showy perennials. Periodic freshening will keep containers going through the fall. Heavy bloomers can be trimmed and fertilized.
- If you plan to be away this summer, ensure that you have someone to water or set up your irrigation system on automatic timers. When you return from vacation, do a check of the entire garden to make sure that nothing was ignored while you were away.
- Start making a checklist of fall chores that may be unique to your garden. Plants that need to be moved or divided, for example, will appreciate your waiting until shorter days and cooler, moister weather. If you want to reduce water usage in the future, make a list of the biggest water-hogs in your garden and decide if they are worth keeping or can be replaced in the coming months with more droughttolerant species.
- Despite daytime heat spells, balmy evenings in most of the county prompt many gardeners to sit out in the warm twilight, often setting up a table for dining outdoors when the garden feels fresh and inviting.



"We're excited for future themed classes like Yoga with your dog, dog training classes and classes for children on how to care for their new pet." says Glory.



# Hiding in Plain Sight Mary Jo Winter

Kleiser Park, a Cloverdale gem hiding in plain sight, is located on the southwest corner of Cloverdale Blvd. and School Street. Named in honor of Cloverdale's founder, James A. Kleiser, it sits on land he donated 160 years ago for the town's first school, a log cabin with a stone fireplace.

Located on school grounds, it fell into disrepair when it was closed from 1975 to 1987 due to what were deemed "illegal activities." During this time, students were not allowed to eat lunch in the park. They could only walk through it during school hours.

In 2009, Cloverdale Rotarian Joan Tillman brought up the idea of renovating the park. Over a three-year period, the Rotarians raised \$90,000 for the project, a portion of it through their very successful Asti Tour de Vine bike event held each October.

They also sold more than 600 personalized bricks and 10 new benches, all of which were incorporated into the final design.

The City of Cloverdale and the Cloverdale Unified School District signed a joint-use agreement, with the City contributing \$10,000 from its Quimby Act Park Fund. The school district agreed to provide maintenance, including cutting the grass and picking up litter.

Support also came from community volunteers who donated their time, and from local businesses that donated or provided discounted services, materials and merchandise.

Completed in 2012, the renovation included widening pathways with decomposed granite, planting drought-resistant plants and trees, and installing new park benches and picnic tables. The personalized bricks are heartfelt testaments of community spirit.

Thanks to a new irrigation system and the repair of an existing well, there will never be any future water bills either.

Without donations and volunteer effort, the project estimate might have been as high as \$750,000. Instead, Cloverdale, known for its community spirit and commitment to volunteerism, pulled it off for around \$100,000.

Book Buddies Program Pairs Teens and Young Readers for Literacy and Connection



This spring, the Cloverdale Regional Library partnered with Cloverdale High School and Jefferson Elementary School to launch Book Buddies, a weekly, teen-led reading mentorship program bringing together young readers with high school student volunteers. Teen Services Librarian Sonja Sutherland championed the

program with Librarian Rhonda Knowles at Jefferson Elementary School to make it a success.

The Book Buddies program is designed to help young students strengthen their reading skills in a supportive and encouraging environment. Each week, students read aloud to their teen mentors, gaining confidence, fluency, and a growing love for books. The program also fosters meaningful social connections between age groups, creating a sense of community and shared purpose.

Prior to the program starting, teen volunteers received training and mentorship from librarians, and the elementary children got to select a couple free books to take home during the program. The Friends of the Cloverdale Library also generously provided scholarships to the teen volunteers in recognition of meaningful work, and each one received a certificate of recognition.

## CloDems - Cuts to SNAP and Medicaid ~ Shirley Davis

The "Big Beautiful Bill," recently signed into law, has significant 3. Impact on Medicaid implications for food banks due to substantial cuts to the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and Medicaid.

#### 1. **SNAP**

Projected to affect approximately 22.3 million families, with many losing some or all SNAP benefits. Estimated reductions to each family: \$146 per month.

With SNAP providing roughly nine meals for every one supplied by food banks, cuts are expected to create a gap that food banks will struggle to fill. Reductions are estimated to eliminate 6 to 9 billion meals annually from the food assistance network.

#### 2. Increased Demand

Food banks are already experiencing heightened demand. In 2024, Redwood Empire Food Bank (REFB) served 61,000 individuals monthly, up from 56,000 in 2023 and 45,000 in 2022.

Food banks are bracing for an even greater influx of clients as more individuals turn to them for support due to the loss of SNAP.

Cuts to Medicaid could result in nearly 12 million people losing health insurance over the next decade. Loss of coverage exacerbates food insecurity as uninsured face increased medical expenses further straining household budgets.


#### 4. Long-Term Consequences

Locally, REFB is looking to maximize operational efficiency as it adapts to growing demand within the space of the current facility.

As federal support diminishes, food banks increasingly rely on philanthropic contributions and local community support to fill gaps left by government programs.

These cuts are poised to significantly increase the burden on food banks. Cuts to SNAP and Medicaid are expected to lead to higher levels of food insecurity, making it imperative for food banks to have increased community support.



Fabric painting has its seasons of popularity, but for me, it is always one of those creative endeavors that I find intensely satisfying for a multitude of reasons. Perhaps to fill in a spot that got bleach splattered on a favorite top.

Canvas tennies as a walking form of expression for anyone to create. Custom T's for rallies in town? I myself have been getting certified to be a life coach, and this fall I have a potentially once in a lifetime opportunity to meet someone I admire deeply, and who has created the school I am getting certified through, Jay Shetty.

In September fellow coaches and trainees have an opportunity down in Santa Monica for a first time ever convention of sorts, (no outside people invited – coaches only) and when confronted with the networking opportunity, not only was I excited, but I also thought, how can I stand out in a group of 500? As my niche is focused on working with neurodivergent women, and I have a HUGE love of rainbows, a lightbulb went on. I scored a great pair of white cotton pants on the Nordstrom clearance rack. I can certainly paint them and create something unique that both stand out and are also a conversation piece!

So, I dusted off my fabric paints, pens and liquid, and a few paint brushes. I then found some plastic stencil paper, traced a few designs and cut out the shapes I wanted to trace onto the pants. (Plastic pages also work to slide down into the legs of pants, so paint does not bleed through. The custom stamp I ordered with my logo showed up, so I went to town. Now, I often see kiddos on FB holding up signs for the first day of school, so why not have them make a countdown t-shirt for next grade and start getting their creative brains in gear? With fabric paint, brushes, plastic (or cardboard) hand soap and easy access to water and they even make fabric ink for stamps – anything is possible and once dried, safe to launder as well, for the win!

# Smartphones as Safety Tools Will Carter

The smartphones that ride around in our purses and pockets are marvels of our modern era. There are tools, apps, and services for just about any circumstance, including this month's topic: emergencies! Summoning help from emergency services is a very familiar concept to most, usually a call to 911 or activating a product like Life Alert. Luckily, your iPhone or Android device is also designed to fulfill that need, without needing to unlock your phone or make a call. On both iPhones and Android, the tool for summoning help is called Emergency SOS. Once you find Emergency SOS in settings, you should find instructions on activating this feature using a simple, one-handed, process. When activated, Emergency SOS places a call, on speaker-phone, to the relevant emergency services based on your location.

Of course, the obvious limitation of Emergency SOS is the process of activating it yourself! The good news is that there are a few conditions where Emergency SOS can make the call without intervention. Car crash detection allows Emergency SOS to place a call on your behalf if your phone's onboard sensors detect a crash. If you have an Apple Watch or a supported Android Watch, the additional sensors provided can enable fall detection, allowing Emergency SOS to place a call if your watch reports that you have fallen.

The companion to Emergency SOS is Medical ID, a system that allows important medical information (age, allergies, medications, conditions, etc.) to be accessed by those who are on the way or arrive to help you. Medical ID should be filled with your health information, as well as a selection of emergency contacts. With Medical ID enabled, those who arrive to help you will be best equipped to treat you and notify your family/friends. Be sure to enable the options to allow sharing with emergency services and access from the lock screen.

Take a minute to check the settings now, and if you run into questions, ask a trusted friend or technology professional.

#### **Let's Travel Craig Clark**

Now travelers arriving at TSA checkpoints at airports across the country will not have to remove their shoes as part of the screening process.

Identification checks and screening of carry-on bags, will continue and some travelers may still be asked to remove their shoes for additional screening. Passengers whose boarding passes are marked with "SSSS" — which stands for "Secondary Security Screening Selection" — will have to undergo an extra few steps beyond regular security protocols, including shoes off. TSA liquid rules are still in place. You are allowed to bring a quart-sized bag of liquids, aerosols, gels, creams and pastes in your carry-on bag and through the checkpoint. These are limited to travel-sized containers that are 3.4 ounces (100 milliliters) or less per item. Placing these items in the small bag and separating from your carry-on baggage facilitates the screening process. Pack items that are in containers larger than 3.4 ounces or 100 milliliters in checked baggage.

Avelo Airlines will discontinue service at Charles M. Schulz-Sonoma County Airport effective Aug. 11. Their non-stop service included flights to Redmond, OR Kalispell, Mt, Las Vegas NV and Burbank. That leaves American and Alaska airlines with scheduled flights from Santa Rosa, with Alaska taking over Hawaiian airlines international routes.



## **Cooking with David Maciel**

August is the peak of the summer growing season for fruits & vegetables. These zucchini boats are excellent and easy to make as a side dish or main course. You can be very creative with the stuffing. Ground chicken, beef or turkey are excellent options to sausage. Be sure to render the meat of all fat or oil before stuffing the zucchinis.

#### **Stuffed Zucchini**

#### **Ingredients**

- 4 medium zucchini or one very large one
- 1/2 tsp. dried Italian seasoning
- salt and pepper to taste
- 2 tsp. olive oil
- 1 lb. mild Italian sausage casings removed
- 1/2 cup onion finely diced
- 1 tsp. minced garlic
- 2 cups marinara sauce
- 3/4 cup shredded mozzarella cheese
- 1 TBS chopped parsley
- Cooking spray

#### **Instructions**

Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F.

Coat a large rectangular baking pan with cooking spray.

Cut the zucchini in half lengthwise, then trim off the stem ends. Use a spoon to carefully scoop the flesh out of the zucchinis, and discard the flesh. Sprinkle the Italian seasoning, salt and pepper over the zucchini shells. Arrange the zucchini in the baking dish.

Heat the olive oil in a large pan over medium high heat. Add the sausage and cook for 4-5 minutes, breaking up the meat with a spatula. Add the onion and cook for an additional 4 minutes or until onion is softened. Add the garlic and cook for 30 seconds. Season the sausage and vegetable mixture with salt and pepper. Pour the marinara sauce into the pan and bring to a simmer; cook for 5 minutes.

Spoon the meat mixture evenly into the zucchini shells, then top with the shredded cheese.

Bake for 25 minutes, or until zucchini is tender and cheese is melted and golden brown.

Sprinkle with parsley, then serve.



#### On the Wild Side ~ Jennifer Molidor

Drive out to the Sonoma coast through rural West County, chair from the parking lot to shallow water (call 707-865-2487 cruising along the Russian River, past old barns and wild poppies. After miles of vineyards, you'll come to something wilder: Monte Rio, famous for the Bohemian Highway, the Bohemian Grove, and lyrics from our local singer Tom Waits.

The wooded hills of Monte Rio are a critical habitat for many species as part of the Coast Range-Marin Coast wildlife corridor. Local creeks are vital for endangered coho salmon, steelhead trout, native frogs and salamanders. The hills are home to northern spotted owls, osprey, western bumblebee, pallid bats, bobcats, badgers, California quail, black-tailed deer and mountain lions.

The heat of summer days in Sonoma County makes the beach in Monte Rio warm enough to swim, while the coast keeps the water cool. You may even see an otter or seal cruising by. This large public beach rents kayaks and a free all-terrain wheelfor an ADA accessible experience).

Make sure to explore the beautiful redwood forests of Monte Rio Redwoods Regional Park trails nearby. From Hwy 116, turn at the Bohemian Highway, and cross onto Main Street to catch the trailhead about a mile down the road.

That's the exciting news for Sonoma County: A new 1517-acre property expands Monte Rio Redwoods Regional Park and Open Space, improving connectivity for wildlife, conserving public lands and climate benefits, and safeguarding this precious watershed.

Thanks to partnerships like the Save the Redwoods League and Sonoma Land Trust, the property will go to Sonoma Regional Parks for stewardship. Look for announcements later this year about these beautiful wildlands.
