

Do you like to travel? Do you want to take your dogs with you? Here are some important things to consider.



- 1) **Weather**. Will it be very hot or cold where you are going? Are your dogs used to these temps? If it is hot, you may not be able to leave them in the car or camper when you need to step out, so how will you deal with that?

Upgrade Time! ~ Will Carter


In just a few days' time, on October 14th, Windows 10 will receive its final update from Microsoft. At this point, Windows 10 will no longer receive crucial security patching or support. Businesses should already be switched by this date, and individuals should upgrade as soon as feasible. While I have written several articles about this before, this final article will tell you the steps to find out if you can upgrade, or if replacement will be necessary.

First you will need Microsoft's PC Health Check app, which should be offered in the pop-ups you're likely already seeing. If you don't get a pop-up, you can find the app on Microsoft's Support site: support.microsoft.com. Once the app is installed, you can open it, then click "Check now". This will scan your system for five different factors which are required for Windows 11 and give you a report. Some of these factors can be changed or upgraded to enable your system to run Windows 11, others cannot.

The factors which can be changed are: Secure Boot support, enabled TPM 2.0, minimum 4GB of memory, and a system disk at least 64GB in size. The first two are the most likely to be a hangup but are also able to be resolved with only simple software changes. The second two are likely already satisfied with most computers which are otherwise compatible.


The biggest concern, however, is Microsoft's new 'supported CPU' list, which prevents Windows 11 from being installed on systems by age, instead of by capability. Microsoft defends this as necessary for secuirty; however, many find this new requirement to be erroneous and likely prioritizing sales over functionality. The short version of the story is this, if you see "The processor isn't currently supported for Windows 11" in PC Health Check, you're out of luck and it's new computer time.

If PC Health Check says that your system is compatible, now is the time to upgrade! If not, then it is time to make a change. Reach out to a techy friend for advice or give a trusted technology provider a call if you have any questions!





True West Film Center Opening Dates

True West Film Center announced its opening dates for the Cinemas at True West, the newest destination for North Bay movie goers. The cinemas are the focal point of the film center's James Redford Campus located at 371 Healdsburg Avenue. Cinema doors will open to the public on Friday, October 17. The Grand Opening Celebration will take place on Saturday, October 25, following a VIP Preview on Friday, October 24, 2025.

The project is being funded through the Campaign to Open True West, a multi-year \$5.6M capital campaign which has generated \$4.75M to date and runs through December, 2026.

The new venue comprises three theaters with a total of 102 seats and seven spaces for wheelchairs. The cinemas offer state-of-the-art theatrical exhibition, luxury seating, and a bespoke food and wine program featuring local providers. An additional multi-purpose space allows for independent screenings, private events, and community gatherings.

Estate Planning: Joint Tenancy vs. Tenant-in-Common Paula Hall

When two or more people purchase or acquire real property, the title officer may ask how they would like to take title: joint tenancy or tenants-in-common. Which should you choose for your estate plan? If you want your interest to pass to the other joint tenant when you die, joint tenancy is a good choice. Joint tenancy allows property to pass automatically to a surviving joint tenant when one joint tenant dies. The surviving joint tenant records an affidavit and the death certificate with the county recorder and title transfers to the surviving joint tenant. No Will, probate, or court supervision, is necessary. If you want your interest in the property to pass to someone other than the other co-owner, choose tenants-in-common.

With tenants-in-common, each co-owner may direct to whom his or her interest should pass. This flexibility allows a tenant-in common to sell his or her share to a third party, leaving the other tenant(s) in common to co-own property with a stranger. The privilege to direct who gets your interest requires actual direction. You must name the person in your Will and go through probate to get the property to your intended beneficiary, or otherwise hold your interest in a trust. Creditors are a disadvantage with either choice. A creditor of one co-owner can place a lien on the entire property to collect a debt, even if the other co-owner has no liability for the debt. Ultimately, the choice depends on the goals of the individual co-owners.

Generally, however, joint tenancy works for married couples, while tenants-in common is better for people acquiring property as a group, but want a degree of separation between the other co-owners and themselves, such as siblings or couples with children from a previous marriage.

October Gardening Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardeners Sponsored by Sanz Nursery

- If you haven't been cleaning up leaves as they fall from roses, be sure to do it now. A single rose leaf on the ground can carry millions of tiny fungal spores that overwinter and infect roses the following year. Put leaves in the trash, not the compost pile.
- Fall sales are still on at many local nurseries. Look for bargains but be mindful that many sale plants are root bound and will need to be watered regularly before winter rains begin. Do not buy anything you can't put into the ground and keep watered. Some pot-bound perennials can be divided 2-3 times before planting; use a pruning saw or large serrated kitchen knife to cut through the root ball.
- Bulbs are on display in nurseries and garden centers and good selections are available from specialty catalogs. It is generally easier to wait until after the first rains to plant them, but buy now so you are prepared.
- As days become cooler and shorter, you can begin to divide and transplant ornamental grasses and clumpforming perennials. Keep the divisions well-watered until it rains. It's easier to divide grasses if they are first pruned low to the ground.
- Perennials should be completely dormant before you cut them back to just above ground level from November to January. It's too early to start now. Leaving foliage intact allows leaves to continue feeding the root system throughout fall. You can cut back flowering stems and trim some unsightly leaves, but leave well enough alone until foliage dries completely or is killed by frost.
- October is a good time to take hardwood cuttings of woody plants such as lavender, rosemary, and manzanita.
 Take small cuttings, dip them in rooting hormone, stick in damp vermiculite, and keep misted. Covering with plastic helps hold in moisture. Keep out of direct sunlight and wait for roots to form in several weeks to a couple of months, depending on the species.

E-Bike & E-Scooter Safety

As your Police Chief, I prioritize the safety and well-being of our community members. While these devices offer a fun and efficient means of transportation, it's crucial that both parents and youth riders are fully aware of the rules and regulations that govern their use. When in the roadway they are still subject to the rules of the road (stop signs, speed limits etc.). Here is some essential information that will help keep our riders, sidewalks, and streets safe for everyone.

- Driver's License Requirement (CVC 21235(d)): All riders must possess a valid driver's license or learner's permit to operate an electric scooter.
- · Helmet Requirement

(CVC 21235(c)): Riders under the age of 18 are required to wear a bicycle helmet while riding.

- Bicycle Lane Usage (CVC 21230, CVC 21229,): It's mandatory to use bicycle lanes when they are available.
- Sidewalk Riding Prohibition (CVC 21235(g), CVC 21650.1): Riding on sidewalks is strictly prohibited to ensure the safety of our pedestrians.
- Speed Limit (CVC 22411): The maximum speed limit is 15 mph.
 Adhering to this limit reduces the risk of accidents.
- Night Riding (CVC 21223):
 Scooters must be equipped with operational and visible front and rear lights when used after dark.
- Proper Parking (CVC 21235(i)):
 When not in use, scooters should be parked in a manner that does not obstruct pedestrian access.
- Alcohol and Drug-Free Riding (CVC 21221.5): Operating an electric scooter under the influence of alcohol or drugs is illegal.

Classes of E-Bikes David Maciel

In the last several years the popularity of e bikes has skyrocketed and with that comes a daunting task of understanding the classifications of each bike and what's the best choice for you. There are three classes of e-bikes

Class 1 E-Bike:

- -Pedal-assisted
- -Motor helps up to 20 MPH

Class 2 E-Bike:

- -Throttle-controlled and pedal-assist
- -Motor propels bike up to 20 MPH without pedaling

Class 3 E-Bike:

- -Pedal-assisted and throttle
- -Motor helps up to 28 MPH
- -Must have a speedometer
- -Rider must be 16+
- -If under 18, helmet is required on public roads and bike paths

Each of these classes of e-bike can accelerate from zero to its top speed in less than three seconds. For a parent buying an e-bike for their child it's important to understand how fast these bikes are. The average person on a conventional bicycle will only reach around 15 mph.

There are many choices that fall into a very wide range of prices. The old saying of you get what you pay for cannot be more accurate. When choosing an e bike there are three factors to look for, making that decision:

- Do they have a US-based customer service contact information?
- 2. Do they have a company website?
- 3. Read customer feedback and reviews online

Lastly, there is a lot of good information on safety and the laws surrounding e-bikes at dmv.org and Sonoma county bicycle Coalition.

California Regulation On Electric Bicycles Cloverdale Police Chief Chris Parker

As Police Chief, I want to emphasize the importance of adhering to California's regulations regarding electric bicycles. Always wear a helmet, regardless of your age; it's your first line of defense in an accident. Be mindful of the speed limits, especially in high-traffic areas and shared pathways. Make sure your electric bicycle is equipped with the necessary lights and reflectors, especially if you're riding at night. By being vigilant and respectful of these regulations, we all contribute to a safer and more harmonious community. Remember, these precautions may seem minor, but they can make a major difference in preventing accidents and ensuring that everyone, cyclists, pedestrians, and motorists alike can navigate our streets safely.

Electric Bicycles An electric bicycle is a bicycle equipped with fully operable pedals and an electric motor of less than 750 watts. Three classes of electric bicycles have been established:

- Class 1: A low-speed pedal-assisted electric bicycle equipped with a motor that provides assistance only when the rider is pedaling and ceases to provide assistance when a speed of 20 mph is reached. There are no age restrictions for riders.
- Class 2: A low-speed throttle-assisted electric bicycle equipped with a motor used exclusively to propel the bicycle and NOT capable of providing assistance when a speed of 20 mph is reached. There are no age restrictions for riders.
- Class 3: A low-speed pedal-assisted electric bicycle equipped with a speedometer and a motor that provides assistance only when the rider is pedaling and ceases to provide assistance when a speed of 28 mph is reached.

The operator of a Class 3 electric bicycle:

- Must be 16 years old or older.
- Must wear a bicycle safety helmet (all ages).
- Must not transport passengers.
- May ride an electric bicycle in a bicycle lane if authorized by local authority or ordinance. CVC 21200; This section states that bicycle riders have all the rights and are subject to all the provisions applicable to the driver of a vehicle, including, but not limited to provisions concerning driving under the influence of alcoholic beverages or drugs, and a host of other detailed rules of the road (Speed, stop signs, etc.). All electric bicycle classes are exempt from the motor vehicle financial responsibility, DL, and license plate requirements (CVC 24016(b)).

Essential Safety Tips for E-Scooter Riders

- 1. Always Wear a Helmet: Wearing a helmet is crucial for protecting your head in case of falls or collisions.
- 2. Stay Focused: Keep your eyes on the road ahead and avoid distractions.
- 3. Control Your Speed: Ride at a safe speed that allows you to react to obstacles.
- 4. Follow Local Laws: Be aware of the regulations regarding e-scooter use in your area.
- 5. Perform Regular Maintenance: Check your e-scooter before each ride to ensure it is in good working condition.
- 6. Use Protective Gear: In addition to a helmet, consider wearing knee and elbow pads, wrist guards, and gloves to protect against injuries in case of falls.
- 7. Let Others Know You're Coming: Use a bell or your voice to alert pedestrians and cyclists when approaching them on shared paths.
- 8. One Rider at a Time: E-scooters are designed for single riders only.

Why Children Should Not Ride E-Scooters Ashley Morgan, MD, Master of Science, Fellow of the American Academy of Pediatrics

Shared electric scooters (e-scooters) are common in cities and on college campuses across the United States. Much like bike shares, you can find them on the street, unlock them with a smartphone app and leave them at your destination. But there is a cost to convenience: e-scooter-related emergency room visits have spiked. With this increase in e-scooter injuries, it is important to be aware of dangers and regulations surrounding e-scooters and how to keep kids safe. Read on to learn more.

Common e-scooter injuries

If you fall off an e-scooter, which can travel up to 15 and 20 miles per hour, you are going to get hurt. Period.

The most common injuries are cuts, fractures and head injuries. Some of these injuries are severe. Many of these injuries are caused by incidents with motor vehicles or user-control issues of the e-scooter.

The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) recommends that children under 16—who are too young to have a driver's license—should not operate or ride on motorized or e-scooters.

Helmets: the best protection on e-scooters

All scooters pose a similar—if not increased—risk of head injury compared with bikes. Helmets are the best way to prevent serious head injuries, but usage remains low. Consider:

- A 2017 survey found that parents were less likely to make their child or adolescent wear a helmet while riding a scooter when compared to riding a bike. Only 57% of parents said they would make their child or adolescent wear a helmet while riding a scooter.
- When signing up on the apps to rent e-scooters, riders are asked to wear helmets; yet helmets are not provided.
- Images on social media often make it seem like it's ok to ride a scooter without a helmet. Always make sure to wear a helmet when using an e-scooter, even if advertisements do not show riders wearing them.
- The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) conducted a study showing that there are about 14 injuries per 100,000 trips on motorized scooters. Some of these injuries were severe.
- According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) in 2021, there were an estimated 42,200 emergency room visits due to e-scooter injuries. This number shows a 66% increase from 2020.
- E-scooters are responsible for 68 deaths from 2017 through 2021.

E-scooter injuries in children are increasing, which is likely due to the rising popularity of e-scooter sharing apps. It is important that parents are aware of the dangers and regulations surrounding e-scooters.

Important safety rules for all e-scooter riders

- Children under 16 should not operate or ride on motorized or e-scooters. In some cities, it is illegal for kids under 16 to use an e-scooter.
- Wear a helmet and closed-toe shoes. Wearing a helmet may prevent or reduce the severity of e-scooter injuries. An adult who falls off an e-scooter is just as likely to hit their head as a child.
- Wear protective gear. This includes elbow and kneepads and reflective gear when riding at night.
- No texting and riding. Use both hands to operate the scooter.
- No earbuds in. Be aware of your surroundings.
- Do not ride e-scooters on sidewalks, beach paths, or parks. This puts pedestrians at risk of injury as well as riders.

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Let's Travel Southwest Airlines Coming To Santa Rosa Airport Craig Clark

Flights to Santa Rosa's Charles M. Schulz-Sonoma County Airport (STS) will begin April 7 and will fly four routes from Santa Rosa, including daily service to both San Diego and Las Vegas. Flights to Burbank will operate five times per week, while the Denver service will be Saturday only. This is a plus for the airport as Southwest ranks first in customer satisfaction by J.D Power

Elliott.org recently published a report on how AI is trapping online travelers into paying more for flights and hotel stays. While I don't have the space here for the entire article, the takeaway is that airline and hotel reservation systems will often display higher prices based on your past inquiries. To counter this try using different browsers for your inquiry, go incognito (Ctrl + Shift + N), clear your cookies between searches, or use a VPN (Virtual Private Network) to shift your location.

More hotel and car rental rates are being offered at nonrefundable rates. New Al-driven pricing models allow travel companies to adjust their prices and refund terms in a split second. For example, hotels will often lower their rates by 10 percent in exchange for the room being nonrefundable, knowing that some people will cancel and then they'll get to sell the room again.

To avoid this, book your hotel stay using a credit card guarantee, with a 24- or 48-hour cancelation privilege. The same goes for rental cars. If a deposit or full payment is required, select a different car type or different company as most airports have more than one rental car company available.

Most airline tickets purchased are non-refundable, but they generally retain their original value for future travel if you have to cancel.

14ft., which is conveniently located right next door to Plank will host art events in the fall. Guests can sip champagne, chat with the artist and view their work.





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

October is a busy month for the Cloverdale Democratic Club. We are working hard to get out the vote for the November special election and we are also gathering signatures on the petition to put the SMART Initiative on the spring 2026 ballot.

California Proposition 50, also known as the Election Rigging Response Act, is a significant legislative measure that will be on the ballot for a special election on November 4, 2025. The measure would authorize temporary changes to California's congressional district maps in response to partisan redistricting efforts in Texas. If passed, the new maps will be used for the 2026 to 2030 elections. The California Citizens Redistricting Commission, which typically handles redistricting, will resume its duties after the 2030 Census. Unlike Texas's approach, California's law requires voter approval for extraordinary redistricting measures, emphasizing democratic participation. Watch for our canvassers encouraging people to vote, and contact us for yard signs, buttons and postcards.

The SMART Initiative (theSMARTinitiative.org) is a voter-led effort to extend the existing .25% sales tax for 30 years to protect our \$1 billion investment and ensure rail and trail project completion to Cloverdale. With SMART funded to Healdsburg (expected to be completed in 2028), it's more important than ever to ensure the system has a secure local funding source for operations and completion. SMART ridership continues to break records. If you haven't ridden yet, go see what you're missing: seniors 65+ and students ride free. Watch for us collecting signatures at local events including the October 18th No Kings events. A petition is also available at the Cloverdale Chamber of Commerce Monday-Friday 10am-4pm (call 707-894-4470 to ensure availability).

Without your support, food and monetary donations, the Food Pantry would not exist. We distribute food to 90+ families every week. And the need is growing! We thank the following organizations for their time and effort: United Church of Cloverdale, Kiwanis Club of Cloverdale, Cloverdale St. Peters Catholic Church, and Living Water Church.

There are monthly costs to the Cloverdale Food Pantry program: (Approximately \$2,000 per month.)

- Food Pantry building: rental fee, water, electricity, and insurance
- Weekly food purchases from the Redwood Empire Food Bank
- Food Pantry van (gas, insurance, service maintenance costs)



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Could Esmeralda Strengthen Cloverdale's Future? ~ Erik Terreri

The proposed Esmeralda resort and housing development in southeast Cloverdale is projected to generate substantial tax revenue for the city. While that benefit is widely acknowledged, the bigger question many residents ask is whether Esmeralda will truly boost the rest of Cloverdale—or risk drawing energy and spending away from our historic downtown.

In my view, Esmeralda has the potential to be a catalyst for growth across the entire community. Once complete—likely within a decade—the development could attract enough new residents and visitors to support additional restaurants, shops, and services. That kind of increased demand could be exactly what Cloverdale needs to maintain and expand its local business base.

The real key will be in how Esmeralda integrates with our existing economy. Instead of importing outside brands to fill its on-site retail spaces, the development should partner with Cloverdale's

own entrepreneurs. Imagine their planned pop-up grocery store operated by Dahlia and Sage, the coffee shop branded as another Plank location, or many other potential collaborations that help sustain existing businesses in town and provide needed services on site. Such partnerships would keep dollars circulating locally, foster community pride, and ensure downtown and Esmeralda grow together—not in competition.

The project is still in its due diligence stage, with time remaining for market analyses, city review, and preliminary approvals before the land purchase is finalized. That's why it's critical for the Planning Commission and City Council to make local business partnerships with Esmeralda's retail spaces a priority.

With thoughtful collaboration, Esmeralda could do more than add rooftops and resort rooms—it could become a cornerstone of a stronger, more vibrant Cloverdale for decades to come.

Creative Corner Christy Anne



October, the magical month, trapped between the chaos of the new school year and the last time before the holiday madness takes hold of us all. Those of us who hid during the summer months can finally emerge and reintroduce ourselves to humanity and many rejoice as the assault

of pumpkin spice rears its head and one can almost hear the swooning as many indulge in the long dormant flavor as it makes its yearly appearance.

For those looking for a project it can be a strange time as schedules are full and the expense of the holidays looms over our collective heads, making frivolous purchases unappealing. Luckily, many of us have lingering about in closets or dusty corners of the garage, old picture frames that have long ago lost their glass and backings. Many of you know what I mean, the older wooden ornate frames that you can't quite decide whether to finally toss in the bin or hold onto a wee bit longer. I have a solution and no, my ridiculously busy example is not the part I propose.

The part I propose is the simple art of attaching that wooden frame to a box to create a shelf of sorts, perfect for smaller items, or larger depending on the size of your frame face. Even for those hesitant to build, creating the box is quite simple and there is no need for a back. Simply measure the back of the wood frame where a box could be attached, mine for example is 14" by 12". I had some scrap wood and cut 2 pieces to 15" and 2 pieces to 12". The extra inch on the 2 pieces allows for $\frac{1}{2}$ " overlap when set up with the 2 – 12" pieces. A little wood glue and some panel nails as my pieces were only $\frac{1}{2}$ " thick did the trick.

Because I can take anything and make it involved, I had some fun.

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On the Wild Side Jennifer Molidor

It's spooky season. The celebration of Halloween comes from the Celtic festival of Samhain, marking the end of the harvest. It is a time when the veil between the spirit world is most liminal. Nocturnal bats and owls feed on insects that flock to festival bonfires, and became linked with Halloween. Irish author Bram Stoker's Dracula also played a part in linking bats with vampires and the creatures of the night.

In California, our official "state bat," the pallid bat, has golden-state colored fur and helps keep pests at bay. We also share landscapes with the Townsend's big-eared bat, brown bats, and Hoary bats with frosted, silver-colored fur. Look for bats at dusk. They roost in trees, crevices, caves, attics, and barns. At twilight, you can see them flying from under bridges, over rivers and lakes, and out of large trees.

Owls are also associated with Halloween. Nearby, the Great Horned Owl, Western Screech Owl, and Barn Owl live in forests, woodlands, and farmland. Vulnerable species include the Northern Spotted Owl, which lives in forests near the coast, and enjoys meals of dusty-footed woodrats. Listen for the hoots of owls, and if you're lucky, you may see one perched on tree limbs or fences, or hunting over open fields.

If you want to support bats and owls, connect with Sonoma County Wildlife Rescue and the Bird Rescue Center. These organizations can assist with an injured animal or advise on how to add bat boxes, owl boxes, and native plants to your spaces.

Celebrate a wildlife-friendly Halloween: skip the fake spiderwebs, netting, and spray that can trap critters and contaminate yards. Let's protect these critters who help keep our lands healthy. Happy Halloween!

Cooking with David Maciel

The smell of fall and harvest is in the October air. The cooler morning temps give way to warm afternoons. This creamy very rich soup is a perfect belly warming meal for those cooler evenings

Pumpkin and Bacon Soup

Ingredients

- 2 cups low-sodium chicken stock
- 2 (15 oz.) cans pure pumpkin puree
- 1 (12 oz.) can evaporated milk
- 1 Tbsp. packed brown sugar
- 1 and 1/2 tsp. salt
- ¼ tsp. black pepper
- ½ tsp. dried sage leaves
- ½ tsp. garlic powder
- 1 oz. Parmesan cheese
- 3 strips cooked bacon

Instructions

- 1. Put a large pot or Dutch oven over high heat. Add the chicken broth, pumpkin puree, evaporated milk, salt, pepper, sage, garlic powder, and brown sugar. Stir. Reduce heat to medium.
- 2. Cover and cook, stirring often, until it comes to a simmer. Reduce heat to low. Taste. Add more salt and pepper if desired.
- 3. While the soup is coming up to a simmer, finely grate the parmesan cheese and finely chop the bacon. Mix them together.
- 4. Preheat a nonstick skillet over medium heat. Drop the Parmesan and bacon mixture into the pan in 6 little piles with space between them. When the piles have melted and started to brown (about a minute), use a spatula to scrape under them and flip them over. They'll squidge up a bit when you try to get under them but that's okay. Cook, flipping occasionally, until golden brown on both sides, 1-3 more minutes. Remove from heat. Let them cool for a minute and then chop them up.
- 5. Ladle the soup into bowls and top with the bacon and Parmesan crumbles.

Cloverdale Sculpture Trail Updates

Danielle's first love of sculpture ignited during a weekend welding workshop in Mendocino Art Center with Richard Yaski. The experience went on to propel a degree in fine arts in the Arts & Architecture and Geography/ Environmental Science at UCLA in 2006.

She works with artists in the permanent collections of Storm King New York, SFMOMA, NYMOMA, the Whitney Museum, Brooklyn Museum, Triton Museum, Sonoma County Museum of Art, etc. Danielle was the curator of Extraction: Art at the Edge of the Abyss at Erickson Fine Art Gallery, 2022, working the International Art Fair Fort Mason Center, San Francisco, CA.

Additionally, the Sculpture Trail is now under the non-profit umbrella of the Cloverdale Arts Alliance, where it originated. New installation for sculptures is slated for Spring, 2026.
