

Cool weather is here, and dog owners look forward to keeping their canine friends in longer, fluffy styles. That's great ... if you know how to



maintain them. Many people don't understand how dog grooming works. They think they can bring in their dog, who is overgrown and matted, point to a picture on Instagram, and we can make their dog look the same. I like to joke that we are dog groomers, not miracle workers.

The best way to set a length is to clip the fur short, then manage it as it grows out. This requires two things: regular brushing at home, and frequent professional grooming. Our Doodle clients with long styles come in every 2-4 weeks for maintenance. Knowing how to brush is equally important. 

Cloverdale Library and Washington Middle School Partnership

Last month, I focused on the Friends of the Cloverdale Library and their good work for Cloverdale Library. This month, I am focusing on a learning experience for the fifth graders at Washington Middle School thanks to a partnership with the faculty and staff, especially fifth grade teacher Carly Lewis, and the Friends of the Cloverdale Library.

Author Natsha Yim, who has written twelve children's books (three of them for Disney), came and presented on what it takes to become a published author. She showed PowerPoint slides and talked about the roots of her early literary life, what the writing process entails, including many revisions, and the waiting process as a manuscript makes it way to publication. She shared her latest children's book, Luna and the Case of the Missing Mooncakes, and even had students try to guess who the culprit was prior to the story's ending.



Besides focusing on her fiction career, she also shared her love of researching topics and showed several magazines she has written for such as Highlights for Children, Muse, and Faces. Besides her writing career, she shared that she is also running writing workshops through mid-November for students that the friends and Sonoma County Library sponsor. It culminates in publication of a book. Last year's book was Story Stew, and the current one is at the publisher with nine Washington students' work in it.

Resilient Cloverdale: Knowing Your Neighbor The Gift of Connection in Times of Need Becky Ennis, Resilient Cloverdale

As we gather around our tables this November to give thanks, it's easy to think first of the blessings closest to us: family, friends, and the comfort of home. But this season of gratitude is also a perfect time to look just a little farther — across the street, over the fence, or down the driveway, and ask: How well do we really know our neighbors?



In Cloverdale, we're no strangers to emergencies. Wildfires, power outages, floods, and even earthquakes remind us how quickly life can change. We know, too, that when disaster strikes, it's often the people right next door who make the greatest difference in those first critical hours. Emergency services do incredible work, but in the first 72 hours after a major event, they can't be everywhere. That's when knowing your neighbors — really knowing them — becomes one of the most valuable resources any of us can have.

When you think about preparedness, it's natural to picture checklists: extra batteries, flashlights, water, and a go-bag. But true preparedness also means community preparedness. It means knowing who might need an extra hand if the power goes out — the senior who uses a medical device, the single parent juggling kids and supplies, or the neighbor who works nights and might sleep through an evacuation notice. It also means knowing who has a generator, a truck, a chainsaw, or even just a big heart and a willingness to help.

Taking the time to connect before a crisis not only makes our neighborhoods safer; it makes them stronger, kinder, and more joyful places to live every day. And that's something worth being thankful for.

If you're not sure where to start, the Thanksgiving season offers the perfect excuse. Drop off a pie, share some extra apples from your tree, or simply introduce yourself. A small act of kindness can open a door that leads to a lasting relationship. Maybe you can check out our Resilient Cloverdale website https://cloveready.org/about-us/#block and host a block party or a Saturday morning coffee in someone's driveway. Maybe you start a shared group text for your street. Something as simple as "Need help?" or "All clear?" can be a lifeline during a storm or evacuation.

These small gestures matter. They remind us that we are part of something bigger than our individual households. They turn neighbors into friends, and friends into a safety net. When you know who lives around you — and they know you — you create a circle of trust that makes the whole community more resilient.

And while this is about preparedness, it's equally about gratitude. Because when we take time to connect, we discover just how much abundance already exists around us — not just in material things, but in generosity, resourcefulness, and care. The neighbor who checks on your pets when you're away. The teenager down the street who helps carry groceries. The retired firefighter who quietly keeps a watchful eye during fire season. These relationships are the threads that hold our towns together.

So this Thanksgiving, as we count our blessings, let's add one more: the gift of community. Let's be grateful not only for what we have, but for who we have, the people who live beside us, the ones who share our skies and our worries, our laughter and our hope.

In good times and in crisis, the strength of our neighborhoods comes not from emergency kits or official plans, but from the connections we build with one



another. Gratitude grows when it's shared, and so does resilience. This holiday season, take a moment to reach out. Knock on a door. Learn a name. You may find that the neighbor you meet today becomes the friend who stands beside you tomorrow.



I Want AI in My Home (and Nowhere Else!) Will Carter


Eight years ago, I was given an original Google Nest Speaker for Christmas. Like an Amazon Echo, it is voice activated with a phrase I now repeat several times a day: "Hey Google." I found this device to be incredibly useful, and I now have several Nest devices. Recently, Google announced that, at the end of October, the Nest Displays and Nest Speakers would receive updates to enable Gemini, Google's new AI assistant. I am excited for this new AI feature but never use AI otherwise. So why do I celebrate this AI product, but condemn popular tools like chats and image/ video generation?

Desperate to understand AI as a user, I have tried Gemini and ChatGPT, and the biggest take away for me was concern. Almost all services have minimal guardrails, and you can overcome them so easily, you might do it by accident. There are many disturbing reports about the hazards of these chats and the ethical lapses of their developers. Conversations with AI chats are eerily comfortable and filled with incorrect information, bad suggestions, and AI models breaking their own rules.

With Sora 2, OpenAI's latest video generator, in pre-registration AI tools are becoming dangerously effective at simulating real content. Other new tools allow questionable content like violence, explicit images, and depictions of illegal acts to be generated on demand. Beyond Deepfakes, AI image/video generation is questionable on many other fronts: taking creative jobs, violating copyright law, and creating inaccurate AI hallucinations which are often published without correction.

If you are interested in AI, use it with caution and skepticism. If you don't want to use AI, you don't need to. But what is it that I think AI is good for? For my use, all I want is to answer simple questions and fulfill simple requests. Gemini, as integrated with Google search, allows users to see a summary-style answer to their query, which is often correct if the question is simple. At home, having an AI assistant which can set timers, answer simple questions, and control the smart devices in my home is all I need and all I expect to want!

November Gardening Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardeners Sponsored by Sanz Nursery

- It's time to dig up and divide ornamental grasses and perennials. Set plants in a shaded area and cover roots with damp newspaper while you are working.
- If you have deciduous trees, rake up leaves as they fall. Shred large leaves before composting. If not shredded, large, moist leaves will mat and decompose very slowly, making a slippery, gooey mass in your compost pile or on beds. You can put them out for recycling as well.
- Heavy feeders such as roses and fruit trees should get a good dose of organic fertilizer. Winter rain allows nutrients to penetrate into the ground where they break down and are ready to feed plants in spring.
- First frost often occurs in the county in mid-November. Protect tender plants such as Bougainvillea, Hibiscus, Citrus, Tibouchina, and other tender species. You can use an anti-desiccant spray such as Cloud Cover or a spun fabric row cover. Covering plants with sheets or lightweight blankets or burlap is another option. If you use plastic sheeting, do not allow plastic to contact foliage.
- Spring-flowering bulbs are on display in nurseries and garden centers and good selections are available from specialty catalogues. When the ground becomes soft from rain, put bulbs in the ground as soon as you can, following package directions.
- Hardwood cuttings can be taken at any time during dormancy, but just after leaves have fallen is an excellent time. Taking cuttings from leafless shoots is advantageous because water loss due to transpiration is minimal. You can bury the cuttings in moist sand or peat moss, put them in a cold frame or a sheltered area, and plant next spring. Ensure that they do not dry out.

The great wildlife migration is underway. Spending the winter somewhere warm, indulging in good food, appeals to most of us. It does to a lot of animals around us, too.

The season's change brings flocks of wild birds moving high above the landscape on their southern journeys. Hundreds of species soar above, from hummingbirds to herons to wrens. The sky is alive with wings.

Raptors are among those giant creatures sailing up high. Visiting the valley this season, you may see more hawks, eagles, falcons, owls, osprey, and kites. Some red-tailed hawks have been tracked flying from Washington to Argentina and back. Look for ferruginous hawks and rarer birds, like the Merlin, rough-legged hawk, and golden eagle.

The presence of raptors is a sign of balance. Some are passing through, leaving northern nests for warmer weather. But many are here for the coastal prairie habitat. The raptors are out because the rodents are too. What can be a nightmare for people is a feeding frenzy for birds. If suburbs, farms, and fields had more habitat and less poisons, these winged creatures would take care of most rodent problems. The



wild brings a natural balance in this way.

Support public lands by viewing raptors at regional parks like Tolay Lake, Spring Lake, Taylor Mountain, Crane Creek, and the Laguna de Santa Rosa, or head down to the banks of the Russian River on a nice autumn day. Hang out with experienced birdwatchers through West County Hawk Watch and Sonoma Land Trust. Beyond Sonoma County, raptors can be viewed at Point Reyes National Seashore and the estuary at Big River in Mendocino. Locally, where the river meets the sea at the Sonoma Coast, you'll find the trails at the Jenner Headlands Preserve an excellent place to spend a fall day.

Washington Middle School Cross Country Team Finds Their Stride

The Washington Middle School cross country team missed their first two meets and nearly a month of training, but that didn't stop their eight dedicated runners from making a strong impression once competition began.

The team's first meet was held at Laurence Jones Middle School. Sixth grader Liam Hickman led the boys with a fast 7:15 mile pace, finishing in 13 minutes and 30 seconds. Seventh graders Flynn Cook, Noah Peterson, Quinn Wilton, and Johaun Schreier followed close behind, each showing steady effort and determination throughout the



race. Kensie White, the team's only female runner that day, made an impressive debut, finishing in 14 minutes and 25 seconds with a 7:45 mile pace.



Washington's runners competed at the All Middle School Invitational at Spring Lake. Hickman placed an impressive 35th with a time of 13:50, while Cook, Wilton, Peterson, and Schreier delivered solid performances. In the girls' race, which included over 135 competitors, Trinity Cook and Kensie White both finished in the top 25—Trinity in 22nd place (15:28) and Kensie just behind in 24th (15:31).

The team's most recent competition brought them back home to Cloverdale, where they hosted their own meet at the scenic Asti Winery. On their 1.8 mile home course, the Washington runners truly shined. Kensie White stole the spotlight, taking first

place out of 12 runners with a remarkable time of 12:36, improving her performance by a full three minutes from last season. Trinity

Cook, a seventh grader, also outstanding with a third-place finish in 13:21. In the boys' race, Flynn Cook led the way, finishing sixth with a time of 12:42, followed by Noah Peterson in 10th (13:36), Quinn Wilton in 11th (13:57), and Clayton Vickers, who competed in his first race of the season, finishing 14th (16:30).

What started as a season full of obstacles has turned into a story of commitment, perseverance, and the power of teamwork.

"Ours is the only Level II trauma center between the Oregon state line and the San Francisco Bay Area," says Omar Ferrari, DO, director of the Department of Emergency Medicine. "We care for more than 4,500 trauma patients each year, including around 600 who are transported by helicopter. And we're in the top 10% nationally when it

comes to positive patient outcomes."

Santa Rosa Memorial's team of specialized emergency physicians, trauma surgeons, nurses and other staff treat patients with life-threatening injuries 24/7/365. "There is no injury we can't treat, but the ones we see most often stem from traffic accidents, falls by people who are on blood thinners, gunshots, stabbings and the like," Dr. Ferrari says. Injured people are stabilized, triaged, then transferred to Santa Rosa Memorial immediately via ambulance or helicopter.

"I want to make sure people know how important Santa Rosa Memorial's trauma center is to the community. It was astounding how swiftly I received treatment," says Rebecca Green Birdsall, who was treated for sepsis in the ER.

To ease financial burdens, Providence hospitals often offer medication vouchers or pay for Uber rides home for patients who live hundreds of miles away. "We all work together as a family, and that results in better care for our patients' medical as well as emotional needs," says Dr. Ferrari.

City Council Report Elegnore Webster

September 24: Council proclaimed Pollution Prevention Week 9/15-9/21/25, and Creek Week 9/22 -9/28/25. Also 9/15 to 10/15 is Hispanic Heritage Month, recognizing the contributions of Hispanic community members. Gris Alonso-Soto was recognized for her efforts. Members of the Hispanic community were present, many dressed in traditional attire. Then Cloverdale's Police Chief administered the oath of office to Officer Alex Segobiano. About 20 family members were present. Alex's father, a former Cloverdale police officer, pinned Alex's badge.

Council adopted a monitoring and reporting program for Soda Springs Ranch open space. The hope is to open for public use by year end. Council adopted the Cloverdale Citizen Recognition Program, to start in 2026. Council authorized purchase and installation of two portable buildings at the Cloverdale Municipal Airport. This should be a revenue generator for the City through rental fees. The cost is about \$10,000 to be recouped through the fees.

October 8: Council proclaimed 10/4 to 10/12 Water Professionals Week, and 10/11 to 10/18 Zero Waste Week. Water Dept staff and Zero Waste representatives were present. Zero Waste representative Leslie Lukacs presented on the goal to achieve zero waste by 2030 (see the video recording and Zero Waste website).

Council denied a request from Wine Country Inn to reduce their water charges from a water leak that was noticed by City staff. Staff provided three notices to the property owner before repairs occurred. The property owners were not present at the meeting to answer questions. Council approved a Budget amendment to fund a 'reduced cost' study for the new Police facility. The first design came in way over budget. This study is intended to reduce costs while keeping focus on critical needs.

Council approved the purchase of 110 N. Cloverdale Blvd. and 124 East 1st Street for an amount not to exceed \$1.166 million. This property borders the Downtown Plaza (empty lot and laundromat, barbershop). See Agenda attachments for more info. Council and City Staff feel this is a rare opportunity and allows for expansion of the Plaza. The purchase amount is slightly below the appraised value. Funding mostly comes from fees paid by developers; no money comes from the general fund. Council committed to including the impacted business owners in the plans and expressed appreciation for their businesses.

Property tax bills are out. While the statement is in your hand, take the opportunity to review how title to your real property is held.

If your home is held in a trust, the address portion of your tax statement will provide at least a hint that the property is held in your trust. For example, your name may have the letters "TR" or "TEE" for trustee after it. If the statement shows the address in your individual name without any indication that you are a trustee, pull out the deed and double check. Alternatively, you can call the Sonoma County Assessor to confirm how title is held. However, if you are unsure, check with your attorney. If you have a trust and your real property is not titled to you as trustee, your estate plan may not go as planned. Your estate may require probate. To ensure your estate plan works as you intend, ask your attorney to transfer your real property to your trust. If you own real estate and do not have a trust, create a trust and fund it with your real estate.

It's for those that toil, the arid soil, Or their work would be in vain, No seed would sprout, if it's without That vital drop of rain.


And on I look at a forming brook, As it slowly makes its way, Widening as it rolls along, This dark, but beautiful day."

Hundreds of professionals and stakeholders came together from across Northern California to plan next steps to care for our neighbors who need support amidst these devastating federal cuts.

The County of Sonoma has launched Open Doors, a campaign to connect residents to vital services including access to food, housing, health care, employment, child care and other services everyone needs to thrive. Open Doors is a collaborative effort uniting government, nonprofits, and community-based organizations that deliver critical safety net services to vulnerable populations (OpenDoorsSC.com).





Alan Mardis Furber Jr. August 22, 1944-October 6, 2025



A dedicated resident of Cloverdale, Alan Furber was a beloved father, grandfather, and a man who believed things simply "had to be done", even if it meant climbing to the highest rung on an orchard ladder to clean a gutter or spending hours clearing brush.

For fifteen years, he taught woodshop at Brookhaven Junior High in Sebastopol, introducing countless students

to the smell of sawdust and the pride of crafting a pigshaped cutting board. His creativity spanned beyond the classroom; he was a self-taught lathe turner, a precise painter, who never used blue tape, and a marching band trombone player who kept his musty, worn instrument case handy.

His dedication to Cloverdale was deep-rooted. His great grandparents moved here in 1879. He and his brother Craig and parents Helen and Alan Sr developed family land for both housing and the Furber Ranch Plaza shopping center, and he consistently supported the town's entrepreneurs, purposefully buying from local businesses. He also served on the board of the History Center, teaching visitors about the community's past.

Alan was an avid outdoorsman, a fixture on local trails, hiking 3-4 miles several times a week. It was a routine everyone in town seemed to know. He loved fishing, hunting, and waterskiing. He made sure his kids and grandkids learned the thrill of popping out of the water, or holding on to the inner tube handles with all their might. He also shared his passion for the ocean, diving for abalone and treating the family to delicious appetizers.

He was the guy who always showed up—for soccer games, speech tournaments, and every performance or show his grandchildren, Hazel, Avy, and Zac, performed in.

He taught his family everything from how to fix a clogged sink to how to drive a stick shift. He loved to dance, always with a big smile on his face, a joy that was reflected on his partner's. A master of the grill, he could barbeque anything and his signature potluck item was tr-tip served on toothpicks, making him instantly popular. When he truly loved a meal, his highest praise was the simple and understated "pretty fair".

His legacy is carried on by his beloved daughters Amy and Andrea and their husbands Jim and Casey and his cherished grandchildren, Zac, Avy, and Hazel. He loved us, and we loved him, and he will be fiercely missed by

his family, friends, and the Cloverdale community he helped build.

We will celebrate his life on December 13, 2025, at The Citrus Fair Auditorium at 11:00am. Please join us for memories, food and fellowship. He'd want it that way.

Artist's Statement

"I have spent over 45 years as a welder/fabricator in my career. Over that time, I produced equipment for the winery and food industries, as well as trucking manufacturers. After many years, I discovered that I enjoy creating metal sculpture using recycled and repurposed materials. For the past 10 years, I have been creating metal art for the general public. Some of my projects have been on display annually at the Cloverdale Citrus Fair. They are also sold at Cloverdale Nursery. I have participated in serval Rebel Junk Shows in Sonoma County. In pursuit of different and unusual materials, I often attend estate sales and hunt salvage yards. Recycled materials are a major part of my design process. Commissioned pieces are also available.





Cooking with David Maciel

In November comes my favorite holiday Thanksgiving. But then comes the task of preparing & cooking the turkey so it comes out tender & juicy.

The best way to ensure this is with a brine.

Wet brine is a saltwater solution used to submerge the turkey for 12 to 24 hours before cooking. If you are concerned with sodium intake brine does not increase sodium in the meat

Wet Brine Turkey

How it works: The salt solution tenderizes the meat by causing the muscle fibers to absorb water through osmosis. This process expands the muscle cells, which helps the turkey retain more moisture during roasting

Benefits: This results in a noticeably juicier, more tender, and more flavorful turkey. Most places that sell turkeys have prepackaged brine mixes that only require water. Here's my favorite brine recipe.

Apple & Citrus Turkey Brine

- 14-pound Turkey
- 2 gallons liquid (apple cider is my preferred choice; water also works)
- 1 C coarse kosher salt or good quality coarse sea salt
- 1 C brown sugar
- 8 cloves of garlic, smashed
- 2 oranges, halved and juiced
- 2 lemons, halved and juiced
- 4 TBS peppercorns
- 4 bay leaves
- Handful of fresh herbs like rosemary, thyme, sage, and parsley.

Instructions

- Transfer about 8 cups of cider or water to a saucepan. Add salt and sugar. Bring it to a boil, then lower to a simmer. Let it go, stirring occasionally, until the salt and sugar have dissolved. When done, set it aside and let the liquid cool completely. (You can speed this up by adding ice.)
- Pour the cooled brine to your brining container. Add the rest of the cider along with the garlic cloves, herbs, and peppercorns. Squeeze the juice from the oranges and lemons into the pot (don't worry about the pits) and place the squeezed orange and lemon into the pot as well. Slowly and carefully submerge the turkey into the brine (careful, the liquid level will rise). Cover and refrigerate for an hour per pound.
- When brining time is up, carefully transfer the turkey to the sink. (I line mine with plastic grocery bags to try to keep things more sanitary. You could also use plastic wrap.) Carefully but thoroughly rinse the turkey with low water pressure to avoid splashback. This will rinse off excess salt. If you skip rinsing, you will end up with your turkey too salty.
- After the rinse, pat the turkey dry with paper towels and transfer it to a cooking vessel. You can now prepare it and season it as you normally would.

Let's Travel ~ Craig Clark

Here's what you need to know

A growing number of countries are demanding insurance as a How much coverage do you actually need? condition of entry.

Here's where insurance is required:

Argentina introduced a travel insurance requirement last July.

Europe's Schengen Area also requires insurance. All 29 countries in Europe that belong to the Schengen Area require visa applicants to carry about \$35,000 in medical coverage, including emergency hospitalization and repatriation.

All 29 countries of the Schengen Area require all Schengen visa applicants to take out travel insurance and border agents can ask for proof. If you don't have it, they can deny entry.

Cuba won't let you in without medical insurance.

Ecuador and the Galápagos Islands require visitors to have health insurance.

Thailand, Turkey, the UAE, and Russia also have a mandatory travel insurance rule.

23 countries plus Europe's Schengen region, now require travel insurance,

Travel insurance is becoming mandatory in more destinations. Bottom line: There's an excellent chance that if you're crossing a border, you'll need travel insurance.

Start with \$55,000, but experts recommend at least \$100,000 because healthcare costs in those countries can bankrupt you. The coverage must include specific benefits: emergency medical treatment, hospitalization, repatriation, and increasingly, medical evacuation.

Here's a checklist of things you should do before traveling.

Check requirements early. Don't wait until you're at the airport.

Buy comprehensive coverage. You need one that meets minimum thresholds and includes emergency medical care, trip interruption, and medical evacuation.

Carry proof everywhere. Keep both digital and printed copies of your insurance certificate.

Use a reputable provider. You can get a quote quickly at my website, Cloverdaletravel.com Look for the blue box on the front page from Travelex. Be sure to list the trip cost in even dollars, such as 3000, no decimal points.
