Introducing the Economic Development Committee

The Cloverdale Chamber of Commerce has launched the Economic Development Committee (EDC), a community-driven effort focused on strengthening Cloverdale's economic vitality. Chaired by Erik Terreri and supported by six dedicated community leaders, the EDC is partnering closely with Cloverdale's city leadership to gather meaningful input and develop proposals that support local businesses, residents, and long-term economic growth.

To begin this work, the EDC is rolling out three targeted surveys. The first survey—arriving just after Thanksgiving—invites everyone who lives or works in the 95425 area to share where they work, shop, and dine, as well as what services and amenities they would like to see in Cloverdale. A second survey will engage commercial property owners to better understand their development goals and needs. Powerful Power of Attorney Paula Hall

A well-drafted durable power of attorney is possibly the most powerful estate planning document.

A power of attorney is a document signed by an individual giving another the authority to act on his or her behalf. The person signing the document is the principal. The person receiving the authority to act is the agent or attorneyin fact.

A power of attorney can be durable or undurable. To be durable, a power of attorney must include a provision stating that the power of attorney will not be affected by subsequent incapacity. Without that sentence, the agent will not have the power to act when the principal is incapacitated. People execute a power of attorney to give someone authority to act upon incapacity and expect it to work.

Although the pre-printed California Statutory Power of Attorney is easy to download from the internet and sign, without an attorney, it does not always work and may even result in unintended consequences. It is frequently rejected by third parties, especially title companies, real estate agents, and banks, because it does not include required language or reference a specific transaction. Banks require specific language authorizing the agent to deposit in, draw from, establish or close a bank account.

The powers to designate beneficiaries, create or modify a trust and to fund a trust must be specifically granted. Those powers, when properly used, can avoid probate. If the principal becomes incapacitated, owning real property or other assets requiring protection from probate, the agent can use the power of attorney to create and fund a trust.

It is critical that the power of attorney work when it needs to. Review your power of attorney, preferably with an attorney, to ensure it is durable and specifically grants the powers you may want and need.

"I bring my one-year-old daughter to the restaurant so she can see what Daddy does." says Gurpreet smiling.

"We have something for everybody." he states. There is a fun arcade with pinballs, a puncher and video games for all ages. Wrapped around the restaurant are six big screen TVs for those NFL football games. Every couple of months, the restaurant hosts Beer Educational Tastings with Anderson Valley Brewing Co., and HenHouse Brewing Co. There is a lunch buffet every Monday-Friday where for \$13.99 you can get pizza, salad and a drink. Their "something for everybody" motto includes a Senior Discount, too. And fifteen percent will be subtracted from the bill for larger pizza parties.

Everything is made fresh daily, with all produce purchased locally. "The pizza toppings are spread edge to edge!" says Gurpreet. There are ten beers on tap and wine selections from Kendall Jackson, Carmel Road and Murphy-Goode. Pizza delivery includes a five-mile radius from Cloverdale, including Geyserville.

"Give us a try - just one time", says Gurpreet. "We will do everything to fulfill your expectations."

December Gardening Tips from Sonoma County Master Gardeners Sponsored by Sanz Nursery

- Protect frost-tender species you can use an anti-desiccant spray such as Cloud Cover or a spun fabric row cover. Covering plants with sheets or lightweight blankets or burlap is another option. If you use plastic sheeting, do not allow plastic to contact foliage.
- Dig up and divide grasses and perennials if the ground is not completely saturated from rain. Moist earth, shorter days and cooler weather, combined with their dormancy, make this the least stressful time for disturbing perennials. Make sure that once you've excavated a plant to keep roots moist.
- If you have deciduous trees, rake up leaves as they fall. Shred large leaves before composting or run a lawn mower over them. If not shredded, large, moist leaves will mat and decompose very slowly, making a slippery, gooey mass in your compost pile or on beds. You can put them out in the compost bin as well, but it's best to put their nutrients back into your own garden.
- Dormant-spray fruit trees and roses with horticultural oil after they have lost their leaves to control fungal infections and kill overwintering insect eggs.
- Make sure your garden is amply mulched for the winter. Mulch will insulate roots and retard weed growth. Winter weeds grow prolifically in the rainy season.
- Plant any remaining spring-blooming bulbs. Sow wildflower seeds.
- Clean, oil and store tools such as shovels, hoes, and pruners. Use light machine oil on metal parts to prevent rust.
- Clean out gutters to avoid overflow and direct water to downspouts.
- Winter is the season when rats forage—and damage—ornamental plants. If you have had problems in the past or if your neighbors have noticed rats, put out traps early before rats damage fruit trees, vines, climbing roses and shrubs. If you have ivy, the best time to prune or remove it is winter when growth slows and soil is somewhat soft.

State Funding Brings Alexander Valley Health Center Closer Than Ever



The Alexander Valley Health and Wellness Center is one step closer to reality, thanks to a \$3.5 million grant from the State of California, announced by Senator Mike McGuire in Cloverdale on October 29. Before the announcement, Senator McGuire toured AVH's Tarman Medical Center, hearing firsthand from providers about the impact the new facility will have—more space, better equipment, and expanded services for the entire community.

The planned 27,000 square-foot, two-story building will feature urgent care, a pharmacy, on-site lab, and expanded primary medical, dental, and behavioral health services. Once complete, it will double AVH's patient capacity, ensuring access to quality care for all ages.

Prior to this announcement, AVH raised \$1 million from local supporters, and \$6.7 million in grants from businesses, foundations, Sonoma County, Congressman Huffman, and the State Proposition 1 Bond program. With a total project cost (including planning, construction, furnishing and equipment) of \$38 million, the remainder will be financed through additional fundraising and a tax-exempt bond.

Construction is scheduled to begin in early 2026 and finish by early 2028. With this impactful state grant, and ongoing community support, Cloverdale is on track to get the health center it needs and deserves.



A lot can happen in a year, and this snapshot offers a summary of what moved our town forward in 2025. It was a year of transition with a mix of returning and newly elected and appointed Councilmembers, a new City Manager, and a few new staff, yet the focus remained on strengthening foundations, improving essential services, and supporting long term stability. We also acknowledge the staff whose steady day to day work keeps the City operating and makes these major achievements possible. For more detailed information, residents can always visit the City's website and contact their elected officials or department leadership.

Infrastructure, **parks**, **and public spaces** saw wide ranging improvements this year as the City continued investing in safety,



accessibility, and outdoor amenities. Photovoltaic upgrades at the Wastewater Treatment Plant, a significant repair to Lake Street, ongoing repairs to water service lines across multiple neighborhoods, and airport improvements that included two new portable buildings supported system reliability, while crews responded to 235 community service requests ranging from pothole repairs to graffiti abatement and

park maintenance. Survey feedback guided new downtown drinking fountains, planter adjustments, and other enhancements. Routes to schools were improved through vegetation clearing, branch trimming, serviced school zone lights, and





refreshed striping at key crossings, and work continues in the downtown corridor to reduce tripping hazards and improve accessibility. The City also participated in the countywide Streets to Creeks trash awareness campaign and contributed to the Russian River Cleanup to protect

local waterways. Water system improvements were completed through a turnkey efficiency project that installed a combined 600-kilowatt solar system at the water and wastewater treatment plants and finalized the AMI meter upgrade with Neptune Mach 10 meters and customer facing usage tracking tools. The

Wastewater Treatment Plant integrated new SCADA automation and completed a biosolids removal project that cleared more than three hundred dry tons to support uninterrupted service. Two replacement drinking water wells were also drilled to strengthen system resiliency and ensure continued access to clean drinking water. Parks received major

upgrades as well, including the new inclusive playground and scoreboard at Furber Park, expanded recreational amenities, a new gazebo at 2nd Street City Park and the dog park gained improved ADA accessibility. Significant progress continued at the 210-acre Soda Springs Ranch Open Space Preserve, where new multiuse trails, picnic sites, fencing, signage, and a parking area moved the project closer to public opening. Vegetation management throughout the year included prescribed burns and targeted sheep grazing to support habitat health and fire safety. Parks, Public Works, and Water jointly secured more than one million dollars in grants to support these efforts and

bolstered their staff with multiple Operator in Training (OIT's), and expanded maintenance personnel to strengthen ongoing

operations and support succession planning. The accomplishments reflect the City's integrated approach to community improvements, supported by reorganized staff roles that now



place the Parks Superintendent in charge of street crews, strengthening coordination across departments.


Public safety efforts remained a core focus this year through continued support of Resilient Cloverdale, FEMA and Emergency Operations Center trainings, and updated EOC preparedness supported by joint simulations with the County. The Police Department strengthened staffing with new trainees, promoted two officers to Patrol Sergeant, and upgraded equipment through a Homeland Security grant, while continuing its use of body worn cameras and Taser systems. The department purchased two new patrol vehicles, one of which is a four-wheel drive unit that increases access to all terrain areas. Officers expanded community outreach through school programs, events, and a local business mixer, and investigative work led to major arrests in a bank robbery, a retail theft ring, and multiple stolen vehicle cases assisted by the Flock camera system. Participation in drug disposal events and expansion of less lethal tools further supported safe incident resolution. Over the last four years, officer-initiated activity increased by 35 percent, calls for service rose 3 percent, arrests increased 8 percent, and citations grew 27 percent, reflecting a proactive, community-centered approach to public safety. As of November 2025, this year the department handled 8,792 calls for service from dispatch, responded to 14,080 total incidents, and officers initiated 5,288 of those incidents. A total of 237 arrests were made. These efforts highlight the City's continued commitment to safety, preparedness, and strong community relationships.

Development activity this year focused on long term planning, community investment, and careful review of future projects. The City purchased the lot and buildings next to Plaza Park to support the planned Plaza Expansion and create more space for public use. A major reorganization of City records was completed, including relocating long term files to a new retention site to improve storage and access. The Planning Commission and Council approved the Circulation Element,

and Objective Design Standards were adopted to provide clear guidance for future housing and commercial projects. A Vacancy Ordinance was also adopted to incentivize economic development and reduce long-term commercial vacancies. The City also assisted in the sale of the vacant carwash property, moving a long-time blighted site

toward renewed use. Work continued on evaluating cost reduction options for the Police Department facility design, and early review began on potential development concepts






for the proposed Edge Esmerelda site. Together, these efforts reflect ongoing initiatives aimed at improving community spaces, strengthening planning, and supporting responsible future growth.



Community engagement grew significantly this year as the City participated in and helped coordinate several events, including the downtown Halloween festivities, the Fourth of July parade, a Chamber of Commerce Mixer at the Police Station, and representation at the Citrus Fair and several ribbon cuttings. The new lights and speakers the City purchased for the plaza stage helped elevate the Friday Night Live concert series, and National Night Out strengthened connections between residents and public safety partners; and the Grinch stole Winterfest again! The Police Department also participated in the 2025 Law Enforcement Torch Run, carrying the Flame of Hope through Cloverdale in support of Special Olympics Northern California and amplifying inclusion. Civic engagement



expanded through multiple surveys, increased social media outreach, website cleanup efforts, advertised initiatives, press releases, town halls, and outreach campaigns. Residents are encouraged to follow the City on Facebook and Instagram @cityofcloverdale and subscribe to the newsletter, which shifted to a more photo centered format and is now published the Thursday after each Council meeting. The City also responded to more than one hundred records requests, supporting public access to information. We assisted the Cloverdale Unified School District by hosting field trips at the Water Treatment Plant and City Hall, promoted community attendance at after school sporting events, and while two Student Liaisons completed their terms, after summer break two new liaisons began representing the Cloverdale student body at City Council meetings. Public meeting accessibility improved through upgraded audio-visual equipment at the Cloverdale Performing Arts Center, and Council commemoratively named the walkway between City Hall and the Chamber of Commerce Wolter Way in honor of former Councilmember Gus Wolter. Council also led a community initiative opposing the decommissioning of the Potter Valley Project to help protect regional water supply. This effort required extensive time and coordination by the Mayor and Council to ensure Cloverdale's water interests were strongly represented. Councilmembers continued broader advocacy work through their service on multiple regional boards, reinforcing the City's commitment to active leadership beyond the local level. Council delivered over 20 public recognitions and proclamations, launched a new citizen recognition program, and adopted over 70 resolutions and 6 ordinances that guided City policy. These combined efforts strengthened communication, increased transparency, and helped build a more informed and connected community.

What's Next in 2026

As we look ahead, the City will continue to strive for community wide connection and growth, supported by Council's newly adopted Mission, Vision, and Values, which guide long term planning, reflect what the City strives to achieve for the community, and are available for review on our website. Work will begin on the next two-year budget to ensure that community priorities shape financial decisions. The City will continue implementing the recently adopted tax measure funds to support infrastructure, public safety, and long-term resilience. Renovation of the historic Scout's Cabin in City Park will move forward, and plans will advance for the City Plaza expansion and the remodel of the former Trading Post building. The Soda Springs open space area is expected to open, new lights will be added at the dog park, a new gazebo will be installed at Furber Park, recreation programming will expand, and a new park picnic rental program will launch. The City will also undertake a major transition from a dot net to a dot gov website, a significant project that will update the City's digital presence. The City will continue its advocacy on regional water issues and pursue options that protect long term supply. With three City Council seats on the November ballot, 2026 will also be an important year for civic participation! Thank you to the Cloverdale community for your support, involvement, and continued spirit. We look forward to serving you in the year ahead!



Pig Hunting Now Open

The Friends of Lake Sonoma has announced that its popular feral pig hunting season is now open and will conclude Sunday, March 22, 2026. Hunting is archery and crossbow only; firearms are not allowed in the park.

Hunters are required to register in person at any of the following locations:

- Milt Brandt Visitor Center at Lake Sonoma; 3288 Skaggs Springs Road, Geyserville
- Lake Sonoma Resort & Marina, 4200 Skaggs Springs Road, Geyserville
- Turra's Backroom Archery, 3260 Santa Rosa Ave., Santa Rosa
- West Coast Archery, 2040 Petaluma Blvd. North, Petaluma

Hunters must show a valid driver license and valid California hunting license, as well as a Wild Pig Validation. Each hunter will be provided a Pig Hunting Property Pass for their vehicle and orientation materials. The cost for the pass, good for the entire season, is \$35.

The pig hunts are sponsored by the Friends of Lake Sonoma, a non-profit organization that supports programs at the lake. All money raised is used to cover registration costs, educational materials and land stewardship projects within the park.

Note: Hunters are subject to all park rules and regulations plus all county, state and local laws, and California Department of Fish & Wildlife regulations.



Streaming, Television, or Streaming Television? Will Carter

When I was growing up, my family had a Netflix subscription which became the focal point of family movie nights. Each week we would have a new movie or disc of a TV series delivered in the mail. We would slip the DVDs out of their Tyvek sleeves, load them into the DVD player, and sit down to watch the film. These days of course, Netflix is VERY different.

When Netflix began streaming it kicked off a new age of media consumption. Today, streaming services are ubiquitous and DVD rentals by mail are a thing of the past. As streaming services have become popular, something unexpected has happened; they've started to compete directly with traditional television services like Dish, DirecTV, and Xfinity. These services replace your DVR or set top cable box with an app for your smart TV, Roku, or personal device. The same channels and networks you are already familiar with are available, including the Bay Area news stations and local sports coverage.

Hulu + Live TV, Xfinity Stream, Sling, and YouTube TV are all examples of this new type of service. The benefits of these services include a lower monthly price, no hardware or installation fees, and TV that is easy to take with you on your laptop, tablet, or phone. Of course, there are some tradeoffs, you will need an adequate internet connection (≥16mbps), a compatible smart TV or steaming device, and a willingness to learn a new system for watching TV.

As prices for both traditional television and streaming services climb, many of my customers are rethinking how and what they watch on their TVs. Some folks only use streaming services but will include a PBS Passport or other subscription for live news. Others are sticking to their traditional TVs for most of their watching. However, most people do a little bit of both! No matter how you watch TV, it should be an enjoyable experience with few glitches or frustrations. If you do experience issues with television or streaming, ask a techy friend for help or call a trusted technology service provider to assist you!



City Council Report ~ Eleanore Webster

At the October 22 meeting, Council awarded the first Citizen Recognition award to John Turner for his contributions to Cloverdale over 41 years. (see article "JT Honored", page 5, this issue) Then the Library Commissioner's Report was presented by Commissioner Brooke Greene (see Agenda for more information).

Council amended the Municipal Code to establish objective design and development standards for new housing developments, based on California regulations. Council also approved naming the City Hall/Chamber of Commerce alleyway in recognition of former Council member Gus Wolter. This is part of City property and not a formal street. Council Members then made reports, including mention that the Grange Hall will be the new home of Heaven's Closet and possibly the food pantry.

November 12 meeting, Council proclaimed November Native American Heritage Month, in recognition of local tribal residents. Members of the Cloverdale Rancheria and Dry Creek Pomo Indians were present to receive the recognition. Council also committed to working more closely with tribal members in the future.

Council approved measures to enable construction of Alexander Valley Health Care & Wellness Center (see https:// alexandervalleyhealthcare.org/wellness-center).These changes come from AVH requests to reduce its footprint and begin construction. The measures are needed to address the surrounding infrastructure. Council authorized a grant of \$1.2 million from Low-Moderate Income Housing Fund for this purpose. Financing will address Washington Street extension and storm drain updates. The changes will benefit Washington School as well as access to the area. It will also make the remainder of the property more attractive for development or sale. AVH consultants made a presentation about the project (see www. youtube.com/cityofcloverdaleca). Council asked about power usage and emergency backup, funding priorities, and sources for the estimated costs. Project representatives were present to answer questions about funding and improvements. Esmeralda group then made a presentation (see separate Cloverdale Connect article, page 21, this issue).



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A Promise Kept ~ Gene Marcinkowski

On April 11th, 2014, I contacted then supervisor Mike McGuire about the possibility of the veterans managing the Sonoma County-owned Cloverdale Veterans building. The building was in fairly sad shape at that time, even to the point where the county wanted to sell it. After serving on the county's Veterans Advisory Committee for a number of years, I realized that with all the veterans buildings the county owns, they were all vying for funds to repair and improve each building.

Sadly, the Cloverdale building was not on a priority list, that's why I made the offer. I explained my vision for the building to Supervisor McGuire, who understood and shared that vision with me. James Gore was running for office at that time, and I spoke to him at a meet and greet during his campaign. I explained to him what I wanted to do and he was wholeheartedly in favor of it. The Board of Supervisors agreed to a third-party contract at the persuasion of Supervisor McGuire.

My goal was to convert a smaller trophy room into a veterans clubroom exclusively for the use of veterans to get together, share stories, and general camaraderie that we shared in the services. As managers of the building, we were responsible for renting the building for events, daily upkeep, maintenance of the grounds, and purchasing equipment and products to keep the building running efficiently. This was no easy task as our tables and chairs were old, as were the appliances. However, over the years we realized how much this building was part of the Cloverdale community. People would tell of their graduations, birthdays, wedding receptions, or memorials for loved ones,

and it served as a general meeting place for service groups. Since then, we have tried to do what we could afford, likening it to starting a business on a limited budget where you can only do so much improvement. In the 11 years, we have made a lot of improvements that we are quite proud of: new upholstered chairs, new lightweight tables, linens, dishes for the kitchen. We purchased a new commercial kitchen stove and ovens, and replaced outdated, inefficient, and noisy refrigerators. We removed large oak trees encroaching on the building and replaced a virtual weed field with a patio complete with benches and tables.

Mike McGuire, now Senator, visited our building approximately two years ago and remarked on how much we have done since we took over. We spoke about what I would still like to do. I told him that the commercial kitchen was very outdated and that would be a priority—to replace the inadequate cabinets and remove the asbestos flooring, which is a health hazard. Other projects were lighting, sound systems, a large screen TV for PowerPoint presentations, slideshows to celebrate the life of deceased, and pictures from the past for anniversaries and birthdays in the auditorium. Senator Mike said he would try to help us with some funds to upgrade the building. On Wednesday, October 29th, with approximately 100 Cloverdale residents in attendance, he announced appropriations for the Alexander Valley Health Clinic and the Veterans Building. This funding will be a very welcome addition for our community. I speak for the veterans and citizens of Cloverdale: THANK YOU, MIKE, he remembered us.

How to avoid getting to the airport too early (and still make your flight)

Check the crowds before you fly. Processing time information is available at several airports on the Customs and Border Protection site. https://awt.cpb.gov but remember that CBP airport wait times do not include time to retrieve baggage or navigate through the airport. And you should add an hour to your scheduled depature time, just to be safe.

Sign up for real-time updates on delays, gate changes, and other flight-related difficulties through your airline's app.

Sometimes, the airport is the destination itself. Singapore, which has one of the best malls in all of Asia, the Jewel Changi Airport, outside the gate area. It even has the world's tallest indoor waterfall, called the Rain Vortex. San Francisco, SFO, presents about 40 exhibitions throughout the terminals annually. Many other airports offer similar exhibits and entertainment.

A visit to the airport can also be a wonderful opportunity to exercise by walking through the terminal and checking out the shops and restaurants.

There are some common-sense steps you can take to avoid missing your flight during the busy holidays.

- Check in online and save your boarding pass to your phone, in addition to a paper copy.
- Become familiar with your airport in advance, so you know the location of your terminal and gate, and know your flight number, departure time, and destination.
- Don't forget travel insurance that can help by offering coverage for trip cancellations or interruptions, emergency medical care, and baggage protection, and 24 hr. phone assistance.

Don't check luggage. That adds stress, and there's an earlier cut-off time for checking your bags. If you can avoid checking a bag, you'll save time and avoid becoming a gate camper.

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

On the Wild Side Jennifer Molidor



This dreamy eye of a fin whale is the size of a grapefruit. Fin whales are the second-largest whale on the planet. The largest, the blue whale, visits the California coast along with gray, humpback, and fin whales. These species are protected by the Endangered Species Act. Gray whales travel 14,000 miles between the Arctic feeding grounds and California breeding grounds. Recently, the San Francisco Bay has been awash with whales, delighting

lucky viewers on whale watching tours in the Bay.

Visiting whales are vulnerable to the Bay's shipping lanes and boat activities. 10 gray whales have been killed by ship strikes in the Bay Area this year. At least 80 whales are killed by ship strikes off the West Coast each year, which also harms sea turtles. Ship strikes are the leading cause of mortality for gray, blue, fin, and humpback whales off California's coast, just as automobile strikes are a threat to many threatened species of wildlife across the U.S.

One way we can prevent this is if the National Marine Fisheries Service reroutes and slows shipping lanes and curbs air and noise pollution near endangered marine life. Of course, we could buy local more often, too. Plans like these could minimize harm to whales and sea turtles.

The Marine Mammal Protection Act is another important law. It's saved some whales from extinction. With this law, seafood imports must meet U.S. standards for limiting marine mammal "bycatch." That's the wonky name for the millions of sea creatures accidentally killed by the fishing industry and discarded. Many of these animals are whales, dolphins, and sea turtles.

This winter, try to spot whales in the Bay, whether on a tour or safely from the shore. Learn about the precious roles whales play in keeping our local ecosystems healthy.

The Power of Showing Up



to City Council Eleanore Webster

At the November 12th Council meeting, Esmeralda Project Founder Devon Zuegel and Director of Development Michael Yarne, made a presentation to City Council and Planning Commission (see www.youtube.com/cityofcloverdaleca). This was the first of several presentations planned to go before Council: water impact in December; and Entitlements Package in January. Council potentially will vote in February. The Entitlement Package includes amendments to the Environmental Impact Report, AVR specific plan, SP-1 zoning district, development agreement, infrastructure finance plan, and tentative master map. The final version of the Fiscal and Economic Impact Study is due in January. City leaders take these findings into account when reviewing the proposal.

The proposal includes public river park, roads, walking/biking trails into town, housing, and hotel. The design preserves heritage oaks and restores natural habitats to the half-mile long and roughly 18' tall wood/dirt mound ("Twinkie") left by the lumber company. The park includes public parking and restrooms. The site is in the Russian River Watershed and can expand the river flood plan to capture and store water. Presenters estimate the residential units will be 50% primary residents and 50% second homes; they acknowledged there is no way to know for sure. Planned housing ranges from large homes to small studio apartments. These are market rate homes, including some "affordable by design" lower-priced homes.

Esmeralda does not yet own the property; it is owned by Spight Properties II LLC. A hotel partner is unknown at this point, but the vision is a boutique hotel with about 100 rooms and some "condo" units. Most of the jobs are hotel/service-related jobs. The SMART train would run through the site; Esmeralda is meeting with SMART officials to discuss engineering designs. Solar power is also being considered. There is a proposed school, but Council wants a commitment to work with the Cloverdale School Board. The Presenters said it will be up to the City of Cloverdale on the inclusion of a school.

This project would provide considerable income to Cloverdale, with estimates of \$2.6M in gross hotel TOT revenues and \$2.2M net annual fiscal surplus. Construction will generate about \$2.5M one-time sales and tax revenue. Esmeralda expects to provide \$77.5M in-kind and cash payments toward public parks, infrastructure, stormwater management, schools, fire, and police. The project will rely on public-private partnerships, grant funding and public agency support. Planned buildout spans 11 years, with approvals in 2026 and Phase one (the hotel) in Year 4. Subsequent economic growth, with more business coming because of the town's growing size, is also probable.

Questions were asked by Commission and Council members

- Why the lack of transparency on investors? There are 19 different investors, mostly families local to the Bay Area; their investor base is more democratic than most projects; people want to remain private for obvious reasons.
- Water? Come to next month's meeting.
- Why would hotel guests and residents drive into Cloverdale?
 There are bus, bike and walking paths and people don't limit their activities to their homes and hotel rooms.
- If Esmeralda isn't associated with the Network State, why did Zuegel speak at their conference? Devon speaks at many conferences and she is not part of that association.
- Impact on parking, police and fire department resources? The increased income to the City will more than cover those costs.
- Won't this end up like Stanly Ranch in Napa (see https://www.pressdemocrat.com/2025/10/28/luxury-napa-valley-resort-development-in-230-million-default/)? That's why they're doing the preparation, to avoid that outcome.
- Changes to Cloverdale's culture? Control of the property? Growth can be positive; an HOA is part of the plan.
- Accusations included lying and the Chatauqua model's highlighting of Henry Ford, with reference to his known biases. Devon will consider removing the offensive website photos.

Council encouraged the Presenters to be more transparent on funding sources and ties to other organizations. Mayor Lands talked about three ways towns can grow: increased housing, tourism, and funding. He feels this project does a bit of each and not too much of any. Lands said residents want to avoid being Healdsburg, with an overabundance of tourism or excessive growth. This project can bring income without destroying the town's culture. It can also help support the water system's storage and recharge. Mayor Lands then asked the student liaison for her opinion: she expressed optimism about higher income for the school district through property taxes.





Fresh brussel sprouts are in season and mixing them roasted with dry fruits nuts & cheese makes this dish a winner at the Christmas dinner.

Oven Roasted Brussels Sprouts

- 2 pounds brussel sprouts, rinsed, trimmed and cut in half
- 2 tablespoons olive oil, divided
- 4 tablespoons balsamic vinegar
- 2 tablespoon honey
- ½ teaspoon salt
- Dash of pepper
- ½ cup crumbled blue cheese, (or you can use goat cheese)
- 1 cup dried cranberries
- ½ cup pecans, walnuts, almonds, or pistachios

Instructions

- Preheat oven to 425 degrees F.
- Prepare the brussels sprouts by washing and drying them thoroughly (wet sprouts won't roast properly).
- Trim the stems and remove any outer leaves that are wilted or damaged.
- Slice sprouts in half (or quarters if they're very large) to ensure even cooking and expose more surface area for caramelization.
- In a large mixing bowl combine the brussels sprouts, 1 tablespoon olive oil, salt and pepper. Spread on a large baking sheet (you want the brussels sprouts to have space so if it is too crowded use two baking sheets).
- Roast the brussels sprouts for 20 to 30 minutes or until tender and golden brown around the edges. The exact cooking time will depend on the size of your sprouts.
- Remove from the oven and return to the large mixing bowl. Toss in the additional 1 tablespoon olive oil, balsamic vinegar and honey.
- Add the blue cheese, dried cranberries and pecans. Put on a platter and serve warm.

Leftovers will keep for up to 4 days in the refrigerator in an airtight container.
